GRASS ROOTS OPINION

TIFTON, GA., GAZETTE: "America's growing labor force needs thoughtful leadership bent upon serving its legitimate needs in an era of swift change. What it can do without is the kind of irresponsible leadership that simply dangles bigger bunches of bigger carrots in front of the workers each time major negotiations come up."

CLEVELAND, O., DAILY TIMES: "... Wladyslaw Gomulka, Polish leader who in 1956 was a strong reed of resistance to Moscow, this year decided he had to suppress a critical student newspaper and impose other press curbs. The reaction was quick and violent. That the Poles dared to act thus was a measure of their defiant strength. It suggests, too, that the rebellious spirit there and in the other satellites is never far beneath the surface."

TOMPKINS, KY., NEWS: "Some five hundred people will be killed in the next ten days by automobiles in this country. Maybe if some people knew the victims they would advocate safe and sane driving."

FORT PAYNE, ALA., TIMES NEW-ERA: "In gloating over Russia's achievement in putting the first earth satellite in motion Nikita Krushchev gives credit therefore to the 'socialist' system of government under which the Soviets operate. He implies, of course, that this 'socialist' or communist system is superior to the capitalistic system that we know in America. For our part, we'll take the good old American way over the totalitarian way of Russia, even if it means that we're later than they in making a spectacular demonstration of our ability to get a 'Sputnik' circulating around the earth. We hope the day will never come in this land of ours when even the most amazing scientific achievement is put ahead of the freedoms we are wont to enjoy."

GOOD NEWS

U. S. News and World Report recently ran a feature article on the present state of retail trade and the prospects for the future. At the end it said: "The coming season... is to be a time when the consumer is being wooed eagerly, when goods of all types are plentiful and prices are being held close to last year's level. Those are conditions that usually encourage people to spend freely, so long as their incomes hold up."

"People, so far, are responding by increasing their purchases to record level. While the increase is slowing down and may be ending, the high level of sales is expected to continue through the foreseeable future. That's good news for businessmen everywhere."

Those are interesting paragraphs, and contain more meat than may be apparent at first glance. Take, for instance, that phrase about the consumer being "wooed eagerly." This is true—and the reason it is true is that retailing is a free competitive enterprise, in which success goes to those who please the public best. And that wooing takes many forms—better service, wider stocks of goods on display, more effective advertising, and lower prices than would otherwise be in effect.

The second paragraph of the quotation from U. S. News also is significant. It shows, by implication, just how outstandingly important retailing is to the economy as a whole—to everyone who lives and works in the United States. The greatest productive system on earth would wither on the vine without a system of distribution to match. Mass production and mass distribution in sum, are full partners of equal standing.

THE VOICE WASN'T LOUD ENOUGH

Sylvia Porter, the syndicated writer on economic affairs, recalls that during this year's congressional session "... you, the American public, demanded cuts in federal spending in the loudest voice you've used in modern times."

Just what results did this public clamor obtain? Miss Porter provides an answer to that question, based on information from the factual and authoritative Congressional Quarterly. There were 66 roll call votes directly affecting federal spending. Moves for economy were backed in only one-third of these votes, 22 out of 66.

As for the future, Miss Porter takes a pessimistic view. She thinks the chances are that government spending in general—aside from defense allocations—is likely to rise.

Recent events, obviously, have made a bad matter worse. There is a definite probability that two or three additional billions will be needed for a stepped up missile program. Other military spending may also be increased. Congressional leaders have said that the money can be obtained by paring non-defense spending. But will it—or will it be piled on top of an already swollen budget?

The public voice demanding economy was loud earlier this year. But it is going to have to become far louder still if it is to get the answer it wants.

'Prefabs' Join Luxury Class



Prefabricated house has eight rooms, three baths.

Prefabricated homes come a long way from the plywood Nissen huts and corrugated steel Quonsets that sheltered GIs during World War II. Today, "prefabs" are widely accepted in both lower and middle-priced home brackets and are reaching out for the "luxury" home market. The home illustrated here is an example. Built in Toledo by Scholz Homes, Inc., it fits into a high-priced neighborhood as well as any of the conventionally constructed homes surrounding it. Completely Air-Conditioned The house has eight rooms, three baths, a full basement, and is completely air conditioned and insulated. It was built to sell for \$45,000, including the cost of a large lot on an exclusive street. Despite its "custom" look, the house is a standard model and can be reproduced anywhere east of the Rockies. Framing, wall and roof panels, asphalt shingles, and ponderosa pine windows are included in the factory pre-assembled "package." Various "prefab" manufacturers differ in how much of the final house package they supply, out most include wall, floor, and ceiling panels and roof trusses or rafters, for delivery by trailer to the prepared foundation. The panels are factory-assembled on large flat jigs by trained labor, inspected by supervisors, then loaded in correct sequence so that they go into place at the site quickly and fit together perfectly. "Under roof and lock and key in one day" is the "prefab" manufacturers' boast. Roof Color Choice The local builder-dealer adds finish flooring according to local taste, and masonry exteriors and fireplaces when desired. The customer normally has the choice of asphalt roof shingle color, so that the roof, usually the most dominant feature of any house, will fit in with the neighborhood and the customer's own decorating plan. Rich blue asphalt shingles set the tone for the subtle gray brick exterior of the Toledo house. Preservative-treated, Colonial-style wood windows and exterior ponderosa pine panel doors are architecturally correct for the traditionally designed house. The doors are pre-hung with factory precision. The house is fully insulated with mineral wool thicknesses recommended for maximum economy in air-conditioned homes: six inches of mineral wool between the ceiling joists, four inches in the walls. The slab model has two-inch perimeter insulation all around. Research has shown that such quantities of insulation reduce the initial cost of an air-conditioned house by permitting a smaller cooling unit. Operating costs are materially reduced.

