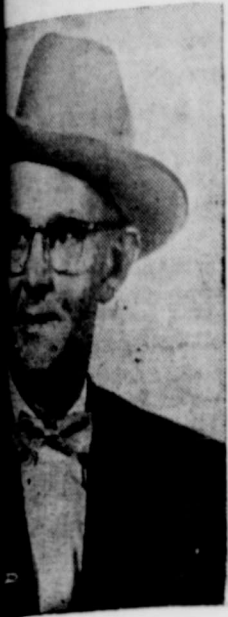

## Conservation of Our Water

We all know, that Burkburnett has always had a problem as far as water supply is concerned. We were very fortunate last summer in getting showers spaced through the summer months so we did not have to ration at all, but if we have a dry summer this year, of course, water will have to be rationed.

There are a number of things we as individuals can do to help, not only to conserve the water supply but also to save us money on monthly water bills, for instance, a hole 1-64 of an inch in diameter which actually is not as large as the average pin, will at normal line pressure waste 170 gallons in 24 hours, multiply this by 30 days and you have lost 5,000 gallons of water, or \$1.25 worth. Leaking faucets in bathroom, kitchen sinks and yards will waste a large amount of water in a months time.

A lot of water is wasted and unusually high water bills are caused by the cutoffs in flush tanks in the bathroom not shutting off completely. It is a good practice to lift the tank cover and check every few days, to see that the water is not running through the overflow pipe.

Also the float can be set so as to save 1 to 1-2 gallons of water each time the tank is flushed without impairing the flushing actions. When you count up how many times the average family will flush the tank in 24 hours you can easily see how much water that will save in a months time. Also see that floats in evaporative coolers are properly set to keep them from overflowing. A soaker type hose for watering shrubs and lawns will give better results for the amount of water used than a sprinkler will, as you don't have the large amount of evaporation from them that you do sprinklers.

The summer months will be here soon, so if you have any of the above mentioned things that can be done it is a good practice to get them done now and not only help conserve our water supply but also help keep down high water bills.

The grounds in and around the seating capacity will be sprayed. The lights and lighting effects will all be checked and in readiness by Jim Ady, chairman of lights.

## Estes Files For Precinct 2 Post

Dow Estes, 53 year old Burkburnett school district tax assessor-collector, filed his candidacy Monday for county commissioner in Precinct 2, Burkburnett.

Estes opposes the incumbent, Clark Gresham, Burkburnett druggist, for the rest of the unexpired term of the late W. T. (Slim) Holman. The term will expire January 1, 1959.

The commissioner elected in the general election Nov. 8th will take office immediately afterward.

## Special Election

Gresham edged Estes by three votes in a special unofficial election Feb. 25th to win a runoff spot against Lee Beckham, Precinct 2 highway foreman. Gresham defeated Beckham a week later in the runoff and was appointed by County Judge Guy McNeely to serve as commissioner until the general election.

Estes said Monday he will conduct an intensive campaign. "I will see every voter in the precinct," he said. Estes pointed out, "I know everyone already, but I'm going to renew acquaintances."

Estes, a native of Olustee, Okla., in Jackson County, has been a resident of Precinct 2 for 33 years. He has lived in Burkburnett for the last 11 years.

## Rodeo Caller

He is tax assessor-collector of Burkburnett Independent School District. Estes is a well known rodeo mounted square dance caller and public address system announcer.

He was tax assessor-collector of the former Fairview Independent School District in Thrift Community 12 years before its consolidation with the Burkburnett district.

Estes was voting precinct chairman in former Precinct 38 (Thrift) more than seven years. He is a member of Burkburnett Church of Christ. He and his wife, Bessie, have five children.

## Salute To The Salvation Army

Everybody knows the Salvation Army, yet nobody knows it. It is known for action, yet it fights so self-effacingly, on so many fronts, that practically no one outside its ranks can tick off for us the many facets of its "practical service in God's name."

