## Four 4-H Boys To Enter Turkeys At Dallas State Fair

Four Wichita County 4-H boys will enter turkeys in the Dallas Fair. Each boy will enter three toms and three hens in the show, according to B. T. Haws, county agent. The birds will be judged Saturday, Oct. 6th. Prize money and ribbons will be awarded. The turkeys will be sold in an auction sale at the fair. This is the largest Junior market Turkey Show in Texas.

On Saturday, Oct. 6th they will also show two turkeys each in a county Broiler Show sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce. The boys will also receive ribbons and prize money in this show. The turkeys entered will also be sold.

The boys that will enter turkeys in the Dallas Fair are: Charles Sidney Robertson, Robt. Frank, Gary Frank and Danny Parfet. Entries for the boys have been sent in.

## Sen. Price Daniel Thanks Texans In Race For Governor

Senator Price Daniel this week thanked the 622,000 Texans who gave him an overwhelming lead in the first primary race for Governor, putting him more than 162,000 votes ahead of his run-off opponent.

"This is the widest lead a candidate for Governor ever has had in a run-off," Daniel said. "I am confident that, with hard work, we can win a landslide victory on August 25th."

Daniel, a native of Liberty County, maintains his family home on a small ranch near his birthplace and is a member of the REA.

As a U. S. Senator, he supported 90 percent parity on basic crops, authored an amendment to the farm bill which placed grain-sorghum supports at a comparable level as corn, and helped obtain more realistic farm credit provisions.

Daniel is advocating a statewide water and soil conservation program, a state drought relief program that would include loans to farmers and ranchers facing mortgage foreclosure.

His program also includes stepped-up research into proposals to create additional water supplies, such as conversion of salt water and artificial "rainmaking."

Daniel said that as Governor he would "put the full power of the State Government behind our farmers and ranchers, to help them regain their fair share of the national income and to help them fight the worst drought disaster in our history."

Civil Defense is basically the voluntary efforts of people, individually and in groups, together with the local, state and national government departments and agencies to protect themselves and their families and homes as well as commercial and industrial establishments and other community facilities such as schools and recreational and social agencies against the effects of warfare and national disaster.

Civil Defense includes fire fighting and rescue work, first aid, defense against atomic attack and many other phases of defense.

## Contract Let For Highway Work

A contract for 2 miles of construction on US Highway 287 in Wichita County has been awarded to a Dallas and Graham firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Uvalde Construction Co. and Harry Newton, Inc., submitted the low bid of \$2,948,837.16 on the project. Construction of grading, structures, storm sewers and concrete pavement from Ninth Street in Wichita Falls to a point just north of present US 287 is expected to take 360 working days, according to L. B. Dean, District Highway Engineer at Wichita Falls. The awarding of the contract to this firm is subject to the concurrence of the Bureau of Public Roads.

Frank S. Craig, Resident Engineer at Wichita Falls will be in active charge of the project while under construction.

"Several hundred farmers are killed or injured each year when farm tractors overturn, and one of the principal causes of over turning is overloading," he said while demonstrating safety in using a farm tractor.

## Senator Johnson Biography Now In Book Form

Texas' senior senator and Gillespie County's most distinguished citizen, the Majority Leader of the United States Senate, is the subject of a new biography, "The Lyndon Johnson Story" just published by Farrar, Straud and Cudahy, New York.

The book now on sale in book stores throughout the nation, was written by Booth Mooney, formerly of Dallas, who has been Senator Johnson's executive assistant since 1953.

The book contains a foreword by Johnson and is illustrated with 20 pages of photographs.

"The Lyndon Johnson Story" chronicles the major events in Senator Johnson's 25 years of public life, tracing his youth in the Hill Country of Texas in Blanco and Gillespie Counties to the present high position he holds in the nation's government.

It presents a close-up portrayal of the Texas, who is Texas' favorite-son candidate for the Democratic Presidential nomination this year.

The books open with an account of the heart attack Johnson suffered last year, then goes back to recount his career from its beginning. Full attention is given his work as a young congressman, and his meteoric rise in the Senate after his election to that body in 1948 is told in detail.

The State of Texas Future Farmers of America held their annual convention at the Statler Hotel in Dallas, Texas, August 7-9. Leslie Kaspar, a vocational agriculture teacher at Burkburnett, received the Lone Star Farmer Degree at the annual State awards banquet held in cooperation with the convention. He received this degree by earning \$500 from his projects and having outstanding leadership record.

