## THE FIGHT IS ON THE BATTLE RAGES

In last week's issue of the Free Press announcement was made that in answer to a petition the Commissioners' Court had granted and ordered an election to be held Saturday, November 1st, to determine whether or not intoxicating liquors shall be sold in Haskell County. The Commissioners' Court could hardly do otherwise, since there were nearly three hundred signers to the petition. The only criticism that might be offered is the short time given for the campaign. But we feel confident that the Court must have had satisfactory reasons for making the time short, and we shall offer no criticism.

In view of the fact that the time is short, the leaders on the prohibition side realized the importance of getting busy, and therefore a meeting of those favoring prohibition was called in the county court room Friday evening of last week, at which time there was a good representative company of men of this city and community present to lend encouragement to the movement to combat the efforts of the opposing side in bringing saloons back to Haskell county.

R. E. Sherrill called the house to order and stated the object of the meeting, whereupon he was elected temporary chairman. The election of a permanent chairman and secretary-treasurer resulted in the selection of R. C. Montgomery and Scott Key for the respective places. A committee of seven, composing B. Cox, W. P. Whitman, H. G. McConnell, W. F. Draper, G. R. Couch, J. F. Pinkerton, N. McNeil, was appointed, who will have charge of the campaign. A public collection was taken to defray the expenses of the campaign, and nearly everybody responded liberally to the call.

After a short while spent in discussing some other important matters with reference to the campaign, the meeting adjourned until Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, when it was expected to have a prominent speaker present to address the people. Dr. Sandefer, president of Simmons College, Haskell, was conferred with and he promised to be present to deliver an address. A large crowd

was present to hear him, and everybody pronounced it one of the most logical, conservative but at the same time strongest addresses on the subject that they had ever heard. The Free Press is glad to be able to present to its readers a synopsis of this address, and it sincerely hopes that every reader of this paper, whether he be pro or anti, will read it. Following is the address:

**DR. SANDEFER'S ADDRESS:**

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen and fellow-citizens of Haskell County: Republican forms of government are founded on free speech. High class public discussions of questions affecting the weal or woe can not but be provocative of the most rational and intelligent thought. The question that we are here to discuss this afternoon is one that affects vitally the five fundamentals of our government, viz., the home, the school, the church, the vocations of men, and the government proper, or politics. I trust that in the discussion of this matter everyone present will give me an open mind, and we shall endeavor as honest and capable citizens to arrive at conclusions that cannot but mean for our community's and country's welfare. I trust no one has come here feeling that I shall take advantage of this occasion and abuse him who should not agree

with me touching the question that brings us together. No man has more respect for an honest man or a virtuous woman than I have. I admire any man who takes an honest position and conscientiously supports that position. I have very little respect, however, for that man who is so narrow, selfish and circumscribed in his views as to advocate privately, publicly, or both, a cause that may perchance put some money in his purse, but in doing so not give value received for it.

I believe that the liquor traffic is the greatest foe to the fundamentals of our government that obtains in the earth today. I believe that if we will apply some standards to our institutions and they cannot stand the tests, and on the other hand are found destructive and subversive of the best interests of men and women, they ought to be eradicated. I believe in everything that is good. And I abhor that which is evil. I believe the open saloon, without which you have done so many years would prove at this time the most powerful enemy to your institutions for good in Haskell that you could possibly place in reach of your citizens. If I did not think so I would not be here at this time giving my time and service at the instance of your committee, contributing in my humble way towards keeping them from again becoming a part of your economic and social fabric.

I presume, fellow-citizens, that, like most other men, I am more or less selfish. The saloon is an enemy to my business, and I do not like anybody or anything that attempts to destroy the business in which I am engaged. As most of you perhaps know, I am a college president. It is my business, therefore, with the help of my faculty, to take the sons and daughters of my patrons, and, after some years of physical and mental and spiritual endeavor, return these sons and daughters as finished college products to the homes from which they have come and to the fond expectancy of those who have entrusted them during these years to my keeping. It is a beautiful industry, ladies and gentlemen, in which I am engaged: To take the raw material of young manhood and womanhood and to be instrumental in moulding it into beautiful, symmetrical, and Christian character is to my mind one of the greatest industries that ever challenged the intellect and the soul of man. This is the mission of our schools, and especially of our Christian colleges. In spite, however, of all we are doing and can do, in an educational way,