From May 20th through 27th, all America will commemorate National Salvation Army Week, and doubtless learn more about this amazingly selfless organization that began its work in the US with eight people 76 years ago. Today there are 5,000 officers in the Army, nearly a quarter million members, and almost 17,000 business and professional men and women serving on its Advisory Boards across the nation. And we might add that not the least remarkable aspect of Salvation Army week is the fact that there will be no appeal for funds!

The Army's best known work, perhaps, is the rehabilitation of homeless men. Conducted in 1955 through 110 social service centers, it started 42,987 men on the "road back." It served 13,743,333 meals to the cold, hungry and homeless. Additionally, it operated 187 hotels and lodging that sheltered 2,473,099 men and women who were homeless and broke and provided homes for low income people at low cost.

Famous also for its war and disaster work, its service units, more than 3,000 of them, accompanied our armed forces in every part of the world in World War II. Salvation Army rescue teams, an important part of the National Civil Defense organization operating 99 rolling canteens, aided 103,971 victims of storms, floods, fires, explosions and wrecks in 1955.

During 1955 the Salvation Army visited 129,888 prison inmates, expanded the work of its "Lifters Club" and the "Brighter Day League" which helps those returning to society. Hundreds of prisoners, paroled to the Salvation Army, are helped to find jobs and adjust to family life and freedom.

Oldsters, lonesome and frustrated, deprived of family life, are given companionship and opportunities for work and play and earning through the Army's "Golden Age clubs," and help is given those needing institutional care.

Last year in the crowded neighborhoods of our big cities, 327 Salvation Army youth centers provided spiritual guidance and recreation to 3,930,131 boys and girls and almost 33,000 spent healthy and happy vacations at Salvation Army Camps.

The Salvation Army locates mission persons, aids unmarried mothers and performs many other humane and spiritual offices, most often for those who have no other place to turn. But why say more of this Army whose only command to all comers is: "Ask, and ye shall receive."

Simple attachments to convert your turn light to this double duty are available now. They may soon be standard equipment on new cars. The question is 'How much more blood must stain our highways before this flashing "disablement flare becomes mandatory?"

INDIO, CALIF., NEWS: "The House Agriculture Committee has approved legislation that would authorize the Department of Agriculture to go into the business of building big dams. If this bill becomes law, the nation will have three big dam agencies. But we wonder if there is any taxpayer outside the bureaucracy, who wouldn't agree that we have dam-building agencies aplenty right now?"

## A Critical Problem - And A Solution

Secretary of State Dulles and Atomic Energy Commission Chairman Strauss have said the long range security of the country may be seriously affected by the continued shortage of scientists and other specialists.

Russia is producing about 60,000 trained engineers annually while colleges and universities in this country are graduating only 22,500.

What can be and is being done to bring more qualified American students into engineering? An answer is found in an approach, originated by Michigan State University, called JETS — Junior Engineering Training for Schools. JETS brings the facts of engineering to young people in high school at a time when they are deciding on their future careers.

Since the first JETS club was organized in 1950, the

program has grown to include 75 clubs in 18 states with an active membership of more than 2,000 boys and girls.

The hard facts of engineering, that mathematics and other "non-glamorous" subjects are musts, are stressed. This approach both emphasizes the realities of an engineering career and helps to steer students, who have misconceptions about engineering and whose talents fall in other areas, away from the profession.

Supported by enthusiasm from teachers and students alike, the JETS program offers a real solution to a critical problem.

