Holt Services Were Tuesday Methodist Church

Funeral services for Painter Holt, 62, former civic leader here, were held at 10:00 A. M. Tuesday from the First Methodist Church with the pastor, Rev. Felix Kindel, officiating.

Holt died Friday in an Oklahoma City hospital following an illness of several years. Burial was in Burkburnett Cemetery.

Born Sept. 29, 1893, Holt lived here until 1940 when he entered the Veterans hospital in Amarillo and later was taken to an Oklahoma City hospital. He was manager of the United Gas Co. of Burkburnett. Holt was a Veteran of World War I, a member of the Masonic Lodge and a Rotarian.

Survivors include his wife, Iva Holt; two daughters, Mrs. Jeanne Pfeiffer and Mrs. Hubert Gragg, all of Oklahoma City; a sister, Mrs. L. D. Waggoner of Tulsa. Also surviving are four grandchildren.

Thomas was graduated from the Stephen Fuller Austin grade school and N. R. Crozier Technical High School. He worked in the banking business after graduation from High School until entering Southern Methodist University where he spent one year studying pre-medicine. He then transferred to Dallas Christian College to begin preparations for the ministry. Graduating from DCC in June 1955, he was called to the First Christian church (formerly Central Christian) in Burkburnett and has served on a student basis while attending Texas Christian University working toward a B. D. Degree in theology. He was also graduated from the Dallas Police School and served as Chaplain of the Reserve battalion while in Dallas. Thomas has been called into military service and will report for induction August 27 in Dallas. He will spend two years in the service then re-enter school if possible. He is 24 years old and still a happy, free bachelor (but not for long).

Concerning City Affairs

NEW CEMETERY SITE URGENT

A location for a new cemetery site is one of the most pressing needs of the city right now. In all probability, the present cemetery will have all lots sold out by the end of this year. There is only a very small corner left on the East side now.

In choosing a new site, it would be well if a lot of thought, planning went into the problem. First consideration should be availability of ample water to keep the final resting place beautiful the year around. Once the site is secured its future maintenance should have first consideration. The city should not be burdened with the entire expense of keeping the plot groomed through all the years. A plan should be set up whereby money for keeping the premises beautiful would be assured. An association, patterned after other successful such organizations, should be formed. Sale of the lots, plus a yearly rental fee may be the answer.

Past experiences should be a warning to the future. The present cemetery is more or less an inherited burden on the city. A few years ago, grass and weeds were waist high all over the cemetery. Some three hundred letters were printed and mailed to all who had lots and had loved ones buried here, telling them of the ugly situation, and begging for funds to clean up the grounds and keep them clean. Total receipts from the pleas; One check for three dollars, and one letter containing two one dollar bills! What a sad situation. Members of the Unity Garden Club came to the rescue. They organized work groups and began putting the place in order. (One morning six men and one woman reported for work. Of the group, not a single one owned a lot in the cemetery, or had any near relatives buried there). The garden club sponsored the building of a gateway entrance to the cemetery, and this year they have been working on a more permanent fence surrounding the plot. Although it has been extremely dry this year, the city has done a wonderful job keeping the grass and weeds cut from around the graves and along the drives and fences. A drive through the place will convince one of the huge task of keeping the place presentable. Almost everywhere, curbs and iron pipe fences around the grave lots, shrubs planted helter skelter in every direction. Most of the work controlling rank vegetation must be done by hand. Power equipment can not operate under such conditions.

Proper planning of the new cemetery can keep the maintenance down to a minimum. To begin with, the entire acreage should be laid out sensibly and landscaped. Wide driveways, with no dead-ends should crisscross for easy accessibility. No large tomb stones, no curbs, and no iron pipe fences. The head markers should be limited to possibly eight by twenty inches, face up, level with the ground. In this way, one man with a power mower could care for several acres, watered and mowed at all times. May our loved ones rest in peace in beautiful surroundings, not in a jumbled jungle of hideous tombstones, concrete curbs and iron pipe fences.

TRAFFIC SITUATION LITTLE IMPROVED

Although some improvement has been made in controlling fast drivers in the city limits and removing those detestible loud mufflers, the situation leaves much to be desired. What do our rural neighbors in Oklahoma and North Texas think about our feeble efforts for better law enforcement? From Oklahoma: "We have been coming to Burkburnett for thirty years. Because of so much reckless driving here, we had just about decided to quit coming to Burkburnett." From Texas: "Our boy was picked up here in town for having a noisy muffler and driving too fast. We had told him it would happen, and we are glad he got caught. We made him pay his fine out of his own money, and put new mufflers on his car. We believe he has learned his lesson. My wife dreads to drive to Burkburnett. The youngsters use the farm to market road she travels as a drag strip. It is narrow and has some hills. After she gets to town, there is not much difference—cars racing out West Third at 70 miles an hour. She is a nervous wreck when she gets back home. Please keep up the good work. Since the paper has taken its stand against reckless driving, we will always subscribe to it, even if we have to take in washing for the subscription price."