Leslie has been a member of the FFA chapter for the past three years. He has served on the Poultry, Livestock, Dairy, Dairy Products and Grass judging teams. He is a member of the Burkburnett High School football team and will be a senior this coming year.

The chapter also received the highest award given by the state association, that of Gold Emblem. Only the top 50 chapters from over 850 in the state received this award. Burkburnett was the only chapter from this district to receive the gold emblem with a score of 93.1. The chapter hopes to return next year with more state candidates and again receive the gold emblem.

### Information For Veterans

The bill signed yesterday by the President extending the World War II GI Bill Loan deadline also has other important provisions affecting many veterans. Scott B. Harrington, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Dallas said today.

The new law will permit any veteran who sells residential property purchased with a GI loan to be relieved from liability to the Government under certain circumstances, Harrington said.

Previously, the veteran who sold his property and allowed the purchaser to assume his GI loan still remained liable to the Government in the event of subsequent foreclosure and the payment of a guaranty claim by the VA.

## PLEASE . . .

PULL to the curb and wait in your car for several minutes when the fire siren blows. Give the fire trucks and the firemen a chance to get to the fire. AND DON'T try to beat the truck to the fire, AND DON'T FOLLOW the truck unless you are a fireman. Just last week the fire truck was crowded to a skidding halt to prevent a smash-up. Some curiosity-stricken ignoramus almost got smeared. A big old clumsy fire truck loaded down with hundreds of gallons of water and other equipment can not be stopped on a dime. You are taking your life in your hands when you get in the way of a truck going to a fire. BE CAREFUL!

On another occasion the fire truck answered a call on a dead-end street. It looked like the blaze would get out of hand and a hydrant connection would have to be made and hose laid. The truck could not move for cars blocking the street. It took 15 minutes to open up the street. Luckily the blaze was brought under control just as the tank on the truck run dry. What if the house had been lost because the fire department was prevented from doing its job? Several car drivers were laying themselves wide open for heavy fines and liability suits.

Not all green vegetables have the same food value. The intention of the meeting was to encourage the maximum consumption of feed by the broiler flock should be provided. It's the extra feed eaten which produces the extra gain in weight and makes the profit, says B. T. Haws, county agent.

B. T. Haws, county agent advises that the best hay buy is usually hay which was cut while the plants were young. Hay from such plants is higher in leafiness and protein content and is actually a better buy even at a higher price than hay made from mature plants.

So many kinds of green vegetables can be bought at the market these days that there is really no excuse for a diet not adequate in needed vitamins, according to Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent.

Diet studies show that nutrients most frequently found in inadequate amounts are calcium which is supplied by milk and vitamins A & C which fresh green vegetables can help to supply.

Dark green leafy vegetables yellow vegetables and dark yellow fruits such as apricots, yellow peaches yellow meated plums and cantaloupes are all good sources of Vitamin A. These vegetables and fruits, eaten raw or properly cooked also supply substantial amounts of vitamin C.

Producers of Texas cotton are being asked to take every possible step to keep tar spots out of their cotton. The problem has become serious, says B. T. Haws, county agent, to warrant a belt-campaign of elimination.

The source of contamination is believed to come from tar coating for pickers. According to Haws, tar may also get into the cotton from tar tracked on the trailer or wagon, or from tar on the feet of those who walk on the cotton.

The hot weather which is prevalent during the picking season, close attention should be given to the tar picked up from driveways either by the tar on the feet of those who walk on the cotton. It's an easy job to track the tar into the Haws, for the wheel trailer is often used as a centering the trailer and on the wheel or tire transferred to the cotton sides or floor of the wagon.

Manufacturers are penning materials contaminating tar spots. By checking the origin of the contamination, the mills can tell where the bale was produced. At least one manufacturer already called on producers in an area where cotton has been tar spotted or lost their crop (in Texas).

Now few items are more apt to cotton producers than Haws advises to do everything possible

to help hold what they have and gain more.

The county agent advises growers to check the sacks of pickers who furnish their own sacks to make sure no tar is present and to also caution the pickers on tracking tar into the truck, trailer or wagon. If sacks must be bought, don't buy those with a tar coating.

## Texas State Dept. Of Health

State health authorities have raised a red flag of warning against careless use of insecticide compounds around the homes and gardens.

Despite being "tremendous agents for good" when used properly, the potent compounds can be fatal when absorbed through the skin or mucous membrane or when inhaled, Health Commissioner Henry A. Holle said.

Only last week health department food and drug officials asked that a roach paste containing thallium be recalled from the market because its odor and taste made it attractive to children.