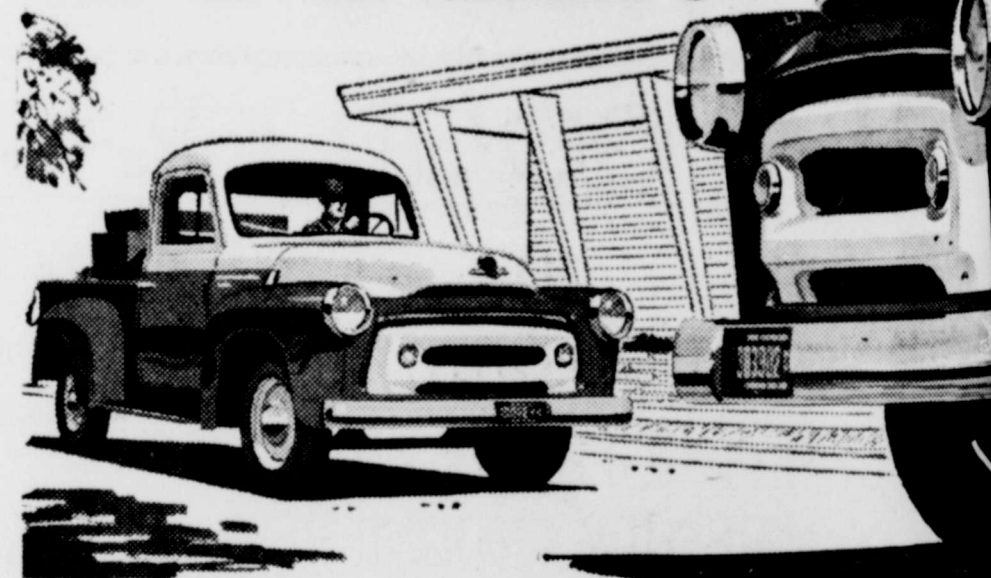

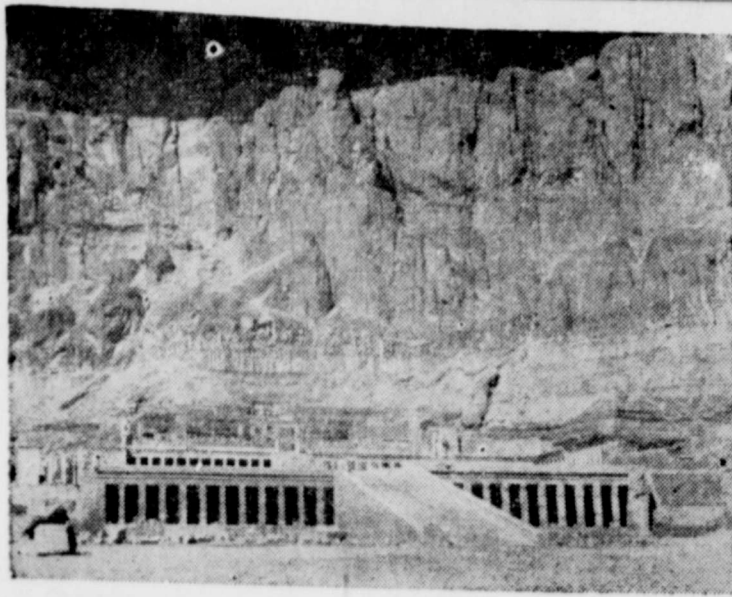

## May Is Month To Check Pecan Trees

Early May is the time the Wichita County farmer needs to check his pecans for their number one enemy, the pecan casebearer. This insect does more damage to the pecan crop than any other insect. A general rule to go by in spraying is to apply your spray application just after pollination or when the tips of the tiny nuts begin to turn brown, says B. T. Haws, county agent. Of course it is best to find the eggs but we have found that spray application made about the time the tips of the tiny nuts turn brown is satisfactory. You can examine the trees earlier and if the new growth on the twigs has been fed upon, it is usually evidence that you will have a generation of casebearers. The overwintering worms feed on this new growth, but the generation that actually does the damage to the nuts is the one that is produced by the overwintering generation.

There are several insecticides that may be used in controlling the pecan nut casebearer. You may use either 3 lbs 50 percent wettable DDT or 2 lbs 15 percent wettable parathion or 1 pint 40 percent nicotine sulphate

plus 2 quarts summer oil. This amount is to be used in 100 gallons of water. Sprays are ineffective after worm enters nut, warns Haws.

