It was a close game all the way with Burk taking a quick 3-0 lead only to see Electra punch away for single tallies in the 3rd, 4th and 8th to tie the game 3-3. That is when Dependable Dan slashed the double into right field, driving in the winning run, and giving the Oilers their 11th victory of the season.

Felix R. Kindel was born near Whitt, in Parker County, Texas. His ancestors on both sides were pioneers in that section. His great-grandfather, A. Q. Pierce, and grandfather, B. C. Clark, were prominent in that section for many years. The families were active Methodists and his father, Will Kindel, was church school superintendent for years.

Rev. Kindel was reared at Perrin, in the Keechi Valley of Jack County. He attended public school there, as did his wife, Mildred Duke. They were school day sweethearts and married in the Methodist Church at Perrin. Rev. and Mrs. Kindel have one daughter, Aquilla Ann.

Rev. Kindel attended Weathervord Junior College, Southwestern University and is a graduate of NTSC at Denton. He received his theological training in Southern Methodist University. He taught school in South Clay County before giving full time to the ministry, having been licensed to preach at the age of 17.

He has pastored churches in Carrollton, Dallas, Farmersville, and was for 5 years pastor of the First Methodist Church in Henrietta, Texas. He came from Henrietta to Burkburnett the first of June of last year.

Rev. Kindel has been secretary of Dallas, McKinney and Wichita Falls districts. He is one of the secretaries of The North Texas Annual Conference and was elected at the last session of the conference, Conference Missionary Secretary. The latter office makes him a member of the 8-state Jurisdictional Board of Missions. In addition, he is on the executive committee for Wesley Foundation at Midwestern University.

He is a member of the Rotary Club and The Masonic Lodge of Burkburnett.

He was instrumental in the formation of The Ministerial Alliance here in Burkburnett and is its president. Since its organization the Alliance has been very active in the religious affairs of the City.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

CANADIAN, TEXAS, RECORD: "Maybe you want to trade democracy for national socialism as the United States form of government, and in our free democracy you are privileged to make the choice. But think a little bit first: having once given up the democratic form of government for the Socialist state, it will no longer be your privilege to trade back. National socialism doesn't work that way. Socialism is a one way street."

WALL, S. D. COURANT: "True, the farmers have problems, but don't we all. The nearer the government comes to a guarantee of a living wage to the farmer (then to the rest of us) the nearer we come to socialism, and the farther we pull away from our heritage of individualism and self initiative and improvement."

BLAIR, NEBR., ENTERPRISE: "—this nation cannot go on grabbing selfishly for funds which will benefit a few without regard for the needs and the benefits of the many — If this country is ever to have sound government we are going to have to think farther than our own local communities in asking for government projects."

ST. LOUIS, MO., LABOR TRIBUNE: "We are not so sure that Millions of Americans would not likewise surrender their birthright of freedom to some slick, swash-buckling paranoiac if they were promised steady work at good wages and other forms of security by a dictator who might be able, through some ruse or other means, to take control of the USA and operate it for his own and his collaborators' exclusive hidden benefit, power and glory."

DUBLIN, TEXAS, PROGRESS: "The old saying that you can't get something for nothing is still true, even though many of us act like we don't believe it and political candidates would have us forget it."

INMAN, S. C., TIMES: "Free enterprise system' is a term generally accepted but little analyzed. It is a term which refers to our basic way of living, but one which can be easily forgotten among the jumble of 'ism' and varied proposals of a new way of life."

WHAT COST SAFETY

Reflectorized license plates, first issued by Connecticut in 1948 and now used in five states, have come into the news after a sharp verbal blast at Connecticut's plan to drop the plates next year. Some safety officials have said these plates, which glow brightly in the headlights of approaching vehicles and provide a much needed margin of safety at night, may become the national standard.

J. W. Darley, former deputy motor vehicles commissioner whose efforts and experiments over several years led to Connecticut's adoption of the plates, said his state's plan to revert to a non-reflectorized plate in 1957 is a "long step backward in highway safety."

A spokesman for Connecticut's motor vehicle department says the move is an economy measure that will result in a "substantial saving" to the state, which has a crimped treasury after last year's disastrous floods. Darley says the saving will be approximately \$75,000 this year, or only 3 3-4 cents a person. Darley called Connecticut's plan to save pennies "a foolish kind of economy" that tinkers around with human lives.

