### Lone Star Drivers Accident Free

Two Burkburnett employees of the Lone Star Gas Co. have earned certificates of merit for driving an automobile in line of company duty without an accident, according to A. W. Breenland of Dallas, assistant personnel director in charge of safety. They will receive the awards at a company safety meeting in Wichita Falls March 21, Breenland said.

W. R. MILAM, local manager, holds an 8 year safe driving record and F. B. MAXWELL, serviceman, has driven a vehicle four years without an accident. The certificates will be presented by Glynn Covington of Ranger, Lone Star safety engineer. He said that an employee must drive a vehicle at least 5,000 miles in a year to qualify for a safety award.

### Kite Warning

Safety rules for boys and girls who fly kites were outlined today by J. B. Ady, manager for Texas Electric Service Company, in anticipation of the opening of the 1956 kite flying season.

As explained by Ady, the five safety rules in order of their importance are, First fly your kite out in the open where it won't get caught in wires or trees. Second, use only string made of cotton, silk, linen, nylon or rayon. Third, use only wood in your kite frames. Fourth, fly kites only in good weather. You don't want to get them rain soaked. and fifth, if your kites should get caught in electric wires, call Texas Electric Service Company. They will send someone to get it down for you.

Local youngsters who fly kites have been very careful in the past about where and when they flew their kites," Ady stated. We had a perfect record last year with not one boy or girl being injured and only a few kites demolished. This year, I fully expect that even the number of kites lost will be reduced because it seems that every year, our boys and girls listen more carefully to our warnings and cooperate better in making kite flying safer.

To further impress children that safety is all important in kite flying, Texas Electric Service Company is providing posters for all school bulletin boards and announcements for school principals.

### Burk Man Hurt In Car Accident

#### OKLA. FARMER KILLED

One man was killed and another critically injured when the car in which they were riding went out of control near Grandfield, Okla., late Tuesday.

Edgar L. Haynes, Jr., 34, apparently was killed instantly when the automobile crashed into a bridge abutment 10 miles west of Grandfield. Haynes was identified as a farmer near Davidson.

Walter Slusser, 56, resident of Burkburnett, was in General Hospital in Wichita Falls Tuesday night with critical injuries. State troopers were not sure Tuesday night who was driving the car at the time of the accident. Another passenger of the car, Frank Elliott, also a resident of Burkburnett, was slightly injured. He was released from the hospital following emergency treatment.

Slusser had not regained consciousness late Tuesday. He is employed by a pipeline construction company.

Troopers who investigated the accident said the car ramed the bridge abutment, careened across the road and overturned. All three were thrown from the vehicle, a 1946 model Chrysler.

Haynes remained unidentified for several hours after the accident. His body was taken to a Grandfield funeral home where relatives made identification several hours after the crash.

## GRASS ROOTS OPINION

**BREEZ, ILL., Journal:** "Pravda, the chief Russian newspaper, gives familiar advice to those who would retain advanced years. They should avoid worry, sleep regularly, avoid excessive smoking or drinking. This leaves out the most important requirement: Don't Criticize the government."

**BISHOP, CALIF., Register:** "Rather than ask for price support at the expense of the consumer, cattlemen have launched a self-help effort to stabilize the present difficult cattle situation. They've gotten together with other people in the beef business, the feeders, packers and retailers. All cattlemen ask is that the public help itself to beef, particularly to the less demanded cuts which are in such great supply right now. They point out that these cuts can be as tasty, when properly cooked, as those cuts we pay more for. And they're every bit as nutritious."

**BEDFORD, VA., Bulletin:** "We believe in price supports because it is the only system yet devised which gives agriculture something at least akin to an even break, but we do not like the way the system has been administered and abused."

## PEACE A LA RUSSE

There is no longer any question of who is who in the Kremlin. Nikita S. Khrushchev, technically First Secretary of the Soviet Communist party, made it clear in a seven hour speech to the Twentieth Congress of the Party in Moscow that he is the head man. The more photogenic Nikolai A. Bulganin, who became Premier of the USSR when Khrushchev sent Stalin's stooge Georgi Malenkov to work in the power plant, is kept around for odd jobs such as writings to Presidents and as a traveling partner.

As if to prove his unassailable position as the new god of Communism, not only in the USSR, but worldwide, Comrade Khrushchev, in his seven hour explanation of peaceful intentions and what is going to happen next, calmly refuted the gospel of Marx and Lenin. He declared these idols were wrong in their dictum that "while imperialism exists, wars are inevitable." Instead, he indicated that Communism would follow the "Leninist principle of peaceful co-existence," especially since the Capitalist countries are coming apart at the seams anyway.