If you are bothered with rosette on your pecan trees, (this is a common disease of pecan trees in Wichita County) spray the trees with 36 percent zinc sulphate at the rate of 2 lbs to 100 gallons of water. Make first application at the time of casebearer spray.

If you want your progress to stop, just be totally satisfied.

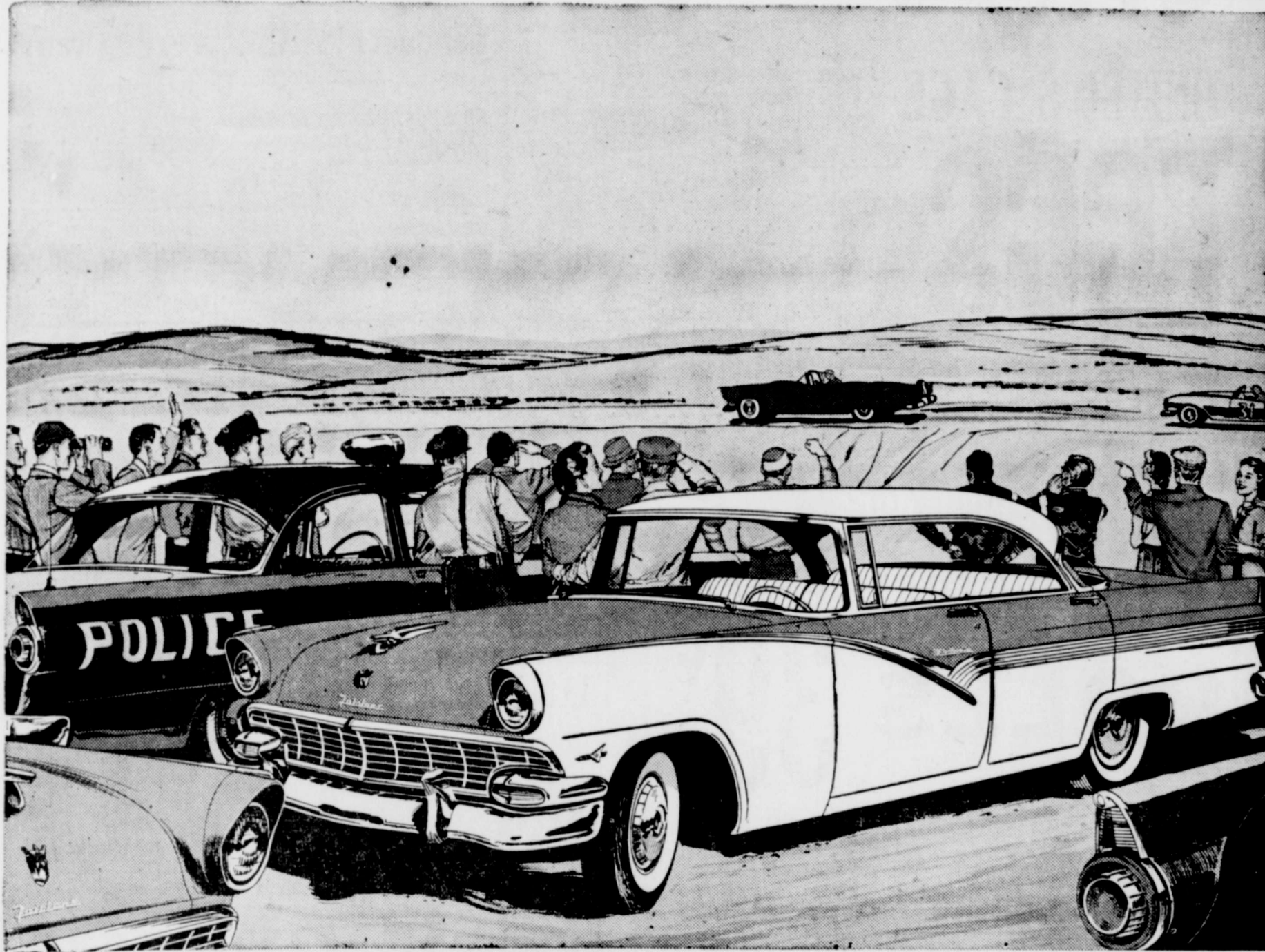

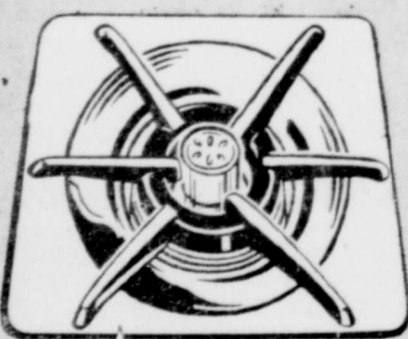

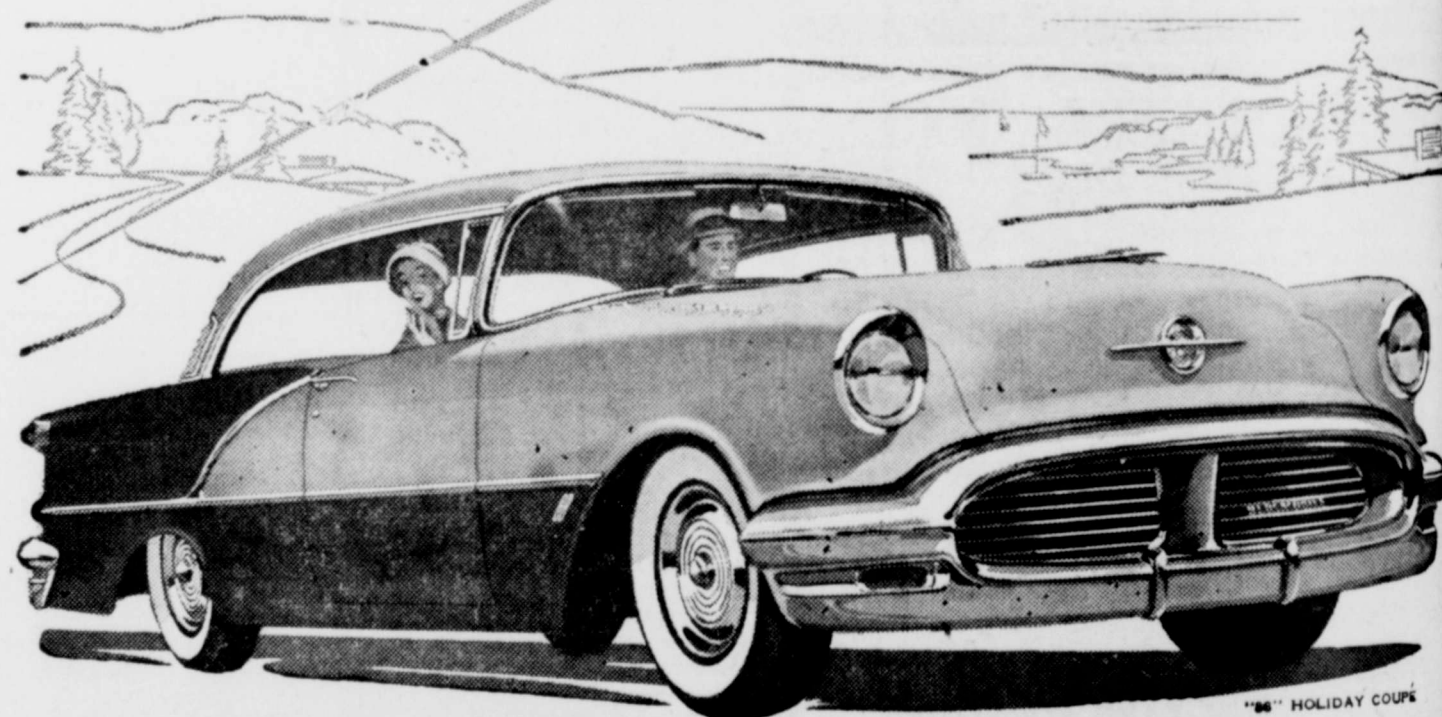

**Cairo Attracts**  
 Thousands of Visitors  
 Modern Skyline

Cairo, the capital of Egypt and one of the largest cities in the world, is attracting thousands of visitors a day to see the Pyramids, the Sphinx, the beautiful mosques, the ancient treasures at the Egyptian Museum, and to shop at the famous Musky bazaar. The city is modern hotels to accommodate about 3,000 persons, and the completion of the new Hotel and the Nile Hotel, now under construction, hotel accommodations are considerably increased. There are some sixteen museums and palaces to visit, more than 100 important mosques and monuments and a number of Christian churches and monasteries, dating back to the days of Christianity. The major Egyptian University with an enrollment of more than 35,000 students are in Cairo and there are other