There is convincing evidence of truth of Darley's claim that his state is putting money ahead of human lives. Minnesota, which this year issued reflectorized plates for the first time, had a 45.1 percent drop in nighttime accidents between January and April 30, 1956. Earl Larimer, Minnesota's director of highway safety, said his state's reflective license plates are a factor in this important reduction.

The issue seems to be as plain as the difference between daylight and darkness, and darkness is known to be deadly particularly on the highway.

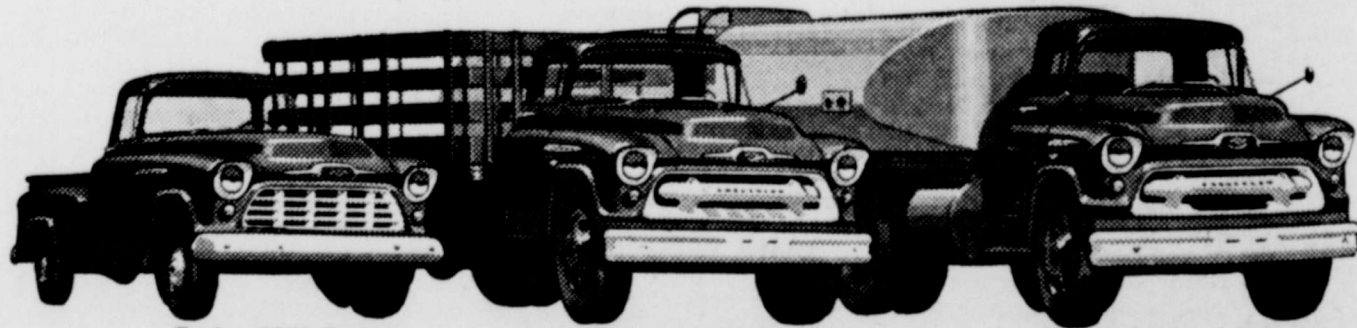

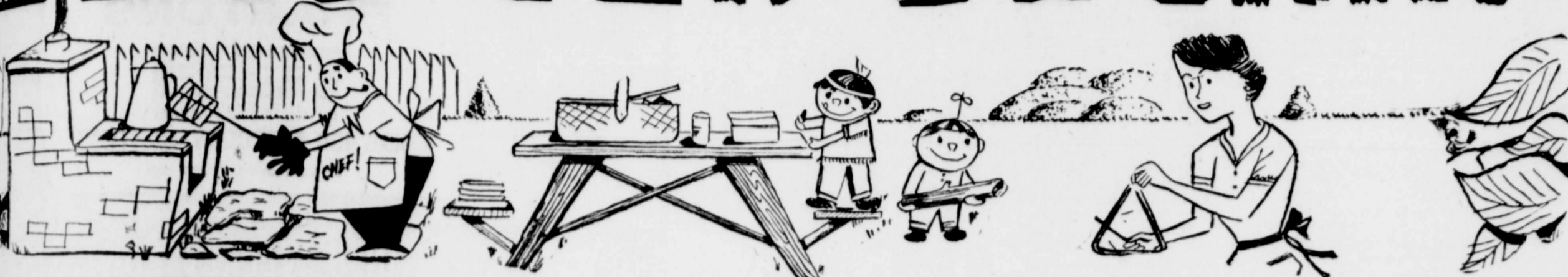



Making Democracy Live In Your Community

Editors Note: The following article is the first in a series of articles which will appear in this paper from time to time during the summer. These articles are designed to broaden the readers knowledge of the functions and benefits of a good PTA group not only in this community but all over the country. PTA work is not of interest only to parents, but to everyone who is interested in the betterment of a community. The articles are written by Mrs. R. C. Moser, president of the local PTA.

"Your Task—to build a better world" the maker said. I answered, "How?" The world is such a vast place, so complicated now. And I, so small and useless am, there is nothing I can do. But our Maker, in all his wisdom, said "Just build a better you."

The strength of our free country lies in its active, thoughtful citizenry. Increased emphasis must be placed on the various phases of citizenship for no time in the history of our nation

has the democratic way of life been more significant.

The role of the Parent Teacher Association in citizenship education is threefold in nature.

1. PTA should stimulate interest and develop understanding within its own members thru an organized education program for good citizens.

