## Preston Calves Go to Feedlots

One of the largest bunches of calves to leave Wichita County were trucked out last Saturday from the D. R. (Doc) Preston ranch headquarters Southwest of Burkburnett. These calves, weighing between 500 and 600 pounds, were purchased by Matney the cattle buyer of Amarillo, and were on their way to feed lots in Colorado.

Nine hundred seventy-eight nice fat white face calves made up the shipment. These calves were contracted for 'way back in the spring at a set price, which was a little above the present market price.

For the past several years Matney has bought Preston calves. Doc of Electra and Hugh of Burkburnett have half a dozen pastures scattered all over Wichita County.

Matney buys 6,000 to 7,000 calves each year. A long distance telephone call may cinch a deal involving \$50,000 to \$100,000. He knows his sellers and they know him. It's just that simple.

You can usually find the correct number by comparing with the houses in your block. Even numbers should be used if you live on the WEST or SOUTH side of the street and odd numbers should be used if you live on the EAST or NORTH side of the street.

## GRASS ROOTS OPINION

**NEWBERRY, S. C. Observer:** "The greatest danger facing Americans today, discounting foreign aggression is the insidious expansion of the powers of our central government and the gradual but obvious lessening of the powers of the individual states."

**PAMPA, Texas, Daily News:** "We are tremendously benefitted by every new labor saving device. By this means we are able to multiply our individual human energy to the point where one man plus tools, can produce things that many men require."

**KINGSLEY, Iowa, News-Times:** "Some members of Congress are firmly convinced that lower taxation for corporations are essential to encourage industrial expansion essential to meet the nation's future needs. Taxes necessarily are added to the price paid by the consumer for the products corporations manufacture."

**ANGOLIC, Ind., Republican:** "Our educational problem is two pronged: a lack of proper classroom space and a shortage of teachers. The Federal government is now taking about one third of people's income and returning to the local communities a small fraction at a great cost in the charge of handling. If the Federal government should return to the states certain areas of taxation or certain percentage of income taxes collected, the state, under local supervision, could meet the tremendous problem confronting it."

## NO SUBSTITUTE

In that letter to Russia's Premier Bulgannin, that President Eisenhower signed during Secretary Dulles' visit to Denver, he indicated acceptance of the Reds' idea of inspecting our military on the ground, providing they accept his Geneva proposal for exchange of military blueprints and reciprocal aerial inspection. Under the Russian plan, we would exchange inspection teams to be placed at vital military concentration points.

"I have not forgotten your proposal having to do with stationing inspection teams at key points in our countries," concludes the President's letter, "and if you feel this would create the better spirit I refer to, we could accept that too."

Once more General Eisenhower has laid it on the line. He has made it clear that the Russian ground inspection plan is no alternative, but he has graciously accepted it "too". All the Reds have to do is to accept his.

They have been unable to kick the President's proposal around until it got lost.

## NO LAW TO PROTECT JURIES

Few revelations of our time are more shocking, and none more sinister than the discovery that a Federal jury room in Wichita, Kansas, was "bugged" and recordings made of the jury deliberations, with the reported consent and approval of the chief judge, the trial judge and the attorneys on both sides of the five cases involved.

Prof. Harry Kalven, who conducted this "research" for the Law School of the University of Chicago, under a \$400,000 grant from the Ford Foundation, says the idea was to "improve the administration of the court system."

Attorney General Herbert Brownell, Jr., says of this outrage of May 1954: "We in the Department of Justice are unequivocally opposed to any recording or eavesdropping on the deliberations of a jury under any conditions, regardless of the purpose." He said further that he would ask Congress for a law to prevent it.

Chairman James O. Eastland, of the Senate Security committee, will hold hearings and "recommend whatever legislation shall be necessary to insure that anyone who so violates the sanctity of the jury room in the future will find himself in violation of the law."

Somehow, we had always thought that there was a law against jury tampering. And we had also naively supposed that a judge or a lawyer who colluded in this act would be considered even lower as a moral offender than laymen who might be involved.

Senator Eastland thinks that any lawyer cooperating in such an enterprise as the Wichita "research in law and the behavioral sciences" merits the "severest censure."

All this will be interesting to sundry characters who are now in stir for failing to have the proper respect for our jury system.

