GRASS ROOTS OPINION

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And certainly Mr. Reed should know, for he and his century old company have been guiding tourists since long before any military man ever thought of guiding a missile. This year his company will do the planning, counseling and worrying for a good share of the 1,250,000 Americans who will range the earth, well over 500,000 of them "invading" Europe. In fact, said Mr. Reed, there would be more Americans visiting that continent this year than the total number of emigrants leaving Europe for our shores in 1900, the year the American Express office opened in Paris.

The occasion for these remarks was the recent and festive rededication of that office which has been "a home away from home" to 25 million American and other travelers during the past half century, and which has just received a million dollar rejuvenation. More than 500 distinguished guests, including representatives of the US and French government, diplomats from many other nations, business and financial leaders, attended the reception that followed. And, after them, during 1956, will come almost a million travelers, as many as 10,000 a day during the peak season.

All of which gives us a slightly itchy foot. What, we are beginning to wonder, are we sitting here and vegetating for? For one thing, it's downright unChristian. If the pathway to peace is to be beaten out by the feet of travelers, as Mr. Reed suggests, why don't we get with it?

That "jet weekend in Europe" that he's cooking up ought to give us some fresh ideas and something new to talk about during the long winter evenings, to say nothing of making the neighbors' eyes bug out.

DON'T SELL NATURE SHORT

The day is coming, we are given to understand, when nobody will forget his or her rubbers. It won't be because human memories are likely to improve that much, but because the leather will be impregnated with Latex. And even sooner, perhaps, you can have tires to match the color of your car, perhaps even two-tone jobs. Right now there are natural rubber dishes in various colors that won't chip or crack or break.

These things and many more, including rubber thread, rubber rail pads and the new rubber bonded, non woven fabrics that won't crush and will hold their preformed shape, emerge from the research laboratories of the natural rubber people in England, France, Holland and Southeast Asia. Another development is an improved rubber tree being set out in the plantations. In seven years, when it starts to produce, it will give four times as much Latex as its predecessor, and require no more land or labor.

Natural rubber and synthetic rubber have worked well together and the synthetic has done a noble job when the natural was unavailable or scarce. But the experts insist

they are two different products, with differing characteristics and points of superiority. Both will continue to be needed, and in whatever quantities can be produced. In 1956 the US is expected to turn out 1,140,000 tons of synthetic, the plantations of the world 1,870,000 tons of natural and world industry will gobble it all up and cry for more. It seems unlikely there will ever be enough rubber of either kind.

In our enthusiasm over synthetic rubber, following the long and desperate struggle to produce it satisfactorily there was a tendency to forget the indispensability of the natural product. But we should have remembered that in our youth, the most outstanding property of good old "India" rubber was its bounce.

