## Car Check Urged In Safety Drive

Most people don't know that they may be harboring a killer right in their own garage.

That automobile in your garage is only as safe as its mechanical condition makes it. If its headlights are aimed to high, or too low, or in the wrong direction, or one is burned out, it can easily be the direct cause of a motorcade.

If the brakes are not adjusted properly or have a fluid leak that may cause them to grab or fail at a crucial moment, that car can be a killer.

If the taillights or stoplights aren't working properly, thus allowing somebody to approach too closely or quickly from the rear, the car can be the direct cause of death.

It may be raining and the windshield wipers aren't good enough to keep the windshield clear. It could be too late by the time the walking child is seen. The result can be negligent homicide. You will have been harboring a killer in your garage. Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director, Texas Dept. of Public Safety, says, "Don't take chances. Make sure your car is safe to drive. Have it inspected now at one of the Texas Dept. of Public Safety's 4,300 official inspection stations."

## No Excuse

In a recent statement, Budget Director Stans expressed "... a sense of discouragement at the size of the deficit I have to report..."

Mr. Stans certainly has every justification for his feeling. Last January, it was estimated that this year's Federal Budget would end with a slight surplus. Now the anticipated deficit is in the neighborhood of \$12 billion.

Mr. Stans offered the hope "that revenues will be better, expenditures less, and the deficit a lot lower." The coming months will tell as to that. But, at best, the Federal government will again operate at a huge loss, whatever the exact figure.

In the course of his report, Mr. Stans spoke of possible new sources of government revenue. One is a further increase in postage rates—even though substantial raises in first, second and third class mail charges went into effect only last August 1st. The postal deficit despite the August increases, will reach about \$735 million this year.

That brings up a significant point. The late increases were not extended to the fourth class mail category, which is parcel post. Yet parcel post has long been a producer of heavy direct and indirect losses, even though the enabling law specified that it was to pay its own way. And parcel post is in direct tax-subsidized competition with the taxpaying private parcel carriers, even though the enabling law specified it was to supplement the work of these carriers, not to take it over.

## The Big Lie

Hitler perfected (if that is the word) the technique of the big lie, and all other dictators have used it to their own ends. It is based on the principle that if you repeat any statement often enough and aggressively enough, great numbers of people will come to believe it, whether it be true or false.

Here in our own country we have long been subjected to a charge which is akin to the big lie—the charge that when a taxpaying utility company is authorized to build a power plant on some river, it amounts to a shameless "giveaway" of precious resources which belong to all the people.

Writing in Human Events, L. Robert Driver, formerly a Securities and Exchange Commission official, nails that gross misstatement in clear and simple words. He points out that when a utility is licensed to build a power dam on a river site, all it gets is the right to produce electric power at rates regulated by public authority. To quote him directly: "The profits of the corporation are limited to a 'reasonable return' on the company's investment and that investment cannot include a nickel of the alleged 'value' of the site which is supposed to have been 'given away'. He adds that the value of a canyon or a waterfall "is strictly scenic until somebody builds a dam or a power plant to make use of its latent energy."

If that "somebody" is the government, the construction is done at the expense of all the taxpayers, and the plant is operated on a tax free, tax supported basis. If that "somebody" is private enterprise, the construction is done with private savings, substantial sums are paid for the use of the falling water and when the plant goes into operation, heavy taxes are paid to all units of government. Take your pick!

## Right-To-Work And The Rank And File

A Wall Street Journal news item says that: "Right-to-work" laws seem sure to gain in November voting. Labor all but concedes passage of a union shop ban in Idaho. Close votes look likely in California, Kansas and Ohio.

Whatever happens in any given state next election day, there is small doubt that sentiment in favor of the right-to-work principle has shown very substantial gains not only on the part of the public at large, but among union members. Various surveys have shown that. Union leaders hate right to work as the devil hates holy water, but great numbers of the rank and file feel otherwise.

