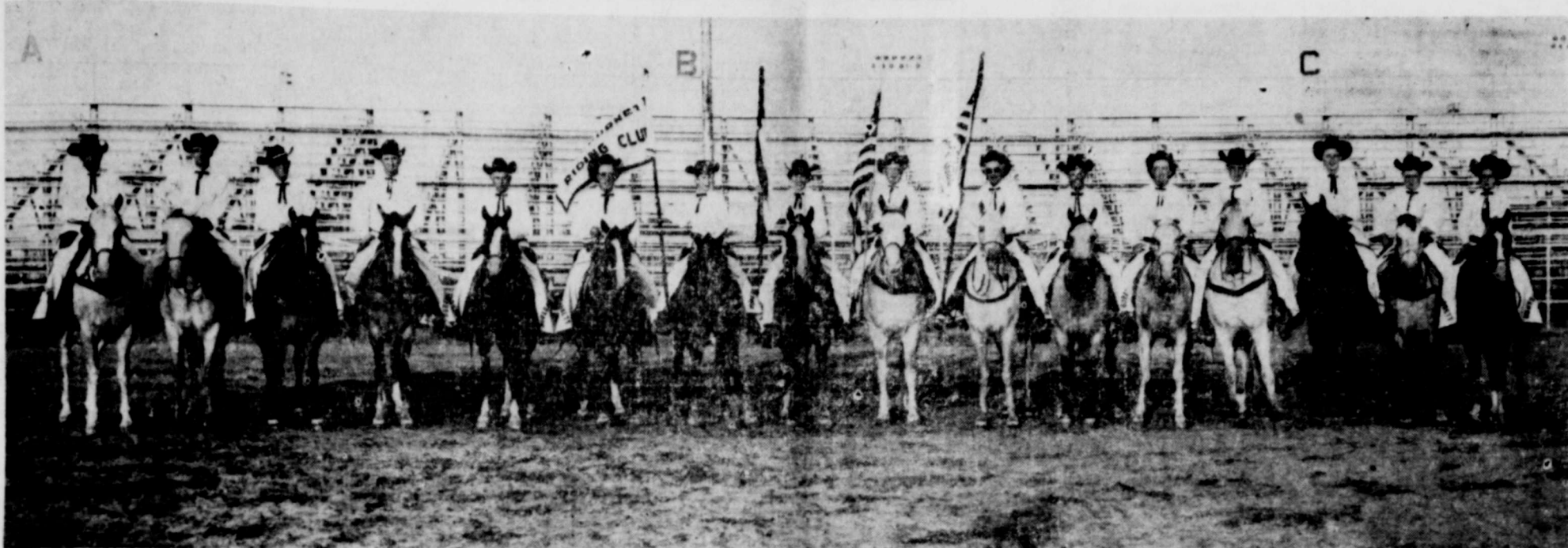

## RAILROADS ACT TO SAVE LIVES

Motorists will have a better chance of surviving because of a new and unusually effective device being used by several American railroads. Born of tragic need, the device combats a problem that has caused many deaths, stirred Congressional discussion and caused many influential groups to demand action.

The device — reflective markings on the sides of railroad equipment — is being used to reduce the number of instances in which motorists unknowingly speed to their deaths at night against the side of dark boxcars.

Forty-six percent of night collisions between trains and motor vehicles occur when a motor vehicle crashes into the side of a train, not when the train hits the car or truck. Perhaps more significant is the fact that 26 percent of the night railroad crossing accidents occur when a motor vehicle hits the train behind the engine. This compares with only five percent of this type of accident during the day, when the train is easy to see. Several railroads, rightfully concerned about these tragedies, have recognized the value of reflectorization as a means of preventing these accidents.

Several railroads, including the Chicago and North Western, the Burlington and the Great Northern, have quietly embarked on extensive programs of reflectorization that have made their equipment much easier to see at crossings at night. Now motorists can see such reflectorized equipment several hundred feet away, providing increased warning and stopping distance to avoid accidents that only a few months ago would have been fatal. All railroads could be commended if they followed suit.