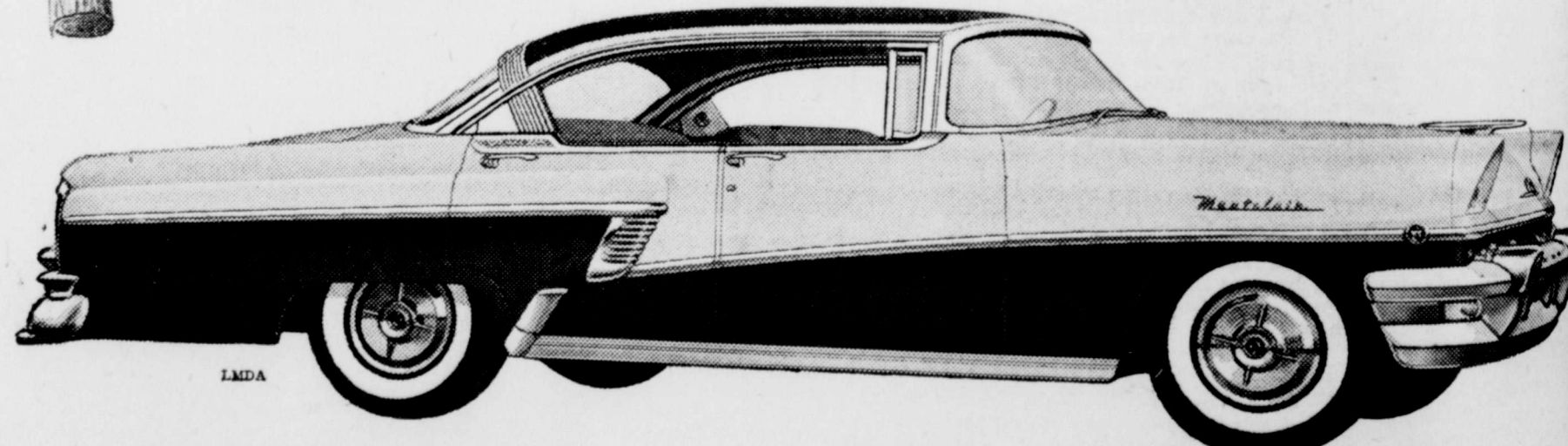

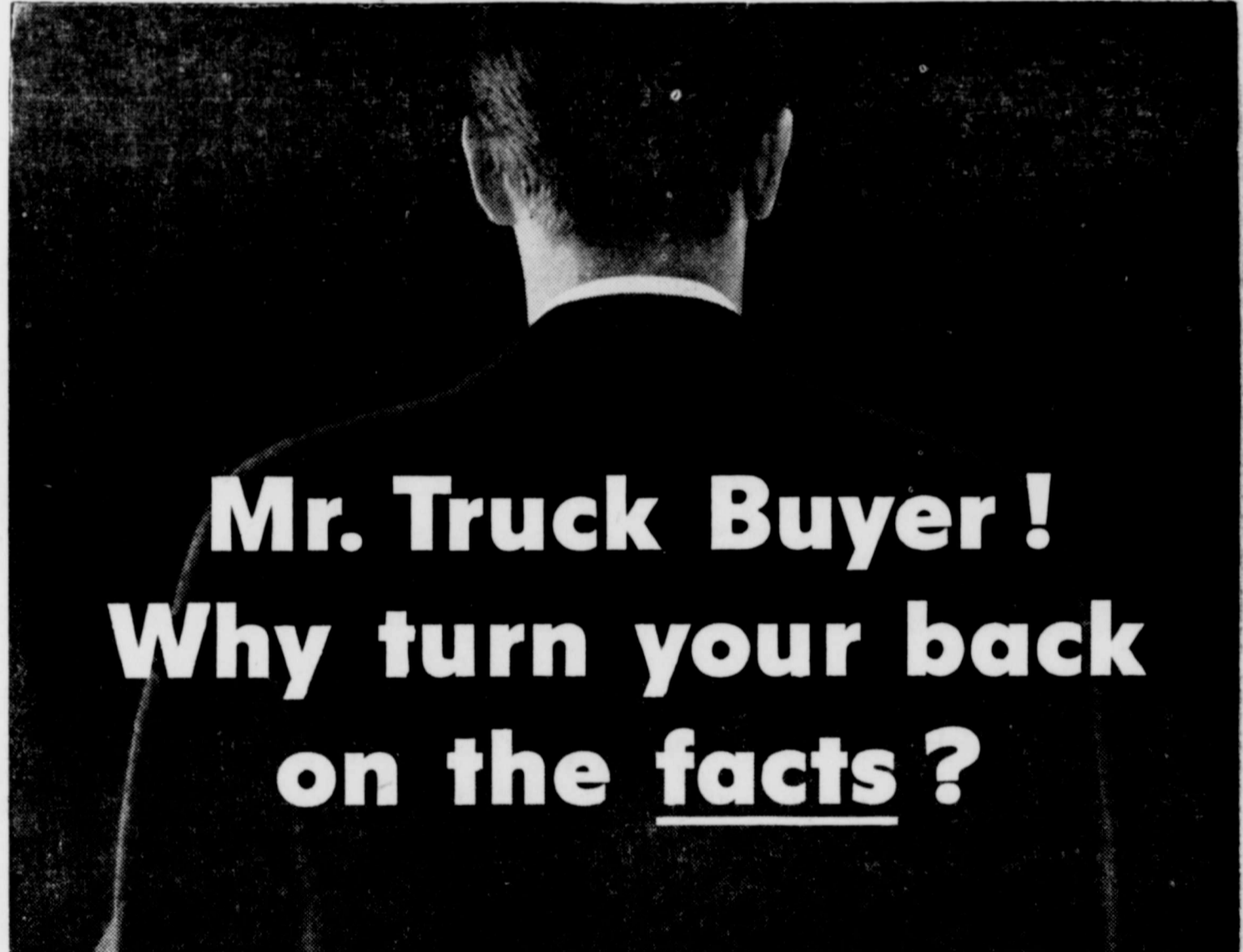

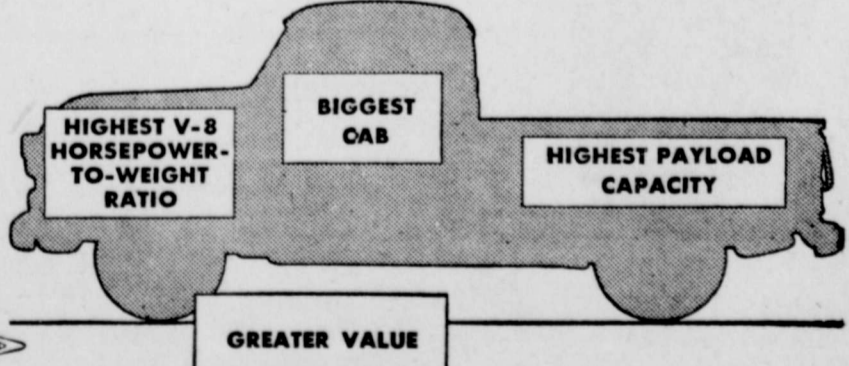

A good mixture to use is: 400 pounds cottonseed plus 200 lbs. 20 per cent superphosphate. 600 pounds of this mixture is the suggested amount for one surface acre of water for one year. Apply as follows; first application 300 lbs broadcast over pond in early spring; second, third and fourth applications of 100 lbs each at four to six weeks intervals.