Two of the newer garden spray products, parathion and tetraethyl pyrophosphate, come from a group known as "organic phosphate" insecticides. They were originally designed for professional use only, by workmen thoroughly familiar with the dangers associated with them.

Now they are available in small packages or bottles which frequently reach the general public.

Dr. Holle urged persons who insist on using either of the two powerful formations to handle them as professionals do.

"They wear special protective clothing with goggles to keep spray from their eyes, and respirators approved for protection against organic compounds.

"They never smoke or eat until they have thoroughly washed after using the preparations, and they know the symptoms of insecticide poisoning."

Holle listed headaches, excessive sweating, giddiness, blurred vision, weakness, nausea, cramps, diarrhea, or chest discomfort as symptoms of insecticide poisoning.

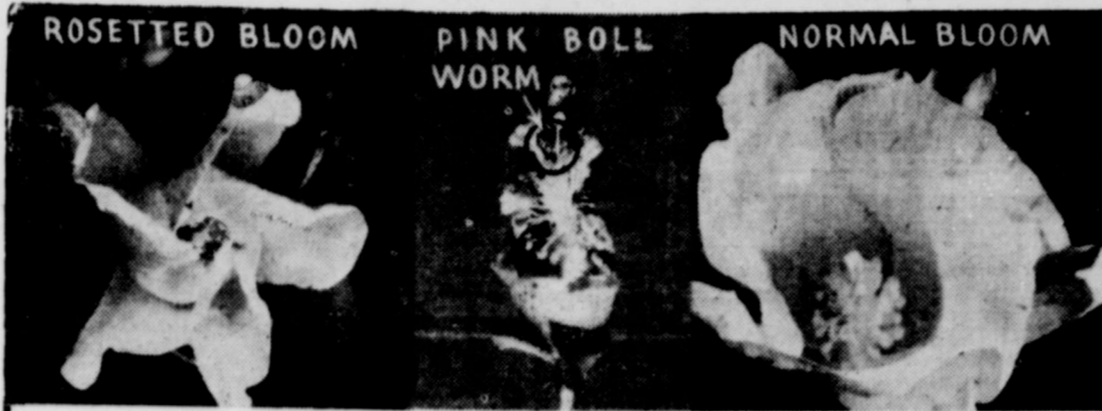
"Unless a man has the equipment and technical know-how, he had better steer clear of organic phosphate insecticides. And he would do well to read the precautions on the label of any insect poison, regardless of the ingredients."

A further insurance against poisoning, Holle suggests:

Keeping the insecticide out of reach of children and pets, and keeping it in the original container, covered and with the warning label attached.

Never give insecticides to a neighbor in an unmarked container. Write a warning in bold letters and personally attach it to the neighbor's bottle or can.

The dreaded pink bollworm is moving into cotton fields in all areas of Texas. When the cotton plants first start blooming, fields should be checked between 9:00 A.M. and Noon, daily, for about ten days for rosetted blooms. Rosetted cotton blooms indicate the presence of pink bollworm. The worm can be found by tearing open a rosetted bloom. Farmers should be on the lookout for pink bollworms, and are urged to contact their County Agent for control recommendations.

## Management Of Farm Fish Ponds

An interesting demonstration on Farm Fish Pond Management was conducted last Friday by Morris Stalcup, Wichita County game warden on the Joe Frazier farm located 6 miles southwest of Burkburnett.

Approximately 3 pounds of Rotenone was applied per acre foot of water. Small fish and minnows were affected within a few minutes after application of the rotenone. Carp, Crappie, bass and bream came to the surface in less than 1 hour after treatment was applied. Mudcats were the last fish to be affected and were still suffocating 8 hours after treatment.

Purpose of the treatment was to remove all fish from the farm ponds and to restock in the right proportions with bass, bluegills, and channel catfish.

Mr. Frazier plans to follow a fertilization program that should increase production tremendously.

Lloyd Ladd, of the Burkburnett Soil Conservation Service office states that application of commercial fertilizer (8-8-2) applied at the rate of 100 pounds per surface acre per month from April through September can support 200 to 600 pounds of fish per surface acre. Fertilizer not only improves fishing, it also

keeps down moss and other undesirable plants.

Do not start a fertilization program unless you plan to keep it up.

1. Stock the pond with the right kinds and numbers of fish.
2. Fertilize (preferably with commercial fertilizer) about once a month April through September with about 100 pounds of fertilizer per surface acre each application.
3. As soon as the bass and bream have spawned, fish the pond hard. Fishing by your neighbors and town friends won't hurt the pond. Heavy fishing is very important in maintaining proper balance of fish.

