Burk led 26-0 at the half. Coaches Jack Robertson and Bill O'Brien gave every player a work out in the last half. It was against reserves with little experience that Childress scored their touchdowns.

Three of Burk's touchdowns were set up by intercepting Childress passes. Bryan Teal kept up the good work converting extra points with his educated toe. He also received a telling pass to help toward a touchdown.

This Friday night Burk journeys to Electra for one of the most crucial conference games of the season.

New Highway Construction

A contract for 2.052 miles of construction on U. S. Highway 287 in Wichita County has been awarded to a Wichita Falls firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Stuckey Construction Co. and Chas. B. Jones and Concrete Structures, Inc., submitted the low bid of \$1,941,238.79 on the project. Construction of grading, structures, storm sewers, flexible base and concrete pavement from a point 1000 ft north of U. S. 287 through interchange 1 mile north of Wichita Falls to a point 0.34 miles south of Sheppard Air Force Base on present U. S. Highway 277, is expected to take 276 working days, according to L. B. Bean, District Highway Engineer at Wichita Falls. The awarding of the contract to this firm is subject to the concurrence of the Bureau of Public Roads.

Frank S. Craig, Resident Engineer at Wichita Falls will be in active charge of the project while under construction.

440 Bales Cotton Ginned This Year Farmers Co-op.

TERRE HAUTE, IND., TRIBUNE: Polio will not actually be defeated until virtually all the population has taken advantage of the protection afforded by the Salk vaccine.

APOLO, PA., NEWS-RECORD: "Action to increase social security payments by seven percent probably will be a small relief to recipients, and one should not look a gift horse in the mouth—only this doesn't happen to be a gift horse. That fact is emphasized by the announced intention of tacking another one fourth percent to the grab taken from worker's pay, with similar amount being charged to the employer."

TITUSVILLE, FLA., STAR-ADVOCATE: "A recent book review contained the assertion that the book was not beyond the grasp of the average citizen and that it could be read and digested in less than an hour. While one cannot be sure what the reviewer had in mind, mere ease of reading is in itself not much of a recommendation for serious literature, it should be noted that the really worthwhile objectives are difficult to obtain. As the first hint of Fall sharpens the Air and Autumn colors begin to tint the leaves, another harbinger of the season, a man-created institution that has become as much a part of Autumn as Jack Frost makes its presence felt—OIL PROGRESS WEEK.

This year it is to be observed from October 12 to 18th. As usual it is the period when all segments of the nation's oil industry unite to present to the world the work and progress and hopes of the industry. In a nation where air, water and gasoline are taken for granted, Oil Progress Week should be recognized as more than a promotional effort.

Every United States citizen now consumes an average of just over two gallons of oil products a day. Just imagine if oil products were delivered to your door like milk. For a family of four that would be more than eight gallons of oil products every morning. There were 18 million more people living in this country by 1956.

To prepare for all of this, to be ready for these 18 million new people, oil companies invested nearly \$80 billion in production, plants and equipment. These things can only take place if our people understand and support policies which encourage the growth of a strong oil industry operating in a free competitive market.

Here We Go again

Six months ago recession was much in the news. Now inflation is coming to the forefront again. Business is picking up, the public debt is headed for a steep rise and prices, wages and other costs are headed for another upward spiral. The sensation is somewhat like the here we go again' feeling of a roller coaster ride, except there is no ticket man to help us off at the end. Inflation has no end except bitterness, disillusionment and strife. These are the inevitable consequences of the depreciating value of money.

Inflation is especially painful to the nation's retailers, who must pass its effects on to consumers in the form of higher prices. Some facts about the American retail distribution system should be kept in mind. Retailing, particularly as conducted by the chain stores, operates on a high volume minimum price principle. This principle applies in all lines.

Modern shopping centers, which are the location sites for nationally known chain outlets, reflect the ultimate in distribution efficiency. Insofar as it is humanly possible, retailers working in a free market and competing stringently with each other, will give consumers the most for their money at its current value. That is all that can be done.

No amount of rules and regulations can change the trend of inflation nor the sacrifices it will exact if continued. It can only be stopped by curbs on government spending, on labor monopolies that force wage hikes for less work, and on price raises that inevitably follow tax and labor costs. It can't be stopped at the counter of your local merchant.

Without Due Process Of Law

The Nebraska Supreme Court has upheld state's right-to-work law. The decision noted that compulsory union membership would in some instances "compel support, financial and otherwise, of policies which an employee might deem objectionable from the standpoint of free government and the liberties of the individual under it. Then it added, "To compel an employee to make involuntary contributions, from his compensation, for such purposes is taking of his property without due process of law.

"An employee not only has a right to work, but he has the guaranteed right to have his earnings protected against confiscation against his will. The 17 states which have passed right-to-work laws have simply affirmed that every man has the privilege of joining or not joining a union, as he chooses, and that neither employer nor union official has the right to infringe on that privilege. What valid argument—in law or in moral principle— can be used against that!

It is quite a job to transport all these children—it is a greater job to carry them safely. Yes the school bus driver has a great responsibility and is doing a fine job, but did you know that you are responsible for the children's safety, too! You are if you drive a motor vehicle on streets and highways.

According to the Texas Safety Association statistics for 1957 show that some of our motorists forget their obligation, because there were 229 accidents which involved a school bus. These accidents claimed five lives and brought injuries into the lives of many others. Someone forgot the children paid.

Under Texas Motor Vehicle Laws, the drivers of other vehicles on the highway are responsible if they interfere with the safe loading and unloading of children riding the bus.

A portion of the law reads: 'The driver of a vehicle upon a highway outside of a business or residence district upon meeting

or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus but then may proceed past such school bus at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding ten (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children.

The major portion of the past year's school bus accidents involved a violation of the above section of the law, the motorist failed to stop.