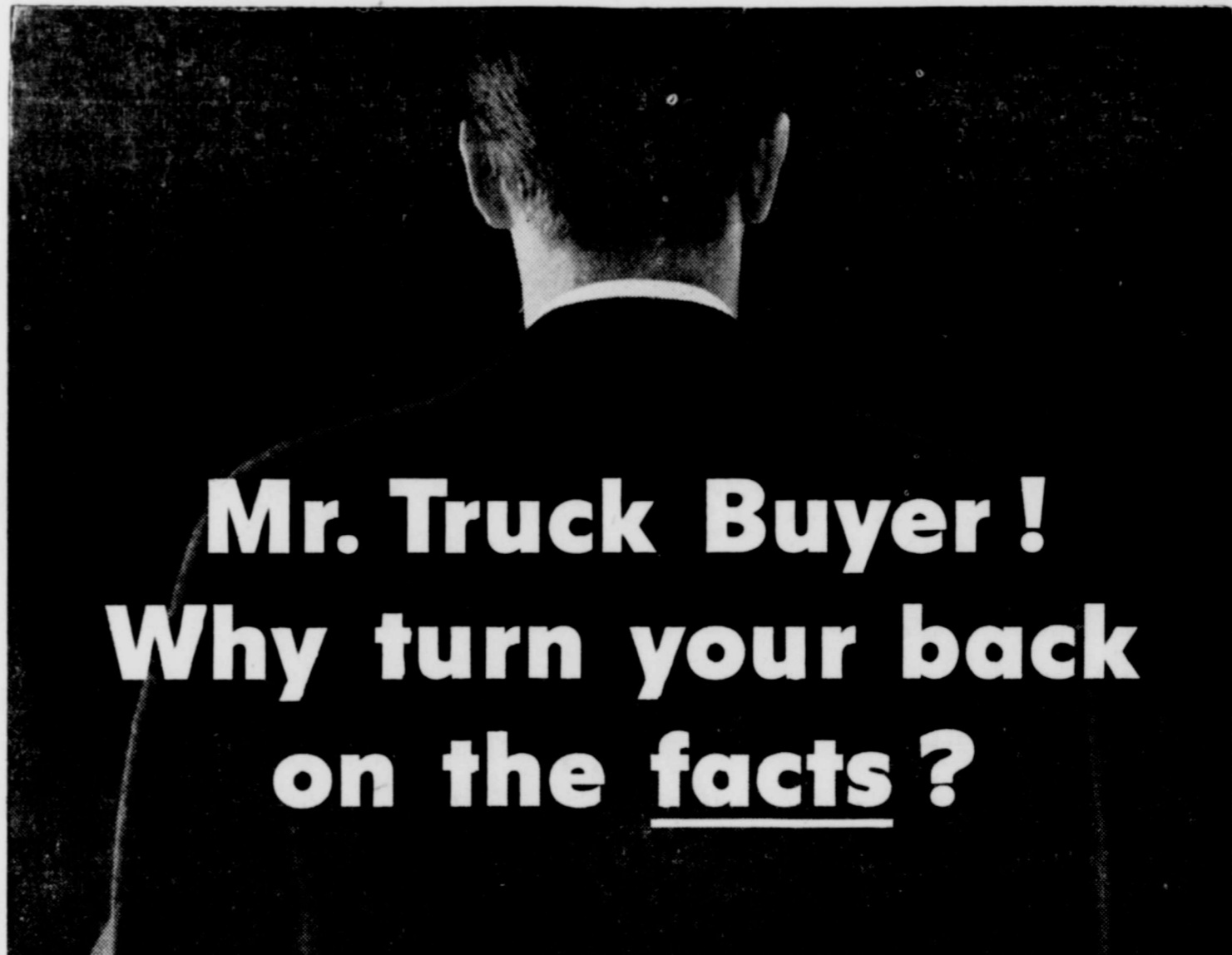

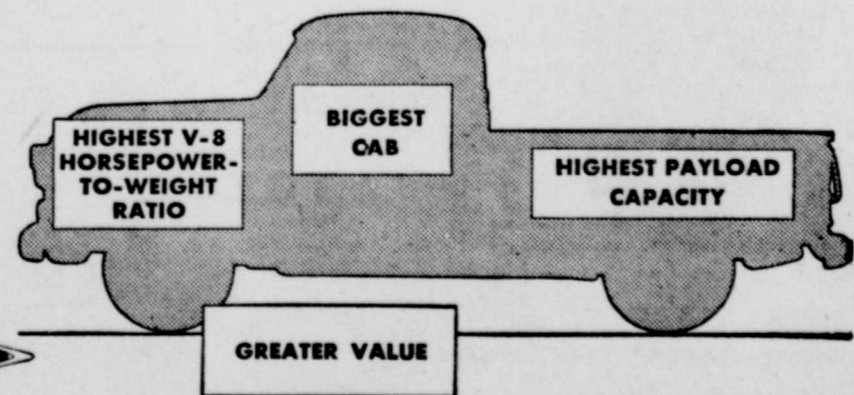

from LOOK Magazine's Dream Kitchen

STRAWBERRY BAVARIAN CREAM

Here is a classic, light dessert that is always favored around the time when fresh strawberries begin to appear on the market. LOOK suggests that it also be made with raspberries, blackberries, or any fruit in season.

Put 1/4 cup cold water in top of double boiler; sprinkle in 1 envelope unflavored gelatin. Dissolve. Add 1/2 cup sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup hot water. Stir over boiling water in double boiler until the gelatin and sugar have dissolved. Remove from heat, add 1 cup crushed strawberries, 3 tablespoons lemon juice. Chill until slightly thickened. Beat until foamy. Beat 2-3 cup heavy cream; fold into the whipped gelatin. Pour into mold; chill. Garnish with whipped cream and strawberries just before serving. Serves 4.