The desirable fish removed by rotenone from farm ponds are edible as this chemical causes suffocation and is not poisonous.

## Builders Want Packaged Unit To Heat, Cool

Heating and air-conditioning equipment for homes will be greatly simplified if the nation's builders have their way about it.

In the final report on the Air Conditioned Village, Austin, Texas, the Research Institute of the National Association of Home Builders says research at the Village has indicated the desirability of equipment with "proper packaging" to permit simple, inexpensive installation.

They note that a trend to equipment of this sort already exists.

The Air Conditioned Village consists of 22 similar houses built as a test project in 1954. Since that time, the houses and the families living in them have been the subjects of a series of technical, medical, and psychological tests.

**Add-On Units Wanted**

The report calls for year-round air-conditioning systems designed so that the cooling unit can be installed at the time of construction or added to the heating equipment later. The advantage of "add-on" air conditioning, as this is called, is that it eases the financing problem for the home-buyer.

A Coleman-manufactured system, which was installed in one of the 22 Village houses, is an example of the type of equipment that most nearly meets the recommendations for "packaging" and "add-on" design.

This system includes pre-formed round ducts, in accordance with specifications suggested in the report. This saves the longer installation time required for custom-made ductwork. A new type of duct made entirely of self-insulating glass fiber and plastic material is available. This reduces heat gain and prevents condensation of moisture on the ducts.

The same duct system serves for both heating and cooling. The furnace also serves year around. During the winter, it forces heated air through the ducts. In summer operation, the furnace fan blows air through a cooling chamber above the furnace and through the ducts to the rooms. The cooling system requires no extra space inside the house.

The refrigeration machinery goes outside the house. In line with the NAHB report, this is available with the refrigerant gas sealed in at the factory. This again lowers installation cost.

With add-on air conditioning, the heating components of the Coleman system are installed when the house is built. The cooling equipment then is added as the home-owner's budget permits. Normally, no change in the heating system is required.

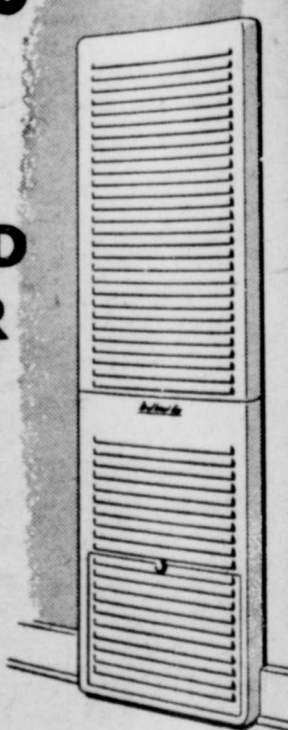

## Heating Needs Due Consideration When Building

The current wave of home construction lends impetus to the importance of modern heating equipment with its benefits of health and comfort. Contractors, builders and architects recommend that heating needs to be planned in advance so ducts, flues and the appliance can be installed as the house is built. Lone Star Gas Company heating engineers point out that much of the health and comfort of the family depends upon the temperature and humidity within the home. They state that one of the most important considerations in building a home or remodeling present construction is the type of heating equipment and how it is installed.

For the most effective, comfortable type of heating, a floor furnace, wall furnace or central heating plant is recommended. Combining this type of equipment with proper sizing, installation and venting is the proper means to provide excellent heating for the home. Proper sizing gives the right amount of heat, even on the coldest day. Proper installation assures faithful service and proper venting eliminates wall and window sweating.

There are many efficient and effective makes of gas heating equipment and each produces in its own way maximum comfort and operation efficiency. One of these is the perimeter heating system which, like other central heating plants, does away with cold floors and produces a uniform flow of warm air that stops drafts before they start. The perimeter system actually places the heat where it is most needed.

The perimeter gas furnace produces the warm air which travels through underfloor ducts to small diffusers installed in the outer walls and under windows. From the time it leaves the furnace until circulated in the room of the house the warm air is at work producing healthful, comfortable temperatures.

Because heat from the duct work under the house staves off chilly drafts, cold air never reaches floor. As a result, children may play in cozy warmth. The furnace for this gas heating unit can be installed in the average small closet. The under-floor location of the ducts does away with disturbing existing walls. Normally only one return register is required, eliminating costly decoration.