## Suez Chickens Could Roost Here

On the forty-second anniversary of the opening of the Panama Canal for business Secretary of State John Foster Dulles sat down to lunch in London with Her Majesty's Prime Minister Eden and Foreign Minister Lloyd and French Foreign Minister Pineau and the task of finding a face saving way out of the Suez mess.

The following day, Mr. Dulles presented to the opening session of the 22 nation Suez conference, from which Egypt's president Nasser was notably absent, a four point plan on which the Western Big Three had presumably agreed over the luncheon bubble and squeak.

He proposed that the canal be operated in accordance with the Constantinople Convention of 1888, and by an international board which would include Egypt and some sort of tie with the U.N. No single power must dominate and the canal must be open to the shipping of all nations, in peace or war.

This plan would recognize Egypt's right to share in canal profits. It would also guarantee compensation to the stockholders of the Suez Canal Co., now nationalized by Col. Nasser. Finally, it would set up arbitration machinery to handle disputes.

It is the American position, whether Mr. Dulles sold it to Britain and France or not, that the nationalization of the canal by Nasser was legal, that it therefore belongs to Egypt and so do the profits. The Big Three is strongly united, however, in the determination that both supervision of the canal and its actual operation must be international. Egyptians would be allowed to work for the operating authority.

Soviet Foreign Minister Shepilov and India's Krishna Menon, however, urged that operation and control be turned over to Egypt under suitable guarantees that the canal will be open to all who wish to use it and will be properly maintained.

For once we are inclined to agree with this Russo-Indian view. For one thing, the Egyptians who have the most to gain by efficient operation of the canal, should be able to do a far better job of management than an international committee. But, far more important from the US point of view, is the looming question of how we can insist on globalist control and operation at Suez, and continue to retain for ourselves the management of our own Panama canal.

## BRACE YOURSELF

The movement to shift our non-religious holidays around so they will fall on a Monday is gathering considerable headway. This scheme of the National Association of Travel Organizations would give us five long week-ends every year:

Since Lincoln's and Washington's birthdays are variously observed, these would be merged and called "Presidents Day" which would fall on the third Monday in February. The last Monday in May would always be Memorial Day. The Fourth of July would not be the fourth very often, since it would inflexibly be the first Monday in that month. Thanksgiving (shades of the Pilgrim Fathers) would also be on Monday, the fourth one in November. Labor Day, of course, would require no juggling.

Swallowing our respect for tradition, this sounds pretty exciting. Practically everyone who has to meet a payroll is all for it. But still, could the human animal stand it on top of the five day week.

