Rodeo & Parade Queen Contests Underway

The Rodeo and parade queen contests for the forthcoming annual Boomtown Rodeo got underway this week with several clubs participating in the event.

Rodeo queen will be determined by the organization selling the largest amount of rodeo tickets. The queen will ride a horse in the parade and in the

grand entry at each rodeo performance and will represent Burkburnett at the Fort Worth Stock Show and Exposition in Feb., 1960. The contest will end

at 9:00 a. m. June 15, 1959. Parade queen will be determined by the organization selling the largest number of votes at one cent a vote. Proceeds of

this contest are pledged to the swimming pool fund, the queen and court will ride in the parade in convertibles. The contest will end at 5:00 p. m. June 13.

Rodeo Tickets To Go On Sale Next Tuesday

Rodeo tickets, both general admission and reserved seats will go on sale all over town next Tuesday morning. Many clubs have entered candidates for Rodeo Queen, which will be decided on a point basis from ticket sales. Representatives of each club having a candidate are invited to be at the Chamber of Commerce office next Tuesday morning when tickets will be issued. Some kind of block system is being worked out, whereby all clubs will have an equal number of the most desirable tickets.

Van Guard

"ARMED FORCES WEEK", to be observed from May 11th to 16th, should have special significance this year when the experts are arguing whether these forces are too many or too few and the cold war is getting warmer and warmer.

And on May 15th, designated as "National Defense Transportation Day" the humble moving van will be revealed as a hitherto secret weapon. It is a little known fact, for instance, that most of the electronic-brain computers activating the Nike defenses of our big cities were wrapped in blankets and moved like mother's fine china smoothly and swiftly from the factory to the missile sites by van.

In the first move of its kind in history, one of the nation's largest movers, North American Van Lines, transported the household goods of 240 Army families, an entire army battle group from Fort Bragg, N. C., to points all over Europe. Loaded and padded in furniture vans at Fort Bragg, the furniture and household effects remained untouched until unloaded at the new quarters in Europe—a maneuver made possible by the Navy's newly-commissioned "roll-on roll-off" USS Comet combined with North American's world-wide agent network.

At home, the dislocations, upheaval and added transport burdens of war time are colossal. Apart from the tremendous volume of military personnel, material and supplies constantly on the move, families of fightingmen consolidate, for reasons of economy and morale; industrial plants move and expand and thousands of workers, joining the production battle, move to new locations. A North American official describes the World War II domestic scene as "the biggest and most jumbled migration in the history of the world." But if and when history repeats, the 4,000 interstate moving firms can make available to this vital aspect of any war effort nearly half a million vans.

With continued peace, the ultimate goal of all defense activity, there is still plenty of moving. It is estimated that 400 million Americans will change homes this year, and doubtless many will be going to our 49th state, their goods traveling in North American vans, the only ones which use the Alcan Highway. And, as specialists in moving factories and businesses, a North American van on Main street can well mean a new industry coming to town.

It seems odd to think of the moving van, the tank and the guided missile in the same context. But it is no odder, perhaps, than the memory of Parisian taxicabs rushing troops to the front in World War I.

The Point Of Diminishing Returns

Taxes—and most particularly excise taxes—can easily reach a point of diminishing return. In other words, they become so high that sale of the products to which they apply sag, and in the long run government gets less revenue than it would from a lesser tax. This principal applies to the gasoline tax with full force.

The president of the Ohio Oil Company points out that the average motorist now pays state and federal gas taxes totaling 9c a gallon, which works out to more than 40% of the retail price of gas excluding tax. Now it is proposed that the federal tax be boosted by a whopping 50%—from 3c to 4½c a gallon. He says of this: This can only have a retarding effect upon gasoline sales. And at some point, motorists will be given sufficient incentive to curtail their purchases of gasoline to the extent that the taxes will produce less revenue rather than more for the taxing agencies.

You can take a horse to water but you can't make him drink. You can boost the gas tax to any level—but you can't prevent motorists from paring their driving to the limit and thus defeating the very purpose of these taxes. A 40% tax on an absolute necessity is certainly big enough and then some.

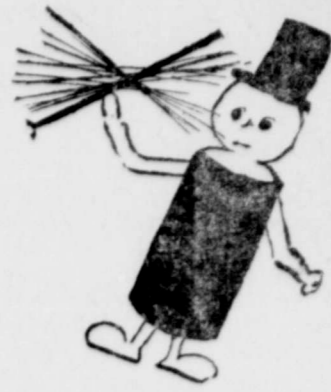
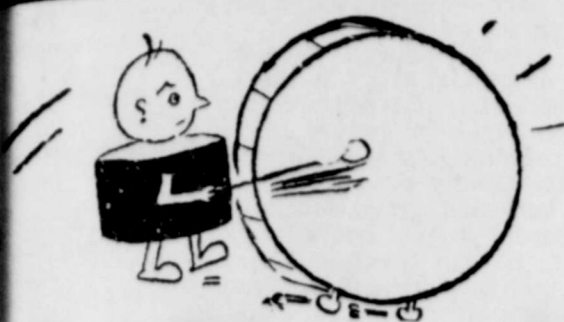

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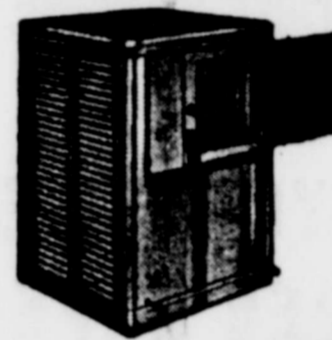

Burk Burnett school officials and officers from Sheppard Air Force Base Thursday morning participated in ground-breaking ceremonies...

