## Postoffice Dedication Tues., December 9th

### Burkburnett vs. Byng, Oklahoma Basketball Game of the Year Brother Against Brother Coaching

Monday night, Dec. 6th, a basketball match was held at the Byng, Okla. Pirates in the Burkburnett field where a cage tussle with the Burkburnett Bulldogs.

The non conference game will be the top basketball attraction of the season in Burkburnett since the Pirates were ranked as the best basketball team in the Sooner state last year and that covers a lot of territory since Oklahoma is not only a high caliber of basketball Coach Bill Koller's basket team won 38 straight games and won their third state championship since he took over in 1947.

Koller's present quintet consists of two regulars from last year's edition of the Bulldogs, two newcomers and four newcomers. ### New Post Office Building to Be Dedicated Tues. at Joint Meeting

Removal of the Burkburnett Postoffice to the new building at the corner of Ave. B and 2nd St., became an accomplished fact when the office opened for business there on Monday morning Dec. 1st.

Formal dedication services and Open House will be held on Tuesday, December 9th from 3 to 5 P. M. at the new office with a dinner to be given in Town Hall at 7 P. M. honoring the visiting officials. Patrons and friends who wish to attend the dinner may do so by making reservations either at the postoffice or the Chamber of Commerce office before 5 P. M. Friday, Dec. 5th.

The dedication address will be given by Mr. W. B. Weathered, Postal Field Service Officer from the Regional office in Dallas. Short remarks by other visiting officials will be heard.

Bill Browning of Burkburnett will be master of ceremonies. Invitations have been sent to U. S. Senators Johnson and Yarbrough, State Senator George Moffett, Representative Frank Ikard, Flake George, President of the Texas Chapter of the Postmasters Association, General Jas. H. Wallace, Sheppard Field and his staff and the postmasters of the area.

The program will consist of several numbers in addition to the main address. A short band concert by the Burk Hi Band, a formal flag ceremony, when the flag which has been flown over the National Capitol will be hoisted. Recruiting officers of the Army, Navy, Air Corps and Marine Corps will be present representing the branches of the service.

Some of the interesting bits of history of the office is revealed by old record books in the office.

The move marks another milestone for the office which was established fifty-one years ago on October 1st 1907 with Maggie Weaver as the first postmaster. She was followed in the office by F. E. Pike, who was also editor of the 6666 Star (now the Burkburnett Star.) Pike was succeeded in 1908 by C. A. Purcell, a long time postmaster and was followed during part of the Boom area by Miss Eulalia Smith (now Mrs. J. E. Gray of Wichita Falls), Neeley R. Vaught was appointed following the resignation of Miss Smith and served some twelve years. The present postmaster took office in April 1936.

A few interesting items found in the early records show that the first Money order issued was purchased by one F. L. McGehee on October 2nd, 1907. The oldest patron still living in this area is Wm. F. Rammung of the Clara Community, who purchased money order No. 47 on Oct. 26th, 1907.

An entry on April 15, 1908 shows the purchase of a money order by Fannie Meyers (now Mrs. T. Guy Willis) of our city and another was purchased by

J. R. Sullivan in May of the same year. One other entry in June 1909 shows that the present postmaster Al Lohofener, sent a money order to the Curtis Publishing Co in payment for Saturday Evening Post sold.

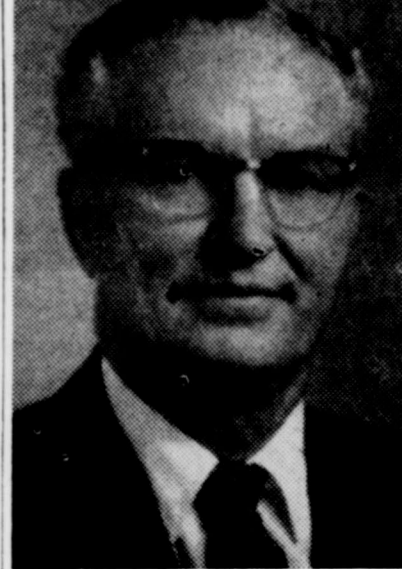

Higher pay for legislators is an issue that's buried, but not dead.

Voters buried it under a two-to-one avalanche of disapproval when it was submitted as a constitutional amendment Nov. 4th. But already there is talk of trying again.