When smart alecks have been repeatedly warned, why do they persist in disregarding the law? It is because they have not had a bitter enough dose of enforcement. Take their drivers license and car away from them. If arrested after this, throw them in the klink. That'll do it.

Leroy Meyer, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Burkburnett, was born in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma and lived there until after his graduation from high school. He attended the University of Oklahoma where he was a member of the football and baseball squads. He was a test-flight engineer during World War II, and surrendered to the call of God for special service in 1943. After serving as minister of music and education in several churches in Oklahoma he became pastor of the First Baptist Church of Fort Cobb, Okla., in 1948. He moved to Burkburnett from the First Baptist Church of Hugo, Okla., in September of 1955. Rev. Meyer will lead the singing in the City-Wide Revival next week at Bulldog Stadium.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

WASHINGTON, IOWA, Evening Journal: "Farmers are unhappy, yes, but not rabidly as indignant some politicians have tried to make out. It was predicted by many that a political volcano would erupt if President Eisenhower voted the farm bill. He did, and the eruption did not happen. Farmers, by the very nature of their business, are accustomed to the ups and downs of weather conditions and markets. They are taking the present situation in stride."

GAINESVILLE, TEXAS DAILY REGISTER: "If we are to continue to maintain the balance between the states and federal government that has made possible the development of our country and the protection of our individual rights, the authority and rights of the various states must be preserved and the trend of ever increasing power of the federal government must be reversed."

DOVER, DEL. STATE NEWS: "The misbehavior of some of our American young men—especially in their contacts with people who are not natives of this country—has always been a mystery to us. It seems strange in our democracy—where we have always emphasized human rights—that we do not show greater respect for the rights of others."

CLAREMONT, MINN., NEWS: "The blacksmith has not been eliminated. He has just changed his name and is now called a mechanic and there are far more of them—than there ever were."

ENDLESS "EMERGENCIES"

During the Korean war, certain taxes were increased in order to help pay the bill. It was generally said and believed that these increases would be repealed once the emergency was over and Korean war spending could stop. The corporate income tax and some excise taxes were among those increased because of Korea. That war ended long ago—but just the other day Congress decided to continue the increases for another year.

THE STATE OF SMALL BUSINESS

You've no doubt heard it said that small business is in a bad way these days. A report from the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, based on government figures, tells a very different story. In the last year corporations with assets of less than \$250,000 have shown the greatest increase in profit margins. They did far better than the average for corporations of all sizes. It is true that business failures have increased since 1950. However, the number of new incorporations shows a greater increase—36 percent against 24 percent. So the Chamber asks this apt question: If the pessimistic reports about small business were all true, how could such large numbers of new business spring up?

IMPORTANT WARNING

A Hoover Commission report estimates that changes in the federal government's obsolete budget and accounting practices could save us as much as \$4 billion a year. Obviously, this reform should be effected as fast as Congress can act. However, if and when that happens, the taxpayers should not draw a breath and think that is all now well. The Wall Street Journal provides an important warning in these words: "A spend-thrift government could still waste the people's money no matter how the money is counted. The best accounting method in the world will not save money unless the Administration and Congress both are determined to keep down the exorbitant cost of Government."

Soil Conservation District News

An irrigation water management field day is scheduled for July 27th at 9 a. m. on the Martin Hereford Ranch two miles south of Iowa Park. Elvy Sargent, Soil conservation Service technician has announced.

Purpose of the meeting is to study getting the required amount of water on the crop at the time it is needed and without harmful effects. Roy Thompson, SCS engineer, will lead the discussion on water application and water will be applied to the field according to needs of the crop to replace the available water that has been used.

Dr. Carl Gray, soil scientist for Wichita County Water Improvement Districts numbers 1 and 2, will discuss the quality of water. Bill Koos, SCS soil scientist, will discuss how to determine when to irrigate land and the amount of moisture required. Lester Brooks, supt. of Iowa Park will comment on crop and their relations to water management.

The board of supervisors of Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District urge all owners and operators of irrigated land to attend.

Highway Death Toll Exceeds Korean War Loss

More Americans died on the highway in 1955 alone than on the battlefield during the entire Korean war!

The National Safety Council's statistical yearbook, "Accident Facts," just off the press, shows there were 38,300 traffic deaths in the United States in 1955. Official Defense Department records list the battle deaths in the Korean War at 33,629.