2. A PTA cooperates with the home, school, church and other community agencies.

3. A PTA displays good citizenship in reference to the problems and affairs of the community.

"Wisdom is the principle thing, therefore, get wisdom and with all the getting, get understanding." Proverbs 3: 7.

"Liberty will not descend to a people; a people must raise themselves to liberty; it is a blessing that must be earned before it can be enjoyed." (Charles C. Colton)

"Where there is no vision the people perish." Proverbs 29:18.

In the pushbutton world we live in, we omit some of the most important phases of life for our children. We need to stop and take inventory on the wisdom and knowledge we are passing on to our children. The attitude which our children develop in school and at home depends upon the knowledge, skill and the enthusiasm of the parents and teacher.

As parents, we fail our children many times by not teaching responsibility in the home, school and community. We leave this phase of our child's life to someone else.

Every child grows into the primary and inescapable responsibility of self-government whether or not they have been prepared.

If the child is unfortunate enough and does not acquire the responsibility of being a good citizen at home, where will he learn?

The citizenship committee of parents and teacher association are interested in cooperating in preparing youth for this responsibility in the home, school, church and community.

The following are desirable methods of teaching in the home by precept and example, by helping others and sharing and respect for the right of others.

Developing — the child must have a sense of security, a sense of responsibility and a sense of loyalty.

Learning — The child can learn through family councils, family worship, family libraries and planned activities.

The child can learn responsibility of school by the parents becoming acquainted with school methods and organization, cooperating with school activities, faith in the work of our school and to support all school improvements.

The third foundation of good citizenship is in the church. Every church helps develop character and basic goodness in its members. Realize that the church is an important factor in educating for citizenship and emphasize regular attendance and family participation in activities of the church of their choice.

The fourth foundation of good citizenship is in community participation. Organize community coordination councils, strengthen and coordinate efforts to combat undesirable influences, such as unwholesome commercial entertainment, the sale of liquor and narcotics to minors, sex offences and establishing working relationship with government agencies.

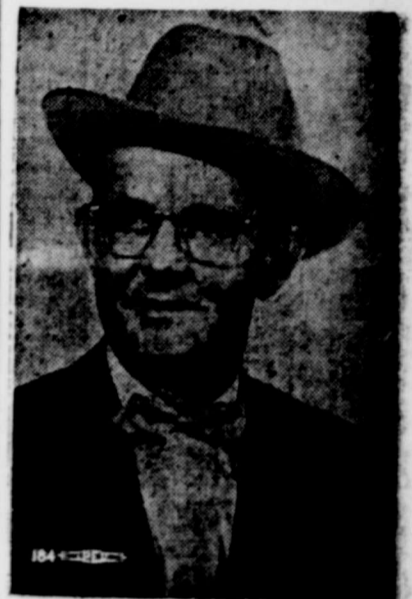

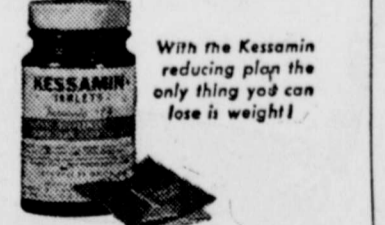

My Trip To The 4-H Conservation Camp

"And God stepped out in space and looked around and said 'I am lonely; I'll make me a world' and as far as the eye of God could see, darkness covered everything."

The Almighty God made that earth and it has been tilled, used and handed down for us, the present generation, to us till and protect for future civilizations who will inhabit this earth.

But as this earth was producing the fruits of the soil, it was also gradually being worn away by improper management, lack of water and wind protection, and the constant misuse of the soil by man, for centuries.

Great men like J. S. Bridwell, the late Louis Bromfield, J. V. Brookshear, Frank Wood and others have realized that conserving our soil is the only key to keeping our people strong and our nation productive. These men have been stressing this program of conservation for many years.

I had heard much about conservation, its meaning and its application to our soil, but had not given it much thought. Then I was chosen as a delegate to the conservation camp held at Buffalo Gap, Texas, for the District III 4-H members. Since attending this wonderful camp, sponsored

by the Federal Cartridge Company, soil, wildlife and forest conservation has become an intricate part of my daily living on our farm.

Since returning home from camp, I cannot measure how much camp has meant to me and what impact it will hold on my future life. I seem to have a greater understanding for the wildlife that God placed here for our benefit, and wish to use my utmost ability to protect these creatures from needless destruction.

