## SEEMS TO BE FILLED

As is frequently the case with the suggestions of former President Herbert Hoover, his idea of a second Vice-President of the United States, has stirred up wide-spread comment and discussion. In a recent TV appearance on "Meet the Press", Mr. Hoover was asked if he thought the Vice-President should have greater powers. He replied that this job had been expanding in recent years and now covers about as many duties as it could. "My suggestion is that what we need is a new Administrative Vice President to be selected by the President and assigned such duties as he may wish. It could be done by legislation."

Most commentators seem to agree, as we do, with the Hoover idea. We would go even further and say that his suggestion was implemented some time ago, in the person of Sherman Adams. But Mr. Hoover says "Assistant President" Adams lacks legal authority in much of the area in which an Administrative Vice President might function.

If this is so, we are sure it has never occurred to Mr. Adams, or to Attorney General Brownell.

But we still think that when the President is unable to perform the duties of his office, the elected Vice President should be the replacement.

## "THIS HURTS ME MORE . . ."

A "Temporary State Commission on Youth and Delinquency" will ask the New York State Legislature for a "parental responsibility" law under which parents can be fined or imprisoned, or both, for the misdeeds of their minor offsprings.

In its report to Governor Harriman, the Commission urged that the courts be given the power to compel the parents of juvenile delinquents to restrain and correct their young hopefuls, and to take the rap if they fail. The suggested maximum penalties would be \$250 fine or 30 days in jail, or both.

We congratulate the Commission on the sanest approach yet offered on this problem—and wonder if the solons will have the courage to implement it.

## CHANGE ON THE LAND

Fifteen years is a short period of time. Yet in the past 15 years vast and often revolutionary changes have taken place in this country. And nowhere has change been more marked than in agriculture.

In those 15 years, the farm population declined by 2,500,000 people. In those same 15 years, the country gained 30,000,000 in population. There are 30,000,000 more mouths to feed, and they are being fed, better than ever before.

How can 2,500,000 fewer farmers take care of the wants of 30,000,000 more people?

The biggest part of the answer to that question can be provided in one word, and the word is mechanization. Agriculture not only has more farm equipment, but it is better equipment, more productive, more economical to operate, more trouble-free, more versatile. So every farmer and farm worker can get out more produce, and get it out with less waste and less labor.

The significance of this will deepen as time wears on. Our population continues to soar, and people continue to demand higher living standards. It seems certain that time and tide, if nothing else, will solve our current farm surplus problems. The machine is the assurance of plenty.

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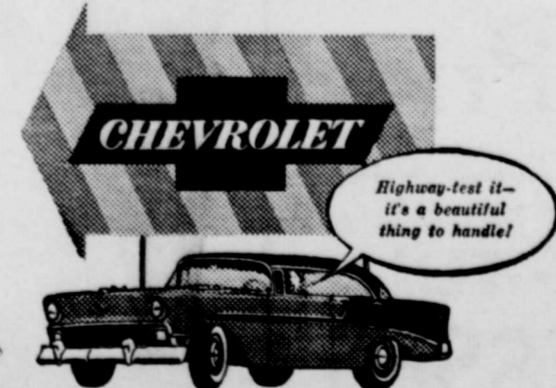