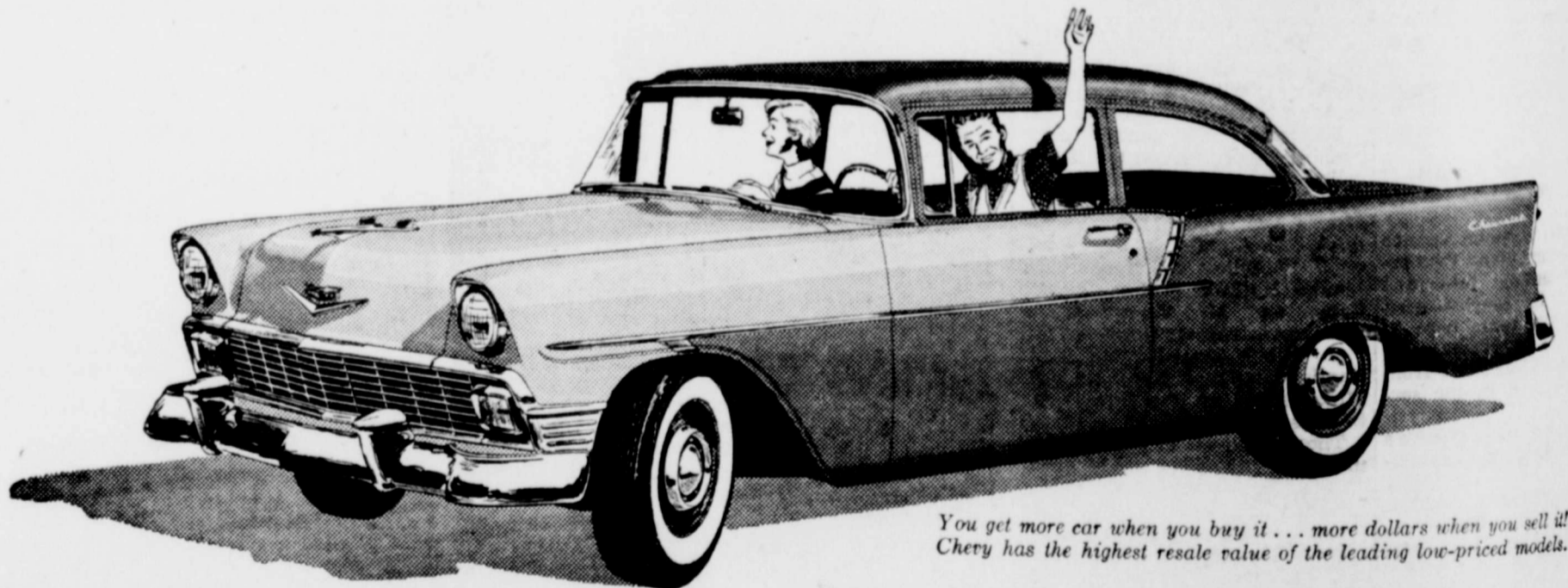

I realize that we do not have over about one-third the personnel necessary to do this job, but I also realize that we owe the duty to our employers, the taxpayers to do the very best job of which we are capable. Enclosed herewith you will find your work schedule for this week and to make this time spent on the highways as effective as possible, I wish to add the following instructions:

- 1st Duty Hours — Note please that the enclosed schedule calls for each of you to work 12 hours each day, in addition to those hours spent in your patrol car and on the road, you will remain at home on standby duty for the other 12 hours so that we will not have to divert another unit from its territory into yours in case of an accident in your area. I realize, of course, the strain of near double traffic and longer hours will affect your ability to see that great amount of tact and courtesy expected of you at all times, but I request that you keep in mind General Order No. 2 which contains these words "Courtesy, to the point of human endurance" and do the very best job you can in carrying it out.
- 2nd Selective Assignments — Major effort will be put forth on US 287 through our district as well as US 82, US 281 and State 99. Major effort will be placed on highways leading from cities to the taverns in your area at such time as called for by your experience in dealing with the people who are inclined to become intoxicated and drive a car.
- 3rd Selective Assignment — During the labor day weekend in 1955, over three-fourths of our fatal accidents has as a causative factor too much speed. You will show no mercy whatever towards the driver who is driving too fast. In order to conserve your time for your work, you

## A "How-To-Do-It" PAINT POINTERS



Concrete floors such as breezeways are more attractive painted in a gay color and vastly easier to keep clean and dust free.

A good grade porch and floor paint is recommended following an etching application of mild muriatic acid solution. Wash and then paint with brush or roller. Concrete should be aged several months before painting.

It is important that all grease, oil or wax be removed before painting using paint cleaner for grease and oil spots and turpentine to eliminate wax.

Basement concrete floors below ground level may present a moisture problem. Test this by leaving a rubber mat or piece of linoleum on the floor for several days. If then there is moisture underneath use alkali resistant chlorinated rubber-base paint after etching. If dry, porch and floor paint should stand up satisfactorily.

### The Picture Of Health Fractures

Soon after the x-ray was discovered by Roentgen in 1895, it was first used to show foreign objects in the body and broken bones. Up to that time physicians and surgeons had to set bones by feel and by guess, and sometimes a fracture badly set had to be broken more than once to get the bones in proper position.