My family, of which I am very proud, also seem to realize that the knowledge that I learned at camp will benefit in some way, and the rural community in which I live. It was the soil and animals of the wild that helped make America the great and proud nation she is today and the people of Clara-Fairview and especially my own family, are working toward that goal where waste will be eliminated and erosion and careless destruction will be a thing of the past.

We are proud and honored that Clara-Fairview, the community in which we live, last year received the first place award for pasture improvement given by WFAA and the Dallas Morning News. Our people are conscious of the fact that improvement and constant work is vital. My aunt Mrs. E. J. Simon, was named "Conservation Homemaker of 1955" for outstanding work on their farm. So you see, the conservation camp will add my knowledge in helping us to improve our individual life and

that of our community. I felt that the delegates gained many ideas that will be of value to our county 4-H members and our leaders. Coming from a predominantly urban county, I was particularly interested in the ways in which 4-H clubbers in the city could aid with conservation practices of our natural life. By making feeder boxes and feeding stations, the city 4-H member feels that he is aiding in the preservation of our wild life as well as engaging in a new project. Another important point learned at camp is to advertise the many types of conservation among all our people and not just the American farmer. The task is one for everyone to fulfill and not just a certain few. I want others to share in my many experiences and lessons I learned at our district camp. At our county 4-H camp I plan to lead a short course on conservation and try to explain to other members of the Wichita County 4-H what I so ably learned from our capable teacher. As a program for our rural community I will endeavor to write a short skit on the many advantages of conservation and will ask other 4-H members of our club to help me present it in an effective way in which we will try to express our thoughts. I also feel that news articles will help us realize our goal in spreading our work in conservation, and I believe we should use this medium to the maximum of our ability.

Becoming a college freshman in Texas A&M next fall will be a new milestone in life for me. Here I will begin to work on my minor degree in soil and water conservation. I feel that Texas and the United States need more men and women in conservation work and I hope I may be able to do some small part in this great and urgent field.

In the future, I feel it part of my duty as a 4-H member and a farm youth to work and encourage more youth and adults to take part in great conservation programs like the Bridwell Soil Awards, Frank Wood Wild Life Conservation Program and many others. To protect our animals, birds, forests and soil shall always be one of my main objectives during my life upon this earth.

There are many people I wish to thank for making my past days experiences available and profitable to me. First I would like to thank the Wichita County Council and my agent, B. T. Haws for sending me as a delegate to the meet. Miss Hodge and Mr. Scofield should also be thanked for planning such a well rounded and effective program for our three-day camp. My thanks also go to the many agents and adult leaders who gave their time and energy in making our camp the great success it was. But, I believe our greatest thanks should go to the Federal Cartridge Company for sponsoring our conservation camp this year and reminding us of our duties to American Conservation.

As long as the smell of newly plowed soil remains sweet in my

nostrils and I still enjoy hearing the country wife singing as she does her chores, then I know our goal to protect America and her assets by conservation will not be in vain.

For is it not found in Holy Scripture these words? "Whatsoever ye shall sow, ye shall also reap."

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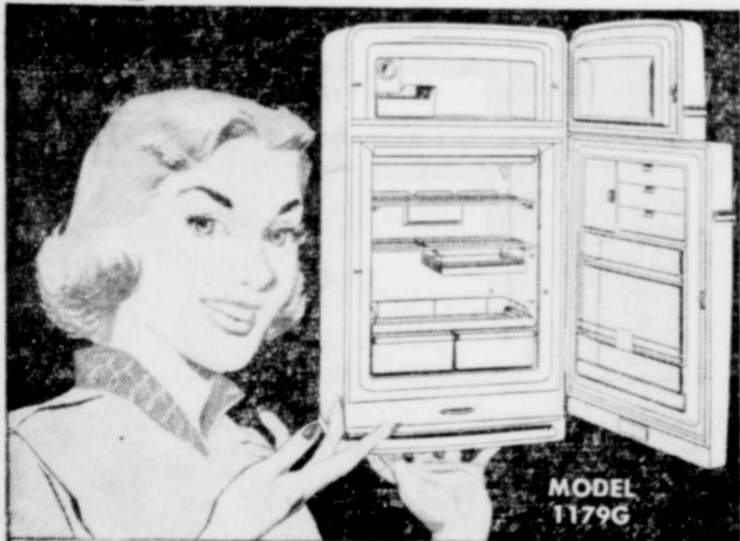

Give the door or lid gasket a good soap and water cleaning to prevent deterioration. Test the door seal. If a thin sheet of paper can be pulled from the closed door, the door needs to be tightened to prevent air leakage. Excessive frost buildup results from air leaks.