"It is true," said Mr. Khrushchev, "that we recognize the necessity for the revolutionary transformation of capitalist society into Socialist society." But he went on to suggest that it doesn't need to be as bloody as the Bolshevik Revolution, unless there is resistance.

"Of course," he said, "in countries where capitalism is still strong and where it controls an enormous military and police machine, the serious resistance of the reactionary forces is inevitable."

"There the transition to socialism will proceed amid conditions of an acute class revolutionary struggle." This will not be war, mind you. The enemy army will not be wearing soldier suits, and will not be recognizable as enemies but will be composed of spies and infiltrationists and saboteurs and the forces they have been recruiting right here through the years. What Comrade Khrushchev mal military machine, and without giving us obvious cause is saying that he can destroy us without calling on his force to direct our own forces against the USSR.

Thus, it's pretty hard to see that the new head man has altered the sacred Marx-Lenin blueprint noticeably.

## Free Nations Are Like Gardens

A well kept garden is beautiful and may appear free of pestilence. But every gardener knows the garden's beauty will soon decay and fall into ruin without constant care and protection from weeds, rodents, insects, fungi and its other enemies.

A free nation is like that garden. It must be everlastingly guarded against enemies within as well as without who would gradually eat our freedoms away, until the stage is set for the final destruction of representative government dedicated to maximum liberty and opportunity for all.

## WHO IS HIT HARDEST?

The Federal income tax begins at 20 percent, on the lowest taxable incomes. From there on it rises until it reaches 91 percent in the high brackets.

You might logically judge from this that people of large means, because of progressive taxation, pay most of the tax bill. But they don't. Eighty-four percent of all individual income taxes collected come from the basic 20 per cent rate, and only 16 percent from the surtaxes. As Graham Patterson put it in Town Journal. "So the high rates are actually more destructive of income than productive of revenue."

Excessively costly government hits everyone — and it hits the people of moderate means hardest. There are not enough rich people to carry the load.

## Do-It-Whose-Self?

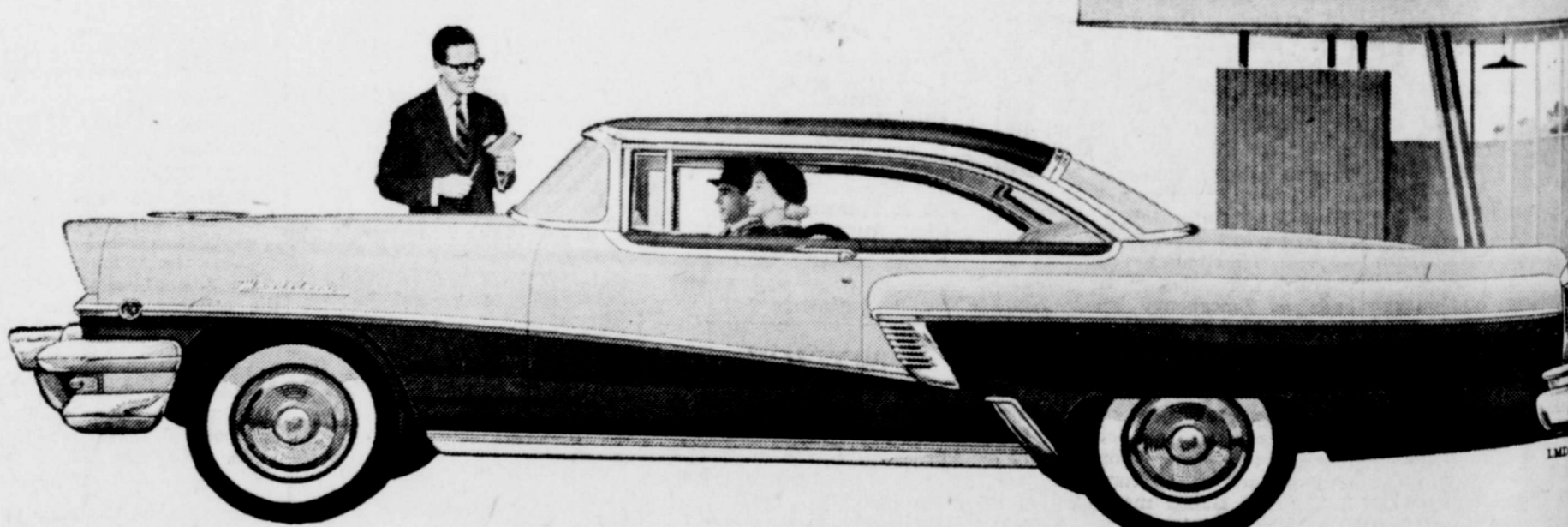
Monk McCarthy's almost as good at publicity stunts as he is at servicing and repairing cars—which is pretty darned good.