Today the radiologist is called upon to examine more patients for possible fractured or chipped bones than for any other x-ray examination with the possible exception of those for the chest and teeth. The radiological examination is the best and sometimes the only way to distinguish between sprains and fractures.

To say "merely" sprained is perhaps misleading, for a sprain can be as painful as a break. Today the treatment used for each one is different. The sprain is bound with an elastic bandage to avoid over-swelling, perhaps injected with an anesthetic, and the patient allowed to use it up to the point where severe pain occurs. When the radiologist reports a fracture it is, of course, immobilized usually in plaster for the period of weeks—sometimes months—that it takes bones to knit.

A fracture of a bone where the skin is not penetrated by the fragments is called a simple fracture; when the bone pierces skin it is called a compound or open fracture. A bone broken in more than one place, splintered or crushed, is a comminuted fracture. A green-tree fracture is one where a bending force has snapped one side of the bone like a sapling bent too far in the wind. Sometimes a fracture can consist of only a tiny sliver of bone chipped off a parent bone.

When a fracture is set it is said to be reduced. Sometimes fractures must be reduced surgically, as when an elderly person breaks a hip that will not heal without pinning. In such cases the radiologist assists the orthopedic surgeon in guiding the placement of a "dowel" through the broken parts. Actually they nail the two ends of the bone together.

### The Picture Of Health Breast Disease

Most diseases of the breast (besides some complications of pregnancy) consist of infections or tumors. One of the commonest kinds of infection is mastitis, meaning simply inflammation of the milk glands. It is usually the result of some bacterial infection. If these inflammations or infections turn into abscesses they have to be surgically removed. Antibiotics are of value in eradicating the more acute infections.

Growths of the breast can of course be benign, that is, harmless, as well as malignant. One very common benign tumor is the adenofibroma, which simply means a fibrous tumor of the mammary gland. Most surgeons will prefer to remove these small masses because, even with the reasonable accuracy of diagnosis by modern methods, the difference cannot always be told. And the breast is, of course, easily accessible to surgery with minimal risk.

Many women, however, seem to fear that every lump the physician finds is going to be grave. Dr. Charles S. Cameron of the American Cancer Society says that the average breast cancer has reached a diameter of more than 1 1/4 inches before the patient pays it serious attention. As a result figures show only half as many breast cancers are being cured as could be. Since they account for one out of every five cases of female cancer, this means that procrastination costs lives. Incidentally, men may also have cancer and other diseases of the breast.

The doctor usually diagnoses a breast ailment by the history, by looking at it, by feeling it (or palpation), and by surgically removing the mass. Accurate diagnosis can also be aided by x-ray examination. The radiologist can further help the surgeon in evaluating the case by determining how far, if at all, it has spread; that is if it has reached the bones or lungs. Most malignant tumors of the breast are treated first by surgery, second, perhaps, by x-radiation and sometimes also by use of male hormones. Advanced cases, which are sure to have spread elsewhere in the body, may also be controlled for a while by cortisone and thyroid hormones.

## Texas State Dept. Of Health

Children are not really ready to enter school until they have had a complete physical examination," Dr. Henry A. Holle, Commissioner of Health reminds parents. All boys and girls enrolling in the Kindergarten or first grade classes of Texas schools should be taken to their physicians or to a public health clinic, for an immediate physical check-up if they have not had such an examination in recent months.

It is important to act as promptly as possible. This is recommended in order to allow time for medical treatments or corrections that may be necessary before school opens. No youngster should be permitted to begin a school career with less than the best possible physical equipment.

As most parents know, vaccination against smallpox is necessary. Those who received this immunization in infancy should be vaccinated again in order to assure a high degree of immunity, and those who have never received this protection should be vaccinated without delay.

Dr. Holle urges parents whose children have not received salk poliomyelitis vaccine to have this administered before entering school. The safety and efficiency of this prevention has been proven and all children should be protected against this crippling disease.

