The Atom's Future

The possibilities inherent in the peaceful application of nuclear energy, especially in the electric power field, have captured much public imagination. That is natural, this form of energy is dramatic, new and strange. But there is a danger that so great an emphasis will be placed on atomic power development that we will tend to forget the essentiality of fostering continued development of adequate supplies of conventional fuels, coals, oil, gas.

That warning has been given Congress by president Sporn of the American Electric Power Company. He implemented it with certain predictions, based on available data.

By 1975 the nation's electric requirement will be far larger than at present, and nuclear energy will have its place in meeting the demand. Even so, Mr. Sporn estimates, only about 7.5 percent will be atom generated. The rest will come from conventional sources. Thereafter, the importance of nuclear energy will grow. Between 1975 and 2000 nuclear power is expected to account for more than 75 percent of the increase in electric generation. But the year 2000 needless to say, is a long way off.

The fact is that nuclear energy is simply a fuel which, when used, replaces another fuel. And the cost of fuel is a relatively modest part of the total cost of providing electric service. There is absolutely no foundation for the idea that atom-generated power would be so cheap that it wouldn't be worthwhile to meter its use. Meanwhile, the utility industry, and other interested groups, are hard at work learning more and more of the secrets of the atom, in preparation for the day when nuclear power will be economical and practical.

Analgesia, We Love You

Americans are a nation in love with analgesia. Aspirin could be the national symbol. We swallow it by the barrelful. It lets us keep doing things that cause headaches without worrying about the headaches that follow.

This penchant for enjoying the cause and trying to dodge the effects spread over into the art of camouflage. Is there an ugly fact you don't want to face? Paint it pink. Do taxes bother you? Accommodating congressmen have hidden hundreds, and Uncle Sam will deduct the others before you get your pay check. Forget them and negotiate with the boss for more take home pay.

Your area would like a new dam, sewage plant or hospital but doesn't have the ready cash? Ask Uncle Sam to finance it. He's giving money away free. Or is he?

There's a similarity between communities rushing to get "easy" federal money to solve local problems and the Saturday football hero who dopes himself with pain-killer to keep running on a broken ankle. He doesn't feel much pain today. Tomorrow he discovers the trick he payed was on himself. And the joke is pretty grim.

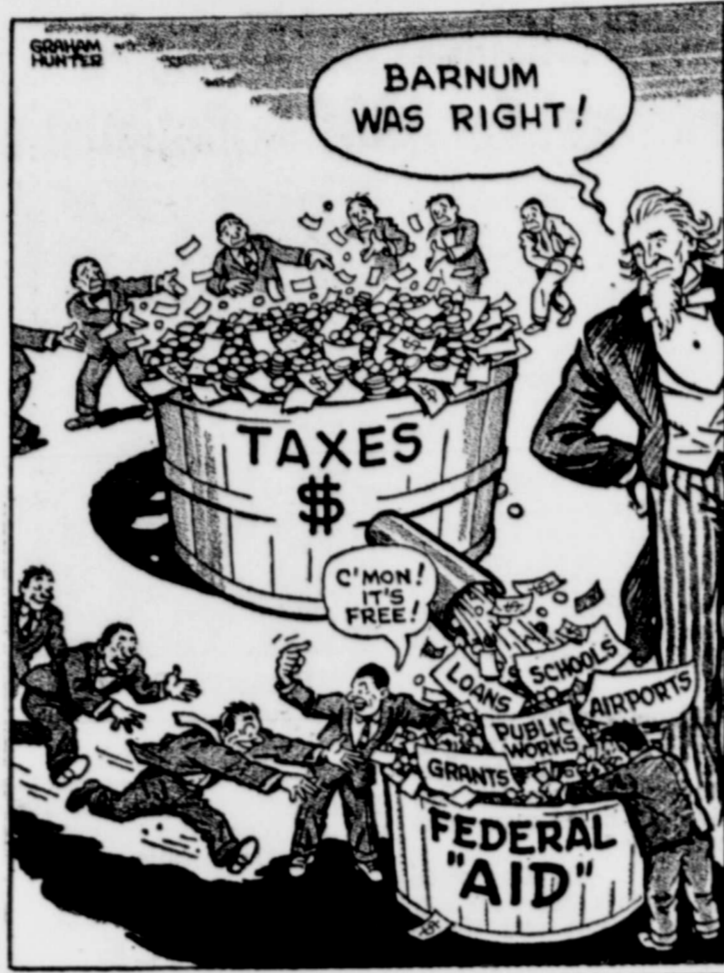

Report From England

Polls taken recently have shown that many of America's young people lean toward nationalization of the railroads, utilities and other basic industries. They feel, apparently, that government can do a better job than private enterprise in some areas.

If you find you have a budding socialist in your home, you might want him to read these figures from England, where nationalization was the order of the day when the Labour Party took power after World War II.

A poll of almost two million Britons shows that 63.5% want no more nationalization. Only 18.6% want more, and 17.9% had no opinion. Oddly, 41.7% of the Labour Party, which dreamed up nationalization as a policy in the first place, want no more of it. Only 36.2% still want more, and 22.1% had no opinion.

