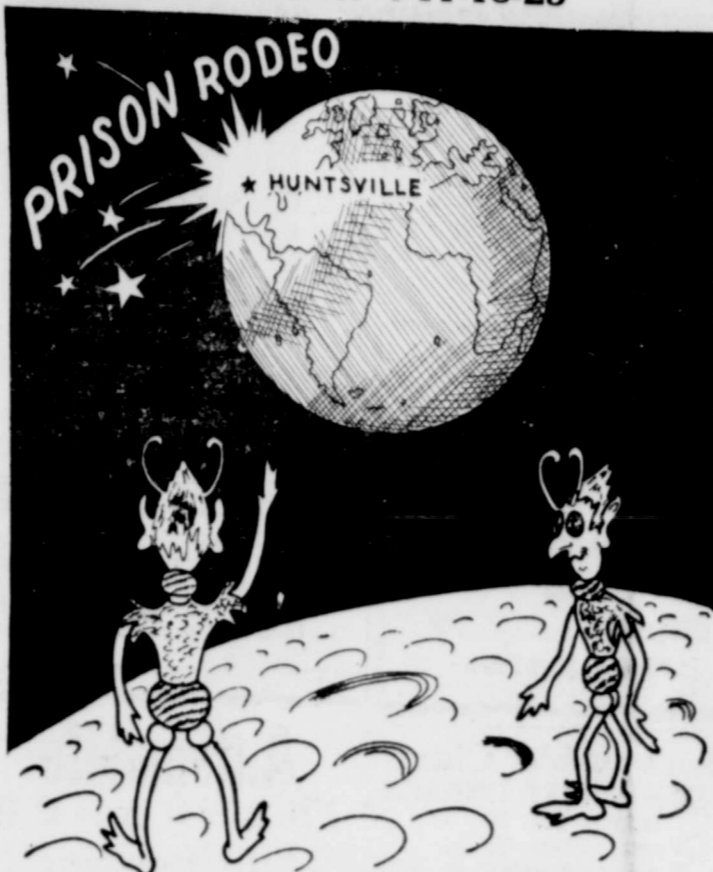
This would seem to be a full time assignment in itself, but Ellzey also serves as commander of the 1100 Air Base Squadron at Bolling Air Force Base here.

## Health Service Ok's Burk Grant

A \$155,000 grant from the U. S. Public Health Service will probably enable Burkburnett to begin its \$799,000 sewer expansion and improvement project by November 1, according to A. W. Newman, city manager.

The grant was approved Friday afternoon.

Newman said the city was now waiting only for authorization from the state health department to advertise for bids.

A \$400,000 bond issue approved last month, coupled with money from the sale of the city's municipal electric plant to Texas Electric Service Co. in July completes the needed financing for the project.

The project will provide Burkburnett with a new sewage disposal plant and installation of sewer lines in about 75 percent of the city which now uses septic tanks for sanitary purposes.

A 20 acre site for the new sewage disposal plant was bought for \$2,500 by the City Thursday. It is located northeast of the city.

## Sept. 27-Oct. 2 Declared Youth Participation Week

More than a million Junior and Senior High school students and their parents will discuss problems and their possible solutions for children and youth during the week of Sept. 27 to Oct. 2nd, according to Dr. Guy D. Newman, Chairman of the Governor's committee for the 1960 White House Conferences on Children and Youth.

Governor Price Daniel has officially declared Sept. 27-Oct. 2, as Youth Participation Week for the White House conference on Children and Youth. All public and private junior and senior high schools were requested by Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar to devote some time during this week to discussion of problems of youth and their ideas of possible solution. Parents will do the same through their local PTA units, according to Mrs. W. D. deGrassi, State President. This involves more than a million Texans.

Each school will report the ideas of their students and these will be a part of Texas' report to the White House Conference. The Discussion Guides were formulated by the young people on the Governor's committee for the White House Conference and are in the language of the teenager.

"From the young people themselves we hope to learn what they consider to be their problems and their ideas for solution said Dr. Guy D. Newman.

## Texas-Ok. Fair Is Spotting Army Progress

A U. S. Army exhibit depicting the Army's progress in meeting the challenge of the nuclear age, and featuring an actual Hawk missile, will be unveiled at the Texas-Oklahoma Fair, Iowa Park, Tex., Sept. 28th-Oct. 3rd, it was announced today.

Coming to Iowa Park from Washington, D. C. the Army's Cavalcade of Progress exhibit shows some of the end products of the military's research and development program with emphasis on operational combat equipment.

Purpose of the official exhibit is to point up some of the truly significant military developments often overshadowed by the dramatic impact of guided missiles and satellite launchings.