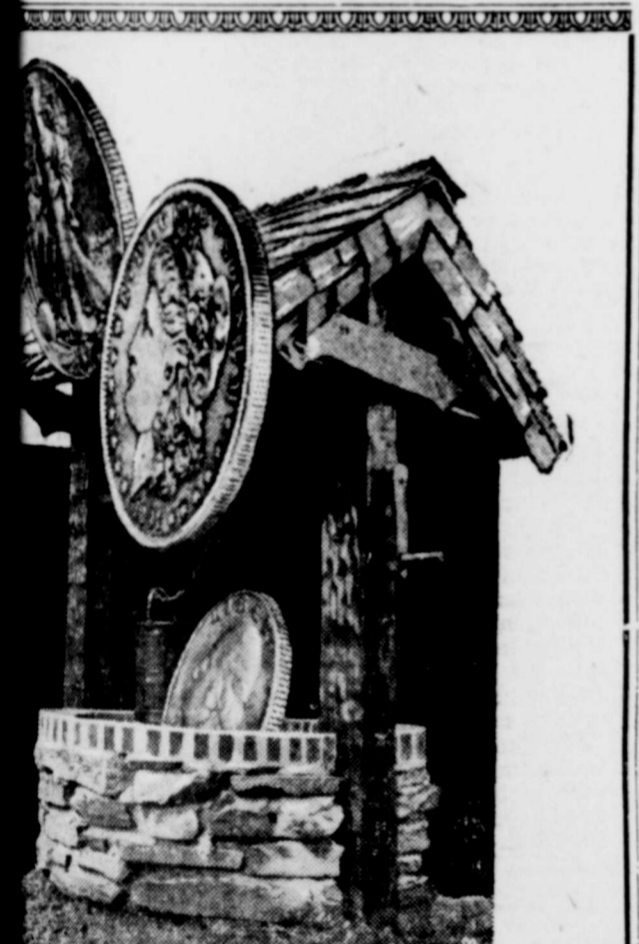

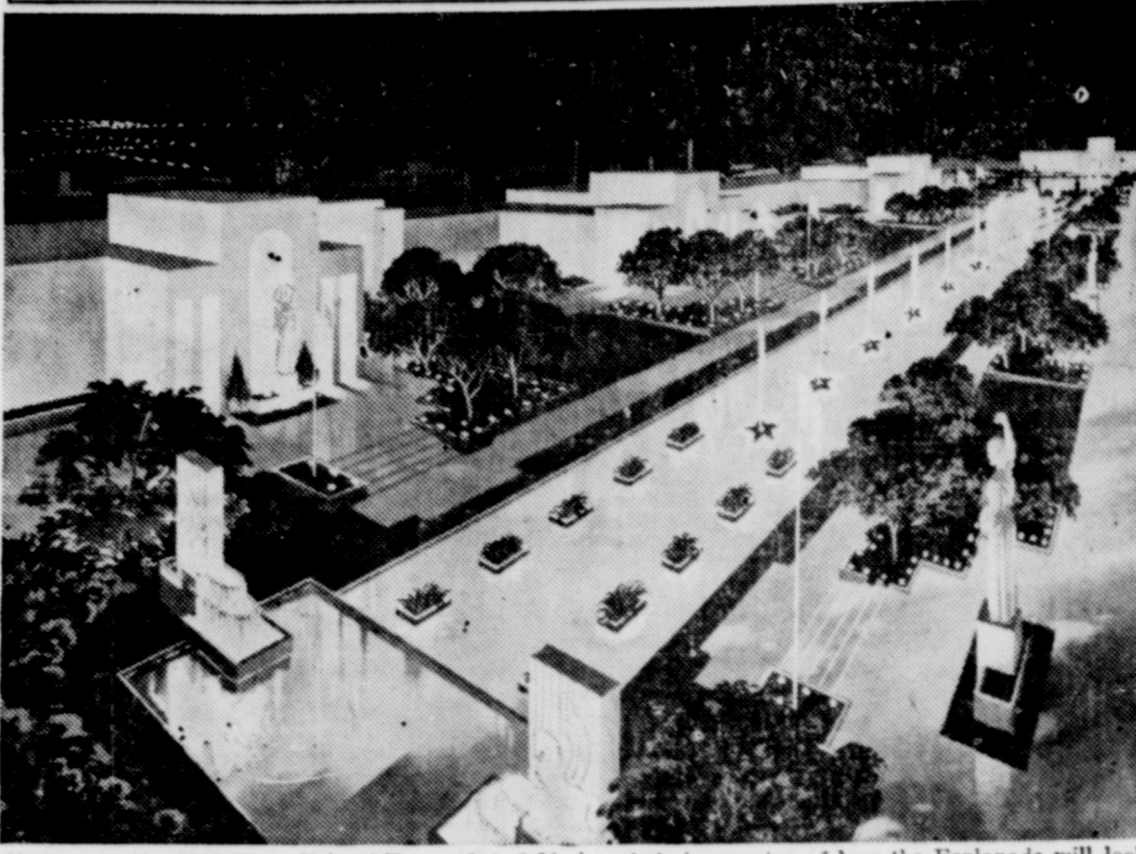

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## Modern Wood Windows Would Amaze Old Romans

In the same way the automobile is an improvement over the ancient chariot, modern windows are better than the simple ones of glass enclosed in a wood frame used by the Romans more than 1,000 years ago. Fundamentally, the original idea is as good as ever, but windows have been greatly improved in design and style. One of the biggest improvements has been in the ways windows open. Here are the basic types of modern ponderosa pine windows: Casement—This is the familiar window that is hinged at the side and opens like a door. In the open position, it directs air currents into the house. Three-way awning window—This is a versatile window which can be installed in awning, casement, or hopper positions. In the awning position, it opens up and outward. Turned upside down, it becomes a hopper window, opening down and inward. Installed on its side, it is a casement window. Sliding—Consisting of two glass panels in separate sash, this window opens and closes by sliding from side to side. Double-hung—Probably the most familiar type of all, the double-hung window has two sash which slide up and down in the frame. Fixed-sash—This window does not open at all, and most frequently is used for picture windows. The awning-hopper-casement windows of ponderosa pine combine versatility with ease of cleaning and operation. They can be grouped together to fill any size area, even an entire wall, and the outside of the glass can be reached from inside the house, simplifying cleaning. Many of the sliding and double-hung windows can be completely out of the easy cleaning, too.

