## GRASS ROOTS OPINION

**BUFFALO, WYO., BUFFALO BULLETIN:** "Just after a United States Senator finished lauding it for its 'democracy,' the United States Steelworkers Union voted to throw out the men who had been unsuccessful candidates for high union office.

## Something We Asked For

The U. S., Britain and France are reported as determined to take whatever steps may be necessary to prevent Red control of West Berlin. That these steps may be expensive and even agonizing is a reasonable anticipation. But just how they may be taken remains a deep, dark secret at this writing.

It would seem to be the Kremlin's plan—on the heels of Khrushchev's announcement that he would liquidate the "occupation status of Berlin—to appear to withdraw from East Berlin, if not from East Germany, and hand over the East German stooges control over the highway, railroad and air approaches to West Berlin.

If we were to believe Khrushchev's bluster, the plan would be simply the East Germans, operating under their own steam, to shut off all access to the Western City, drive out both Allied occupation forces and the West Germans in order to make this fabulously booming city a literal part of the comparative desert that is East Germany. But this is a large order when it is considered that there is nothing the East Berliners and the East Germans at large desire more than reunion with their Western kinsmen, freedom from Soviet slavery and acceptance by the Bonn government as part of the (West) German Federal Republic.

It would seem obvious, therefore, that whatever restraints are imposed and whatever hostile moves made against the Allies and the official regime of West Berlin must be under the direction of Russian wolves in East German sheep's clothing. And the main purpose may well be to force the US, Britain and France to deal with the East German government in the matter of traffic arrangements and controls in and out of West Berlin. Since the three Western powers have consistently refused to recognize East Germany, on the grounds that it is not a representative country but an irresponsible Red satellite, such traffic conferences would constitute some degree of recognition.

The West is now awaiting, therefore, the replacement of Russians at the rail and highway checkpoints by East Germans and the threatened blockade that would most certainly launch another and vastly greater Berlin air lift—along with the concomitant peril of incidents that could mean war.

And these, after all, are the chickens of our strategic ineptitude coming home to roost—13 years after halting our victorious troops at the Elbe so that the Russians (whom we distrusted) might march with us into Berlin, divide this historic city against itself and impose for a hundred miles around a new slavery on millions, freed only then from the Hitler tyranny.

## Smearing The FBI

## Your New Social Security

Many school students and  
housewives plan to work in jobs  
covered by Social Security dur-  
ing the holidays. These part-time  
workers will need social securi-  
ty cards, according to Mr. Tate,  
District Manager of the Wichita  
Falls social security office.

Mr. Tate urges all persons who  
plan to work during the holi-  
days and who do not already  
have social security cards to ap-  
ply for them immediately. Those  
who have lost their cards should  
ask for duplicates. Persons hav-  
ing social security cards at the  
time they file their applications  
for jobs will secure employment  
quicker, declared Mr. Tate. Many  
employers will not hire employ-  
ees unless they have in their  
possession social security cards  
issued in their correct names.

Persons who live in Wichita  
Falls, may visit the Social Se-  
curity office located at 432 Federal  
Building and apply for their  
numbers. Those residing in or  
near other towns may go to their  
local post office, secure and  
complete, Form SS-5 and mail it  
to their nearest Social Security  
office.

The amount of benefits to  
which a wage earner or his sur-  
vivors may be entitled will de-  
pend on the amount of wages  
posted to his old-age and survi-  
vors insurance account. A social  
security account cannot be set  
up for an individual without  
first securing a social security  
card, declared Mr. Tate.

Employers of household work-  
ers are reminded by Erton F.

Tate, district manager of the Wi-  
chita Falls, social security of-  
fice not to forget the deadline  
for repeating earnings of and  
paying the social security taxes  
for their domestic employees.  
The report for the quarter end-  
ing in December must be filed  
January 31, 1959.