There is every reason why this should be the case. Right to work is not—repeat not—an anti-union or anti-labor idea. It's one and only purpose is to give every working man and woman a right that should be as irrevocable as any laid down in the Bill of Rights—that is, the right to freely decide, without coercion from anyone, whether or not to join an organization. A man or woman who lacks that right, as millions now do under the union shop contracts, is certainly not free.

Moreover, from the purely practical view, right to work must inevitably result in more effective, more honest and generally better unions. Under right to work, they must sell their services, on the basis of the quality of the job they do. Under the union shop the worker is helpless and the labor bosses are all powerful.

## Who Will Be Tomorrow's Victim?

The newspapers of this country, with few exceptions, have closed ranks in denouncing a ruling of the Internal Revenue Service which holds that institutional advertising of private electric companies opposing socialization of their industry is not a legitimate business expense, and so is not deductible for tax purposes. The IRS has applied similar rulings to other organizations and enterprises placing advertising of a comparable nature.

As an example, here is a resolution passed by the Montana State Press Association at its recent annual convention: WHEREAS, it has traditionally been the unchallenged right of business, through its own paid advertising, to bring to the attention of people whatever may be of proper concern to its own welfare, the interest of its employees, its customers and the general public,

"WHEREAS, the throttling of such advertising by punitive penalty represents a clear handcuffing of our economic system by preventing the right of business to present its own case, in contrast to which non-taxpaying concerns of public bodies are allowed free, rein, thus giving them a discriminatory advantage. NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Montana Press Association, that: 1. Such rulings are capricious, discriminatory, unfair and unjust. 2. Such rulings violate the principle of freedom of information. 3. Such rulings should be rescinded, as urged currently by many state press associations as well as regional press and media groups.

The concern of the nation's press over IRS's action is not motivated by any undue sympathy for the utility companies or the other enterprises involved. The basic issue was clearly and accurately pinpointed by the Great Falls Tribune in these words: "If today a tax penalty can be employed against some firms or enterprises to suppress freedom of information, no one knows tomorrow's victim. Democracy is dead when citizens may only be exposed to opinions with which administrative officials of the government are in agreement."

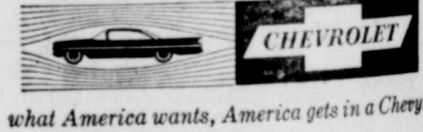

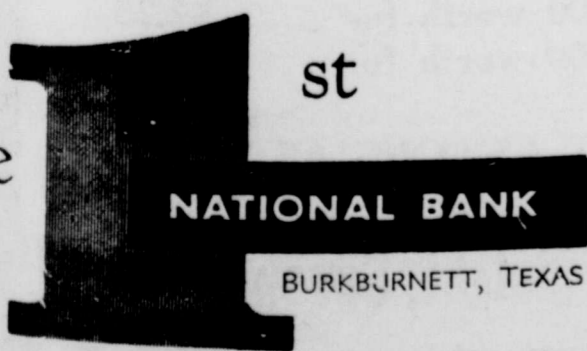

The right and amount of trimming adds interest and individuality to costume. Too much can be distracting and confusing, according to Thelma Wirges, county HD agent.

The secret of effective in trimming lies in discriminating use. Self covered buttons and belts, or those that blend with the garment, can be used without danger of a spotty or over-decorated effect. Self trim of this type becomes part of the design of the garment and gives more leeway in choosing other accessories.

If you plan for contrasting trim, study your figure carefully to determine where to place the emphasis. In other words, "accentuate the positive." Make certain the trim is appropriate to the garment and the occasion for which it will be worn.

Shop for ideas that are different. Study garments displayed in exclusive dress shops and adapt ideas to your own purse and personality.

A final word, when in doubt, leave the extra trim off. It's better to use too little than too much.

Use of trims will be a part of the advanced clothing workshops to start early next year. These workshops have been planned by the Wichita County clothing committee. Committee members

are Mesdames Gail Mitchell, Bill Mitchell, E. J. Simons, Patricia Simons, W. R. Stimpson and Raymond Krull.