## Pre-Hung Door Saves Time

One of the rare jobs around the house that even the most skillful home handyman hesitates to tackle is the exacting task of hanging a door. Any carpenter knows that fitting a door to the frame so that it swings easily, fits snugly, latches properly, and closes just right is a time-consuming and intricate process. To him, it's an art. Today, however, old-fashioned door-hanging with all its headaches can become a "lost art" through the use of ponderosa pine panel door and frame units fitted together at the factory. A carpenter can fit one of these ponderosa pine units with its door pre-hung by factory craftsmen into the door casing and have it ready to paint within 15 minutes. The home handyman, equipped with only a hammer, can do it almost as quickly.

## Grotto of Jeita is Wonderland

The vast interior of the little-known Grotto of Jeita away in the Lebanon mountains about 10 miles North beckons as a challenge to man's courage as he seeks back the frontiers of speleology. The grotto of Jeita is one of the stages on which nature has chosen to enact a wondrous drama composed of water and to stage it against a magnificent backdrop of draperies and curtains that entrance the eye. Hanging in innumerable shapes and forms, the stalagmites have fascinated the speleologists who have entered the interior of the vast cave. In sculptured and simulated eagles loom over the abysses. Layer cakes, candles and totem poles point at the vaulted top. Flattened like combed fleece spread out to dry line the walls. Translucent layers resonate like cymbals with metal. Other layers hang down like candlelike finest crystal, reflecting light with pinpoint brilliance, so beautiful.

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