It is being discussed both by those who supported "Amendment One" and those who fought hardest against it. Sen. Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo, leading spokesman for the opposition has indicated he may submit a pay raise plan of his own next session. Hardeman attacked the recent proposal, not on the principle of better pay for lawmakers, but on the grounds that the amendment was a muddled conglomeration of too many things.

State AFL-CIO, which worked for Amendment One, is plugging for resubmission of the annual pay question. AFL-CIO headquarters officials sent a letter to legislators expressing regret the amendment did not pass and placing the blame on labor's favorite targets—business lobbyists and newspapers.

Whatever the merits of the case, a lot of people in the state agencies in Austin are glum about the prospect of facing a disgruntled, pinch-penny Legislature next year. With the general revenue fund in the red, there's bound to be an effort to cut expenses. In addition, state employees fear, there'll be a feeling among lawmakers that "if we can work for peanuts, so can you."

**Water Struggles—**  
 State Board of Water Engineers has completed public hearing on one squabble over Trinity River water and is faced with another soon.

Probably as a result of the recent drought. There seems to be an increasing intensity in the struggles between various areas of Texas for water rights.

In the case of a major river like the Trinity, which passes through or near three major cities—Ft. Worth, Dallas and Houston—there is always a fear that one city will take out so much water another will run dry.

Water Board has under consideration now Dallas' request for a permit to build Forney Dam on the East Fork of the Trinity. There was strong opposition from the North Texas Municipal Water District, particularly Rockwell County, on the grounds that the dam would secure Dallas' water future at the expense of north county neighbors.

In the making is another wrangle over Houston's request to build a reservoir at Livingston. Houston wants to divert 1-100,000 gallons daily to the reservoir, practically all the unappropriated water from the Trinity. Dallas is attempting to

**Area Highway Construction**

A contract for 14.9 miles of construction on U. S. Highway 82 and 287 in Wichita and Clay Counties has been awarded to a Lubbock firm. It was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

J. R. Fanning submitted the low bid of \$309,711.77 on the project. Construction of flexible base shoulders and two course surface treatment, located from 1.3 miles east of Wichita Falls to Henrietta is expected to take 180 working days, according to L. B. Dean, District Highway Engineer at Wichita Falls. The awarding of the contract to this firm is subject to the concurrence of the Bureau of Public Roads.

A. D. January, Resident Engineer at Wichita Falls will be in active charge of the project while under construction.

A contract for the construction of grading, structures, base and surfacing on Farm to Market Road 2345 in Wichita County was awarded in Austin this week. L. B. Dean, District Highway Engineer at Wichita Falls has announced. The firm of C. C. Booth, Stephenville submitted the low bid of \$80,799.30 on the project which runs from FM 1739 at Sunshine Hill east, to FM 368, a distance of 7.0 miles.

Resident Engineer Martin L. Raabe of Vernon will be in charge of the project for the Highway Department, and it is estimated that the work will take 110 days to complete.

**Welfare Program—**  
 Texas Social Welfare Association at its meeting in Austin asked the next Legislature to:

1. Pass laws putting into effect the new constitutional amendment permitting medical aid for the aged, disabled and dependent.

2. Overhaul laws dealing with delinquent, dependent and neglected children.

3. Appropriate money to the Texas Youth Council for more staffers, including parole supervisors for juveniles.

4. Pass a minimum standard hospital licensing law.

Association also passed a resolution praising State Welfare Dept. Director John Winters and presented its Distinguished Service Award to Miss Ima Hogg of Houston (daughter of the late Gov. James Hogg) for her generosity on the behalf of mental health work.

**Mechanics License Law—**

Next Legislature will be asked to decide whether to require auto mechanics to have a license before monkeying around under the hood of your car. Texas Independent Garagemen Association has voted to work for such a law.

Under the association's proposal, all independent auto repair shops, all authorized car dealers' shops and all mechanics would be examined and licensed under a state board. Purpose say the garagemen, is to protect the public from those who pad bills and do little, if anything, for cars.

**Savings and Loan Change —**

An attempt will be made next session to patch up the savings and loan association law after a part of it was declared unconstitutional.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson held unconstitutional the law which provides for automatic cancellation of a savings and loan association's certificate to do business if it fails to start operations within six months after the certificate is granted. Wilson ruled this violates the constitution guarantee against being deprived of life or property without due process of law.