Each such employee who is  
paid \$50.00 or more cash wages  
in the calendar quarter must  
be included in the report Tate  
said. Tate also states that the  
simplified envelope type of tax  
return which Internal Revenue  
Service provides is the easiest  
way for most employers to fur-  
nish the necessary information  
and to pay the social security  
tax. Each employee must be re-  
ported by name, social security  
account number and amount of  
cash wages paid. The employees  
tax is 2 1-4% and the employ-  
ers share is 2 1-4%, a total of  
4 1-2% of the wages paid. (Be-  
ginning with wages paid in 1959  
the tax bill will be 2 1-2 for  
each.)

These returns will serve as  
the base for determining wheth-  
er social security benefits are  
payable, and the amount of the  
monthly benefit rate. It is there-  
fore very important that the re-  
ports be prepared properly and  
be filed on time.

For further information re-  
garding social security tax re-  
turns, consult the Internal Re-  
venue office in the Federal  
building. For information con-  
cerning old age, survivors or dis-  
ability benefits, feel free to call  
upon the social security office  
at 432 Federal Bldg, Wichita  
Falls.

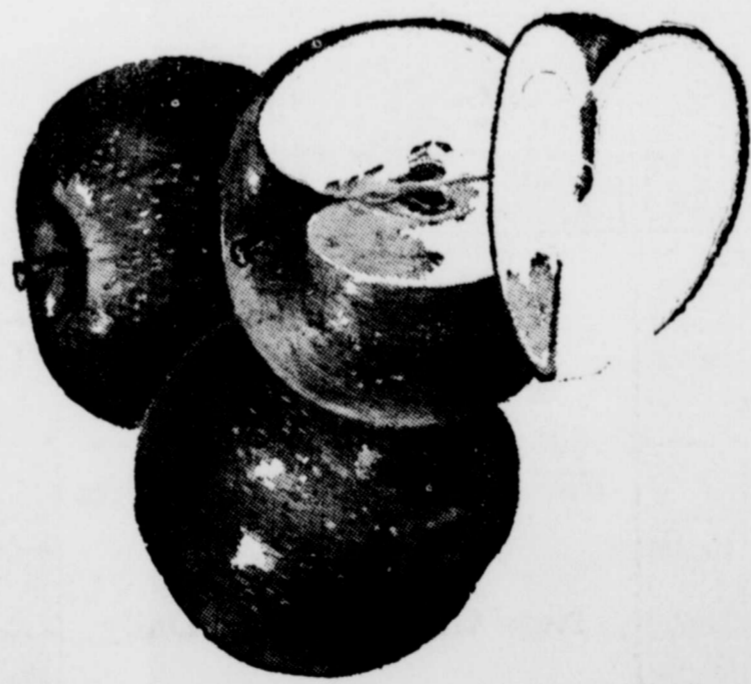

### News From The HD Agent

Those sweet potatoes in the grocery market are prize packages of food value. Besides being tasty and delicious, sweet potatoes offer food value and fuel for energy. Thelma Wirges, county HD agent reminds us that the Texas Food standard calls for serving of potatoes—sweet or Irish—every day.  
Baking sweet potatoes retains much of the flavor & food value and saves time for the cook. Simply wash and dry the potato and bake in a moderate oven at 350 degree. A medium sized potato will require approximately 1 hour to bake.  
Potatoes may teak if baked too long or with too high heat. Test for doneness by pressing rather than puncturing with a fork.  
Left-over sweet potatoes will keep for several days in the refrigerator. Serve them mashed, fried or candied. Citrus juices, tart apples and nuts combine well with the flavor of sweet potatoes.

Sweet potatoes freeze well. Thelma Wirges, gives the following directions: Cook potatoes until almost tender, cool, peel, slice or mash. To prevent darkening, add 2 tablespoons lemon or orange juice to each quart of mashed potatoes. Package and freeze immediately. This is an excellent way to use potatoes while inexpensive.