Plans are now under way concerning a downtown page to be held before the football game Nov. 4th.

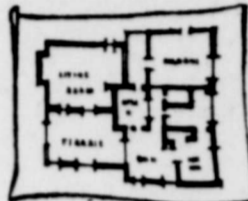

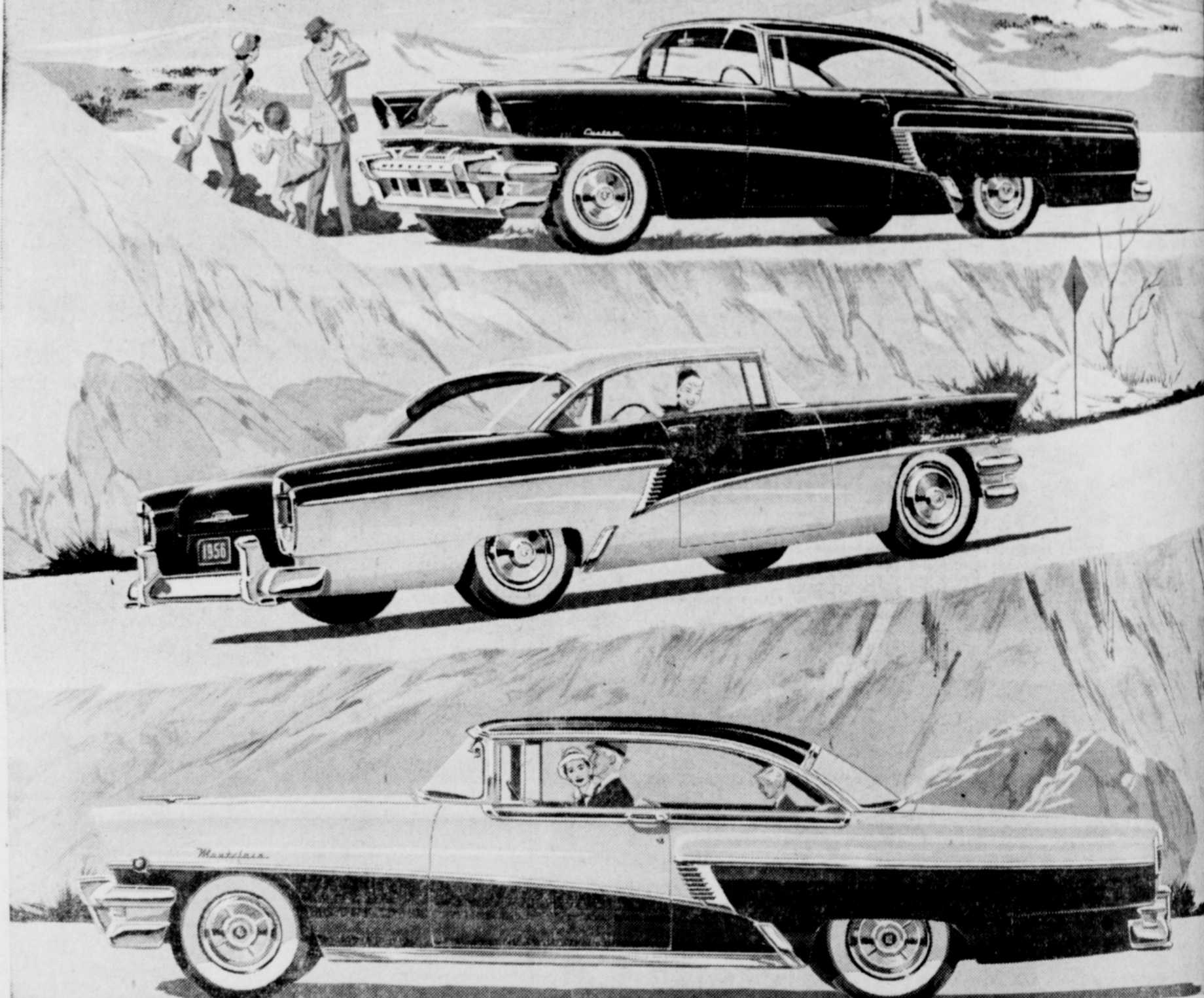

## Beware Pitfalls of Budgeting Experts Says Retail Mer.

Possible pitfalls in doing business with debt adjustment agencies by persons who think they are "hopelessly" in debt were outlined this week by Charles T. Lux of Austin, executive vice-president of the Retail Merchants Association of Texas.

