## Background of Roger W. Babson



Roger W. Babson

Babson has probably done more than any other man to help among his millions of newspaper readers an interest in business problems, and to present a broader vision in business, enabling them to see the ups and downs of the business cycle.

## WAGES TELL THE STORY

Why does it cost much more to operate an American merchant ship than a comparable foreign flag competitor, thus making it necessary for the government to provide a moderate amount of financial aid in order to keep our essential merchant fleet in business.

Many factors are responsible—and one of the big ones is wages.

All manner of authorities, from President Eisenhower on down, have emphasized that the merchant marine is necessary to our military security and our economic well being. And the differential payments made to shipping lines, under rigid rules and provisions, represent a sound approach to the problem of low-wage foreign competition. So do other policies, such as the 50-50 law, which provides that half of all government cargoes must be sent abroad by American flag ships, if the ships are available, and if they offer fair rates.

## GRASS ROOTS OPINION

**BALTIMORE, MD., Daily Record:** "Every merchant and manufacturer knows that there is a point of diminishing returns in the process of raising prices. They know too that it is possible to price an article completely out of its potential market. This is a point which a few labor leaders might well take to heart, for labor too can price itself out of its market."

**PLAINFIELD, IND., Messenger:** "If reports of the government's indebtedness make you sick in the pit of your stomach, just stop and think what causes much of it. We're not beyond the reach of the doctor. We've been asking for too much from the government, a habit acquired by 20 years of a 'do everything' regime in Washington. Just ask for less, it's that easy."

**SAN MARINO, CALIF., Tribune:** "Democracy, freedom, equality of opportunity, justice, enlightenment, are precious gifts that must be wanted so badly that life itself is not too high a price to pay for their defense. We must be ever alert to the threat posed by those among us who would barter these gifts away for the security they think will be found under a despotism they hope will be benevolent."

## Seventeen States Lead the Way

Much is heard of civil liberties these days, and properly so. Great questions concerning the rights of political, religious and racial minorities are being debated. There is renewed emphasis on such basic rights as the free press and free speech. The courts are being called on to establish far-reaching precedents.

Yet there is one right of which we hear less than we should. It is one of the most vital of all the rights. And that is the right to work, free of coercion by either employers or employ groups, free of the necessity of joining any organization and paying dues to it.

No one any longer denies the right of a man to join a union, if that is his desire. But the principal unions, driving for the closed shop, deny that a man has the right not to join and still earn his livelihood. The closed shop is incompatible with every principle of individual freedom. And the union shop differs from it only in unimportant degree.

Seventeen states have abolished the closed shop by law, and affirmed the right to work. This is not an anti-union movement, if any union is able to organize 100 per cent of a company's workers, on a free and voluntary basis, it is entitled to do so. It is, on the other hand, a movement designed to end a form of tyranny as indefensible as any exerted by employers in the far-off past.

### New Light on an Old Subject

Mr. Evans from the Lighting Company gave an interesting talk at the Community Hall last night—on how farmers can cut electric bills. For those who missed it, here's a short recap.

Don't try to light up the cobwebs in the rafters. Use a reflector and a smaller bulb will probably do the job. Too many farmers use naked bulbs that waste 50% of the light.

Try using moveable projector bulbs that beam light the way a searchlight does. A couple of these "spots" will often give you better illumination than a gas of juice-wasting overhead lamps.

From where I sit, it's amazing how often we misuse the things we have... like electricity. We also make a mistake if we misuse our right of personal choice about which candidate to vote for, say, or whether beer or coffee makes the ideal mealtime drink—by trying to force our opinions on others. Respect for the other fellow's point of view should be our "guiding light."

## Savings Bonds Make Ideal Gifts For Christmas

The U. S. Savings Bonds Division today pointed out that many investors apparently are unaware of the co-ownership provisions of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds. In response to inquiries being directed to the Treasury Department,

A. D. Leatherman, Acting State Sales Director, gave the following explanation of the provisions:

"Although individual purchases in any calendar year of Series E Bonds are limited to \$20,000 (\$15,000 purchase value) and of Series H Bonds to \$20,000 (purchased at par), additional holdings by individuals are allowed under co-ownership provisions.

"For example, take the case of a family of four, none of whom are registered owners or co-owners of Series E Bonds purchased in this calendar year; the husband can purchase \$20,000 (maturity value) in E Bonds in his own name, and if he wishes, he can also purchase an additional \$60,000 (maturity value) in E Bonds registered as follows: \$20,000 in his name with his wife as co-owner; \$20,000 in his name with one child as co-owner, and \$20,000 in his name with the other child as co-owner.

"In this example, the husband as the sole owner of \$20,000 and as co-owner of \$60,000 in E Bonds, can redeem all or part of the Bonds without obtaining the signature of any of the other co-owners. The same co-ownership provisions apply to Series H Bonds since purchase limits of E and H Bonds are applied separately. In the case of the H Bond, semi-annual interest checks on the full amount held individually and in co-ownership are mailed to the owner.