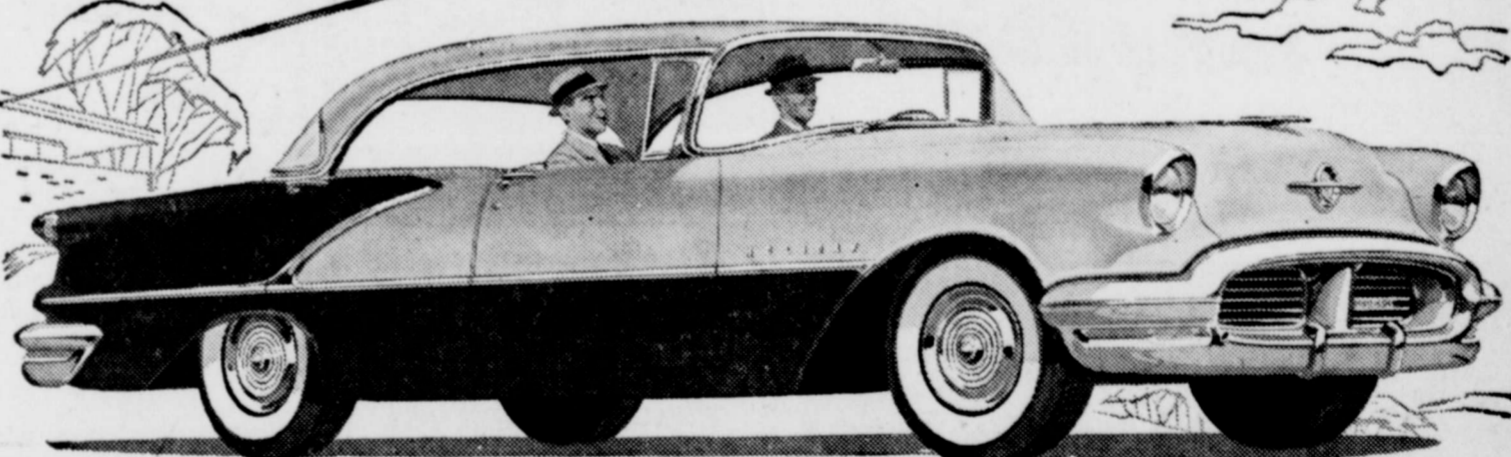

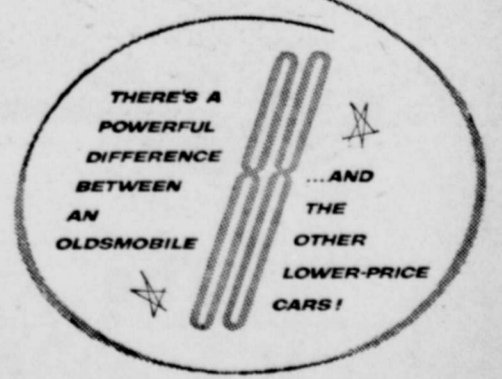


Bottom curve shows power needed to propel the car. Top curve shows hp. reserve.

Notes from HD Agent

Through cleaning and correct spray treatment will protect carpets and rugs from clothes moth, and beetle according to Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent.

Regular care with the vacuum cleaner is the first step. It prevents dust, lint and hair from accumulating and offering extra food for the pests. It can also remove the insects themselves and their eggs. These usually feed under heavy furniture where it is difficult to clean. Rotate rugs and carpets occasionally to make sure all areas are exposed to regular cleaning, light and air.

Entomologists advise a five percent DDT oil solution on rugs and carpets every 12 to 18 months. For a 9 by 12 rug average weight, you will need 1 1/2 to 2 quarts of spray. Rug pads of animal hair or wool, will need spraying on both sides unless they've been treated previously.

Soil Conservation News

Rains and warmer weather have combined to start inquiries about seeding of summer legume according to Elvy Sargent, Work Unit Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service at Iowa Park.

Mike Hartengruber of Iowa Park and operator for George W. Graham Riverside Farm has plowed into the soil a very large growth of Austrian Winter peas and now plans to crop the same acreage to summer legumes. A small acreage will be seeded to edible peas and the remaining acreage will be cropped to sesbania and Guar. Each crop will be seeded in rows.

Ed Foster of Electra is making plans to again seed guar this summer and will have row and drilled seedings. Drilled seedings will be used where summer cover and organic residues are desired and row seedings will be used to aid in seed production.

Guar is adapted to the sandier soils of the district and if seed production is desired, must be seeded in rows. Recommended seeding rates are 5 pounds when seeded in rows and 12 pounds

when drilled. When row seeding land should be prepared as for cotton. Farmers are cautioned that planter plates must fit tight enough to prevent seed from getting under the plate or the gum from the seed will lock the planter and may do extensive damage. Holes in the plates should not be beveled on the bottom. All seed should be inoculated before seeding. If federal Cost sharing is desired, approval should be obtained from Wichita County ASC at Iowa Park.

Sesbania should be seeded in rows at a rate of five pounds per acre. This soil conservation district and agricultural works recommends that the crop be mulched by shredding and sub-surface tilling before seed are produced.

