### Big Pasture FFA Wheat Variety Study

The Big Pasture FFA chapter is conducting a wheat variety and wheat fertilizing demonstration to be observed by local farmers and farm boys. The plot is located one half mile east of the Randlett cemetery on the south side. Seed and fertilizer was obtained from the Oklahoma Crop Improvement Association and Oklahoma Plant Food Society cooperating through the Agricultural Extension service.

The land and tractor was furnished by C. B. Resell and the grain drill was furnished by Charles Bowles.

Varieties included in the plot are Comanche, Early Triumph, Conoco, Wester, Crockett and Daney's Early Triumph.

The Crockett and Daney's Triumph seed samples were furnished by Harlan Mills, Burkburnett, and Jim Kinder, respectively.

The soil is a low fertility clay type. Soil tests indicate a need of approximately 75 pounds per acre of 13-39-0 fertilizer. Fertilizer plots include various rates of fertilizer compared to no fertilizer.

Cropping history of the land is wheat followed by Sudan which was plowed under in July. The chapter will soon locate signs marking each plot.

### Indians Scalp Burk 27-14 At Nocona

Nocona's Indians were on the war path for the third week in a row in Nocona Friday night as they took the scalp of the Burkburnett Bulldogs to earn a 27-14 victory, their third consecutive District 2A-9 win.

Led by shifty Halfback Dennis Richardson, and pile driving Fullback Larry Bagwell, the Warriors' offense was too much for the Bulldogs.

Richardson personally accounted for 135 yards rushing and two touchdowns. The hard-charging Bagwell was almost as effective picking up 123 yards on the ground and one tally.

Bagwell got things rolling for the Indians with six minutes, 24 seconds left in the initial quarter and the 168 pounder crunched his way seven yards for the Indians' first touchdown.

Jimmy Fitts calmly kicked the extra point and the score read 7-0.

Richardson then turned in his first TD sprint of the night, going 43 yards around right end to score standing up. Fitts punted the point after.

Burkburnett fought back in the second stanza to score their first tally of the night. After Halfback Kenneth Durham intercepted a Nocona pass late in the quarter, the Bulldogs headed goalward.

The pay off was a 10 yard scoring aerial from Mike Lacy to Darrell Moore. Lacy tried a pass for the two points which failed.

The Indians, however whooped louder after Burk's touchdown and Rich dived over for the six points. Fitts punched through his third point and the Indians led at the half 21-6.

The second half was a hard-fought contest all the way with both teams battling jaw to jaw. Burkburnett pulled up within striking distance of Nocona by pushing across a tally early in the final stanza. Gary Jennings got the counter from one yard out Jennings fired to end Brian Teal for the two points after.

But Coach James Willingham's Indians were not to be denied this week and came back to add an insurance six pointed with two minutes left in the game. It was Richardson again who crossed the goal tripe this time with a 24 yard rush.

Fitts try for the extra point was wide.

