Lewisville has won 10 games this year, many of them by lopsided scores. The boys are big, but little other information is available on them.

Burk lost one non-conference game, early in the season, tied another with Iowa Park. They have lost only one conference game, to Electra.

The game is called at 8 o'clock tonight (Thursday) in Coyote Stadium. Tickets at the gate are \$1.25 for adults, and \$1.00 for students.

### Bulldogs District Champions Over Cubs From Olney

Last Friday night the Bulldogs put on one of the biggest scoring sprees local fans had seen in a long, long time. The Olney Cubs were the opponents and the high stakes was the district 2A-9 championship. When the final whistle sounded Burk Burnett was leading comfortably 58 - 20.

Everybody expected a close game, with the breaks possibly deciding the victor. Breaks did figure in the outcome—lots of them—all in favor of Burk Burnett. Olney fumbled five times. Burk recovered all five and turned three of them into touchdowns. Burk intercepted four passes, cashed two of them in for scores.

**1st Quarter**  
Olney fumbled on the kickoff. Burk recovered on Olney's 14. Two plays later Donald McKinnis, halfback, went over center to score. Billy Baker missed the try for extra point. 6-0. This happened the first 45 seconds.

Burk recovered an Olney fumble on Burk's 40 yard line. This time, Doyce Walker took off for 60 yards and a touchdown. Baker kicked the extra point. Two min., 35 sec. 13-0

Alex Mills intercepted a pass on Olney's 45. He streaked over the goal line untouched. The try for extra point was an incomplete pass. 5 min. 19-0

McKinnis plunged over from the one yard line for the next 6 points. Norman Morgan kicked the conversion point. 7:35. 26-0.

**Second Quarter**  
Olney showed renewed life by traveling 71 yards continuous possession of the ball to score. Tommy Peden, fullback, went over from the 7 to score. Jack Cooper kicked the extra point. 26-7

Not to be outdone, Burk came back with a 67 yard march with Doyce Walker passing from the 20 yard line to Gary Jennings, who had sneaked across the goal line and was out in the open by himself. Morgan missed the kick for the extra point. 32-7

Olney got their passes and ground plays rolling and kept the ball for 70 yards and a score. Billy Clifton scored from the 3. Earl Phillips, center, kicked the extra point goal. 32-14

Burk rambled 88 yards to the goal line, with McKinnis going off left tackle to score. Walker pitched a pass to Alex Mills for extra point. 39-14

Walker intercepted a pass on Burk's 45 and returned it to the 25. Gary Jennings covered the 25 yards to score. Baker missed the extra point try. 45-14

Burk Recovered an Olney fumble on Olney's 44. Walker made the 44 yards to score on one run. Baker missed the kick. 51-14

Olney's final score came after moving the ball 66 continuous yards. Jimmy Krueger scored from the 1. He also missed the extra point conversion. 51-20

## GRASS ROOTS OPINION

**CUERO, TEXAS, Record:** "The trend toward less time and less production on the job with no reduction in pay continues—Many people do not know what to do with the leisure time they now have, let alone with more free hours. Off the job, they seem lost; they fritter their time away. They need what might be called idleness training, a development of inner resources that will make leisure time fruitful. They will pose a growing challenge to society as working hours decrease."

**ALAMEDA, CALIF., Times-Star:** "Agricultural production is vastly greater now than it was in the mid 1850's. The introduction and constant improvement of farm machinery together with the adoption of better farming methods has made higher production possible with less time and effort."

**TEMPE, ARIZ., Daily News:** "All media of communication have been very much occupied recently with talk about voter apathy. If it does exist, it is highly understandable, for the whole trend of politics now tends to make more and more people feel that they have no stake in the government."

**WASHINGTON, MO., Citizen:** "They have to register in the larger cities before they can vote, but in the smaller town not even registration is necessary. All we have to do in towns like Washington and Union is take a few minutes and cast our vote. Let's show 'em this November"

## TWO KINDS OF WORLD TRADE

Just about everybody agrees that international trade is a necessary thing, and that the world in general needs more of it. Trade can build and strengthen the economies of nations, and improve the living standards of their peoples. Of at least equal importance, it can lead to a better understanding and a climate of friendliness between nations—which is certainly something this chaotic world can use.

