# Conservation of Our Water

We all know, that Burkburnett has always had a problem as far as water supply is concerned. We were very fortunate last summer in getting showers spaced through the summer months so we did not have to ration at all, but if we have a dry summer this year, of course, water will have to be rationed.

There are a number of things we as individuals can do to help, not only to conserve the water supply but also to save us money on monthly water bills, for instance, a hole 1-64 of an inch in diameter which actually is not as large as the average pin, will at normal line pressure waste 170 gallons in 24 hours, multiply this by 30 days and you have lost 5,000 gallons of water, or \$1.25 worth. Leaking faucets in bathroom, kitchen sinks and yards will waste a large amount of water in a months time.

A lot of water is wasted and unusually high water bills are caused by the cutoffs in flush tanks in the bathroom not shutting off completely. It is a good practice to lift the tank cover and check every few days, to see that the water is not running through the overflow pipe.

Also the float can be set so as to save 1 to 1 1-2 gallons of water each time the tank is flushed without impairing the flushing actions. When you count up how many times the average family will flush the tank in 24 hours you can easily see how much water that will save in a months time. Also see that floats in evaporative coolers are properly set to keep them from overflowing. A soaker type hose for watering shrubs and lawns will give better results for the amount of water used than a sprinkler will, as you don't have the large amount of evaporation from them that you do sprinklers.

The summer months will be here soon, so if you have any of the above mentioned things that can be done it is a good practice to get them done now and not only help conserve our water supply but also help keep down high water bills.

## A Critical Problem - And A Solution

Secretary of State Dulles and Atomic Energy Commission Chairman Strauss have said the long range security of the country may be seriously affected by the continued shortage of scientists and other specialists.

Russia is producing about 60,000 trained engineers annually while colleges and universities in this country are graduating only 22,500.

What can be and is being done to bring more qualified American students into engineering? An answer is found in an approach, originated by Michigan State University, called JETS - Junior Engineering Training for Schools. JETS brings the facts of engineering to young people in high school at a time when they are deciding on their

Since the first JETS club was organized in 1950, the

program has grown to include 75 clubs in 18 states with an active membership of more than 2,000 boys and girls.

The hard facts of engineering, that mathematics and other "non glamorous" subjects are musts, are stressed. This approach both emphasizes the realities of an engineering career and helps to steer students, who have misconceptions about engineering and whose talents fall in other areas, away from the profession.