we cannot turn out as many finished products from the colleges as the open and legalized saloon is graduating from her "cess pools" from year to year. The four thousand saloons in Texas today are destroying more men and women than are receiving diplomas from all of our institutions of learning combined. I see two young men, nursed by the same mother, reared and trained in the same home, one goes to college and spends four years, the other goes to the saloon and becomes its patron for four years. I see the fond parents at the expiration of this time on the front porch, peering up and down the lane, awaiting the return of the boy with the diploma from college; and at the same time anxious to see the prodigal who has given his four years as a patron of the saloon and its unholy influences. The college boy is seen coming, erect, with confident tread, with intelligent brow and benign countenance, and he is received with loving embraces by those who have made his being and education possible. On the other hand, ladies and gentlemen, I ask you to behold the graduate of the licensed saloon: There is no confidence in his tread. There is no intelligence on his brow. There is no benignity in his countenance. His physical manhood is gone; His intellect has atrophied and is benumbed. His soul has withered away. He is not only a disappointment, but is a disgrace to those whose blood and being courses through

his veins. He is the epitome of the saloon. His virtue and his ambitions are blasted and he is a counterfeit on humanity. I repeat, therefore, my friends, that I am perhaps selfish in being so open and aggressive an enemy to the saloon because it destroys life and blights the progeny of man more rapidly than I can build it up and save it.

I never have to apologize for being a prohibitionist. I dare say there can hardly be found in this splendid county a teacher in your public schools who would be re-elected to his position if his trustee knew that he was a pronounced anti prohibitionist. Even our anti friends want better examples set before their children than they sometimes set. I venture to say just here that there is not a Missionary Baptist in Haskell county who would send his son or daughter to Simmons College if that one knew that the president of Simmons College were an anti. Am I not correct about this? I trust none of my anti-Baptist brethren will find fault with my position or what I say. I am not claiming that I am any better than you are. I am simply contending that you set one standard for yourself and one for your school teacher. And I can prove by your own pastor that my standard is the one that he would have you conform to. Furthermore, my friends, the president of Simmons College is in better standing in his church than any anti-prohibition Baptist is in his church. I do not

## WET OR DRY?

As is generally known, a peti-  
tion has been presented and an  
election ordered to be held Satur-  
day, November 1st, to determine  
whether or not saloons shall be  
returned to Haskell County. For  
nearly four years this county has  
been in the prohibition column.

The Free Press has never been  
a paper to shirk a duty, and will  
not be found doing so now. When  
a question of this kind arises,  
naturally people ask how the  
paper will stand. Without any  
frills we must say that both  
the editors of this paper are op-  
posed to the return of saloons.  
The attitude of the senior editor  
is well known over the county.  
And if those of an inquiring mind  
will write to Hubbard City where  
the junior editor lived and edited  
a paper for nine years they can  
soon learn his position on this  
question. They will learn that he  
fought in three county campaigns  
for the ascendancy of prohibition  
in Hill county and he always  
voted for prohibition. Notwith-  
standing our undying fidelity  
to the principles of prohibition, we  
shall not use these columns to  
prejudice the minds of the people  
either way. What we shall say,  
to our mind, will be for the best  
interest of the greatest number  
of people.

All men, so far as we know, are  
agreed that the use of strong  
drink is injurious. The matter of  
disagreement is with the methods  
in the handling of the evil.  
Some say free whiskey, others say  
high license, while others say  
not allow it to be sold at all.  
We have heard many say that  
they would vote for prohibition  
if it would only prohibit. The  
time has been when it did not  
prohibit, we must admit, but that  
time has passed, especially in  
Haskell county. It is a little too  
dangerous a thing to sell it now  
under the new law. Now then,  
if those who have been leaning on  
this prop want to be consistent,  
they must vote for prohibi-  
tion.