Dry the freezer thoroughly inside and out before connecting it. Clean the working parts, too. Fan and grill parts collect dust and lint while doing their job. Disconnect the electric cord, then clean all accessible mechanical parts. Use a vacuum cleaner or cloth.

If the freezer motor or fan requires oiling, do it while the motor is off. It may be wise to have a service man give the equipment a thorough check to be sure everything is in good running condition.

When all cleaning has been completed, connect the freezer and let it run half an hour or so to bring temperature down some what before putting the food back in. Put the older packages at the front or top for first use.

Soil Bank Acreage Applications Ready

The County ASC office now has copies of the Soil Bank Acreage Reserve agreements available for signature by farmers wishing to participate in the program according to R. G. Shrauner, chairman of the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee. A short visit to the county office will provide interested farmers with full information on terms and conditions of participation in the Acreage Reserve, which is the first part of the program to get underway this year.

"Growers interested in taking part in the Acreage Reserve have until July 29th to sign the Soil Bank Agreement, designating the acreage of wheat (or other "basic crop) which they wish to include under the Reserve," Chairman Shrauner states.

A wheat grower who wishes to participate in the Acreage Reserve this year, the Chairman explained, first must have compli-

ed with all allotments set for his farm. However, any farm may produce one acre of peanuts without becoming ineligible for Acreage Reserve. If he can meet this condition, he then has three or four opportunities for earning payments on 1956 crops.

Such a farmer may earn payments either by underplanting, by crop loss through weather conditions or other natural causes, or by plowing or cutting a portion of the crop to reduce the acreage below the allotment. Certain conditions for eligibility are attached to all the methods of qualifying for the Acreage Reserve. Payments per bushels vary with counties but will be based on county rate times the normal or the appraised yield, according to the method of qualifying.

Payments for underplanting winter wheat, seeded last fall for harvest in 1956, may be made only if the farmer underplanted his farm wheat allotment because of adverse weather conditions. The rate for this practice is \$4 per acre.

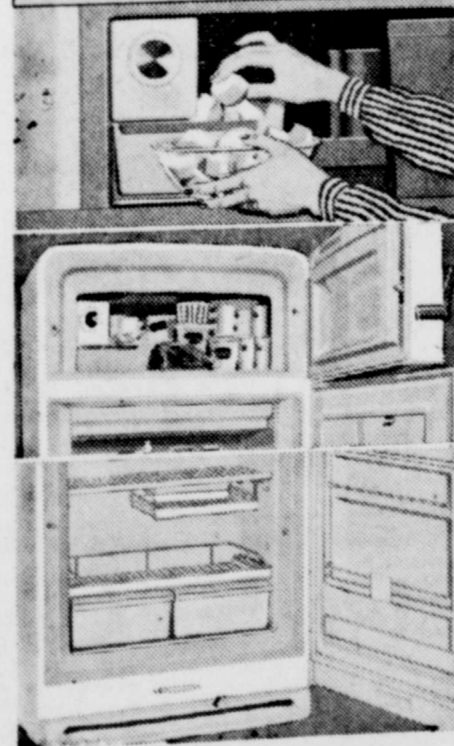

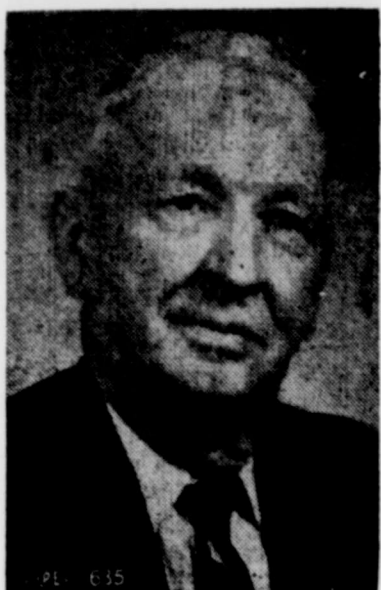