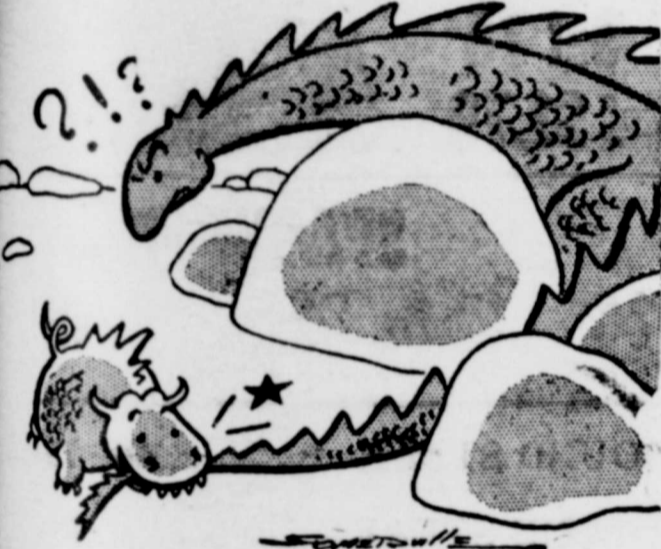

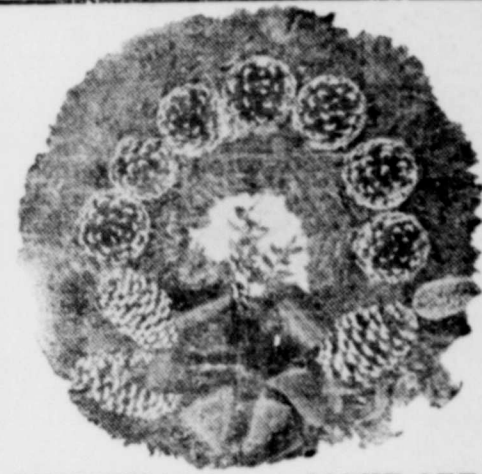

SHORT RIBS Brown, add seasonings and barbecue sauce. Cover and cook in a slow oven.
BOILING BEEF Season and simmer slowly in water or vegetable juice. Add cooked vegetables.

Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District News

Ralph Swinford, supervisor of the local Soil Conservation District was the top winner in the 1957 Bridwell Soil Building Awards Program.

Ralph's accomplishments on the half section that he owns and operates, was judged the best in a three County area, composed of Wichita, Clay and Archer counties. Control of erosion, soil building and plant conservation on the entire farm has been carried out as planned. Proper outlets for terraces was the first problem, which necessitated 2 waterways to be seeded prior to the construction of 4 1-2 miles of graded, channel type terraces. The terraces have been completed and Ralph uses them as guides lines for contour tilling and drilling of his cropland.

Rotation of wheat, oats, vetch, Austrian Winterpeas and Alfalfa is carried out to the extent that more than 1-4 of the cropland is planted to Soil building crops each year. Stubble Mulching or leaving the crop residues on the soil surface, has helped to control erosion, lower soil temperatures in the summer months and to store more rainfall, has been used on all the cropland and will continue to be one of the important wind and water erosion control meas-

ures for cropland.

A good rangeland program is being carried out and the Native grasses are increasing in vigor and density. The pastures are cross fenced so that deferring and rotation grazing can be practiced as needed. More than adequate stock water is supplied by farm ponds that are well located to give better distribution of grazing. Recreation has not been forgotten as some of the ponds are stocked with Bass, Bluegills and Channel Cats.

Fireguards have been constructed adjacent to all roads around the grasslands, though weeds are not a problem, they are controlled by mowing as needed.

The access road to the splendid farm house was changed from a direct or straight approach to one with gentle curves that will be lined with shrubbery in the future. Ralph's plans for the coming year include sodding of midland bermuda grass on dryland, plantings of Sorghum Almun for supplementary pasture, setting out of multiflora roses on his cross fences to provide food and cover for Wildlife and to Maintenance of the soil, water and plant conservation measures that have already been installed.