Lux said such agencies, some times called pro-raters or budget plan houses, were numerous in the East and California, but had only recently penetrated into Texas, thus far only in the largest cities.

These firms, operated by persons who pose as "professional budgeting experts," offer to rehabilitate people who have found their earnings cannot meet payments for the debt they have incurred, Lux said.

They propose to do this by setting up payment schedules for each debt, budgeting earnings and arranging with creditors to carry the account until the debt is paid in full.

"This sounds very attractive to a person who is so far in debt he cannot see how he will ever get out," Lux said.

"But what he doesn't realize is that for this advice and ser-

vice he is charged a fee," he explained. "The fee sometimes ranges as high as 40 percent of his total indebtedness and usually no less than 15 percent," he explained.

"For a debt of say \$300, the fee will increase the debt to anywhere from \$345 to \$420."

What happens then is the professional budgeting expert not only takes a large slice of the money that would go toward retirement of debt, but also piles on a new debt, he said. Thus, instead of keeping a debtor from bankruptcy, he is plunged closer to it.

Experiences in other states show Lux said, that the debt adjustment agency usually takes out its fee before making any effort to retire a person's debt.

Lux said a few states have laws regulating the operation of debt adjustment companies, among them Minnesota, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, Maine and Colorado.

There are no laws in Texas that control their operations, he said.

Lux said the best way a debtor, who is pinched to meet his payments, can meet his bills is to call upon his creditors and explain the situation frankly.

"Before you sign up with any one or pay a fee, it is wise to contact your creditors and seek their advice."

"It will be found that the

merchants of Texas as a general rule are an understanding group, he said. They are just as interested as the debtor in seeing that the slate is wiped clean, and usually can make some adjustments that will bring about financial stability.

"The results you get by seeing your creditors are the same as those promised by a professional pro-rater and there is no extra charge or fee attached."

### TVA Story

Continued From Last Week

Congress has refused and... to spend another \$100 million of public funds to build a second full-page advertisement... which would further subsidize the production of electric power, about \$1.5 billion in such glowing... the 1955 Tennessee Valley... speaks in such glowing...

The city is described as "the Electrical Center of the South," with the highest average annual kilowatt-hour residential consumption, 9,050 kilowatt hours, of any city equal size or larger in the world." The advertisement goes on to point out that— Power, low cost power and plenty of it is what the people of Chattanooga demanded in 1939 when they established the publicly owned electric power board of Chattanooga.

The following statement will be interesting to the rest of the taxpayers of the country who have helped to foot the bill for this low cost power: Through 1954 our customers have saved \$96,191,795 (based on private power rates in 1939) in electricity costs with rates that are less than half the national average. They have used this power to enjoy better living on farms, in homes to increase production in business and industry.

Who do you suppose made it possible for the customers of the electric power board of Chattanooga to save more than \$96 million on their electric bills? It was the taxpayers of the entire country, who supplied the \$1.5 billion invested by the Congress to develop first hydroelectric power and then steam generated power as the demand grew for cheap, subsidized electricity. I must say the copywriters were a bit loose with the facts in another part of the advertisement when they state that all

have invested \$57 million in industrial expansions during the same period.

The advertisement is an invitation to other industries to avail themselves of the benefits of low cost power subsidized by the Nation's taxpayers.

A second full-page advertisement further extols the virtues and benefits of life in Chattanooga, although the sponsorship of the advertisement is not listed.

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appropriations for electric-power development are repaid to the National Government with a 6 percent interest payment.

TVA pays no interest to the Federal Government and it does not pay normal taxes.

In fact, the editor of the Yearbook, in a presentation on page 35 of the publication, states that TVA has paid to the Federal Treasury \$123 million on the original investment.

Compare that with the \$1.5 billion of public money which the Federal Government has invested in TVA to date.

According to another full page advertisement sponsored by the electric power board of the City of Nashville:

More than 22,000 homes are heated by electricity in the Nashville-Davidson County area, largest unit of electricity heated homes in America.

Nashville folks live better with cheap abundant electric power. Says the advertisement.

Life in Nashville is lighter and brighter because of cheap convenient electric power.