As we see it, there is but one  
main question involved, that of  
morals, and we have no hesitancy  
in declaring we belong to the  
moral side. From a moral stand-  
point, there is not a man on earth  
who can defend drunkenness.  
And we fill know the use of whis-  
key will create drunkenness, and  
the saloon is the place where it is  
sold. If there is a man who can  
refute this statement, we would  
like to see him do it. If there is  
anyone who will dare say whiskey  
has not blighted many homes,  
checked ambitious youth, sent  
women to shame and men to hell,  
we would like to have his name.  
Whiskey has robbed the wife of  
that love won on the sacred fields  
of courtship; it has given the  
child brutal blows instead of fond  
affection; it has raised the hand  
of the son and prompted him to  
drive the cold steel into the moth-  
ers bosom against which he was  
pressed and petted thousands of  
times in infancy; it has driven  
principle and virtue from women  
who once blushed deep as the  
crimson rose at the suggestion of  
evil; and it is the accursed weed  
that if once given a fair stand in  
the home chokes out and destroys  
every flower of hope and love.  
In every age and in every land it  
has made man, who in natural  
condition is a being a little lower  
than the angels, a demon with a  
heart for any crime. Yet whiskey  
is as harmless as a mountain  
brook winding its way through  
the vale, singing a happy song.  
The brook, however, when the  
storm clouds rise in fury, when  
the lightning flashes and the rain  
comes down in torrents, becomes  
a raging sea, and woe to him who  
remains upon its banks. And  
when the clouds of thirst begin to  
gather, when the lightning flashes  
of evil association zig zag in the  
heaven of life's purposes, there  
is danger. Flee from the bab-  
bling brook of red liquor, take

refuge on the peaks of high  
resolve, lest you be swept away  
by the waves of intemperance  
into the dark sea of drunkenness.  
Yes, whiskey is as harmless as a  
rattlesnake asleep in the grass, if  
the snake never awakes. But  
when it begins to coil around the  
family fireside, when its fangs are  
fastened in the flesh of mothers  
and children, when its venom  
reaches the very heart of the  
home, love, hope and happiness  
fall dead.

For nearly four years the peo-  
ple of Haskell county have en-  
joyed a peaceful rest from the  
evils of the saloons, save occasion-  
ally when someone imbibed a  
little too freely when he got a  
fresh shipment from Wichita  
Falls, Fort Worth, Dallas or some  
other point. But now these  
shipments will have to stop be-  
cause the law forbids them, and  
therein lies the greatest pain.  
But the law was a demand of the  
people, and we have heard many  
say that if such a law was passed  
whereby it could not be shipped  
in a local option district that they  
would vote for it. Will you keep  
your word? But when you had  
saloons how many farmers of this  
community were benefited by it?  
How many mechanics derived any  
benefit? How many professional  
men profited thereby? And how  
many merchants reaped a benefit?  
Granting that each and every  
class mentioned, gained because  
of the saloons, were the people  
and more especially the youth of  
our county, raised to any higher  
moral standard? And will they  
be if the saloons are returned?

These are plain, sensible ques-  
tions submitted to men of some  
reason and moral sensibilities to  
think about. We have tried to  
avoid anything offensive. We do  
not believe rash and rabid  
methods are best, and would ad-  
vise those who may discuss the  
question on both sides to refrain  
from saying anything unpleasant.  
We believe and know that many  
who differ with us upon this  
question are honest and sincere,  
and we would not say or do any-  
thing to wound their feelings. If  
we can not win by fair means and  
with logical, reasonable arguments  
we do not deserve to win, and  
vice versa. We trust that the  
people will give the matter serious  
thought before casting their vote,  
and when they do, we do not  
fear the result.