State Banking Commissioner J. M. Faulkner said he will ask to have the savings and loan law made like the banking law. This gives the Banking Commission authority to extend a bank's certificate if business is not begun within 90 days.

**Uncle Sam Has Say—**  
 Texas regulatory agencies can not set rates for railroads, truck lines, etc., carrying goods and personnel for the federal government in Texas.

This ruling by the Texas Supreme court was made in a test case brought by the Texas and Pacific Railroad and others. It had been knocking around in the courts for some years. Former Atty. Gen. Ben Shepperd had ruled that the Texas Railroad Commission did have authority to set rates for transportation entirely within the states borders.

Final ruling was based on a decision by the U. S. Supreme Court in a California case of the same type.

**No Harm in A Still —**  
 Court of Criminal Appeals insists the evidence has to be 100 proof to convict a man of manufacturing an illicit beverage.

Appeals Court threw out the conviction of a Lamar County man who had pled guilty to a charge of possessing a still to manufacture intoxicating liquor.

Majority opinion said, in effect, that the law prohibits possession of a still to make illicit beverages, but that illicit beverages and intoxicating beverages are not necessarily the same.

With Christmas only a month away, the Postmaster says it's not a bit too soon to start following these three simple rules to insure delivery of your gifts before Christmas: Wrap them securely. Address them correctly, and Mail Them Early.

The Postmaster said you shouldn't take chances on mailing poorly wrapped packages. Use corrugated mailing cartons, plenty of heavy brown wrapping paper and be sure that every package is tied with strong cord.

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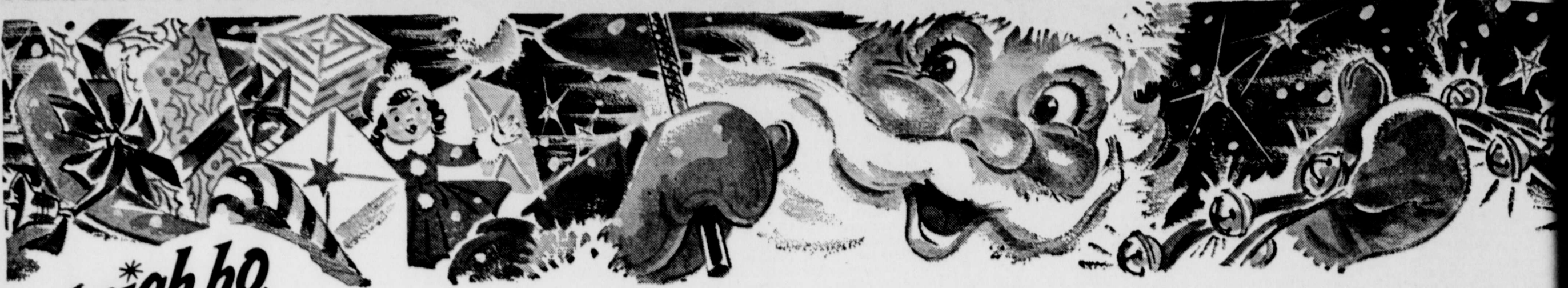

## Berlin Blockade Can Be Broken Again

Russia has shown again that the Communists can't be trusted to enter into any conference with good faith. While representatives of the major powers were meeting in Geneva to try to lay a groundwork of some kind to avoid mass destruction by atomic warfare, Russian Premier Nikita Khrushchev brought up a new and discordant issue in Moscow which he hopes will throw the free nations off balance.

Khrushchev, at a Soviet-Polish friendship meeting, demanded an end to four power occupation of Berlin. He hinted that Russia might break its treaty promise to permit free access between West Berlin and West Germany.

The United States State Department reacted with commendable promptness. It bluntly rejected Khrushchev's demand.

If Khrushchev wants to try to isolate West Berlin, as the Reds did several years ago, the Allied airlift which broke the back of the Communist blockade can be revived.

Naturally the Communists would like for the Allies to move out of West Berlin. East Germany, which is under Communist dictatorship, would absorb it immediately.

The United States State Department said that three powers—the United States, France and Great Britain—are prepared to fight if necessary to defend West Berlin's freedom. Any weakening of this stand would be playing into the hands of the Communists. If the Western Powers make any concession in West Berlin, they bolster Communist confidence to make aggressive pushes in other directions.