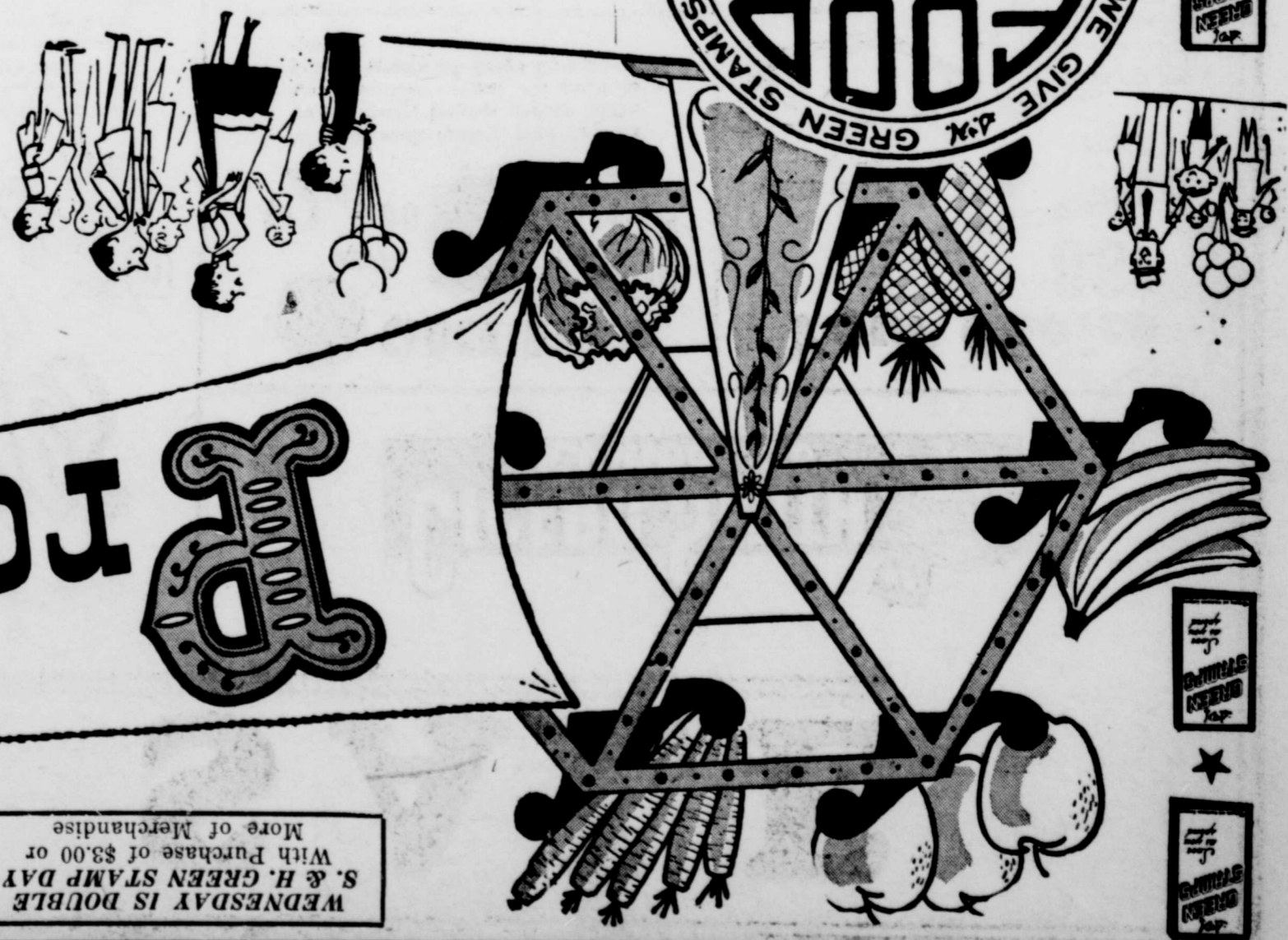

## Senator Hardeman Opposes H.J.R. No. 1 In Nov. Election

The constitutional amendment (H. J. R. 1) proposing annual session of the Legislature, annual salaries of \$7,500, plus an unlimited per diem and unlimited "expenses of office" for each member, should be carefully considered in view of the following:

1. H. J. R. No. 1 would permit continuous session of the Legislature, which would not be good for either the members or the State.

2. The proposed amendment authorizes a per diem unlimited in amount, to each member, in addition to the annual salary.

3. H. J. R. No. 1 authorizes unlimited expenses of office, which might well include transportation, publications, rent, secretarial help, clerk hire, stationery and supplies, telephone and telegraph, postage, etc., in amount and manner as determined by the Legislature, itself. It is not unlikely that the Legislature would deal generously with itself, the only restraint being a fear of voters reaction at the next election.

4. The proposed amendment is wholly unnecessary from the standpoint of either results contemplated or expenses involved.

5. The proposed amendment includes a provision relating to the occupancy of living quarters

## Texas Safety Association

It is not necessarily the itchy fingered hunter in the field who mistakenly kills someone.

The "unloaded" gun in the home is an even more dangerous killer, according to a report from the Texas Safety Ass'n.

In Texas, for example, almost half the accidental firearms fatalities occur in the home. Most recent figures reveal that of 168 total firearms fatalities, 82 happened in the home while only 11 were hunting accident victims.

For increased safety, TSA recommends that all guns be treated as though they were loaded, until it is proved that they are not, never aim in the direction of another person, put firearms away unloaded and dismantled. Lock ammunition in a chest or safe places, especially if there are small children in the home.

in the Capitol building by certain officials, now determined by statute.

6. H. J. R. No. 1 appears to be in conflict with other provisions of the Constitution.

7. The amendment is poorly written and, if adopted, will likely entail extensive litigation and require judicial interpretation.

Annual session will result in greater spending. The record of the Congress attests to this.

The proposed amendment provides for a "Second Regular session." The unrealistic limitation placed on the Second session raises serious questions concerning the validity of appropriation for many of the State's most important functions.

Since its provisions may not be voted upon separately, however desirable one or more features might be, the amendment should be rejected.

I opposed this amendment in the 1957 session of the Legislature, and subsequent study has confirmed the soundness of my action.

## It's The Law In Texas

Among topics covered by the proposed constitutional amendments to be voted upon by Texans on Nov. 4th are pensions, hospital benefits for the needy, hospital districts and advertising of the resources of the state.

Proposed Amendment Number Six authorizes the Legislature to provide for a system of retirement and disability pensions for retiring Texas Rangers. Benefits would be limited to those Rangers who have not been eligible at any time for membership in the regular state employees retirement system.

Those drawing the pensions or disability payments would also be required to have served at least two years as Rangers. Widows could also be provided for by the Legislature, provided they were legally married prior to 1957 to a Texas Ranger qualifying for such a pension.

Under the proposal there would be a limitation of Eighty Dollars per month on payments to a Ranger or his widow. The pensions could be paid only from the Confederate veterans pension fund, which is already in existence and is kept up by a State ad valorem property tax levy of two cents per hundred dollar valuation. The State building fund is currently being maintained from the same source.

Proposed Amendment Number Seven would strike from the Texas Constitution the original 1876 provision which prohibits immigrants to the State. Substituted would be an authorization for the Legislature to appropriate money and establish procedure for developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, recreational and other resources of Texas.

Funds might also be appropriated for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of other states through advertising in periodicals having national circulation, and the dissemination of factual information about the advantages and economic resources offered by the State of Texas.

Pictures of living state officials could not be used in any of such advertising. The Legislature would be authorized to require that any sum appropriated under the new provision be matched by an equal sum from private sources before being paid out.

Proposed Amendment Number Eight would empower the Legislature to provide for direct payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally

Disabled. State funds paid out for such medical care could not exceed those paid out of Federal funds for the same purpose, and the Legislature would be authorized to accept financial aid from the Federal Government for those purposes.

Proposed Amendment Nine authorizes the creation of Hospital Districts in the City of Amarillo and in Wichita and Jefferson Counties. The first two districts would extend to the respective city and county boundaries, but two separate districts could

be set up in Jefferson county. One of these would cover Fort Arthur Independent School District and the other would cover the remainder of the county. All of the districts would be supported by taxes upon property within their boundaries.
