Dial Telephone System Schedul'd For This Summer

Burkburnett's new dial telephone system is scheduled to go into operation this summer. Manager C. A. Deuschle said that the new dial telephone building here is scheduled to be completed early this spring and that telephone technicians will then move into install the intricate dial equipment.

We have sent letters to all Burk Burnett customers notifying them that the dial system will go into service this summer Deuschle said. He added that the exact date of the dial conversion will be announced just as soon as it is set.

The new building and dial equipment is being put in at a cost over \$225,000. Deuschle pointed out that all Burk Burnett telephone numbers will change when the dial system goes into operation.

At that time, all numbers will contain two letters of an exchange name, "Jordan," followed by five digits. For example, a present number might become J0ordan 9-3099, and it will be necessary to dial J0-93099.

License Plate Bonus

Motorists in five states get a special bonus when they receive their license plates. People who live in Delaware, Maine, Louisiana, Minnesota and South Dakota receive reflective license plates which are widely recognized as one of the most important safety devices to be developed during the past decade.

The plates, most of which can be seen from 2,000 feet away at night, were first issued by Maine in 1949. Since then their value has been recognized in other states and their use has grown. Safety experts call them a practical way to reduce accidents after dark, which is when almost two-thirds of all accidents occur.

One of the important features of reflective plates, experts say, is that they are probably the only safety advance that could be put on all automobiles, old and new ones alike, within a relatively short time. Within a few months after individual state legislatures approve reflectorization of its state's plates, they can be made in their own correctional institutions and issued. Once these plates are on, cars equipped with them are much safer at night. Unlike lights, these plates are not hampered by mechanical failures or adjustments. They are made of a light-reflecting sheeting applied on a metal base.

These plates cost motorists only 25 to 50 cents a year. Some states have even made reflective plates cheaper than the non-reflective kind, according to a recent report in Public Safety magazine, the National Safety Council publication.

Geraldine Tweet, South Dakota's secretary of state, said reflective license plate exceeded expectations in all cases. The conclusion of the viewers was unanimous that reflective plates would add immeasurable safety to the highway by making vehicles visible at greater distances, thus providing greater reaction and braking time to approaching motorists.

This advance in our desperate need for safety on the highways will be universal in time. Let us hope all states adopt them soon.

What Does It Mean In Russian?

For once we are forced to agree with former Secretary of State Dean Acheson in his criticism of his successor's plan to meet the near East crisis by giving the President blanket authority to employ American troops and American dollars anywhere in the area.

In testifying behind the closed doors of the House Foreign Affairs committee, Mr. Acheson warned that "perfunctory approval" of the President's message and the Dulles policy would constitute an addiction by the Congress of its duty to the people. He accused Mr. Dulles of "reckless talk" in his testimony before the committee. It sounded to him, he said, "perilously like another approach to the brink."

More constructively, Mr. Acheson suggested that instead of granting the requested powers to the President, the Congress pass a resolution making clear American policy in the Middle East. Earlier, Senator W. Kerr Scott, North Carolina Democrat, speaking from the Senate floor, described the Administration proposal as "an undated declaration of war."

Our legislators must not be hasty or "perfunctory" in acting on this grim request. Let them consider carefully the distinction between authorizing the Commander in Chief to employ our armed forces against a stated enemy and outright declaration of war. And let them consider the intent of the Constitution in giving to the Congress the sole authority to declare war.

Within or without the framework of the UN, we do not think the American people are ready for another "police action."

News From The Congress

By Congressman Frank Ikard

This week I joined with other members of the Texas Delegation in offering a plan which we believe to be an effective drought relief program for the stricken Southwestern Area. The plan that we propose is two fold. First, it instructs the Secretary of Agriculture to make available protein feed concentrates in the drought area. There is no question but what an immediate supply of protein cake is essential for the maintenance of the basic range herds in the Southwest. The feeding of cake would probably be cheaper, as far as any Government program is concerned, than the feeding of hay or grain for which assistance is now available. The second portion of the plan that we offered would provide for a long range far-reaching soil conservation program through the use of deferred grazing. We know that the present drought of the Southwest is the worst that has occurred in over 700 years and that it is not going to be broken and all the damage taken care of just by one big rain. If we are not careful in the future use of the areas effected by the drought, the present conditions could become permanent. Under the proposals that we have made, within certain limitations, the stockmen and ranchers would be able to put his land into a deferred grazing program until such a time as the turf had been restored and the grass was good enough to carry cattle again. It seems that such a program as this is essential if we are not to have the pastures overstocked in the drought area right after the first rain that comes.