But there are some important qualifications that must be added. One is that trade should be a two way street—those who want to sell must also be willing to buy. Another is that our efforts should be given to stimulating trade with our friends, not our enemies.

The case of Poland is in point—a country which, despite its current troubles with the Soviet Union, has a Communist, anti-Western government. During the first eight months of this year Poland exported 18,210,000 pounds of canned pork, mostly ham, to the United States. That marked an increase of more than three million pounds over the same period in 1955. In return, Poland got dollars, which every Communist as well as non-Communist country urgently wants. What Poland does with those dollars seem to be something of a mystery. One thing is sure—she does not buy American agricultural products with them.

By contrast, three of our European friends—Denmark, Germany and Holland, sell canned pork here and they too get dollars in return. But they follow the two way street principle, and are substantial purchasers of American products, including meat and animal products. We need more of the kind of trade that benefits us and the rest of the free world—and less of the other kind.

## Needed: TENS OF BILLIONS

The fact that something like 9 million Americans—most of them in the moderate income brackets—own stocks in our corporations has been well publicized, as it should be. Nothing like this has ever happened on the face of the earth before. It is also pointed out, that, if American enterprise is to grow and expand in the right way, we will need many millions more people who will put a part of their savings into the shares of companies in which they have faith.

Some information presented by U. S. News and World Report indicates how great that need is. It states that a record is being set this year for money spent by business on plants and equipment. The 1956 figure will substantially exceed \$35 billion. The magazine also says, "In 11 postwar years, including 1956, the total spending for replacement and expansion is approaching the enormous sum of \$269. billion."

It is obvious that there aren't enough big investors to make even a dent in future requirements. Much of the expansion money will come from industry's earnings, which will be reinvested in the business. But there is a limit to that. Then, business can borrow, through issuing bonds and in other ways. But too great a load of debt, with its heavy fixed charges, is a burden on a corporation just as it is on a family and can seriously restrict its freedom of action.

That is why as much as possible of the needed money should be raised through sales of stock. And, going by recent past precedent, there is good reason to believe the American people in ever-increasing numbers will wish to become share owners in the nation's industries.

The parade of champions began shortly after 9:30 and following a program in which farmers and conservationists were lauded and rewarded.