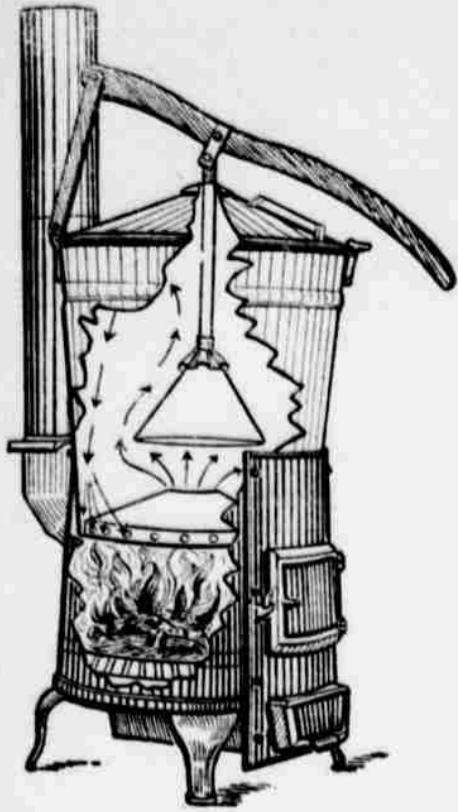

Plaintiff alleges that on or about May 7, 1907, by deed of that date, defendant Lindsey conveyed to defendant Hefner the southeast quarter of section No. 9, H. T. & B. Ry. Co. survey by virtue of Certificate No. 10-329, located in Haskell and Knox counties, Texas; that as a part consideration for same Hefner executed and delivered to Lindsey seven promissory notes of even date with said deed, in which notes and in which deed the vendor's lien was retained to secure payment of said notes; plaintiff alleges that the first six of the said series of notes have been paid off and discharged, but that the last note of said series, to wit, a note for \$287.00 due Jan. 15, 1915, is unpaid and is now the property of the plaintiff and by reason of defaults in the payment of the annual interest upon same plaintiff has elected to and has declared the said note due and matured. Plaintiff also alleges that the defendant Lindsey has endorsed his name in blank upon said note of \$287.00 due Jan. 15, 1915, by reason of which he is liable to plaintiff for the payment of same.

Plaintiff further alleges that on or about the 30th day of September 1908, by deed of writing bearing that date, W. T. Mathis and wife conveyed to A. A. Stewart the West half of the Southeast Quarter of section No. 9, H. T. & B. Ry. Co. survey by virtue of Cert. No. 10-329, located in Knox and Haskell counties, Texas, being the west half of the above described tract; that as a part consideration for said land the said Stewart executed and delivered to the said W. T. Mathis one promissory vendor's lien note in the sum of \$120.00 of even date with said deed and due Nov. 1st 1910, in which said note and deed a vendors lien is retained to secure the payment of said note. Plaintiff alleges that he is the owner and holder of said note.

Plaintiff alleges that the first of the two above described notes, to wit, the note for \$287.00 bears interest from Jan. 25, 1907 payable annually as it accrues; that said note provides by its terms that if default be made in the payment of any annual installment of interest when due, the owner and holder of same may declare the entire note due and matured; that such default has been made in the payment of the annual interest on said note and plaintiff has elected to declare the entire note due and matured. Plaintiff also sues for 10 per

The Fat Stock Show at Fort Worth, November 22-28, is one of the most potential agencies that is working for the upbuilding of the Texas livestock industry. It points out the pathway of progress to feeders and breeders and presents living lessons of profits and actual demonstrations of the advantages of higher types in classes and breeds. The scarcity of the world's meat supply has brought the livestock industry into the limelight and the necessity for increasing the herds and improving the grades is one of the most important economic problems of the day.

The Texas steer of a quarter of a century ago, compared with the present thoroughbred, presents the most convincing argument in favor of good breeding the world possesses. From wild, dangerous and worthless beasts of the plains, they have become cultured, docile and profitable. These dumb brutes have so completely mastered the science of breeding that they have remodeled their shape, reformed their habits and rebuilt their character. Each generation has contributed toward the uplift of the breed, until today the cattle have more purple blood in their veins than any other family of the animal kingdom.

They can teach the human race many lessons in the science of improved lineage. By carefully conforming to the laws of nature, they have bred out deformities of flesh and blood. Their blood, which once made weak and scrubby stock, now produces rich and powerful thoroughbreds. Each breed is known by the color it keeps, by its distinct type and purpose in life.