colleges and technical schools, including the University of Cairo, the Academy of Oriental Studies, a Society of Arts, and frequent showings of painting and sculpture at the Opera House. The winter brings to Cairo annually the Grand Opera Company, and the Comedie Francaise from Paris. Cairo is a city of beautiful parks and a tree-shaded drive along the Nile where tall mastodons feluccas on the waters in stately silhouettes their huge sails billowing in the breeze. Cairo's Zoo has rare animals and its tropical conservatory has many exotic plants. Town planning is the projects of the New Cairo and a long range plan for the city well under way. Traffic is regulated, parking areas are provided, and many streets are paved. Two large projects are planned to expedite the delivery of foodstuffs and to provide for their refrigeration. The distinguishing landmark of the city is the Citadel, which overlooks the city from one of the Mokattam Hills. It was first built by the Crusaders, Saladin. On its summit is the Mohammed Mosque, its great dome and minarets rising skyward, a symbol of Egypt's history.

## Farmers Eligible For Refund On Federal Excise Tax

Good records will make the job of preparing a claim for a refund on gasoline used on the farm easier and the farm tractor a more efficient production tool, says B. T. Haws, county agent. Farmers are now eligible to ask for a refund covering the 2 cent per gallon Federal Excise tax. To get a refund, a farmer must file after June 30th and before October 1, a claim with the District Director of Internal Revenue covering the gasoline used during the first six months of the year. After 1956 refunds will be made for a one year period from July 1 to June 30. Refunds, explains Haws will be made only on gasoline on a farm for farming purposes. They will not include gasoline used in cars or trucks used on the highways even though on farm business. The recently enacted law also applies to diesel and other motor fuels. The claims must be filed on Form 2240 which will be avail-

## Cotton Producers Use Oil Spot For Control Of Grass

Cotton producers in 104 Texas counties used the spot oiling method for controlling Johnson grass last year on 73,637 acres of cotton. According to B. T. Haws, county agent, the control method was first recommended last year and its popularity and value have already been well established. When compared with other commonly used control practices, spot-oiling requires less hand labor, the oils used are readily available and compar-