"Series E is an appreciation Savings Bond earning interest for as long as 10 years after original maturity of 9 years and 8 months. The H Bond is a current income Savings Bond paying interest by check twice a year and maturing in 9 years and 8 months. It is issued and redeemable at face value."

The one she put together on the show was an asymmetrical design in a ceramic container. She used wisteria vines, magnolia leaves, yucca and trumpet vine seed pods.

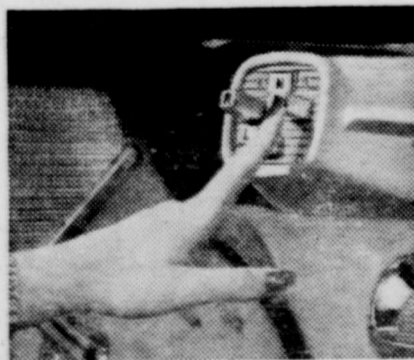

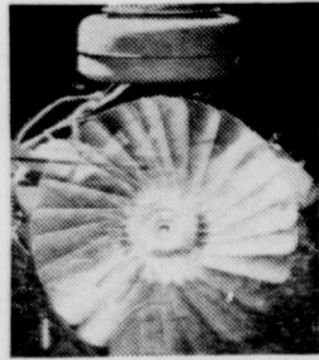

## Early Christmas Mailing Noted

The Burkburnett Postmaster A. H. Lohoefer announced today that there has been a steady increase in the flow of Christmas cards and packages through the Post Office the past few days. He said he was glad to see that many people are getting their Christmas gifts for distant points into the mail.

Stressing the need for everyone to cooperate on his 1955 "Mail Early for Christmas" campaign, the Postmaster says that by following these three simple rules, you are certain to have your gifts delivered before Christmas Day: Wrap them securely. Address them correctly. And mail them early.

He went on to say, "Of course early mailing of all Christmas cards and gifts is a big factor in getting everything delivered before Christmas. Keep in mind that careful packing and correct addressing is equally important. Every year many poorly wrapped packages break open despite careful handling and we often have to puzzle over addresses which are incomplete or simply

cannot be read at all.

He urged that patrons ask for free copies of a new publication, "Packaging and Wrapping Parcels for Mailing," now available at the Burkburnett Post Office. Advance care in preparing gift packages for the mails and making sure that all addresses are legible and complete will prevent disappointment to sender and receiver alike.

"If you have any article of unusual size or bulk, better check with the Post Office before attempting to mail them," the Postmaster warns. "The limits on size and weight of packages varies, depending on where you mail your package from."

than 72 inches in combined length and girth, nor more than 20 pounds in weight. In others, the limit goes up to 100 inches in combined length and girth and 70 pounds in weight.

It is always better to use corrugated cartons for shipping your gifts especially where there are a number of various sized objects. Use plenty of wadded tissue or newspaper in the cartons for extra protection against shock. Complete each package by wrapping in heavy paper and tying it with strong cord.

As extra precaution against loss, the Postmaster advised placing both your return address and the recipient's address inside the carton or package before it is wrapped.

Don't seal your parcel unless you include a notice reading "Contents merchandise, may be opened for postal inspection" and the recipient's address on the mailing label. If you use Christmas stickers, or seals, place them on the back of your Christmas cards and packages so they will not conflict with the address on the front. Before you release your packages be sure that proper postage is firmly fixed to each. This information can be obtained from another free publication, "Domestic Rates and Fees."

## Mail Early For Christmas

Reporting that his "Mail Early for Christmas" campaign is really in high gear, postmaster A. H. Lohofener today gave some helpful hints on how you can be sure that your Christmas cards will reach everyone on your list before December 25th. "When you use three cent stamps on your Christmas cards, you get first-class mail service," he said, "first-class friends deserve first-class mail and the use of first-class postage makes it certain that your Christmas cards will be delivered promptly. Also, use of first-class postage insures forwarding service if the addressee has moved or if the card will be returned to you if the recipient cannot be located. Then, too, on Christmas cards sent by first-class mail, you can include handwritten messages making your greetings more personal."

It is perfectly correct and, in fact, advisable to include your return name and address on each Christmas card envelope. This helps your friends to keep their mailing list up-to-date and insures correction of your list if the card is returned an undeliverable.

Postmaster Lohofener warns that if any of your Christmas card envelopes are larger than 9"x12" or smaller than 2 3/4"x4, they must be sent by first-class mail because such cards require hand cancellation.

When your Christmas cards are ready to mail, you will do both yourself and the Burk Burnett Post Office a real favor by putting the cards with LOCAL addresses in one bundle and those for OUT-OF-TOWN destinations in another. Then mark each bundle with special identification labels you can get free at the Post Office which read

"ALL FOR OUT-OF-TOWN DELIVERY" and "ALL FOR LOCAL DELIVERY".

If you have a large card list mail your out-of-town Christmas cards several days in advance of