Spotlighted in the exhibit is the U. S. Army's Hawk, a fantastic surface to air guided missile that can swoop down and destroy enemy aircraft at tree top level. The Army's sleek 16-foot low altitude killer is ringed American cities as a fixed installation weapon complementing the existing high altitude aerial defense now provided by the Army's Nike system.

The exhibit dramatically illustrates America's rapid technological advances with an Army of military developments including a belt radio, flame thrower, the Army's new rifle and the world's light bulb one tenth of an inch in length.

Utilizing an original presentation technique developed by the Army called "Orthoramas," the exhibit denotes Army progress in mobility, firepower, communications, and human resources. A color motion picture showing some of the Army's more advanced weapons, including scenes of actual missile firings, is also featured.

U. S. Army information specialists will be on hand to answer questions posed by the public. Admission is free of charge.

## What Price Government?

A statistical research firm has figured out that the "average man" in the United States makes almost \$100 a week—and pays \$25.23 of this in taxes. Eight years ago this "average man" paid 22% of his earnings in taxes. He now pays 25.3%.

Heavy as the tax burden is on individuals, it falls even more heavily on corporations. The president of the Northern States Power Company recently told the company's shareholders:

"The total taxes for Northern States Power Company in 1958 amounted to \$2.71 per share of common stock, or more than twice our actual earnings of \$1.30 per share. Compared with the declared dividends of \$1.00 per share of common stock, our tax bill was 2.71 times as large. Thus government without any investment gets more than twice as much out of our business as the common shareholders."

As long as government is necessary, taxes will be necessary. And as long as government continues to expand, taxes must expand also. Considering the price, doesn't it seem probable that we are already paying for more government than we actually need?

He is the only fellow in the world who will pay 50 cents to park his car while he eats a 25 cent sandwich.

An American likes to cuss his government but gets fighting mad if a foreigner does it.

We're the country that has more food to eat than any other country in the world and more diets to keep us from eating it. We're the most ambitious people on earth, and we run from morning until night trying to keep our earning power up with our yearning power.

We're supposed to be the most civilized, Christian nation on earth, but still can't deliver payrolls without an armored car.

In America we have more experts on marriage than any other

country in the world—and more divorces.

But we're still pretty nice folks. Calling a person "a real American" is the best compliment we can pay him. Most of the world is itching for what we have but they will never have it until they start scratching for it the way we did.

"This engine," said Wolfram, "will give our customers an improvement of 15 percent in miles per dollar, maintaining excellent performance."

In all series there are new rear axle ratios and many other engineering advancements. Two three seat Fiestas have been added to Oldsmobile's station wagon line.

"From the trim curved grille to the clean sweep of the rear deck, the 1960 Oldsmobile is the finest automobile we have ever built," Wolfram said.

"The balanced design of the car is new from every view—front, side and rear. We believe the new Oldsmobile has the styling our customers want, the full family spaciousness they need and the luxurious interiors they asked," he said.

Bright chrome plated bars in groups of three give the 1960

Oldsmobile curved grille a wide, stable look even though the car itself is no wider than the 1959 models. Headlights are placed horizontally with the outboard pair set slightly behind the inboard pair. The parking lights are safely recessed in the wrap around section of the bumper where they can be easily seen from front or side.

The lower and slightly rounded styling of the new front end aid maneuverability of the 1960 Oldsmobile, Wolfram said, especially in tight parking situations.

"Used with the new standard 2.87 to 1 axle ratio and Oldsmobile's Jet-Away Hydra-Matic Transmission, the owner of the 1960 Dynamic "88" Oldsmobile may expect a 15 percent improvement in miles per dollar," Wolfram said.

## Internal Revenue Service

Taxpayers writing to the Internal Revenue Service or calling the Internal Revenue Service are advised to be very careful to use the same name that appears on their tax return, by Clarence B. Dixon, Administrative Officer of the Wichita Falls office.

The Dallas District office deals with more than two million taxpayers in the northern half of Texas. Mr. Dixon explained, "There are more than 2000 J. Jones alone who filed an income tax return in the Dallas District during the past year. The chances are good that there are several people with exactly the same name as yours who have filed a tax return. Thousands of taxpayers move each year so the Internal Revenue Service cannot rely upon the address as a method of identification. When taxpayers use an initial, a nickname, or only part of their name, this complicates matters and our problem of identifying the taxpayer becomes greater.

The Dallas District writes thousands of letters each year to taxpayers to determine whether he is the J. Jones who used to live on Main Street in Dallas or the J. Jones in East Texas or possibly West Texas.

If the tax payer write you for information they would appreciate your returning a copy of their letter with your reply. The IRS letter helps determine which taxpayers the tax problem belongs to.

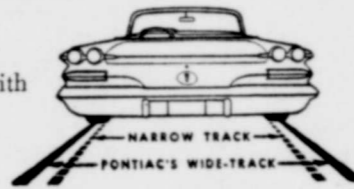