This work has been accomplished largely through the instrumentality of the National Feeders' and Breeders' Show, which holds its Eighteenth annual meeting at Fort Worth on November 22-28, and new models and higher standards will be taught at the coming convention. During this time each annual meeting has gauged and registered the advancement of the livestock industry of Texas and it is here the leaders of all classes and breeds assemble to report progress to the management. Each year has been one of glorious triumph but, none will eclipse the present aggregation of thoroughbreds.

### The Fight is on. The Battle Rages.

(Continued from page 1.)

God, who were defeated in their educational purposes and ambitions because of this iniquitous parasite called the saloon. Is there a man here who ever knew the patron of the saloon who was enabled to give his children more of the necessities of life in food and raiment because that one was a frequenter of the legalized saloon? If you have ever known one of this kind, will you indicate it? I pause for a moment. On the other hand you have seen hungry children whose father squandered his substance and his daily wage that belonged to them for that which made them hungrier and him a poorer father.

I come briefly to the fifth of these fundamentals of our republican form of government—politics. Is there a man under the sound of my voice who will contend that government is better and taxes lower because of the saloon? No. A thousand times no. On the other hand, the liquor traffic has debauched the ballot box. It has defiled the law. It has corrupted and wasted the lives of millions of well-intentioned citizens; and it is not through with its nefarious and wicked ways until this good hour. Henry Watterson, the gifted editor of the Courier-Journal, says that practically every office from constable to president during the last fifty years has been handed over the bar counter. However, my fellow citizens, I feel that a better day is dawning. The public

mind has become aroused as never before touching this cancer on the body politic. It is not so now as it once was that many of our public men are "topers." Just a few weeks ago I looked down on the senate and house of representatives in our nation's capital. I was told by members of those bodies that it is the rarest kind of thing now that a member of the house or the senate is guilty of appearing on the floor with the taint of alcohol on him. The school-teacher president and the matchless Commoner who sits by his side as secretary of state have done much and will do more towards cleaning out the "Augean stables" of political corruption in this republic of ours.

It was believed up to within the last decade or two that alcohol was a stimulant and necessary in many cases and types of disease. I have before me the testimony of twenty-five or thirty of the world's greatest physicians and scientists who bear testimony, without exception, that alcohol is a poison; that it has no food value; that it is classed along with strychnine and arsenic; and that it is always a destructive and never a constructive agent. The authorities I quote are leading ones to be found in the universities and medical schools in the United States, Canada, England, France, Germany, and Holland. If there is anyone present who questions my statement of authorities here I shall be glad to have you see me at the conclusion of this address.

Again, my friends, did you know that our leading authorities trace from 60 to 95 per cent of the defectives in society, such as idiots, lunatics, etc., directly or indirectly to alcohol. I have some exceedingly interesting statistics here, had I the time to read them to you. If you question any statement that I make, and you will kindly see me when I am through, I will make that statement not only good, but more than good. My friends, it is an awful thing for us as responsible and representative citizens of our respective counties to be guilty of casting a vote for that evil that is filling our asylums, our jails, and our penitentiaries. Statistics obtained under Gov. Lanham's administration were to the effect that something like 70 per cent of the more than three thousand inmates of the penitentiaries were there because of the liquor traffic. My Friends, if you vote for the saloon and its attendant evil, the house of ill fame, I believe that you ought to be willing to furnish a son or a daughter help make the institution a success; for without the sons and

daughters of men saloons and houses of ill fame cannot thrive. Do not expect your neighbors to furnish all the raw material. I ask you candidly and honestly, as one interested in the welfare of men, have you a son or a daughter to sacrifice? Methinks I hear you say "No."

Again, Fellow Citizens, I hold before you a map of Texas. These white spots 177 in number, are counties where whiskey is not sold. These brown spots, 50 in number, are counties partially dry. These black spots, 20 in number, that hover around the Mexican border and the gulf of Mexico where Mexicans, Negroes and low grade foreigners predominate—are wholly wet. You see, therefore, that in those sections of Texas where the Anglo Saxon race is in authority local option and prohibition are in force. Now I trust my friends that no one will find fault with me and accuse me of classifying him with a Mexican, Negro, and the lowest strata of Asia. I hasten to say to you that I did not make the classification. You classified yourself, and if you do not like your environment, we will extend to you the right hand of Anglo Saxon and local option fellowship and receive you in good standing into the ranks of prohibition, progressive and militant democracy.