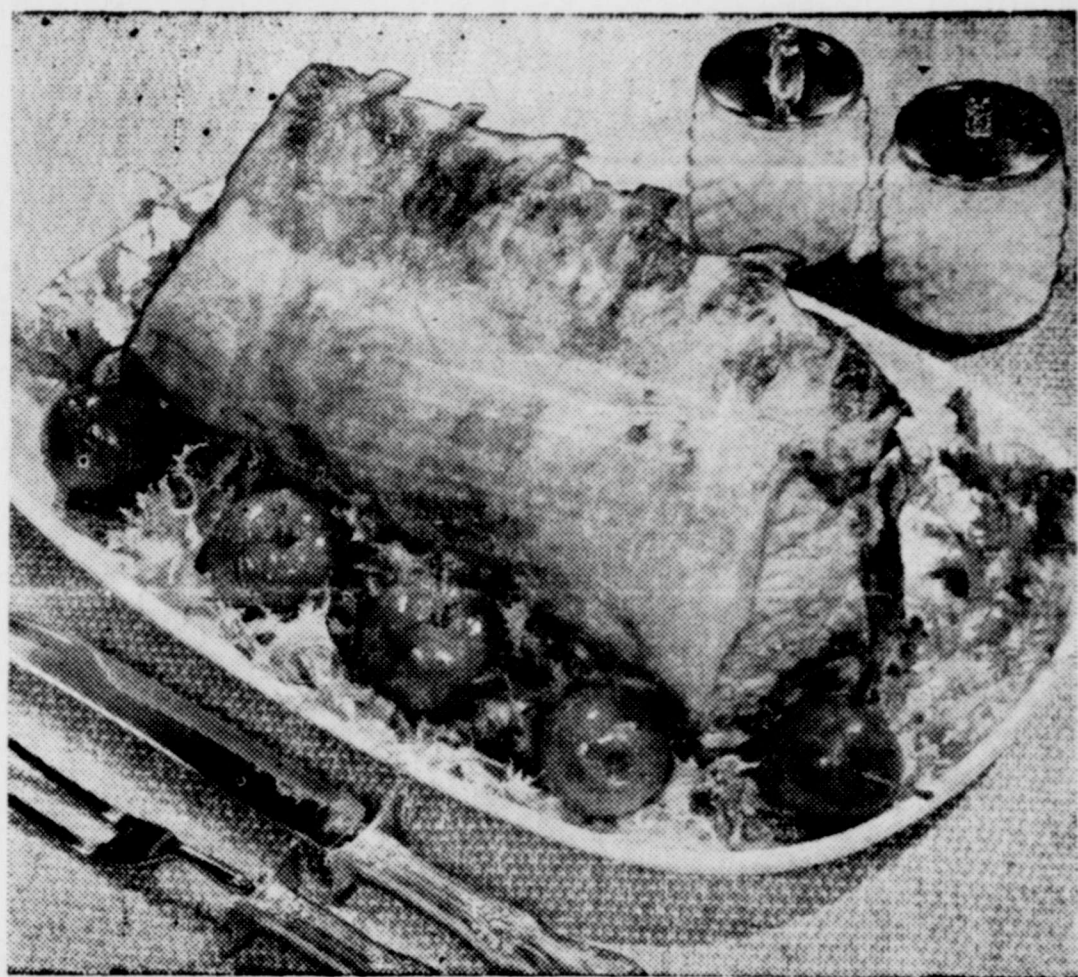

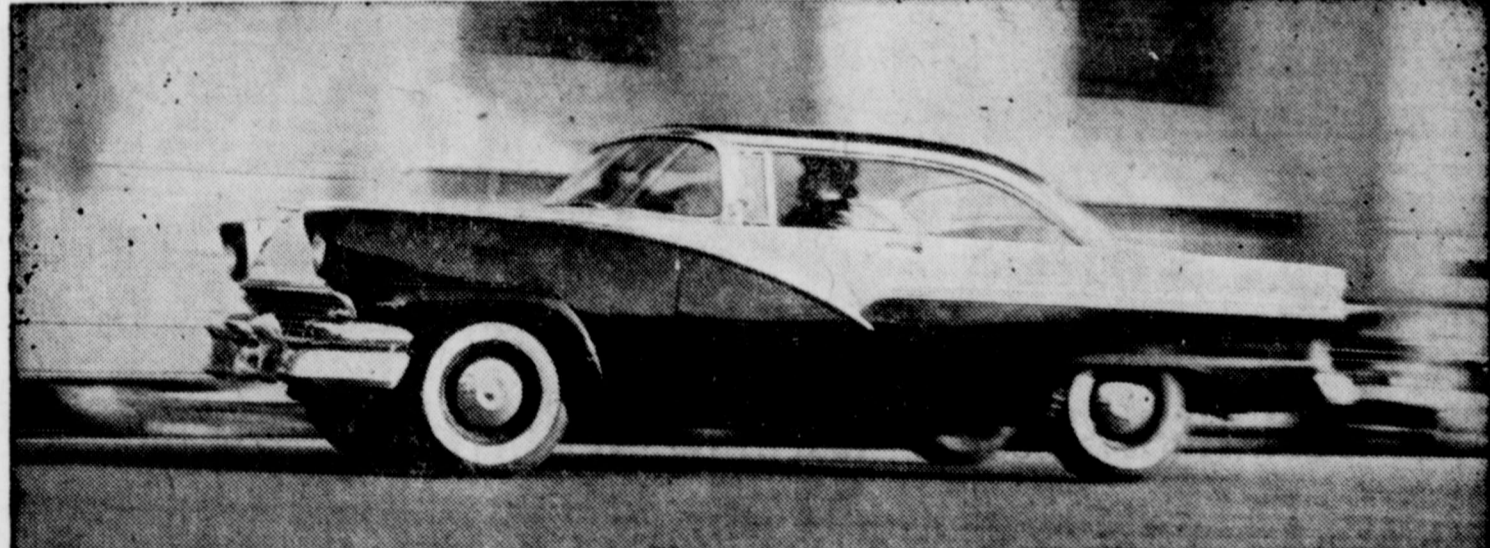

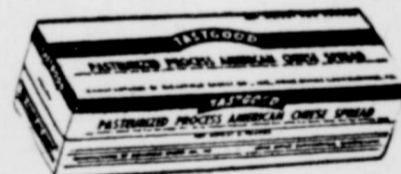

## Firms Ed By yment Tax

38,000 Texas firms employing from four to 20 employees are now liable for the new unemployment tax on their payroll. The recently enacted Texas Unemployment Compensation Act, signed by Gov. James V. Allred, requires that employers of four to eight employees pay a tax of 3 percent on their payroll. Firms with 23,000 more employees are expected to be required to pay the tax by July 1, 1956.

Under the Texas experience rating plan, the Federal Government continues to collect 3-10 percent for administrative purposes. However after qualifying period of from 1-2 to 2 years, the State tax rate can

stable firms with very low turnover, such as the drug store, grocery, barber shop, service station and cafe. This stability suggests that unemployment insurance claims may be made very rarely. Consequently, tax rates can be held low.

The opportunity to save taxes through the experience rating system in the Texas law is one of the reasons why the Legislature brought in the smaller firms.

Had this not been one, these employers of four to eight would have had to pay full 3 percent federal tax.

Under the Texas experience rating plan, the Federal Government continues to collect 3-10 percent for administrative purposes. However after qualifying period of from 1-2 to 2 years, the State tax rate can

range from a maximum of 2.7 percent to a minimum of 1-10 of 1 percent. The TEC collects this State tax. The experience rating feature of State operation of the unemployment insurance program saves Texas businessmen millions of dollars each year.

Any employer who has employed four persons in 20 weeks during 1955 should notify the Texas Employment Commission in Austin now, so that information on how to comply with the law can be sent to him.

## Notes From The HD Agent

If you're an average American you ate your way through \$435 worth of food in 1955. And, chances are, you'll spend the same or more this year unless you plan carefully to cut food costs.

The fact that we're eating out more than we used to, and buying more highly processed and more expensive foods accounts for the increase in family food costs in the last ten years.

Here are some ways to cut food costs. Suggested by Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent.

Buy the "makings" instead of ready-baked and ready-cooked

foods, unless time is more important than money.

Grow some of your own groceries in a garden. If you live on a farm, produce your own meat and milk, poultry or eggs.