Other types of gas central furnaces popular in this area: the closet type furnaces, the most common, can be installed in a closet, equipment room, garage or the corner of a room. The attic type furnaces are installed in attics or upstairs game rooms and produce excellent heating, using a minimum of space. The under the floor furnace hangs beneath floor joists in the crawl space underneath the house.

However, the best central heating furnace is of little value without an adequate air distribution system. Quality central gas heating affords these five advantages: 1. Even temperatures from room to room throughout the home. 2. Minimum temperature difference from floor to ceiling. 3. The air is evenly distributed throughout the home with no drafts or cold or hot spots. 4. Temperature controls permit a person to dial the temperature desired. 5. Air passes through thick filters removing dust, dirt and pollen. Air is cleaner than that breather outdoors.

Other types of gas heating equipment are wall heaters, floor furnaces and vented circulators. Wall heaters are excellent for modern heating in existing homes. They provide economical heating, plus comfort, and are excellent for heating upstairs rooms, hallways not wide enough for floor furnaces and homes without enough crawl space clear ance for floor furnaces. practical, floor furnaces give adequate heating results. Care should be given for properly sized, placed and vented floor furnaces for best heating results.

All types of heating equipment should be properly sized for the area to be heated. There must be adequate equipment for the number of rooms to be heated and the equipment needs to be properly installed.

### Air Conditioners Popular In S-W.

Automobile air conditioners, while making strong sales gains nationally, are mounting as motoring "musts" in the wide open spaces of the Southwest.

This trend is emphasized in Chevrolet's June retail sales, according to W. E. Fish, general sales manager. He estimates that one of every eight new passenger cars delivered by the company in the Southwest region during June was equipped with air conditioning.

The company's action this spring of introducing units applicable to either a six-cylinder or a V8 car and making it available as a dealer-installed accessory has spurred popularity, he said. Further advantage, he said are the three different choices of air conditioning packages: dealer installation and service facilities developed through the company's nation-wide field training program and quicker deliveries.

When introduced on 1955 models, the Chevrolet air conditioner was offered as a factory installed unit on V8's only. This is continued, while the new accessory unit for sixes and V8's comes in three choices, one with a built in heater, another without a heater and a third for cars already equipped with heaters.

Dealer installations, which doubled from May to June, already equal the factory output with final returns on the hot months on July and August still to come, Fish said. The company air conditioner sales for the 1956 model year to the end of June were about three times greater than the total for all the model year of 1955, he said.

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### Broiler Growers Gained Reputation With Producers

Broiler growers have earned a reputation among meat producers for getting efficient feed conversion, that is, turning feed into meat. B. T. Haws, county agent, credits this development with making possible some of the rapid increase of recent years in broiler production and also for making broilers available to consumers at prices which are competitive and attractive when compared with other protein foods.

Research has rapidly increased the knowledge of broiler nutrition and growers have been quick to put this information to work. Cited are the high energy rations and the man supplement used in broiler feeds in relation to energy content rather than as a percent of the total ration weight.

The county agent points out that the first function of feed is to maintain the body weight of the broiler. Results of research reported by Dr. G. S. Fraps of Texas A&M college in 1946 showed that about 58 percent of the feed consumed by full fed growing chickens went for maintaining body weight and 42 percent for gain.

More recently, work done in Maine showed that a test lot of broilers weighed an average of 1.79 pounds each at six weeks of age and 2.22 a week later. This is a gain of 430 pounds for 1,000 birds in a week. Feed consumption was 1,120 pounds, based on Fraps' report, 650 pounds of the feed went for body maintenance and 470 for the weight gain. The 2.6 feed conversion was divided, 1.51 for maintenance and 1.09 for weight gain. Therefore, says Haws, conditions which will encourage the maximum consumption of feed should be provided for the broiler flock. It's the extra feed eaten which produces the extra gain in weight and makes the profit.

Many broiler growers follow the practice of feeding their birds three times each day primarily to arouse the interest of the birds and also by regulating the amount of feed put out are sure that some time during the day the troughs are nearly empty. This practice assures that only fresh feed is available and helps keep a fine edge on the birds appetite.

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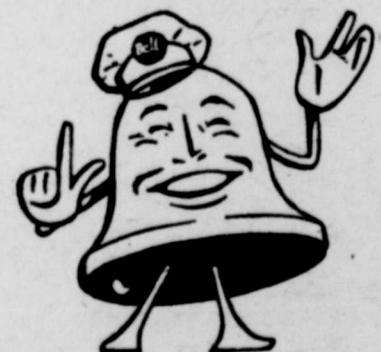
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
