More Push For American Youth

Latest word from the White House on youth fitness- a subject now under study by a Presidential Council suggests that the bievele may be mightier than the dumbbell.

in a discussion of the program with Vice President Nixon. who is chairman of the President's Council on Youth Fitness, President Eisenhower is reported as expressing "particular interest" in more bike riding, and recalling the extensive use of bicycles in Europe.

Thus it is expected that the tortincoming pilot programs in health building to be conducted in three key cities will include increasing the number of cycle paths in public parks as well as other new facilities for body-building recreation

In the meantime, bicycling receives a nutige from the inaugural parade featuring a float depicting the American family riding what we presume are American made bicycles.

But today and every day, in the National Capital the Council's executive director. Dr. Shane MacCarthy and his five sons are conducting a pilot operation of their own in pedalling five miles on their bikes each morning. And the former World War II Maval officer, who has taught at three universities and served in four departments of the U.S. Government, says the bike trains minds as well as muscles. People who ride together, he says, understand each other better, Which, of course, is the idea of family

The Council on Youth Fitness springs from the President's concern over the poor showing of American youth in muscular "minimum fitness test." Half of those taking it in the U.S. falled while 80 percent passed in Italy. Austria and Switzerland, countries where the bicycle is both recreation and transportation.

The Council is on record that the push button age has deprived us of needed physical activity that automation affects rural as well as urban residents and that: "The strength of our nation homorrow is the fitness of its youth today."

With these facis no one can quarrel. So, perhaps all of us, as well as junior, had better get on our bikes.

TAXES CAN BE CUT

The eyes of the nation will be turned toward Minnesota as its legislature begins consideration of drastic tax revisions designed to make the state more attractive to business and industry. The new proposals are the outcome of a 14 month study by a twentyman committee appointed by Governor Orville Freeman and are contained in an 800 page report on "Taxes and Economic Growth in Minnesota" submitted at the end of the year

The committee composed of seven business men, seven labor representatives, four representatives of the state's major farm organizations and two specialists from the University of Minnesola, unanimously recommended complete abolition of the personal property tax. These are the taxes on manufacturers' inventories, grain and livestock held by farmers, and the nuisance tax or household goods which is expensive to collect and unimpressive in toto. For wholesalers and retailers, the tax rate on invent-

ories would be reduced. Total tax relief, from these and other recommendations, is estimated at thirty million dollars a year, yet the committee sees no breakers ahead in balancing the state budget. The recommendations include a system for restoring to local county and towngovernment losses resulting from the tax revisions, and forecast extra income from its proposed withholding plan and other re-

wisions in state income tax procedures. Most important, the committee, to a man, is confident that adoption of their ideas will give the state the expanding economy toward which they have been toiling. In this achievement, there is assurance of ample tax money and mounting state-wide pros-