Vegetable counters offer a wide array now. Heading the list in most areas are celery, sweet potatoes, rutabagas, cucumbers, onions and potatoes. The cabbage family offers variety and good eating at budget pleasing cost, too. Cabbage itself is an economy value while broccoli and cauliflower also wear attractive price tags in most areas.

The E. J. Simons family are prize gardeners, summer or fall. The Simons' family not only received prize money for their

garden but have more served than most a County family. In fact this they are well featured of health.

Proper food can guard against cold, and other ailments with quick changes in exposure and fatigue. Food and nutrition members remind us to start every good hearty breakfast with a nutritious supper. This committee plans for a nutrition program in which members interested in family members.

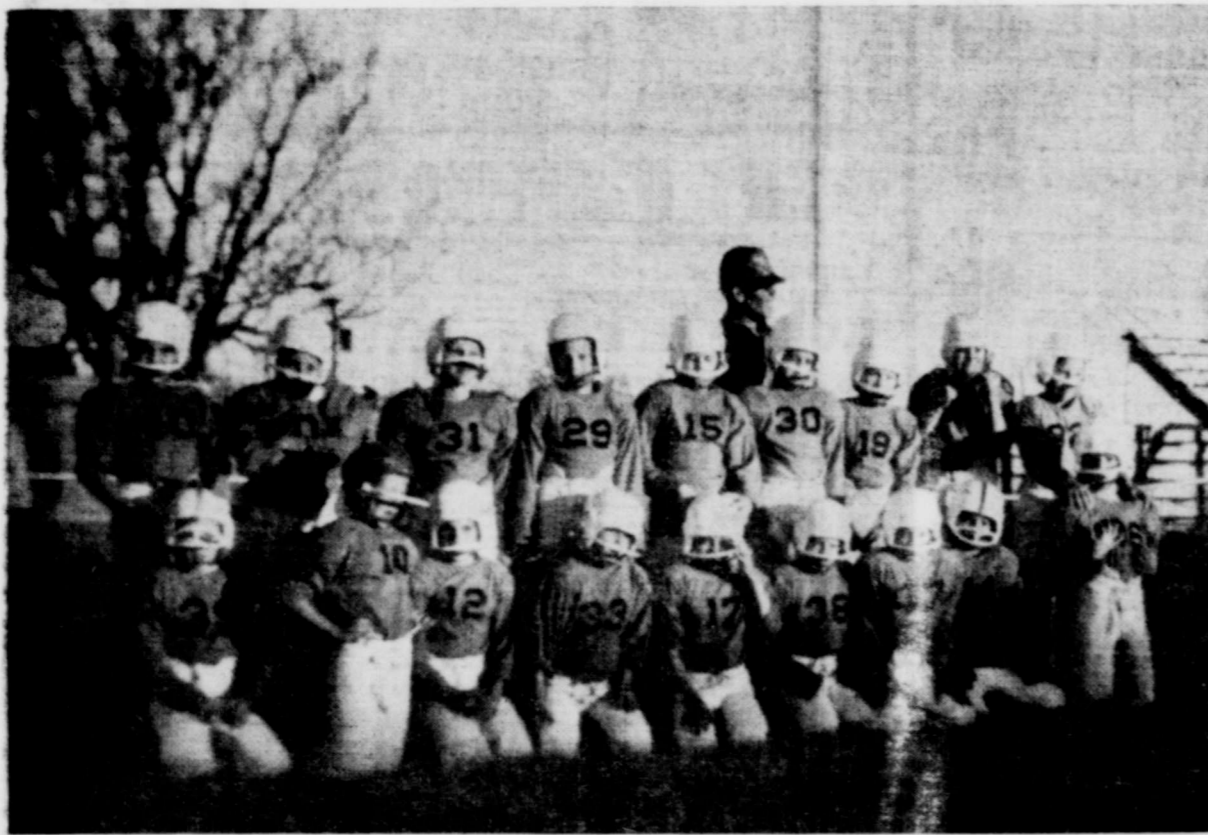