Most of the work that a member does in the House is done in his committee; hence, the committee to which a member is assigned is of utmost importance to him and to his constituents. There is no Congressional Delegation here that is assigned to

as many important committees as is the Texas Delegation. For instance, on the Committee on Agriculture, W. R. Poage of Waco is vice chairman and ranking Democratic Member. Clark W. Thompson of Galveston also serves on this Committee. On the Committee on Appropriations, George Mahon of Lubbock and Albert Thomas of Houston are ranking Members with great responsibilities over the expenditure of Federal funds. Wright Patman of Texarkana and J. T. Rutherford of Odessa are the Texas members of the Committee on Banking and Currency. The committee on Government Operations which is the investigating committee of the House has Jack Brooks of Beaumont and Joe Kilgore of McAllen as Members. Omar Burleson of Anson and Abilene serves as chairman of the House Administration Committee as well as an important Member on the Committee on Foreign Affairs. Walter Rogers of Pampa and Martin Dies of Lufkin are Members of the Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce. Walter Rogers also serves on the Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs with J. T. Rutherford. On the com

On the Committee on Judiciary Jack Brooks and John Dowdy of Athens represent Texas. Jim Wright of Ft. Worth and Joe Kilgore are important members of the Committee on Public Works. John Young of Corpus Christi serves on the Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committees as well as Post Office and Civil Service. Lindley Beckworth of Gladewater also is on the Committee on Post Office and Civil Service and Olin Teague of Bryan is chairman of the Committee on Veterans Affairs. Homer Thornberry of Austin is a member of the all-important Committee on Rules. These assignments are made by the Committee on Committees which is made up of the Democratic Members of the Committee Ways and Means of Which I am a Member.