Leaders will be trained in workshops in Electra, Burkburnett and Wichita Falls. If interested contact one of the committee members or Thelma Wirges, county HD agent, 305 Federal Bldg., Wichita Falls.

Interfacing will also be an important part of the workshop. Interfacing can help give a more professional look to your home sewing, according to the agent. It gives additional body to fabric and is a must with many pattern designs. The secret is in knowing where to use it, and what kind of interfacing to use.

Interfacing is most likely to be needed at edges where buttons and buttonholes are to be placed, says Miss Wirges. Collars, cuffs and pocket flaps often need interfacing to give them body and the crisp, perky look that adds style to a garment. Peplums, yokes and the lower portion of fitted jackets are in need of some additional body for a professional look.

Skirt waistbands may need a single thickness of interfacing to prevent unsightly stretching or wrinkling.

There is no hard and fast rule to follow in the selection of interfacing fabric. It should blend in weight and texture with the outer fabric to give the amount of stiffness or softness desired.

If you expect to wash the garment be sure to choose an interfacing that is washable. For the quick drying synthetics, use an interfacing that has similar properties so that all sections of the garment will dry equally fast.

Directions for selecting, preparing and properly attaching interfacing are given in the new publication MP-260, Interface it. Copies are available from your county HD agent's office.

### ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

You may not know it, but the State Dept. of Health is a first class entertainer as far as motion pictures are concerned.

The films are not intended solely for entertainment of course. They are all on educational health subjects slanted to every age group from kindergarteners to oldsters.

During the last two years, over 15,000 bookings have been made of health department films, and displayed to more than one and a half million of Texans.

Film library secretaries claim that some of the more popular films, such as "The High Wall", a mental health film dealing with human prejudices, are booked weeks in advance. It is for this reason that a second, third and fourth choice is requested when making application for film loans.

Careful records are kept of each film, containing the number of showings and total audience. Unfortunately about half of the loanees do not fill out the requested information on the card enclosed with each film. As a result the totals actually fall short of the whole number of showings and audience covered with each film.

Some films are very popular. "Preface to Life," a film about parent-child relationships for showing to adult audiences, had 26 viewings before 900 people during September.

One of the headaches of the film library is that loanees insist on rewinding films after use. Film librarians would rather rewind the films themselves in order to check for damages and to clean the film at the same time.

Often a costly film is damaged during the rewinding process when done by unskilled operators. Also, prompt return is important because often films are "booked" continuously and 3 to 4 days must be allowed for delivery.

Even though some titles have as many as 10 copies, there is still a waiting list in the peak season. Parent-Teacher groups are high on the list of viewers outside of school children.

Any responsible person or group may borrow a Health Department film for non profit showing. The only cost is the return postage.

A catalog listing and explaining the nature of each film is available from the film Library, State Health Dept., Austin 1.

There are over 1,400 films to choose from and all of them will help you to live a healthier life.

**STATE CAPITAL**  
*Highlights*  
**AND Sidelights**

Texas' No. 1 industry is still up against it. Oil industry leaders and state government officials are pressing harder for an effective federal plan to restrict oil imports.

Gen. Ernest O. Thompson, member of the Texas Railroad commission has called for positive remedial action immediately.

Oil and oil products imported into the United States continue to mount and absorb more and more of our domestic market demand, said Thompson. "This restricts domestic exploration and development and continues to make the United States more and more dependent on foreign oil. Foreign oil cannot be counted as available in case of war."

Thompson implied that he thought mandatory limits on oil importing should be set. (At present only a voluntary limitation is in effect.) Thompson noted that lead and zinc imports had been cut by presidential order and "some such action must be taken in regard to imports of oil and petroleum products."

In meetings over the state, industry spokesmen talked in equally urgent terms. Lester Clark, Breckenridge producer, told the Independent Petroleum Association of American that the oil business is "sick."

