## Voting Machines Not Worth Cost

A bond election will be held soon when voters will decide whether or not they want to go in debt \$225,000.00 for voting machines for this county.

Advocates of voting machines have not given all the facts. Their reasons for purchasing these machines are overshadowed by some outstanding factors not discussed. In the first place, it is doubtful voting machines could cut down present election expenses. A big per cent of voters would have to have the process explained to them each election for the next ten years. Every election would be a different problem. The time saved counting votes would be consumed explaining operation of the machines to voters.

Expense of holding elections in this county is not a very big figure. The cost for the past ten years has been only \$34,919.89! At this figure we can hold elections way on into the next century before we spend \$225,000.

The taxes of each tax payer would be raised approximately \$3.00 per year until the voting machines were paid for.

If the machines were purchased, it would necessitate building a building to store them in when not at some precinct box for an election. Still more expense. And, what would be the annual expense of servicing these machines? An ordinary blacksmith would not be able to cope with the situation. It would take a highly trained technician who really knew his stuff. More expense, which could mount up to \$10,000 a year. This technician would have to set up the machines for each separate election. He and two or three helpers would have to haul the machines to the separate voting boxes and set them up and check for efficiency. He would be on call every hour, all over the county, when an election was going on. What if a machine broke down in Electra two hours before the polls closed, and shortly after one broke down in Burkburnett. The technician is working on the one at Electra and the job takes an hour. He rushes to Burk and runs into the same situation. People are waiting in line to vote. It's time for the polls to close. Somebody is going to miss a chance to vote. Voting machines are for the birds.

If you've ever wrestled with a simple cigarette vending machine, played any number of the "sporting" one-armed bandits or games of pleasure (?), run a typewriter or a Linotype machine, you know sooner or later anything mechanical is going to give trouble now and then. Something as complicated as a voting machine certainly won't be immune to failure at times.

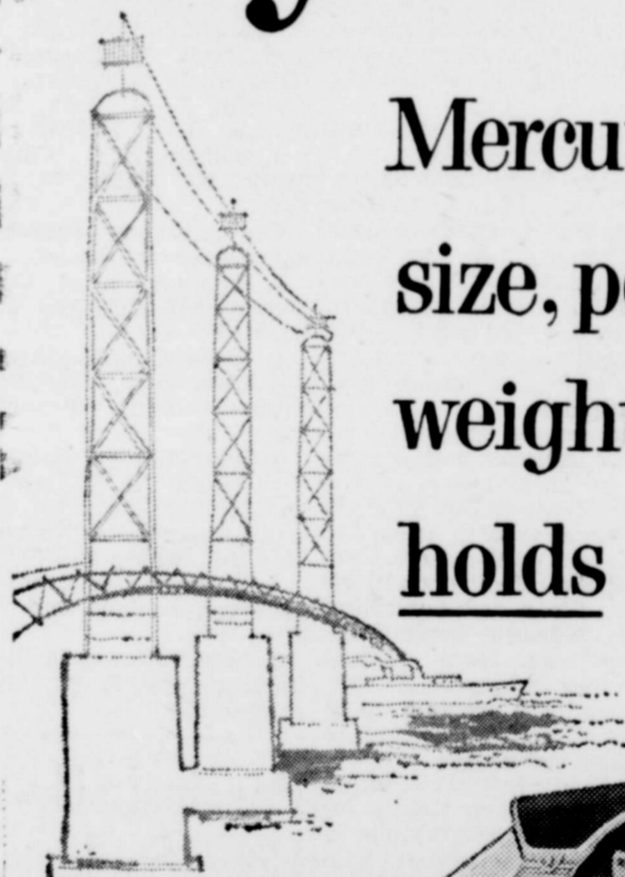

### Clara-Fairview Community

C. O. Smith of the C. O. Smith Landscape Nursery spoke to the members of the Clara-Fairview rural community on trees and shrubs best suited to the community.

He stated that the pecan was the best tree for yard planting, serving the dual purpose of being a good shade tree as well as a profitable one. The next best tree should not be planted too close to the house as it will make the house seem too cold in the winter since its thick foliage will cast shadows on the house. The sycamore, cedar, elm, mulberry, moraine locust and mimosa are also recommended. Mr. Smith did not recommend the American elm or various other oaks as these trees were slower growers and did not make as good a tree. Trees subject to root rot as the Chinese elm and cottonwood would be a waste of time as they would

not live more than four years in most yards in the Burk Burnett area. He stressed that watering too much was as bad as not watering enough, especially on the tighter soils. Also he stated that it was best not to prune roses until the middle of March. Early flowering trees and shrubs that bloom before June are best pruned after the plant has bloomed as any early pruning will cut off the buds.

E. J. Simons showed the progress that has been made in working up the year book to be entered in the rural community contest. Members are urged to turn in pictures and fill in reports on their farms.

## Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District News

Pasture or range deferment during the growing season may be one of the best ways in re-establishing the native grass stands which have been weakened by continued grazing during the past four or five years of sub-normal rainfall, states James Park, technician with the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District.

Parks states that pastures infested with heavy stands of annual winter grasses and weeds can be grazed heavy during the winter and early spring, which will help to eliminate competition for the better grasses to begin growth in early summer.

