Formal Opening Wednesday Morning White Auto Store With New Stock In New Building Next to Palace Theatre





# DUTY CALLS

"Intercontinental travel is the best safeguard against the intercontinental missile." This is the considered opinion of President Ralph Reed of American Express, who believes that expanding tourism, "the spread of interest among people of all lands in visiting one another and living with one another and getting to respect one another" is perhaps the major force now at work for world peace and prosperity. 3

And certainly Mr. Reed should know, for he and his century old company have been guiding tourists since long before any military man ever thought of guiding a missile. 





"Intercontinental travel is the best safeguard against the intercontinental missile." This is the considered opinion of President Ralph Reed of American Express, who believes that expanding tourism, "the spread of interest among people of all lands in visiting one another and living with one another and getting to respect one another" is perhaps the major force now at work for world peace and prosperity. 3