We earnestly advise any industry considering the establishment of a new southern factory branch plant, or distribution warehouse to come to Nashville, where you will receive the finest electric service in the entire nation.

The advertisement concludes with this slogan: In Nashville we say "Electricity: It should be with the rest of the nation helping to pay for it. I want to give credit where credit is due.

Not all of the people of then Tennessee Valley area are happy about relying on Federal handouts.

Following a recent appearance which I made on television to explain the background of the TVA development and the administration's policy with regard to further expansion of power facilities in that area, I received a number of letters and tele-

grams from all over the country from people who agreed with that policy.

Some of these communications were from the Tennessee Valley region. One postmarked from Knoxville, comments in part:

I heartily agree with your views on TVA on Today program this morning. All honest people agree with you. I buy my own shoes with no help from 41 states.

Even the editor of the 1955 Tennessee Valley Yearbook recognizes that a situation exists which should not continue, pointing out on page 37 of the publication that.

Sooner or later we must live within our income; we should repay to the United States Treasury the full cost of TVA for the good of our souls.

Cutting through the smoke-screen of misrepresentations, innuendoes, false charges and sly insinuations, the issue can be defined as whether the taxpayers of the country are going to be required to underwrite the continued expansion of public power for a favored section of the country, whether the expansion shall continue until we have completely socialized the power industry in America, or whether we are going to realize that "cheap" public power is a myth, an illusion created by the fact that many are paying for the benefits of a few.

It is time we heeded the logic of President Eisenhower who wrote, in a letter to the Honorable Sterling Cole, of New York at that time chairman of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy:

My general thinking on the subject is this: it seems to me that all arguments for the construction by the Federal Government for the additional steam plant ignore this one and very important truth. If the Federal Government assumes responsibilities in perpetuity for providing the TVA area with all the power it can accept, generated by any other means whatsoever, it has similar responsibilities with respect to every other area and region and corner of the United States of America.

No one quarrels with the original purpose of the TVA, to promote flood control, navigation and recreation in the area and

to dispose of the surplus power generated incidentally.

But we have now arrived at the point where more than twice as much power is being generated by auxiliary steam plants as is being generated by the hydroelectric installations.

President Eisenhower also wisely pointed out in his budget message earlier this year that—

To the greatest extent possible the responsibility for resource development, and its costs, should be borne by those who receive the benefits.

The President has also suggested that studies be made looking to legislation which will provide that an adequate rate of interest be paid to the Treasury on appropriated funds invested in power facilities in the Tennessee Valley Authority."

I think that proposal is sound. It is time that TVA stands on its own feet.

It is time that the people of this region show an appreciation of the advantages already given them, meeting their obligations to the rest of the Nation's taxpayers by reimbursing the United States Treasury at an equitable rate.

I am glad the people of Memphis have decided to proceed with the construction of a power plant to supply their own needs.

As long as they are willing to invest their own money, pay interest on the funds they borrow, pay back the principal and work out the manifold problems of such an enterprise without coming to the Federal Government for subsidies, I say more power to them.

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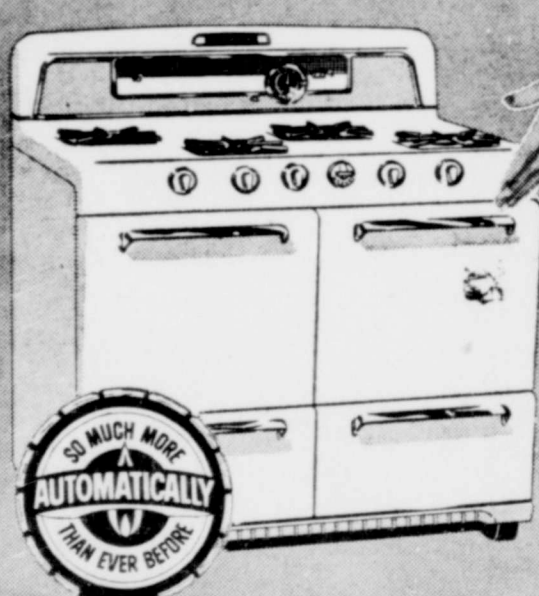