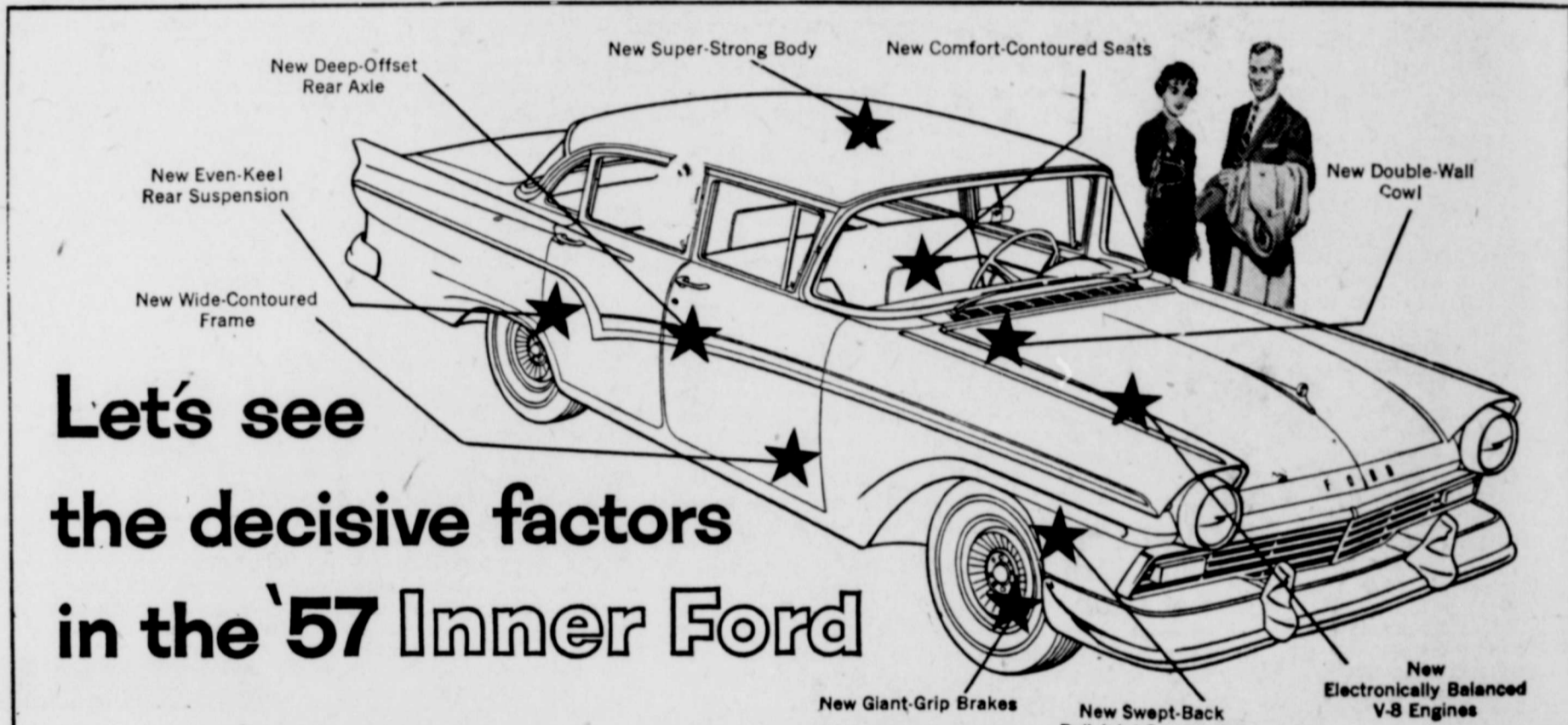

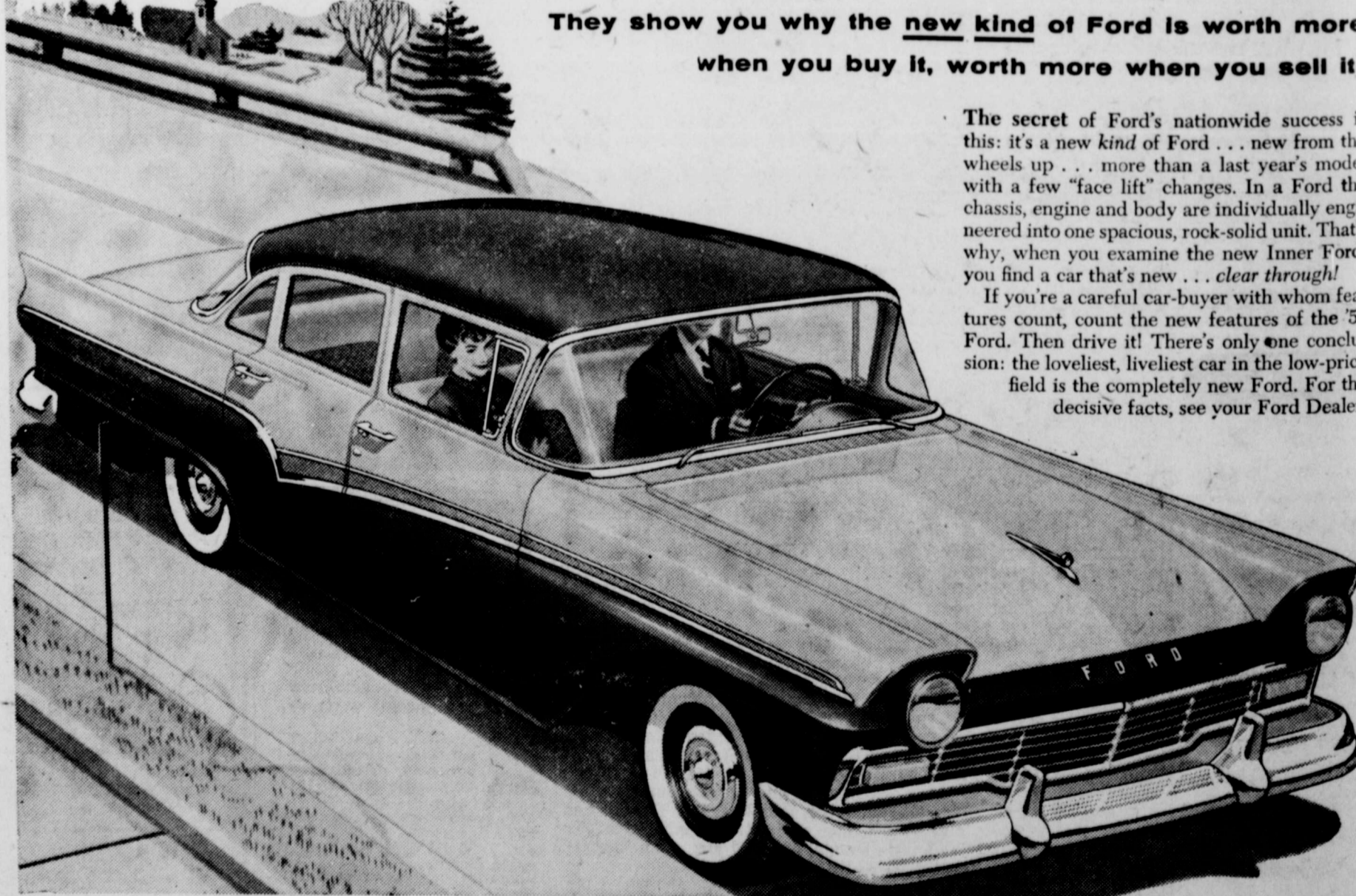

Internal Revenue Service

District Director of Internal Revenue Ellis Campbell, Jr., is asking for the cooperation of all employers in the early distribution of withholding tax statements, Form W-2, to their employees. The forms must be issued by Jan. 31, 1957 and penalties are provided for employers who fail to distribute them on time.

Director Campbell explained that the Form W-2 is a necessary part in the filing of a Federal income tax return by an employee. Taxpayers who have these forms at an early date will be able to file their returns well