Freeze or can fresh vegetables and fruits for use when the price of fresh produce hits a seasonal high peak.

Prevent food waste. If you need more detailed suggestions for planning the food supply, planning meals, growing a garden, or freezing and canning, contact your county home demonstration agent.

It's hard to get enough calcium or riboflavin into your daily diet without using a good deal of milk, according to Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent.

From infancy all the way thru

the teens it takes large amounts of calcium to keep up with the growing body's calcium needs.

Nutritionists recommend three to four cups of milk per day for children; one quart or more for teen-agers; two or more cups for adults; one quart or more for expectant mothers and six cups or one and one-half quarts for nursing mothers.

In diets for losing or gaining weight, milk is considered a basic need. When reducing, milk is good because it contributes generous amounts of protein and calcium per calorie. Skim milk provides all the nutrients in whole milk, except fat and Vitamin A.

Whatever your age or weight, be sure to include enough milk in your daily diet.

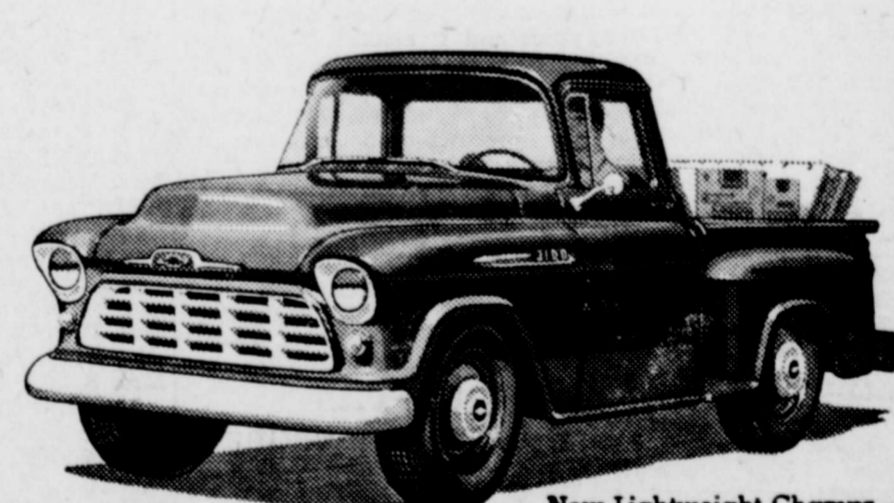

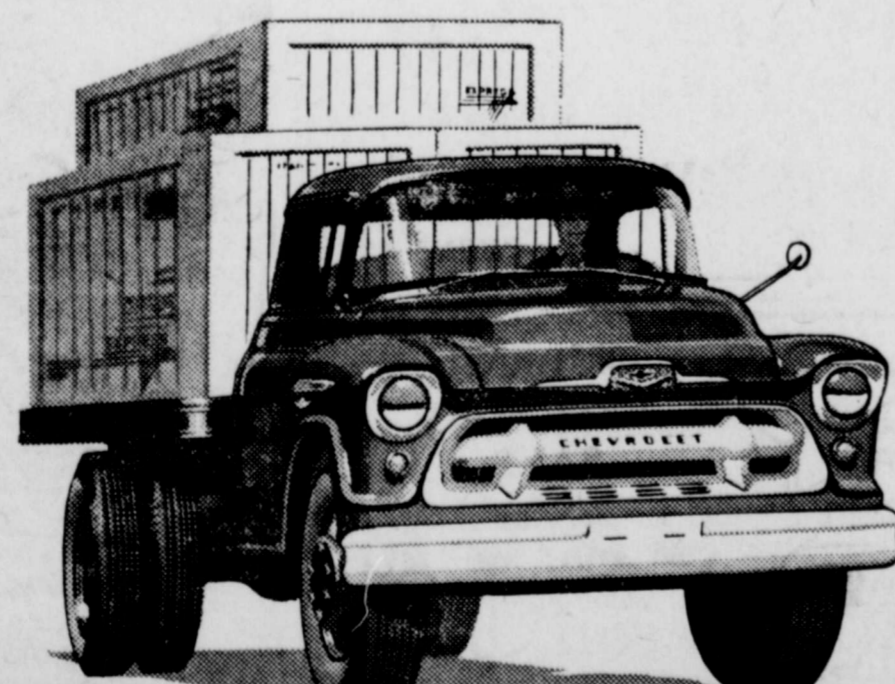