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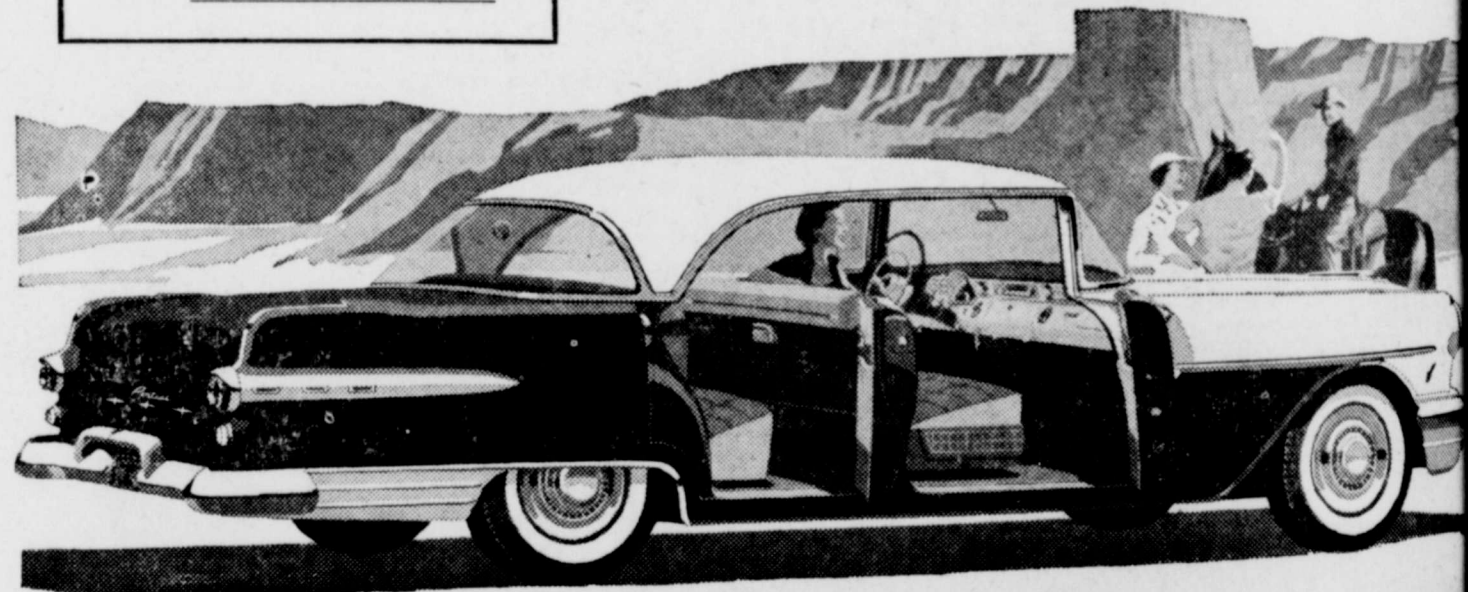

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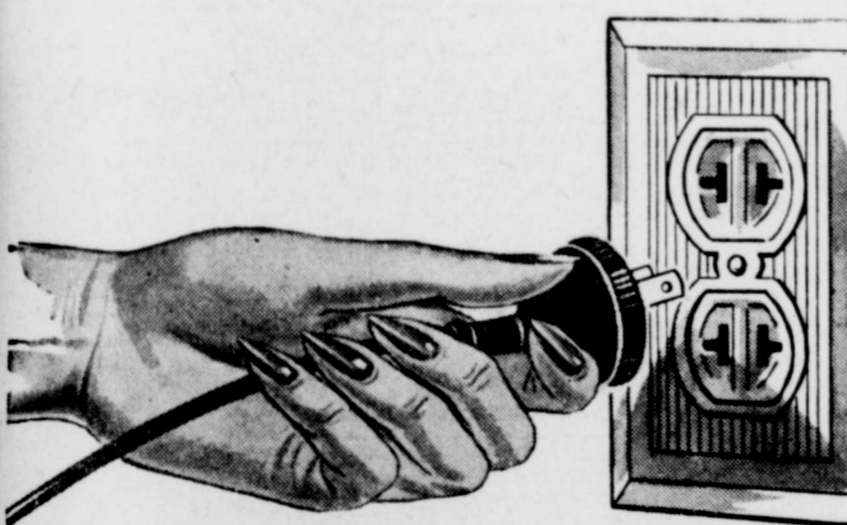