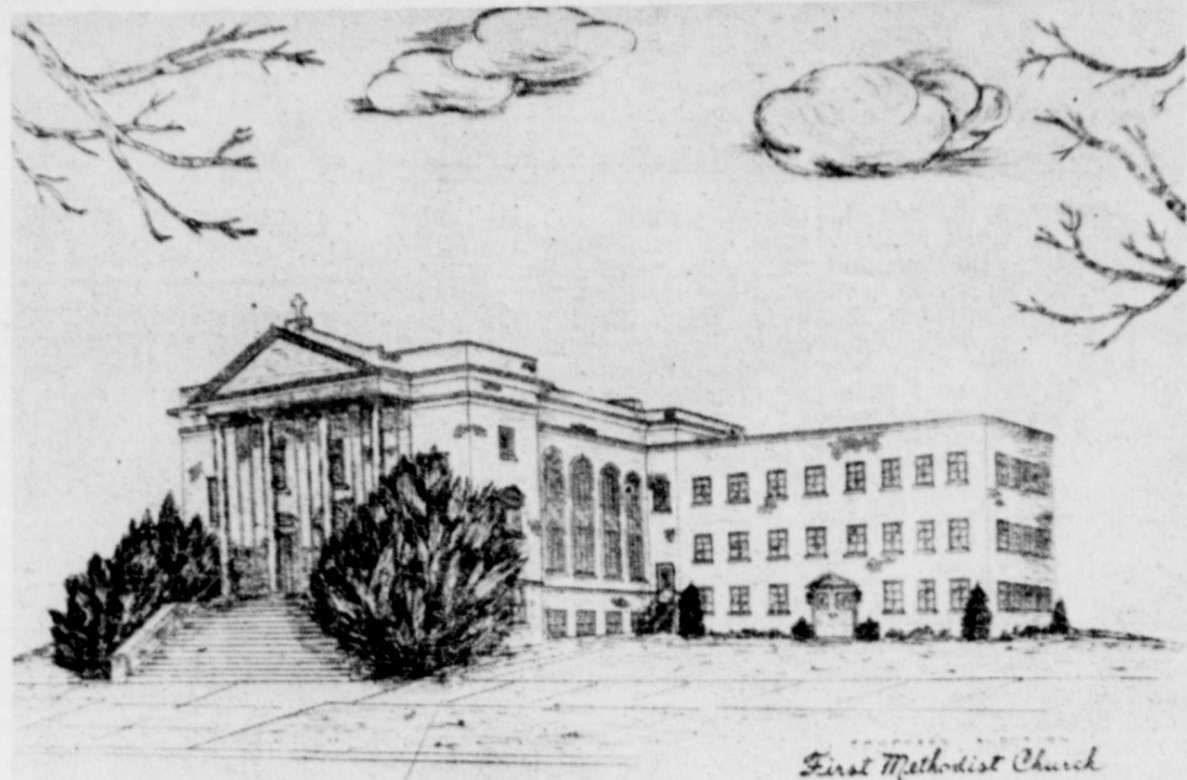

## Notes from County Agent

Alden Smith of the Burkburnett Community was declared a Regional winner in Community Relations in a telegram received by B. T. Haws, county agent, this week. Alden will receive a free trip to the National 4-H club Congress at Chicago, Nov. 25 through Dec. 1st. He will leave Dallas on Friday, Nov. 23rd for Chicago. Alden is a student at A&M College.

Alden has been an outstanding 4-H and FFA boy for several years, winning many honors in both organizations.

Mike Hartmangruber, farmer in the irrigated valley, believes in planting Austrian winter peas in 20 inch rows. He used 150 lbs of phosphate at the time of planting under his peas. He has planted 50 acres of Austrian winter peas.

Wymore Downing likes button clover in his permanent pasture. Downing reports button clover does well in your lower spots in your pasture. We need a good clover for permanent pastures in Wichita County.

Some farmers are busy at present time harvesting pecans in the county. The pecan crop is good, considering the dry weather during the summer.

Frank Morton, 4-H boy from the Friberg-Cooper community, received a Gold Star Award at a District Banquet at Vernon Friday night. Frank is the 1956 Gold Star boy for Wichita County. Frank will leave Friday, Nov. 23rd for Chicago to attend the National 4-H club Congress. He is the state winner in the Tractor Maintenance program. Frank is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Willie Morton.

Recent rains in many areas of the state have been sufficient to germinate and start growth of dry planted winter pastures. Too, says B. T. Haws, county agent, plantings can still be made, but late plantings mean less grazing. He says management of the winter pastures from now on will determine to a large degree the amount of grazing which pastures will provide.

Nov. 16-22 has been proclaimed as Farm-City week in the United States. It purpose is to bring about a better understanding between rural and urban people.

Winter is just around the corner. B. T. Haws, county agent reminds that a hard freeze can play havoc with auxiliary motors tractor engines and sprayers unless they have been properly winterized.

The farm population of the United States has been decreasing about 600 thousand a year since 1949. Farmers who have remained on the land have achieved record breaking harvests on about the same acreage and with 30 percent less labor.

The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council reminds highway users that driving conditions for the next few months generally are conducive to traffic accidents. "Use care and do a lot of thinking when driving during adverse weather periods."