Holding West Berlin is a key to containing communism throughout the world.

## People Increase Faster Than Forecasts

As recently as 20 or 25 years ago many students of population trends were forecasting that late in this century the number of Americans would reach a top figure of about 175,000,000 and then perhaps go into a gradual decline. Some went so far as to say that there never would be more than 160,000,000 Americans, a total to be attained by about the year 1975.

How wrong they were has already been demonstrated. In this year 1958 there are already 175,000,000 Americans and the population is rising rapidly. Growth in recent years has surpassed Census Bureau forecasts. And now the bureau has come out with new prognostications raising its sights materially.

Only two years ago the bureau forecast a 1975 population of between 206,900,000 and 228,500,000. Sunday it came out with new estimates that our population will rise by 1975 to somewhere between 215,800,000 and 243,900,000. The spread of 28,000,000 is due to possible shifts in fertility and mortality rates, and immigration figures.

In any event, our population now is expected not only to continue to rise rapidly but also to exceed greatly the outlook of as recently as two years ago.

It is explained that the projections are based upon expectation of high economic activity and employment, no major war and no disastrous epidemics.

One notable fact in the forecasts is that the number of Americans in the main working group will remain fairly constant while the population as a whole is going up rapidly. In other words, while there will be many more mouths to feed, there will be comparatively few additional producers to feed them. Growing productivity both on the farm and in the factory should take care of that situation handily, however.

Continued heavy population increase will bring many problems, especially in urban areas. There is no question, however, of this country's ability to maintain a much larger population and to do it on a high standard of living.

## Vote Of Confidence

Proponents of socialized power always claim that the people are solidly behind them. But it's one thing to make a claim and another to prove it.

For instance, the people have no chance to pass on such matters as big Federal power projects. Congress approves or disapproves them. But at frequent intervals, elections are held in which the issue is public power versus private power. Over the years, private power has been given the vote in the great majority of cases.

## No Cause For Cheers

Reports now indicate that this year's federal deficit will probably be well below the \$12 billion figure that was forecast until recently. The reason, however, isn't that government spending is declining. It is, instead, that the upturn in business activity and personal incomes are raising tax revenues.

A reduced deficit will be good news. But it shouldn't lead to any cheering. At best, the government will go into the hole by billions. That means more national debt. That means more danger of inflation. That means ever-poorer chances for tax reduction.

If the next Congress continues the spending spree of its predecessors, we'll keep right on moving toward a further debased currency and ultimate national bankruptcy. It's happened all over the world. It can happen here.