"We don't for a moment want to imply that the highway is as hazardous as the battlefield," said Ned H. Dearborn, president of the Council. "But the fact is that the loss to the nation from the 1955 traffic toll is greater

in terms of human life than the loss sustained in the Korean War. Therefore, it's worth getting excited about. Approximately 1,350,000 Americans were injured in motor vehicle accidents during the year the Council said.

What this country really needs is a good five cent nickel.

Sid Hill, Candidate For County Sheriff Gives Platform



A candidate for Sheriff of Wichita County, Sid Hill Tuesday announced his platform.

Born in Gilmer, Tex., Hill, 40, has been employed by Continental Trailways Bus System for the last 12 years.

In his capacity as bus operator he has had close co-operation with Texas Highway Patrol and county law enforcement officers. These contacts and his work with the general public gives him a background of experience which will be of great help to him as sheriff.

Hill is a member of Lamar Baptist church and Pioneer Knights of Pythias Lodge 49.

Married for 17 years, Hill and his wife, Laura and daughter, Sydney Louise, reside at 1800 Britian.

Hill said Wichita County can have any type of law enforcement but this is the type for which he stands:

"I shall enforce the laws of the State of Texas with strict impartiality and under no circumstances will I try to make laws to fit any particular policy I might have; neither shall I undertake to tell business men how they must run their business as long as they operate within the law; nor shall I allow the power of the sheriff's office to be used to assist any person or group to maintain a monopoly in any line of business.

"I am opposed to gambling in any form and I can assure the

citizens of Wichita County that when the police make it too hot for gamblers inside the city limits they will not be allowed to move outside the city limits and operate a gambling house as court records indicate they have in the past three years.

"I shall co-operate closely with our police and other state law enforcing agencies in controlling vice and crime.

"I think the sheriff should maintain an all night patrol of the outside areas of the county that are not covered by the highway patrol and in this manner oil field thefts and other crime could be held to a minimum.

"I will put this all-night patrol service in effect when elected sheriff.

"I shall, if possible, employ local men as deputy sheriffs, men who are honest, experienced and capable. I shall insist on these men treating the public with courtesy and consideration, strong arm tactics will not be tolerated in the sheriff's office.

"I shall take full responsibility for the conduct and official acts of my deputies.

News From The Congress

By Congressman Frank Ikard

The consideration of the so-called "civic rights" bill has developed the most heated debate that has occurred in the House during this session. The fact that this bill is nothing in the world but a purely political vehicle to appeal to certain minority groups was clearly shown during the debate when a prominent Republican, in a speech directed at the Republican members of the House said, "I want to tell the Republicans in this House, if they follow the Southern Democrats in the defeat of this bill, they will seriously regret it." This bill has the solid support of the President, the Attorney General and most of the Republican Members of the House who, in joining with the Northern Democrats, have been able so far to make a great deal of progress toward the enactment of this piece of legislation

which in my judgement, will do a great harm to the country.

This will be the last of the weekly reports that I have been sending on the activities in Congress due to the fact that this session of Congress will be adjourning shortly. Within a short time after adjournment, I expect to spend most of the time during the recess traveling over the District. I will also spend some time in my office at Room 206 in the Federal Building, at Wichita Falls.

The Committee on Ways and Means has just named a new subcommittee on Internal Revenue Taxation which has the responsibility of making a rather extensive study of our tax laws during the Fall. This Committee will go into the tax laws themselves as well as the administration of them. I have been named a Member of this Subcommittee. The work of this committee will be very important for it is hoped that based on our findings, there could possibly be developed ways for tax reduction as well as improving the methods of administering the tax laws. It will be necessary for me to attend the hearings of this Committee here in Washington during the fall.

Joel McCrea Scion Of Apache Fighter

To most Hollywood stars it would seem a very far cry from their own guided lives to a film portrayal of a picture-que pioneer figure such as General Sam Houston.

But to Joel McCrea, who brings Houston vividly to life in the Allied Artists' "The First Texan," in CinemaScope, and now at the Palace Theatre, it does not seem such a far cry.

For McCrea hails from pioneer stock. His maternal grandfather Major Albert Whipple, went to California with the 49ers in a covered wagon. His paternal grandfather, Major John McCrea fought Apache Indians and drove stage coaches in early California with General Phineas Banning.

The latter was an intimate of Wyatt Earp, celebrated cowboy peace marshal, whom McCrea pictured so vividly in his last picture, "Wichita."

McCrea, however, for all his

pioneer forbears, is one of the few top screen stars who was reared in Hollywood. Born in South Pasadena, Calif., McCrea as a boy was taken by his family to Hollywood where they settled.

