Three Injured Near Randlett

Three members of an Arkansas family, including the 18 month old son, were seriously injured Sunday in an automobile accident just south of the Randlett city limits.

Admitted to Wichita General Hospital in Wichita Falls, were George Brewer, 22, his wife, Billie Jo, 18; and their son, William Madison, 18 months. The father is most seriously injured and had not regained consciousness late Sunday.

Brewer was placed on the hospital's critical list. The Brewers were riding in the front seat of their automobile that collided with a 1955 model Ford sedan driven by George B. McClellan Howell, 58, of Randlett. The Brewers were all hurled from their automobile by the impact. The accident occurred at 12:30 p. m. Sunday.

Oklahoma State Trooper Kenneth Skelton of Waurika, Okla., said the Brewers' were driving west on Highway 70 when their automobile was struck broadside by the Ford coming off the County Road 15 feet south of the city limits.

The Brewers' 1953 Chevrolet sedan overturned two times before coming to rest upside down. Howell and his wife, Minnie, 55, were slightly injured but were not taken to a hospital.

A Pearson Funeral Home ambulance brought the injured Brewers to the hospital. The Brewers are residents of Parks, Ark.

L. T. "Tolly" Wilson Seeks Office of District Attorney



A native of Wichita County and a practicing attorney since 1950, L. T. (Tolly) Wilson has announced he will seek the Democratic nomination for District Attorney in the primary.

Wilson said: "I pledge that, if elected, I will devote my full time to the honest, impartial and vigorous enforcement of all matters which come within the jurisdiction of the District Attorney's office."

"I further pledge to extend the fullest co-operation of the District Attorney's office to the Sheriff's office and police departments, as well as with the Grand Jurors in their investigations of criminal matters in Wichita County."

Wilson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Wilson of 2706 Tenth, Wichita Falls. Since 1950 he has been associated with his father in Wilson and Wilson, Wichita Falls law firm, in the general practice of law. His father has been a practicing attorney 40 years. This is Wilson's first try for public office.

Wilson attended elementary school and high school in Wichita Falls. He graduated from high school in 1941 and attended Hardin Junior College one year.

Following his schooling at Hardin Junior College in Wichita Falls, he entered the University of Texas. His college career was interrupted by three years' service in the Army in World War Two. He served in the 76th Infantry Division, including nine months overseas in the European Theatre of Operations. He was in the Battle of the Bulge, the Battle of the Rhineland and the Battle of Central Germany.

Wilson is a member of the First Methodist Church of Wichita Falls, the Blackstone Club, the Wichita County Bar Association, the State Bar of Texas and the American Bar Association. He and his wife, the former Miss Joyce Morrison of Olney, Texas, reside at 1532 Malcolm Lane. They have one daughter, Laura Lee, 2. Mrs. Wilson's mother is Mrs. Laura Morrison of Wichita Falls.

Wilson returned to the University of Texas after military service, received a B. B. A. in 1949 and L. B. in 1950. He is 32 years old.

Wilson has been active in Democratic politics several years.

Sen. Geo. Moffett Seeks Re-Election



The Burkburnett Star is authorized to place the name of Senator George Moffett of Chillicothe in our announcement column as a candidate for re-election to the State Senate from the 23rd Senatorial District, composed of Archer, Baylor, Cottle, Foard, Hardeman, Haskell, King, Knox, Throckmorton, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young Counties.

The first native to represent this district in the State Senate, Senator Moffett has been a leader in that body for several years, and is said to be the author of more amendments to the State Constitution than any other member. They include amendment to speed up court procedure and to build a state office building. The latter will be started soon and will save the State hundreds of thousands of dollars in office rent each year.

Often called "Cotton George," Senator Moffett has vigorously championed efforts to broaden markets for farm and livestock products, especially cotton. He maintains that finding broader markets for farm and ranch products is the best long range solution of the farm surplus problem.

Senator Moffett has shown strong interest in matters affecting his district, as well as those of statewide importance, including oil development, the schools, and war veterans. He is the author of the County Veteran Service Officer Law and other measures for veterans. He is regarded as being an independent thinker who votes his honest convictions upon legislative matters.

"I regard public office as a public trust, to be filled in the public interest," stated Senator Moffett.

"I have never been offered a fee during my service in the Legislature. I pay my own campaign expenses."

"I favor and have voted for bills requiring members of the legislature to register the names of companies or persons from which they receive fees. The people are entitled to such information."

"The last Legislature did the best job of tightening Texas insurance laws that has been done in fifty years. Fourteen hundred insurance companies were attempting to do business in Texas almost as many as in the other forty-seven states. I voted for all the bills which closed the loopholes in our insurance laws, and if further strengthening is needed, I will support bills to do so."

"Our state hospital system needs more building to relieve badly overcrowded conditions. The system also needs to secure more nurses and doctors, and to increase the very low salaries of present employees."

"I expect to discuss other issues during the campaign."

"I have always voted a straight Democratic ticket and will appreciate your vote and support in the Democratic primary. Thank You."

The third annual stubble mulching field day sponsored by the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District will be held April 19 and 20th, Fenton Dale, chairman of the board has announced.

The mulching will be in four communities this year as follows April 19th at 9 a. m. on the J. W. Tole farm at Friberg, at 2 p. m. on the J. J. Dwyer farm 5 miles west of Burkburnett. April 20th at 9 a. m. at Emil Fluesche farm three miles east of Punkin Center and at 2 p. m. at Henry Wolf farm 3 miles north of Iowa Park.

The Implement dealers of Wich-

ita Falls, Burkburnett and while Elvy Sargent and Ladd of the Soil Conservation Service, B. T. Hays, County Agent, Dr. Carl Midwestern University Crocker, Wichita County will assist the supervising mulching day operations. The Soil Conservation cites the following reasons for stubble mulching: (1) adds organic matter to the soil, (2) stubble increases filtration of rainfall, and es water holding capacity soil, (3) stubble left on the surface helps protect wind and water erosion, stubble on or near the increases air space in soil.