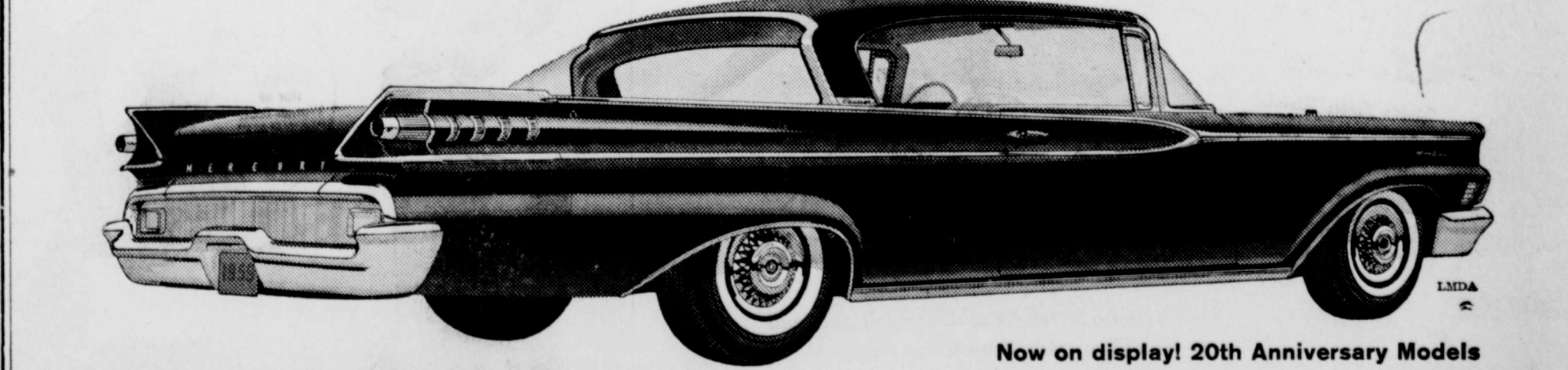

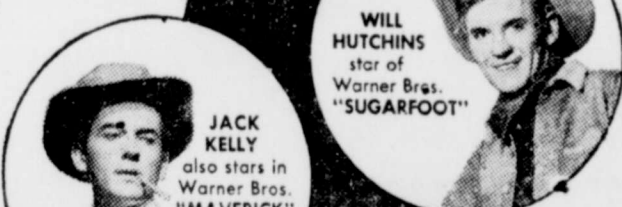

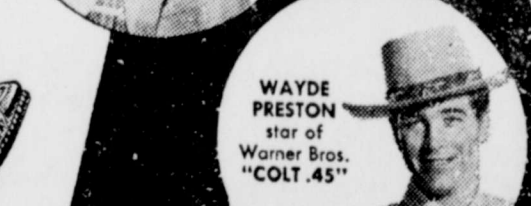

Sometime or another all of us find ourselves alone. Not alone in our thinking maybe, but alone with our thoughts.

Once I found myself in one of those spells while sitting in my coyote blind with no one to talk to but the figurehead on the holster which houses my trusty six gun. Soon I noticed that I was thinking of ability and talent. After a long time of thinking and waiting for some perfectly innocent coyote to respond to my betraying calls, I had come up with nothing. No coyotes to show off to my gun toting buddy, who was home in a warm bed and no thoughts of a talent of ability that was evident.

Perhaps we should attempt to define what I call talent. Ability we know is being able. By talent I do not mean having a good voice for singing rock'n roll, or being able to do a soft toe shoe routine on a four by four table top. I think the talent I mean would come closer to being capable of being of service.

I've always liked to think of myself as a natural born lawman. I live and breathe law enforcement. I study for it, I think about it, and I practice it to the extent of my present position as a pre-law student and a snooper. Someday I hope I can be a good representative of our modern systems of pursuing justice. Before that can come about one must certainly have talent for understanding his fellow humans.

Probably it is not too difficult to understand the actions and reactions of an adult mind; be it perfectly normal or be it the possessor of criminal tendencies or a criminal record. In my four years of active law enforcement I have found the adult mind not difficult to understand, even with what little of that talent to understand that I may have.

Unfortunately however, there are decidedly some humans among us who have minds that cannot be called adult. The unfortunate thing is that too many of those persons do have criminal tendencies. Some even have criminal records. Where! oh where is our talent for understanding those minds.

I speak not specifically of our teen-agers, nor of those just out of their teens. For the greater part of those people are the future leaders of our country, even

our world, and so we progress, our solar system.

Without that talent to understand it, one cannot pinpoint it. So with out being specific as to age, reason, or environment; I speak of those persons that do not consider trying to think like an adult, but probably should. Those who continually do things to aggravate our adult thinking society. We know what those acts are but let me mention a few. Destroying or damaging private property, automobiles, homes or shrubbery. Damaging the facings that are assets as well as necessities to our fine city. It happens and it happens often, and at great costs.

Perhaps each time it happens we don't know who does it. This should be no lasting problem, though it is certainly an immediate one; for there are many ways of finding who does it. I would be happy to suggest several ways.

Our real problem seems to be What can we do with those who did it, and how can we keep it from happening again? Faced with this problem are our present leaders who have trained their adult minds to great limits. But what can they do?

In this country we have an excellent system of corrections. From Alcatraz and Huntsville to the local county jail, all are good. But apparently we can't send a person off to jail for needlessly and thoughtlessly smashing the windshield out of a new car. So what if it was parked in its owner's driveway, it looked challenging to the unthinking mind of the person who smashed it, then fled in some other car with a perfectly good windshield in it. But we can't go around smashing someone's windshield because unthinking crum destroyed ours. Then what can we do?

I'm not a philosopher or psychologist. Just a darned earnest law student who hopes that someday I'll be able and will have the talent to help enforce the laws that our present leaders are making. As for the problem of our unthinking fellow humans, I would be happy to make a number of suggestions. My first suggestion would be: THINK—Before We All Louse It Up.