The British gave government ownership of industry a long try, and found themselves falling behind in the production competition with non-nationalized European countries. Industries which had made profits turned in losses under government ownership. Those which had experienced small losses turned in larger ones. Strikes were as frequent as before.

Some months ago, denationalization of a number of steel mills was accomplished, and the nation breathed a sigh of relief. Meanwhile, another survey shows that Britain's famed national health scheme is costing more than the old private medical practice system, service is poorer, taxes will have to be raised and fees must be charged for services that originally were planned to be free.

Britain is gradually retreating from socialism, and with every retreat her economy takes another spurt. Tell the young 'uns.

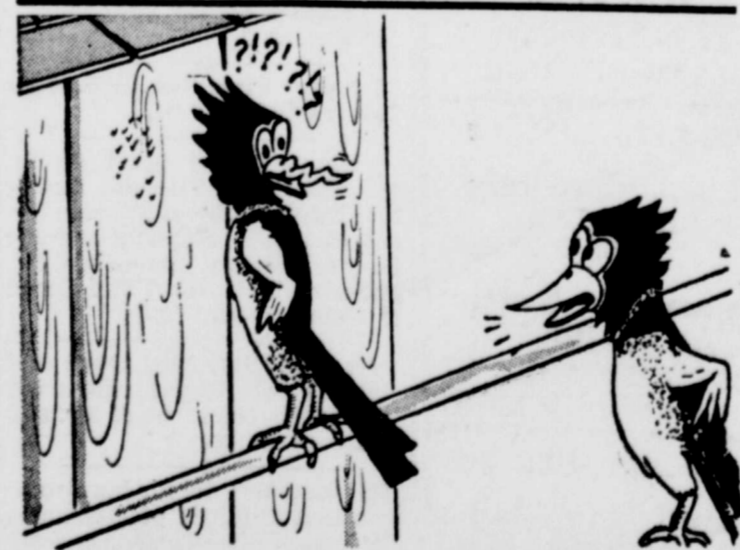

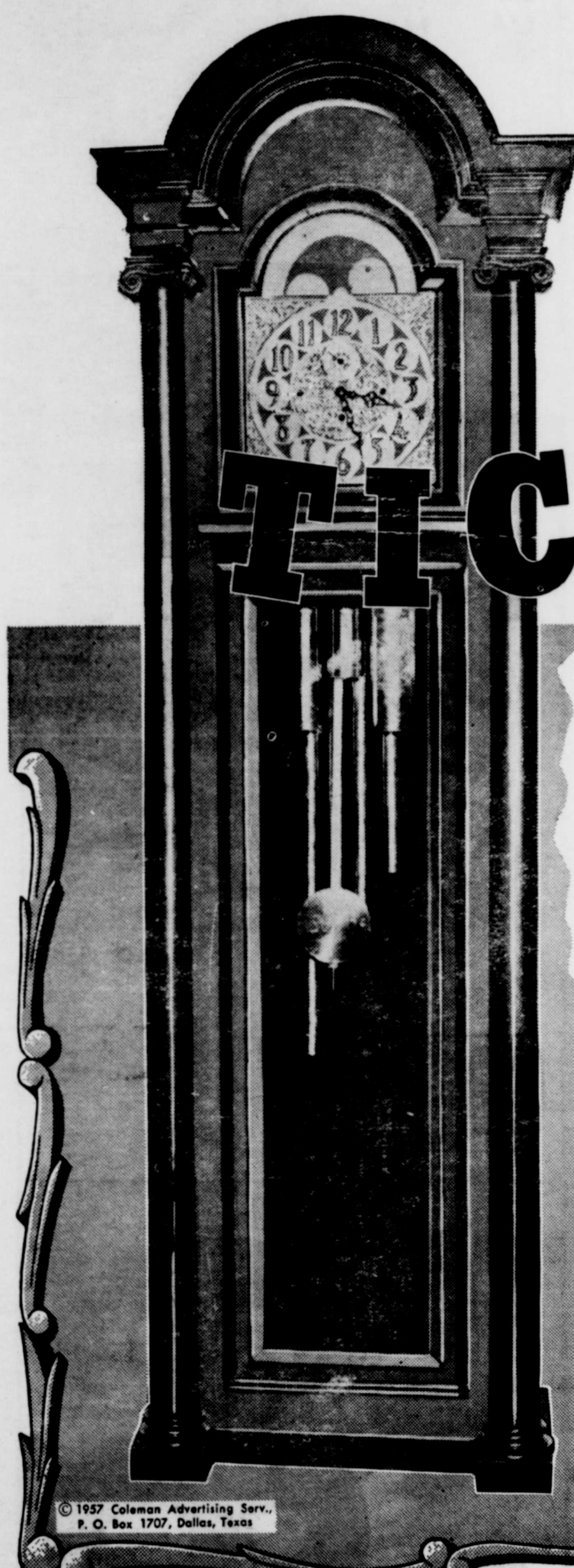