Before the death of Henry Grady, the city of Atlanta was to vote on whether or not the open saloon would be allowed a place among the city's commercial assets. That matchless southerner addressed his fellow citizens in the following words: "My friends, hesitate before you vote liquor back into Atlanta. Do not trust it. It is powerful, aggressive and universal in its attack. Tonight it enters an humble home to strike the rose from a woman's cheek, and tomorrow it challenges this republic in the halls of congress. Today it strikes a crust from a starving child, and tomorrow it levies tribute from the government itself. There is no cottage lowly enough to escape it, no place strong enough to escape it or shut it out. It defies the law when it cannot coerce suffrage. It is flexible to cajole, but merciless in victory. It is the mortal enemy of peace and order; the destroyer of man and the terror of woman; the cloud that shadows the face of children; the demon that has dug more graves and sent more souls unshrined to judgement than all the pestilences that have wasted life since God sent the plague to Egypt, or all the wars that have been waged since Joshua stood before Jericho. O, My Countrymen! Loving God and Humanity. Do not bring

this grand old city again under the domain of that power. It can uplift no industry, revive no interest, remedy no wrong. You know that it cannot. It comes to destroy, and it shall profit mainly by the ruin of your sons, or mine. It comes to mislead human souls and crush human hearts under its rumbling wheels. It comes to bring gray haired mothers down in shame and sorrow to their graves. It comes to change the wife's love into despair and her pride into shame. It comes to still the laughter of the lips of little children. It comes to stifle all the music of the home, and fill it with discord and desolation."

My Friends, look at the open saloon from the standpoint of its business and patronage. If a man wants to engage in the grocery business in your little city, he simply rents a house, installs his groceries, and opens up shop, and men, women and children are his patrons. If you vote that the saloon shall have a place on your square, the saloon keeper cannot open his shop until he has paid his federal license, his state license and his city license. The federal government, the state, and the city know that he is to engage in a destructive and not a constructive business. They, therefore demand of him large sums of money for tearing down their citizenship. Again. Who are his patrons? Women and children are not permitted in his place of business. If your wife or mine should enter his place of business, an officer of the law would intervene and say "Here, woman, this is no place for a lady." I believe every man under the sound of my voice would lose his respect for a woman who would go into a dram-shop and take a drink over the bar. I dare say that there is no man who hears me at this time who would not seek a divorce from his wife if she were to patronize a saloon. There are men who hear me that would seek a divorce court immediately if their wives should suddenly become advocates of and patrons of the saloons as some of you are. I will hail the day, Fellow Citizens, as one that omens well for the home and for native land, when men and women shall be judged by the same moral yardstick.

Once upon a time a judge sat upon the bench. A criminal was arraigned before the bar. The testimony was heard and the jury returned its verdict. The sentence was death. Silence reigned in the courtroom. The judge asked the criminal to stand and receive his sentence.

"Have you anything to say, sir, before the death sentence is passed upon you," said the judge.

The murderer stood, trembling. "Your honor," said he, "as this is my last opportunity on earth to say some things I desire to say them."

The judge said, "say on." "I have some accomplices, your honor, in this crime. (Profound silence reigned in the courtroom.) You know, judge, I was an orphan boy. I never knew father nor mother. I grew up on the streets and wheresoever I found companionship I sought it. I knew neither schools nor churches. I was never regarded as a boy of even ordinary intelligence. I never took a drink of whiskey until I was nearly grown—and not then until you helped to vote it into this town after it had been kept out for years and years. I did not vote for it, but you did. The sheriff there voted for the thing. The attorney who prosecuted me voted for its return. Some of the jurors voted to place it just over there on the corner. Many other leading citizens voted for it on the plea that it would 'make business better.' And it has, Your Honor,—for the court. But it has cost me my manhood and my life. The crime of which

I am charged was committed while I was under the influence of whiskey. I do not recall killing my friend. But the witnesses have sworn that I murdered him; and the law says I must die. "Who saves his country saves all things, And all things saved will bless him: Who lets his country die lets all things die, And all things dying curse him."