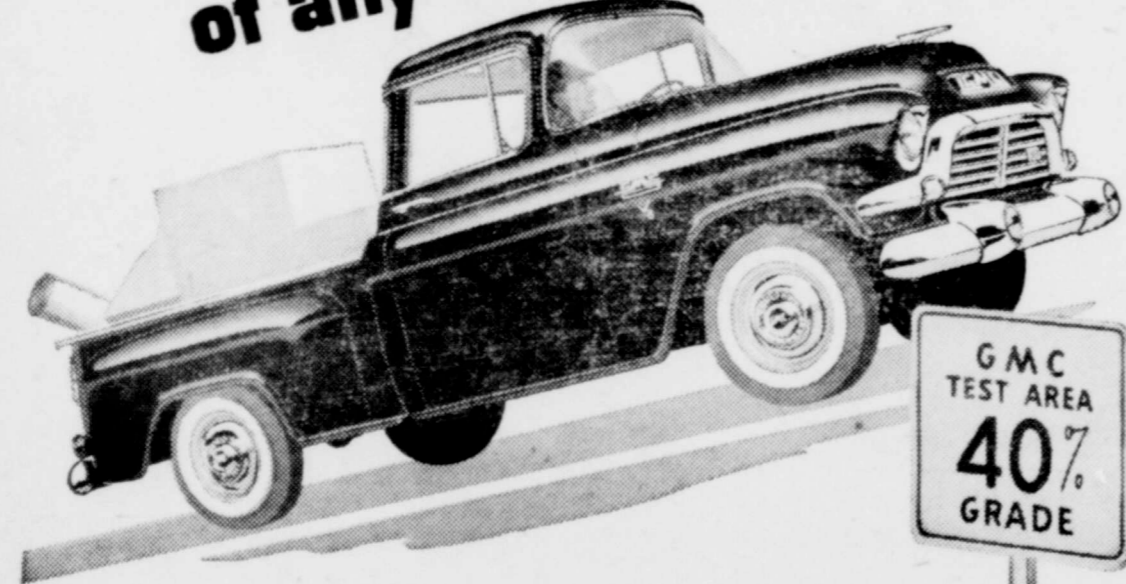

## News From The HD Agent

Defense is a way of saving lives and property. It is a way of protecting you and your family. Under the direction of Alton Birdett, Civil Defense Agent for the City View HD, this group began to prepare for disaster.

The City View Community of this city and their neighbors Sheppard Air Force base members of this home defense club felt it was their responsibility to help prepare community for disaster. The members of this club interviewed 300 families living in the City View Community, which extends from Sunset Lane to Junction Station, seven miles west of the Iowa Park Road and for two miles.

Each family was interviewed and information card was filled and information was given to the family on "preparing for disaster." When all 300 families visited a map of the community was made. This map has been numbered and a key made to show where the following could be found if

needed: 1. 74 families have adequate first aid equipment and supplies. 2. 350 evacuees could be taken care of. 3. 74 defense shelters are in the community. 4. 25 practical nurses would serve. 5. 40 women would serve as cooks. 6. 43 have completed first aid training. 7. 6 have completed Red Cross training. 8. 2 are trained fire fighters. 9. 43 are trained to do secretarial work. 10. 3 electricians could help. 11. 2 plumbers are available. 12. 6 mechanics would work. 13. 2 aviators are available. 14. 3 carpenters are in the community. 15. 2 dieticians would help and 16. 11 telephone operators could work, if needed.

The compass and map show where the following equipment can be found: 12 trucks, 6 trailers, 13 tractors, 4 fire extinguishers, 68 pressure cookers as well as welding equipment, water pumps, bed pans, beds, cots, crutches, canes and wheel chairs.

In addition to making such a survey, the City View Club, under the direction of Mrs. Birdett and other members of the committee studied "Safe Food and Water Supply," First Aid and Fire Fighting. The committee members are Mrs. E. F. Plueger, Mrs. L. L. McHugh and Mrs. T. B. Witherspoon. Mrs. Witherspoon is also president of the City View HD Club.

### Purchase of All Right-of-Way In Counties By State Is Urged

The State Highway Department Friday was called on to buy all right-of-way needed for primary and secondary road construction and improvements in Texas.

The County Judges and Commissioners Assn of Texas Friday in a resolution approved at the association's convention in San Antonio, urged that the State Highway Department take over right-of-way purchasing in all Texas counties.

The resolution pointed out that under the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1956 the State Highway Department had already agreed to purchase right-of-way needed for the interstate highway system. County Judges and commissioners, pointing out that only 79 counties would benefit under this plan called on the highway department to follow the same policy in all 254 Texas counties to relieve local taxpayers of a staggering road bond debt.

They also urged that the legislature levy a "fair and equitable" highway use tax on motor vehicles hauling for fit or hire on Texas highways. This resolution asked that highway use fee be based on the weight of the vehicle load and the miles traveled.

Funds derived from this and equitable highway use would, under the resolution earmarked for right-of-way charges for primary and secondary state highways.
