GRASS ROOTS OPINION

SANTA PAULA, CALIF., Daily Chronicle: "The round of labor strikes, settled invariably by granting higher wages, in several major industries has only fed inflation. The big steel strike laid the foundation, as predicted, and with its settlement, new price increases in iron and steel products were immediately announced. Aluminum followed steel, with more increased prices. There is no known way yet devised to increase costs without price increases, so we travel in a circle."

JUNCTION CITY, ORE., Times: "Voting is more than just a privilege of our citizens — its a duty and an obligation. And that's something to remember in these coming pre-election days. As individuals, we don't owe anything to these politicians, our obligation is to secure the highest type of good government, at local, state and national level."

JEFFERSONTOWN, KY., Jeffersonian: "Men and women willing to stem the tide of over spending should not only be encouraged to run for public office, but should be militantly supported once they decide to make the sacrifice. And a sacrifice is what it really means, to oppose well organized pressure groups that are willing to make demands for legislation for their benefit at the expense of the general taxpaying public."

DUBLIN, GA., Courier-Herald: "Perhaps government should not be operated as a business, but there are certain principles of economics that ought to be considered in the operation of any division of government. One principle is that when the outgo exceeds the income, something serious is bound to happen."

A Freighter Goes Aground

A short time ago a freighter named the Seagate went aground on the Washington coast. And this led the Portland, Ore., Journal to print an editorial highlighting some of the differences between U. S. Merchant ships and their foreign competitors.

The Seagate was Greek-owned and had Liberian registry. She carried a crew of 28 men, which is about 20 fewer than an American flag ship of the same type would carry. Her wage levels were much lower. She was not insured by Lloyd's or American marine underwriters, because, the Journal says, "Those insurers of ships and cargoes have learned that many Liberian registered ships involve too much risk for normal rates."

The Seagate also lacked navigation equipment of the latest type and is said to have been 80 miles off course. To quote the Journal once more, "Better navigation would cost more money, another reason why the cost of keeping the American merchant fleet on the high seas is greater than for vessels such as the Seagate."

That cost difference is felt, and felt heavily, in everything that has to do with our merchant marine, from building, fitting and maintaining the vessels to wages and working and living conditions for the men who man them. This is why the American government has wisely adopted laws and policies designed to keep our flag flying on the seaways of the world, to serve our commerce and to support the national defense.

The Freedom To Take Risks

The United States holds unchallenged leadership of the worlds oil industry. "Why?"

One answer, of course, is that we were blessed by Nature with vast underground resources of this black gold. But that is far from a complete answer. The head of an American Oil Company, points out that oil was discovered at about the same time in both the United States and Russia. Russia also has an abundance of oil underground. Yet, to date, U. S. oil production has exceeded Russian production by the incredible figure of 44 billion (yes, billion) barrels.

One reason for that, he went on, is that government monopolies, such as Russia has long had, just won't take the risks that American oil men working under our free enterprise regard as routine. He used the state of Oregon, where he was speaking, as an example. Nearly 200 dry wells have been drilled there. Oil has not yet been found. Maybe it will be in the future and maybe it won't be. But the American oil men will keep on trying, just as they keep on trying all over this and other countries.

To quote the oil official once more, "If it were not for democratic form of government and our private enterprise system we could not have this important freedom to take business risks and our economy would stagnate. "Natural resources are vitally important, but they are of little value unless there is a climate of freedom that encourages their wise development. That goes for oil and everything else."

"From the massive gleaming front to the smart, streamlined fins of the rear fenders, the 1957 Pontiacs are a triumph of modern design and safety engineering. The body design is new. The overall length has been increased 1.2 inches; however the lower silhouette and the dramatic styling creates a much longer and sleeker appearance.

The wide, low front end of the 1957 Pontiac is high lighted and protected by heavy wrap-around bumpers with integrated bomb type bumper guards. Large oval parking lamps are set into the lower part of the bumpers. A semi circular chrome grille and a full width air scoop direct air flow to the car radiator.

Hooded head lamps surmounted by sleek front-fender ornaments are prominent in the front end styling. Greater vision is achieved by lowering the hood 1.6 inches and increasing the windshield area 75.4 square inches in the Catalinas, convertibles and custom station wagons and by 69 square inches in sedans and other station wagons.

The flair of the rear fender fin houses an integrated tail and back up lamp and a safety reflector. The rear projection of the oval tail lamp is protected by a projection in the rear bumper which also serves as an exhaust port on cars equipped with dual exhausts.

A missile outline trim of stainless steel sweeps the entire length of the car on each side. The Star Flight styling of the 1957 Pontiac is further accentuated by a windsplit molding in the rear fender. On the Star Chief models this torpedo-shaped windsplit is sheathed in stainless steel. The same material, brushed to a satin finish, is used on the vane wheel discs. A full range of exciting modern colors is available on the 16 body styles.

The eye catching appeal of the 1957 Pontiac is not limited to exterior styling for the new cars offer the most luxurious color-keyed interiors in Pontiac history. Star chief series models are upholstered in the finest hand-buffed leather in "dream car" colors of Silver Beige, Kenya

Ivory, Cordova Red, Limefire Green, Seacrest Green and Fontaine Blue. These top grain leathers can also be had in combination with "encore" patterned nylon fabrics.

Super Chief series model feature upholstery of colorful combination in "horizons" patterned nylon faced fabric and grain-ribbed vinyl coated fabrics. Rich-piled carpeting is standard equipment for the Star Chief and Super Chief series, except in convertibles and station wagons. The economy priced Chieftian series models offer a new height of luxury with interiors of contemporary tweeds patterns of nylon faced cloth and vinyl. Sixty six interior trim combinations are offered in the 1957 line.