"Since 1955, total well completions are off 21 percent, exploratory crews have fallen 25%, wildcatting is down 28% and rotary rigs are off 33%," reported Clark.

At another meeting the Gulf Coast Association of Geological Societies was told that during the first half of this year total oil imports increased 5.3% while domestic demand slumped 4.7% below the 1957 average. Impact of this on the domestic industry was a 13.7% cutback and a \$3,000,000 a day loss in income.

Foreign oil production is increasing faster than foreign demand, Jerome J. O'Brien of Monterey Oil Co. told the geological group. Foreign oil interests, therefore, are dependent on getting a share of American buying, the one big oil market in the world. Biggest question in the industry, said O'Brien, is who will get this American market.

Undersecretary of the Interior Elmer F. Bennett told Texans the President's special cabinet committee on fuels is studying proposed plans to cut back imports. But, he said, the administration would not be "stamped into mandatory controls."

**Touchy Topic—**  
Next legislature is forewarned of the difficulties that will be involved in passing any law on industrial safety.

A meeting of the Joint Commission on Industrial Safety developed into heated disagreement and ended in a deadlock. Commission Chairman M. B. Blair wanted the group to approve and recommend to the legislature a plan for a state system of safety regulation and inspection in industry. Rep. Joe Pool of Dallas urged that no recommendation be made until public hearings had been held to get labor and employer views.

Blair's proposal was rejected. Pool's was approved by a 4-3 vote, but Chairman Blair ruled the motion out of order. It ended with agreement to send the Commission's collected data to the governor and legislature with no recommendation.

Commission is a nine member group authorized by the last legislature to study and make suggestions on industrial safety law to the upcoming session.

**End of Road —**  
Former Rep. James E. Cox of Conroe has lost what apparently is the last battle in his fight against a two year prison sentence.

Court of Criminal Appeals slammed the door when it refused Cox a re-hearing. Cox was convicted in a Travis County Court last fall. In June the Appeals Court, by a 2-1 decision upheld the conviction.

Cox was charged with agreeing to accept a \$5,000 bribe in return for killing a bill to outlaw practice of naturopathy. He withdrew from the Legislature after the difficulty developed but has steadfastly maintained his innocence.

**Diablo Dam Pushed—**  
Both Gov. Price Daniel and the State Board of Water Engineers have given their official approval to plans for construction of Diablo Dam on the Rio Grande River.  
Need for the dam was drama-

tically illustrated by the recent heavy floods on the Rio Grande, said J. T. Ellis, Jr., the governor's aide in water matters. Rampant waters caused an estimated \$7,000,000 property damage and about \$131,900,000 worth of water was lost for useful purposes.

Next step toward getting the dam is for the International Boundary and Water Commission to prepare final plans and go to Congress for an appropriation. Diablo will be a joint project of the U. S. and Mexico with this country putting up \$48,600,000 of the \$80,000,000 cost.

**Loan Plan Challenged—**  
Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has filed suit to test the constitutionality of a law permitting certificate plan loans.

Three nationwide finance companies are defendants in the suit. Wilson contends the certificate plan, though permitted by law, violates the constitution al prohibition against charging more than 10 percent interest.

Under plan a borrower may get a sum of money for a year and agree to pay 10 percent interest on the total amount. But he is required to repay the money in monthly installments. Hence, except for the first month he is paying interest on money he does not have.

**No Branch Banks—**  
In another action, Atty Gen. Wilson stuck to his ruling last spring that Texas banks may not set up little banks at nearby military installations.

In numerous cities downtown banks have set up special facilities at nearby air bases, army posts, vet. hospitals, etc.

This clearly violates the Texas constitution's ban on branch banking, said Wilson.

**Younger Scientists Urged—**  
Laboratory science courses beginning in the seventh grade instead of the tenth are recommended by a University of Texas chemist, Dr. Robbin C. Anderson.

Earlier introduction of science will help students in choosing their profession, Anderson told a recent statewide conference of science and mathematics teachers.

