Burk Woman Hurt In Death Crash

A head-on collision 2 1/2 miles north of Wichita Falls on Burk Burnett highway took the life of Alva Orville Perry, 62, of Lawton, Okla., and injured Mrs. Paul Burk of Burk Burnett.

The collision occurred near the Midway service station on US-277-281 at about 10:45 a. m. Wednesday.

State highway patrolman Bob McWhorter investigated. He said there were no other occupants of the cars. An Owens and Brumley ambulance took Mrs. Burk and Perry to Wichita General Hospital emergency room, where the man was pronounced dead on arrival at 11:10 a. m.

Mrs. Burk sustained a possible fracture of the right leg, and cuts on the right knee, lips, and face.

Highway patrolman McWhorter said Perry's automobile was on its side in the middle of the road, and that the car driven by Mrs. Burk was on the shoulder of the highway, facing east.

Spring brings a variety of hungry insects out of hiding. Its time to stock the garden shelf with ammunition to protect flowers, shrubs, grass and trees from damage, says Thelma Wirges, Co. HD agent.

There is no one miracle insecticide. You will need at least 4 different packages on the shelf. Include DDT, chlordane, poison bait and malathion.

Malathion spray or dust will kill aphids, lace bugs and red spider mites. Use a spray for white flies and young scale in the crawling stage.

A 10 percent chlordane dust will kill out worms, leaf eating caterpillars, sowbugs, termites, flea hoppers, grasshoppers, cedar bag worms and many kinds of beetles. It is our best control for red ants.

A 10 percent DDT dust will control thrips, blister beetles and other beetles, army worms and many other worms. It also kills some of the insects mentioned above such as lace bugs, pill bugs, sowbugs and termites.

Use bait for slugs and snails. It also kills sowbugs and other insects. Fine ground bug bait is as effective as the large pellets and is not eaten by birds.

To get best results from insecticides, read directions on the package carefully and follow them as given. Also check for safety precautions in use. Some insecticides are very deadly.

The best way to keep accurate records on your operation is to set a certain time aside each night to record the days costs and receipts. This will eliminate guess work and estimation which may cause mistakes and inaccuracies. Accurate records can help you in several ways. One is in determining the profit or loss of each operation. Good records will clearly show this. Another important use of records is for income tax reporting. Day to day records are the best evidence you can have to substantiate your tax payment. Don't get caught behind the eight ball. Keep your records up to date.

If You Are Wondering

A special factual study on oil well drilling costs has just been issued by a group of industry associations—and it gives dramatic testimony to the huge risks U. S. oil men are taking in their constant search for new sources and reserves of oil.

The study is based on 1955 and 1956 data—the most recent available. Some findings:

Oil men and oil companies invested close to \$5.5 billion in drilling some 113,000 wells in those two years. Of this, more than \$1.6 billion went down the drain in the form of dry and worthless holes in the ground.

The average cost per well went up from \$46,500 in 1955, to \$50,200 in 1956.

Drilling costs skyrocketed as depths increased. For example, wells over 15,000 feet ran nearly 29 times more than those in relatively shallow areas of 2,500 to 3,750 feet.

Costs of offshore wells in the Gulf of Mexico averaged almost nine times more than those on dry land.

If anyone wonders why oil producers are given a 27 1-2% depletion allowance, to help compensate for the enormous risks involved in looking for new wells to replace those that wear out, here's their answer. The risk incentive that allowance provides is absolutely essential to oil exploration.

People Read, Remember, and Buy

A recent nationwide survey shows that more than three-quarters of the nation's retailers expect their summer business to exceed last year's. Editor and Publisher reports. Only 20% anticipate no change, and a mere 2% look for a decline.

It will take a lot of good advertising to bring the expected results about. And it's significant that newspapers will continue to be the retailers' foremost advertising medium. The survey shows that 72% of the stores surveyed plan to invest 80% or more of their summer advertising spending in the papers. And 57% will allocate at least nine-tenths of their ad budget to the papers.

All advertising media are in tough competition these days, with newspapers, magazines, TV, radio, and direct mail scrapping for a larger share of the ad dollar. But newspapers, despite the new media, hold their own—simply because newspaper ads get results. People read, remember, and buy.

FIRST THINGS FIRST

More and more people—and with every reason—have come to believe that one trouble with this country's educational systems is that too much money is spent on unnecessary luxuries and frills, at the expense of educational necessities.

In the light of this, something that happened a short time ago at Portland State College in Portland, Oregon, has much more than local significance.

It was proposed that certain additions be made to the College Center—among them a bowling alley and a barber shop. But the students' own College Center Board voted the plan down, by a 4-to-1 majority.

In part, the Board's resolution read: "... facilities for student entertainment and personal services are in abundance in the Portland Metropolitan Area, thereby making it unnecessary and even wasteful for large amounts of state and student funds to be spent in these areas of the college. . . . The students of Portland State are more interested in education than in services."

Community after community, the small as well as the large, have gone overboard in building almost unbelievably expensive plants. The primary educational need is to allocate as much of the available money as possible to purposes where it will honestly serve true educational ends—such as salary structures that will make teaching more attractive to competent and ambitious people.

Public relations is the most dynamic force in industry today but industry does not know how to use it.