before the deadline of April 15th. Returns resulting in refunds will receive special handling to expediate the refunds.

Blank Forms W-2 are available at the Internal Revenue District office located at Room 312 Post Office building, Wichita Falls. The form is to be made in triplicate, showing the wages paid to the employee during 1956 and the amount of income tax withheld from his wages. Employers are reminded that they must issue a Form W-2 to each employee whose income was subject to withholding and also to any employee who would have been subject to withholding if he had only one exemption.

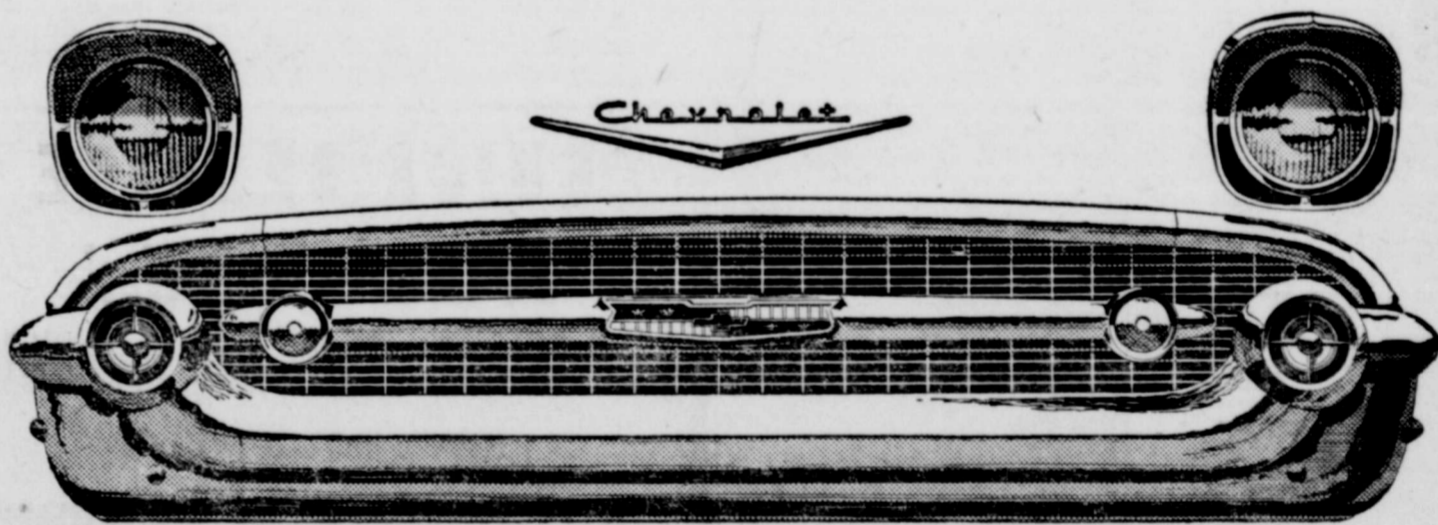