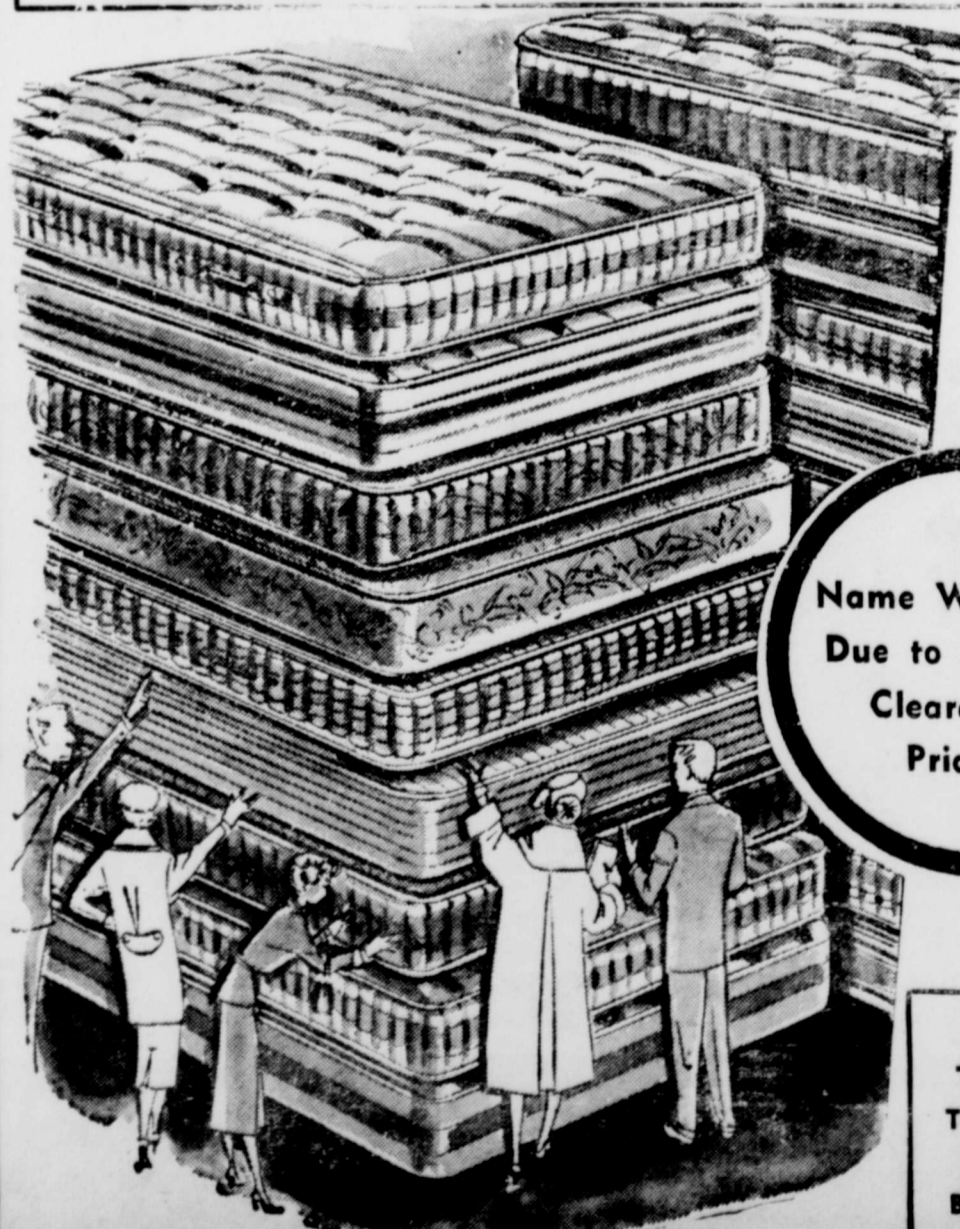