Livestock should be removed in early summer and kept off the pasture during the growing season of the better grasses, allowing the plants to produce a seed crop. Increased vegetative growth allowed to accumulate on the ground will aid in holding the available rainfall on the range longer, and lessen the amount of runoff and will allow a greater percentage of moisture penetration into the soil to produce more grass.

On pastures where brush is a problem, control measures should be taken as range improvement is much slower on pastures where brush is available to compete with the grasses for soil moisture.

On pastures where brush isn't a problem, and the grass stand is thin, mechanical practices may be applied to accelerate the intake of soil moisture by using contour chiseling or contour furrows.

Park states that proper use of the better grasses after the

stand is established is important. That is by grazing only about one half of the current year's growth each year and leaving the remainder on the soil to build up a ground mulch that will aid in greater moisture penetration and a better condition of the range grasses.

Most soils serve as a habitat for certain insects that feed on grass roots especially certain types of termites. These insects work and feed where moisture is present and when grasses are vigorous and their roots are deep in the soil these insects feed on the deeper roots and rarely show any effect to the grasses growth. But when the soil becomes deficient in moisture in the deeper root zone these insects move nearer the ground surface and feed on the grass roots, and at this stage they often work on top of the ground at night attacking the crowns of the plants and completely destroying the plants. This damage is more noticeable during the periods of drought where shallow penetration of moisture prevails over a period of time and the deeper root zone becomes dry.

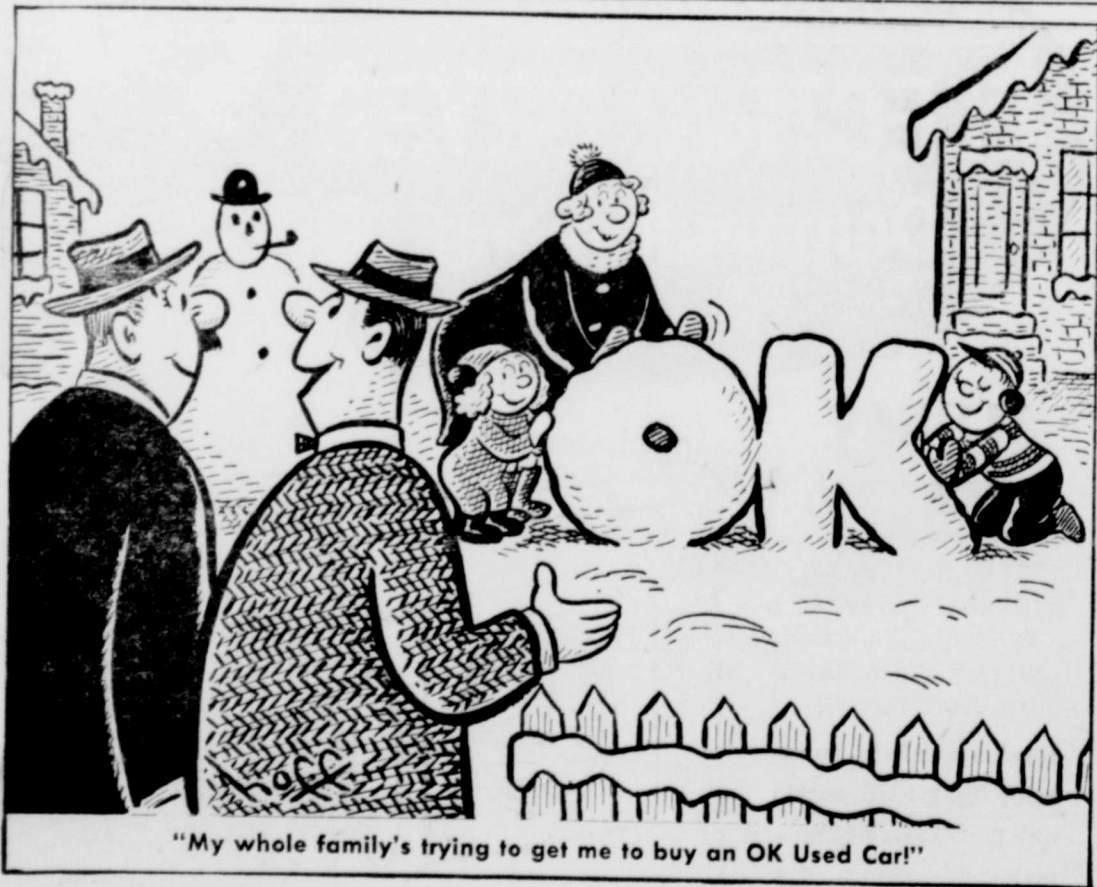

Root knot disease can be con-

Before fumigating, remove

 fumigant from a fruit jar.  
 The jar should be punched  
 with a lid, one to let in air  
 and other for distributing  
 fumigant. Make the applica-  
 tion by walking along the open-  
 ing and dribbling the fumi-  
 gant into the bottom of the fur-  
 row. Smith advises covering the  
 row immediately to prevent  
 escape of the fumigant gases.  
 He says a pint of the material  
 will cover about 150 feet or  
 more. It is a good idea, he  
 says, to test first with water in  
 order to determine how fast

farmers have little trouble keep-

 not overlook the small items, he  
 advises, for they can amount to

 items as interest payments, mem-