Maj. Gen. James H. Wallace, commanding general of Sheppard, and Supt. I. C. Evans turned the second and third spades of dirt.

Construction of the 12 classroom school began immediately after the ceremonies with Jan. 17th as the target date for completion.

The Burk Burnett school board has asked General Wallace and his staff to submit a name for the new school.

No principal has been named for the school, which is expected to be in use for the spring term

for the post are being considered next year. Several applicants for the post are being considered.

Other Burk Burnett men taking part in Thursday's ground-breaking were Weldon Nix, secretary of the school board; board members Harold Preston, Herman Miller and Dub Zimmerman; Alvin Hill, Paul Browning, George Byerly and Geo. Counter.

Roy Mitchell and Clyde McDonnell are other members of the board.

Representing Sheppard Air Force Base were General Wallace; Col. Frank X. Krebs, Deputy commander and Col. Frank Gallo, commander of the air base group.

Extra Caution Should Be Taken To Make Home Safe for Children

Last year 936 Texans under 15 years old were killed in accidents. Most met death on the highway, or at home. Last year 1142 Texans in all died in home accidents.

National statistics show a little more than half of non-fatal accidental injuries to children under 15 occur in the home. Nearly 5,500 children die each year as a result of home accidents.

Just how safe is your home? Especially, how safe is your home for your children?

Even if it is fireproof, moth-proofed, leakproofed, and rust-free—is it child proofed?

Here are some suggestions for helping your children avoid accidents in and around your home. Always keep matches in metal containers, out of reach from small hands.

Be absolutely certain none of your gas fixtures leak. Use metal pipe connections, not flexible tubing which may fray and leak with use.

Check all your electrical connections, wires and appliances for frays, shorts and bare wires. Either buy new or repair any which look dangerous. Tape over unused electric outlets or plugs in the special appliances available for that purpose.

Keep stairs free of all objects to prevent tripping and falling. Train your child from the start to put his toys away. It isn't only safer, but much easier on a busy mother.

While children are young, use table mats rather than table cloths that hang over the table edge. A pot of hot coffee or bowl of soup can easily be pulled down on himself by a toddler.

Keep sewing baskets, scissors, and other constantly used hazardous articles on a shelf or in a drawer that can't be reached by children. This applies to all kitchen utensils as well.

Turn handles of pans on the stove away from the front of the stove, so that your child can't pull them over. Buy a stove whose controls are out of reach of toddlers.

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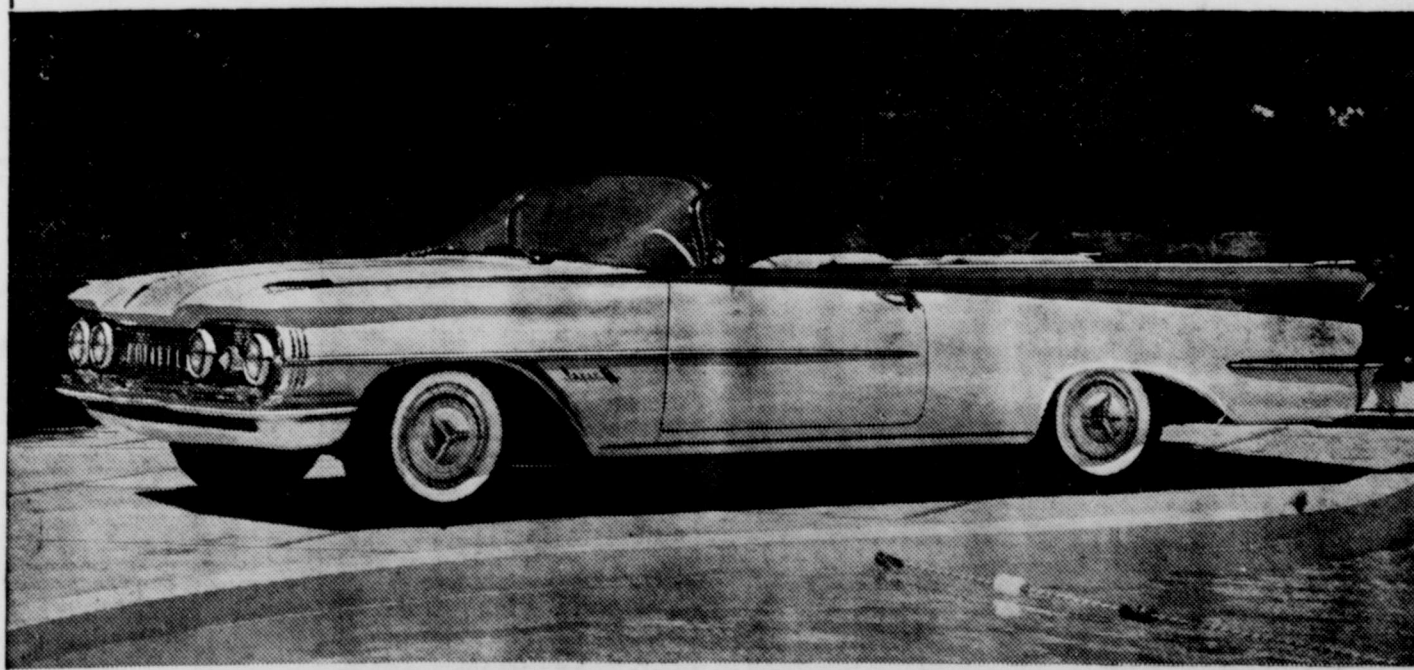