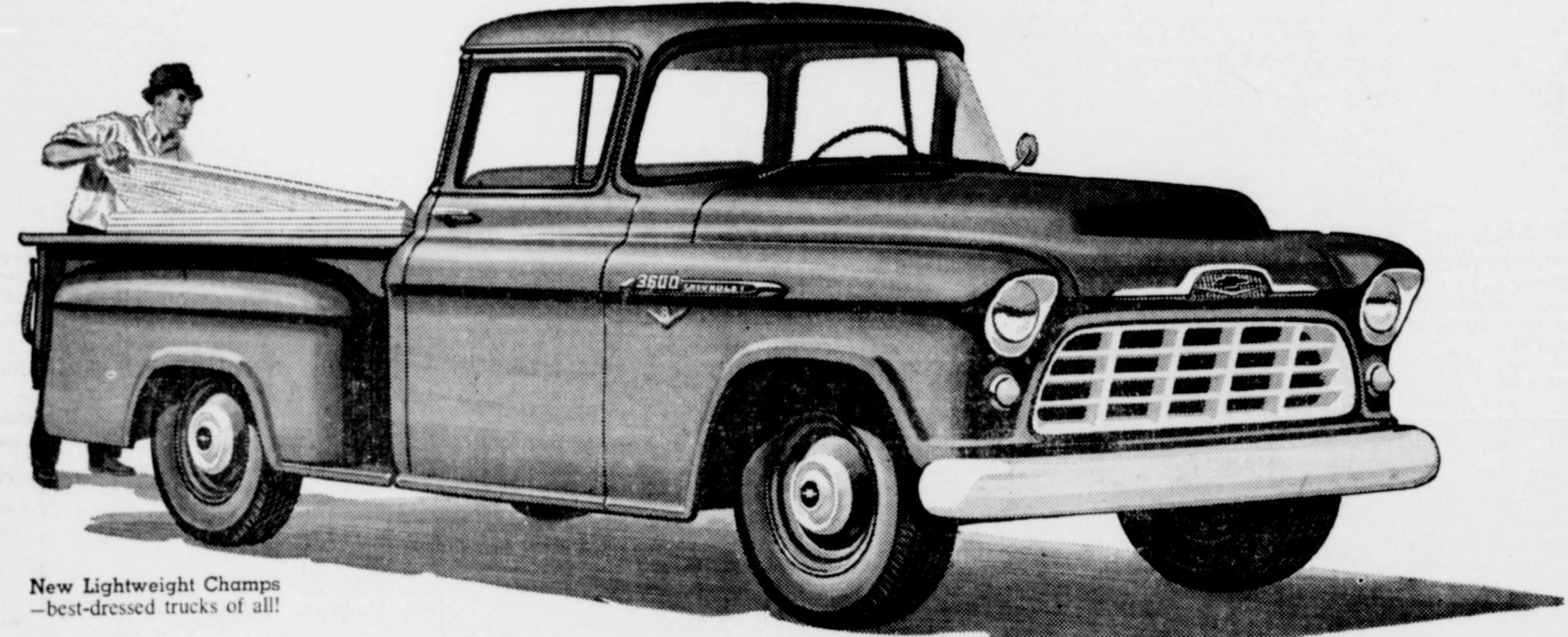

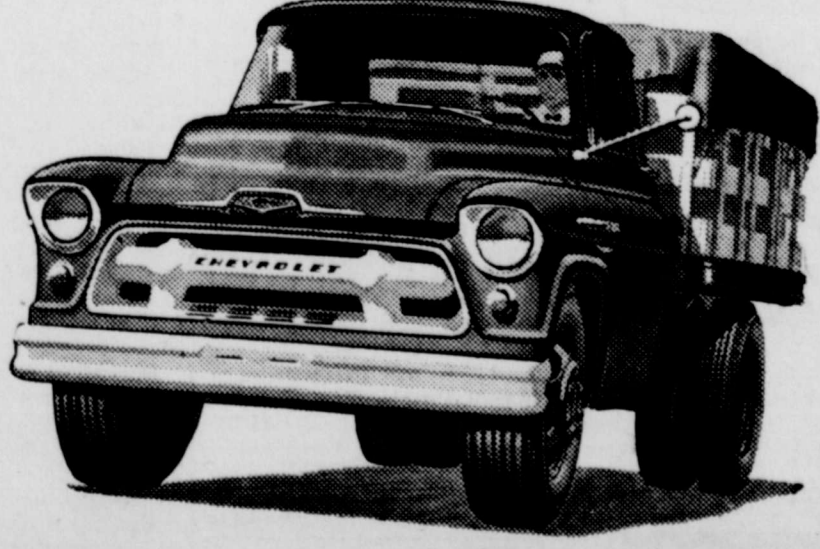