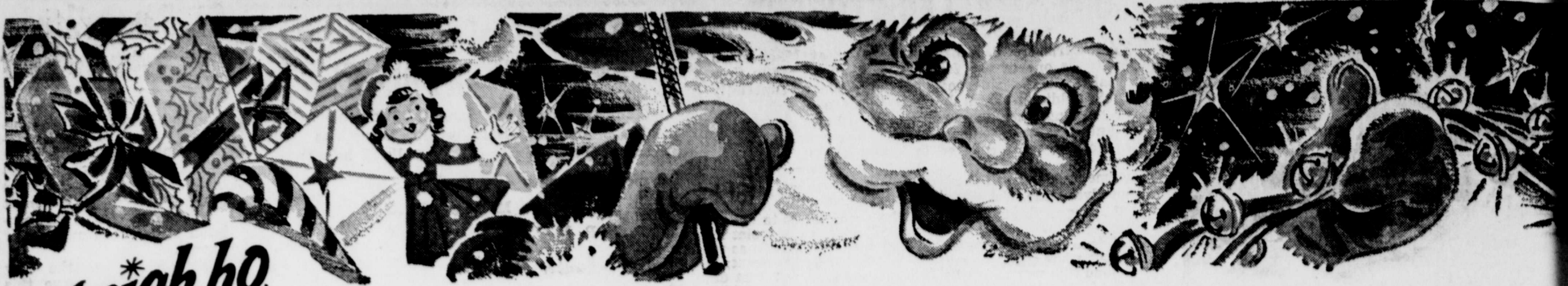

## Christmas Seal Medical Research Making Progress

Treatment and prevention of tuberculosis in children — and the reasons why young girls break down with TB—are being studied under Christmas Seal research grants from tuberculosis associations.

Dr. John W. Middleton, president of the Texas Tuberculosis Association and associate professor of medicine at the Medical Branch, The University of Texas, announced today that 4 centers in Texas are cooperating in a large-scale study designed to improve care of children with tuberculosis. Those centers are at the Driscoll Childrens hospital in Corpus Christi, the Dallas Pediatric Hospital, the Houston Tuberculosis Hospital, and the El Paso Health Dept.

Exact purpose of the study, according to Dr. Middleton, is to find out whether serious complications can be prevented by giving a drug, isoniazid, to children when first infected with tuberculosis.

The study was organized and coordinated by the U. S. Public Health Service. A medical research grant from the National Tuberculosis Association supplements federal funds.

Almost 3,000 children are now under observation. Some of the children are receiving isoniazid, some are receiving dummy pills. Preliminary reports indicate that fewer complications are rising among the children receiving isoniazid.

The study is one of two on tuberculosis in children being aided by Christmas Seal grants, Dr. Middleton said. Another clinical study concerns tuberculosis in adolescence.

## YOUR NEW Social Security

Erton F. Tate, manager of the social security office in Wichita Falls, said today that a farm land lord may have his net earnings from crop production credited to his social security account. Tate pointed out that a farm land lord who materially participates by agreement with his tenant in the production or management of production of products raised must file tax returns and report his net earnings in order to get social security credit.

Tate emphasized that income from this activity after retirement can affect the farmers right to receive benefit payments for some or all months of the year.

The social security office in Wichita Falls has information available concerning benefits under the program to self-employed farmers. Mr. Joe A. Nesbitt, who is the representative from the social security office in Wichita Falls, makes regular visits to this area. The time and place can be obtained by inquiry at your post office.

## News From The County Agent

Are you including wildlife promotion in 1959 farm or ranch plans? B. T. Haws, county agent says that several dollars are lost to farmers and ranchers each year because they fail to recognize the importance of their wildlife resources. With a minimum of effort, people with land can increase their game animal numbers and increase at the same time the opportunities to hunt and fish without leaving home.

Small fenced off areas near water where game animals and birds can find shelter and nesting facilities will more than pay for the trouble in pleasure alone. In some instances leases may be sold to hunters next fall. These leases are of prime importance where finances are concerned. Don't let a good thing slip by you when with just a little planning and even less labor you can have a nice side operation income helping to fill your pocketbook, says Haws.