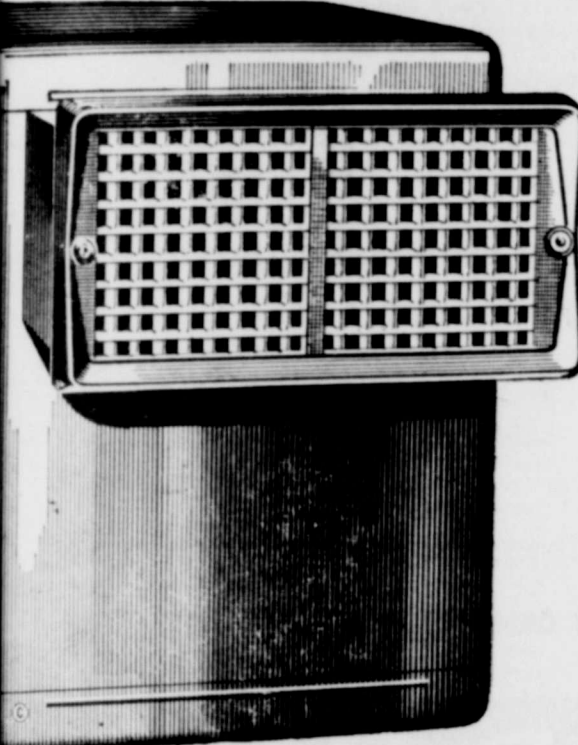

News From The Congress

The House has approved this week a bill making appropriations for the Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare and Labor for the fiscal year 1960. This bill makes available the money for a study of water quality in the Arkansas-Red River Basins. As we have noted heretofore, this study will deal with the sources of natural pollution. Among the streams that will be thoroughly examined will be the Pease River and the Big and Little Wichita Rivers as well as all of the other tributaries of the Red River. It is hoped that these studies which will take approximately two years will point the way to effective control of the gyp and salt that contaminates the water of these streams.

It's The Law In Texas

AVOID LEGAL TROUBLES IN REAL ESTATE TRANSACTION

Thinking of buying or building a new home this year? Whether you buy a completed house or simply a lot to build on, how will you know whether you are receiving a good title to the property you purchase? The safest method is to have a title examination made—that is, a careful study of the abstracts and other title evidence.

Here are a few of the common sources of trouble in real estate transactions to show why the minor expense of a title examination is justified.

Many persons sign "earnest money contracts" believing they are mere receipts with no serious implications. In reality they may specify, among other things that Hawaii will not ratify its statehood and officially become the fiftieth State until after the Fourth of July when Alaska will officially enter the Union; however, the Flag manufacturers have hesitated to manufacture the 49-Star Flags and are now only making them on special order.

A "warranty deed" from a responsible seller is comforting to have but it is a poor substitute for a careful title examination. A warranty deed does not guarantee a marketable title.

Moreover, serious title defects may not come to light until long after the seller on a warranty deed, has moved to an unknown address, or is bankrupt. Even if he is available, a good title is much better than a law suit.

The fact that the seller has possession of an "abstract" does not mean that he owns the property.

An abstract is only a history of a title. Possession of an abstract no more indicates ownership of land than possession of the history of Texas means that you own the state.

Some purchasers of land feel safe because the title is being examined at the time of purchase by an attorney for the mortgage lenders. This seems logical but is a dangerous theory. Mortgage lenders are sometimes willing to accept less than good record title as security. This is sound business for them because, among other reasons, the chances are that the mortgage will be paid off so that no expense in perfecting the title would ever need be incurred. It is risky business for you when you are putting your life savings into the purchase.

These are a few of the reasons why a title examination is an important safeguard to you. When it is completed, the attorney gives you a written opinion stating his conclusions as to who owns the land, the defects in or charges against such ownership and the requirements to be met if any to make good record title.

Off hand this may seem a simple operation. In fact it is. It requires the interpretation of numerous deeds, mortgages, wills, court decrees and other instruments; the consideration of the order in which transactions and events affecting the title occurred; and the application of statutes and court decisions to the various situations disclosed in the abstract.