Pontiac's completely new instrument panel for 1957 offers the ultimate in safety, convenience and modern styling. The lower section of the panel on Star Chief models feature full width chromed trim panels. The glove compartment door and dual ash trays are housed in the lower panel. The instrument cluster, with two circular dials

and a luminescent "Safety Line" speedometer, are positioned at an easily readable level. New finger tip heater and defroster controls and clock are located near the center of the instrument panel. The radio speaker is positioned below the center of the instrument panel for better sound reproduction and distribution. Another influence of "dream car" styling in the 1957 Pontiac is the deep swallow-tail steering wheel, which adds the final touch of modern, safety design to the passenger compartment.

American car buyers, who over the past few years have grown increasingly interested in "what is under the hood" of their new cars, will find that Pontiac engineers have developed the 1957 car to a new level of efficiency and smooth, durable performance.

The Strato-Streak V-8 engine, with displacement increased to 34.7 cubic inches, has higher horsepower, 101:1 compression ratio, larger manifolding, completely machined and contoured combustion chambers, larger,

transmission oil cooler is located for maximum cooling efficiency.

Pontiac's roadability, spectacularly proven by the endurance records it set at the Bonneville Salt Flats, has been notably improved. Contributing to safer ride and handling are the new 14 inch wheels, modified shock absorber valving, and new front and rear springs.

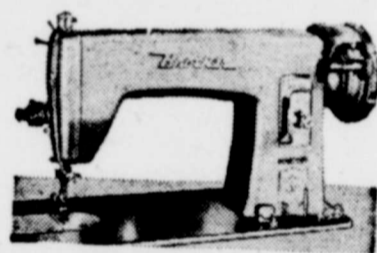

Notes from County Agent And Home Agent

Gary and Robert Frank, 4-H club boys from Wichita County received \$20.78 prize money on their two turkey entries in the Dallas Fair. They received 2 blue ribbons and 2 red ribbons.

Wichita County farmers are real busy at the present time sowing small grain. Lots of farmers had their grain dusted in before the rain. There is however, lots of grain to be planted.

Texas wheat growers signed 12,116 agreements and placed 919,985 acres under the winter wheat acreage Reserve program of the Soil Bank through October 5th, the final date for signing agreements. B. T. Haws, county agent says if those who signed agreements comply with the requirements of the program, they will be eligible for maximum of \$14,067,075 in Acreage Reserve payments.

Grain sorghum hybrids produced from 10 to 25 percent more grain than pure varieties in 1955 field demonstrations conducted in 1956 and scattered from the Rio Grande Valley to the Panhandle. Sorghum hybrids were developed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and seed was released in 1954 for multiplication in 1955.

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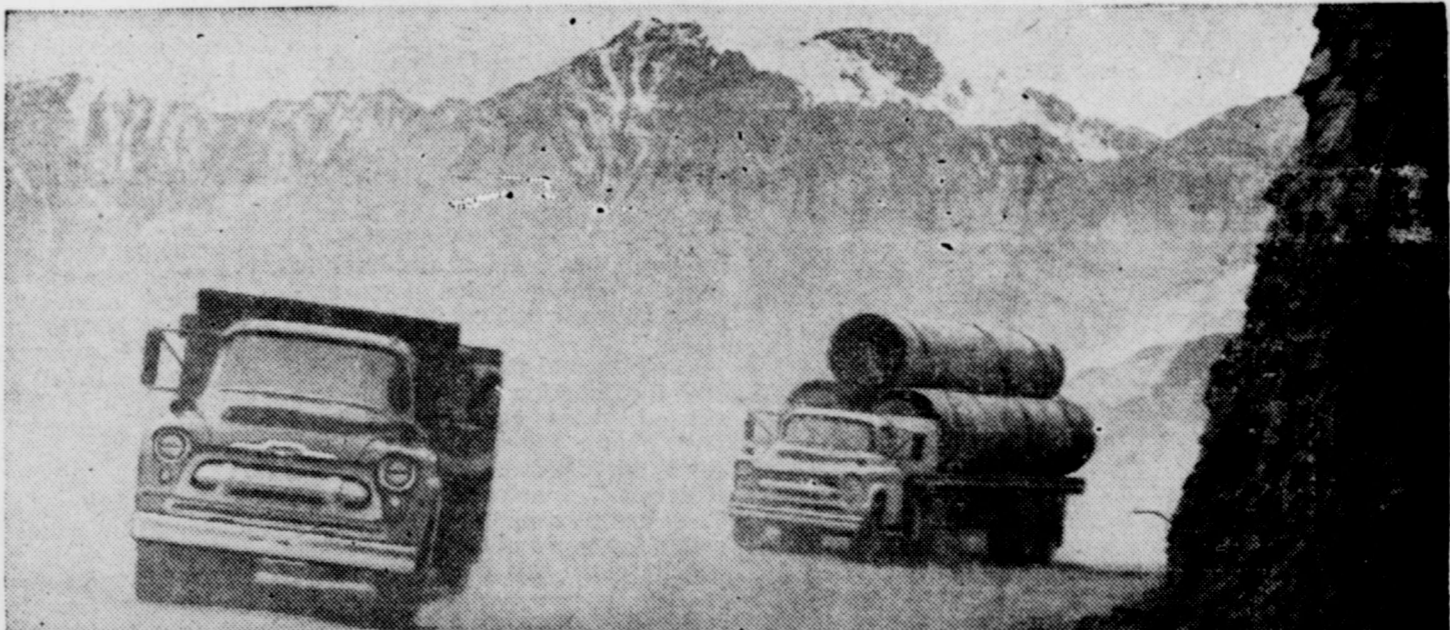
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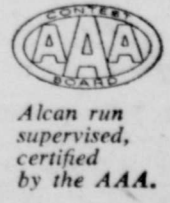
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