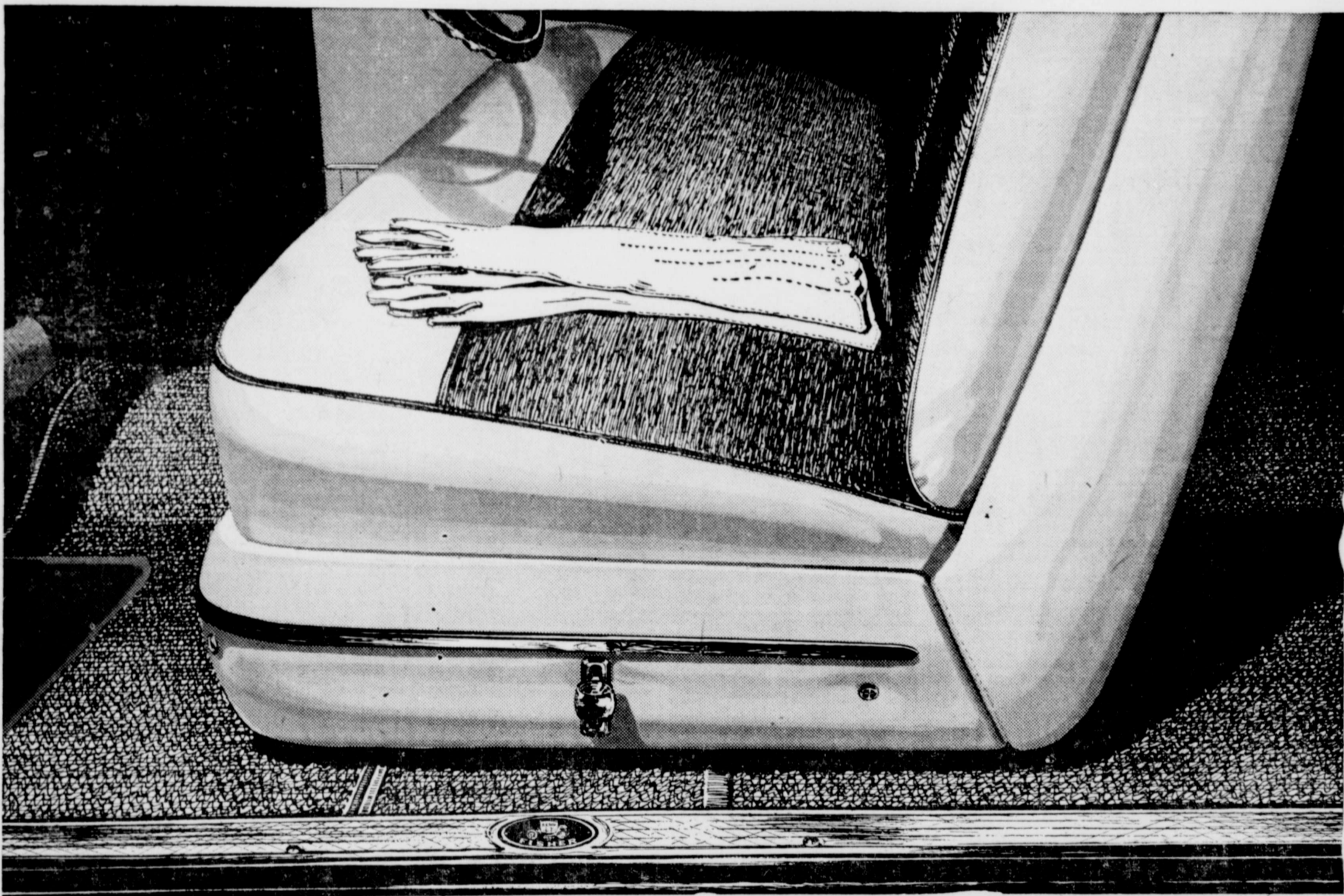

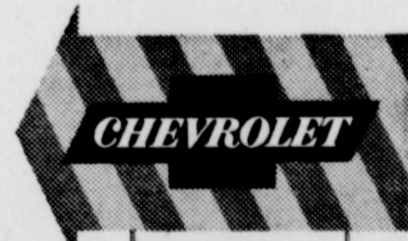