The Sam Houston role in "The First Texan" gave McCrea full scope for his superb horsemanship and innate frontiersman quality. The Allied Artists film was produced by Walter Mirisch and directed by Byron Haskin from a screen play by Daniel Ullman. A pretty screen newcomer Felicia Farr and Jeff Morrow are McCrea's co-stars.

ize a safety program in their neighborhood.

More than a billion broilers were produced in the nation in 1955. Texas producers raised 79 million birds valued \$60,411,000.

It's a good idea to keep foods frozen until you're ready to use them, according to Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent.

Thawing and freezing does not in itself make fruits and vegetables unsafe. However, thawed foods do spoil more rapidly than fresh foods and may quickly become unsafe to eat.

Both fruits and vegetables may be refrozen if ice crystals still remain on the food. However, refrozen vegetables may toughen and refrozen fruits may become soft and mushy. One suggestion might be to use them in cooking. Caution—Never re-freeze thawed food.

Mrs. Reb Huggins, family economics demonstrator, has used her own originality in organizing their family business. She used one drawer from a chest of drawers and a dressing table. She now has all the essentials of a good business center.

Mrs. Bee Bryant is the family economics demonstrator for the Cooper Home Demonstration club. As well as organizing a business center and a family file Mrs. Bryant has done an excellent job of keeping accurate income expense records. This is the first step toward running a farm and home as a real business. Without such records a family can do very little planning for the future. Mrs. Bryant would be most willing to help others begin their planning.

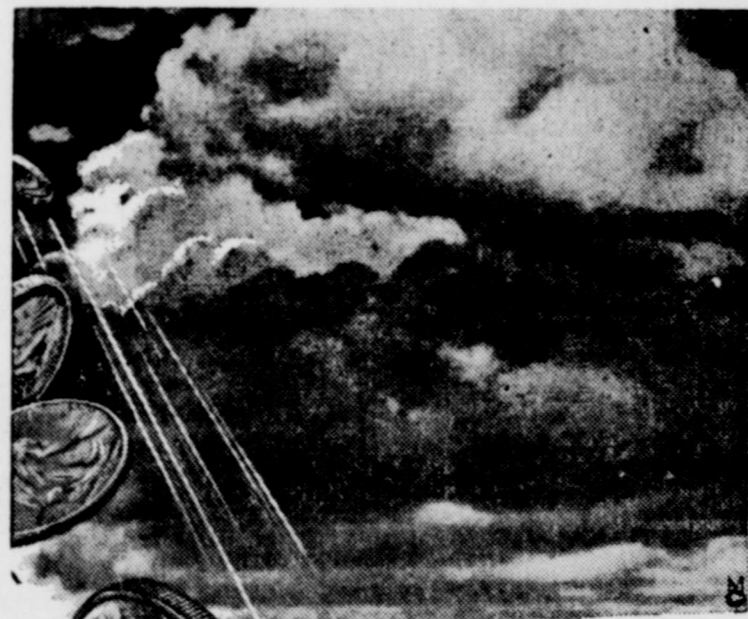

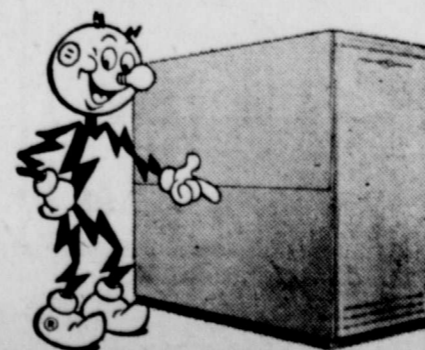

Highway Patrol Report for June

Captain K. B. Hallmark, Jr., Commanding officer of the Wichita Falls District of the Texas Highway Patrol, released Wichita County's rural traffic accident summary for June, 1956, this week.

The Patrol investigated a total of 37 accidents with the following breakdown: 30 property damage, 4 personal injury, and 3 fatal accidents.

Property damage amounted to \$17,240.00, with 7 persons injured and 5 killed. This is an increase of 24 accidents and five deaths for the same period of 1955.

Patrolmen of this district contacted a total of 1680 traffic law violators during the month of June. Of this number, 411 were arrested, while 1269 were warned for violation of the state traffic laws.

Speed was the leading cause of arrest, with improper passing and DWI ranking second and third, respectively.

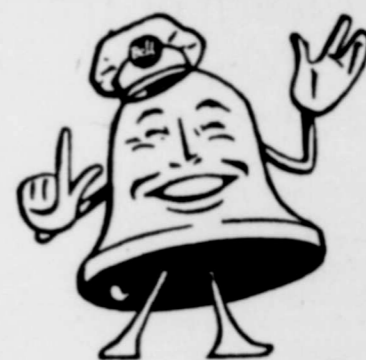
