Final Knockout Near For Polio

Parents and physicians throughout the country are following with intent interest an important mass medical experiment now under way in Florida. All 520,000 residents of Miami and Dade County under 40 are being given a new oral polio vaccine in a test under standard set up by the US Public Health Service. Conducting the project are the Dade County Medical Association and Board of Health and the University of Miami Medical School.

The new vaccine is described in the March Reader's Digest by Paul deKruif in an article from today's Health, an American Medical Association publication, as a safe, cherry-flavored liquid that promises long, lasting immunity from a single dose taken by mouth. It will cost less than previous vaccines and should be available this year, reports the article.

It is the result of 13 years work by Dr. Herald Cox and his associates at American Cyanamid's Lederle Laboratories at Pearl River, N. Y. He started with the fact that the best virus vaccines, those against smallpox and yellow fever, are made not from killed but living, weakened midget microbes. His group weakened strains of all three types of polio virus.

Dr. Cox took the first dose himself in 1950. Tests followed in Sonoma, Calif., and in 1957 at the University of Minnesota, then in many South American countries. "It has been subjected to far more extensive tests than has any other vaccine before being made available for general use," writes deKruif. "Before the single dose, three-in-one vaccine became available almost two million single-strain doses were given to approximately 700,000 people."

Unlike the Salk vaccine, which contains a killed polio virus, the new vaccine uses a live virus weakened below the danger point. Also, unlike the killed vaccine it is taken by mouth. Whereas, three or four injections of killed vaccine are now recommended, the new live-virus vaccine may provide immunity for several years with its one dose. These advantages are obvious.

Until Government authorities approve, the new vaccine will not be available and present immunization programs should continue, says the Digest article. But the Florida test may be the big final victory in mankind's long war again crippling polio.

Was the speaker an American Fourth of July orator? No, he is Sen. Arturo Uslar Pietri, who arose in the Venezuelan congress to reply to an attack on the United States by a Communist senator. Sen. Pietri continued:

"The United States is a country which was founded in the name of principles respected by all men. Those principles are liberty, respect for human dignity, representative government, observance of law, repulsion of violence, acceptance of justice."

In this day when quite a few Americans (not so many, really, it just seems so because they get into the public print and onto radio and television so often) seem to be almost ashamed to be Americans, it remains for a Latin American to tell us the truth about our own country. To continue with Sen. Pietri's splendid statement: "The history of the international life of the United States is extraordinarily clear when compared with any other great power." True, every word of it.

But how long is it since you have read or heard such words from those voluble Americans who wish to surrender portions of our national sovereignty to some international organizations?

Or from those strange creatures who would have us quit nuclear tests permanently and unilaterally, in the vain hope that Russia would then follow suit?

Or from those Americans who, appearing to be suffering from an inexplicable gulf complex because this country is so far advanced beyond others, feel that we should tax ourselves heavily in perpetuity to help the remainder of the world?

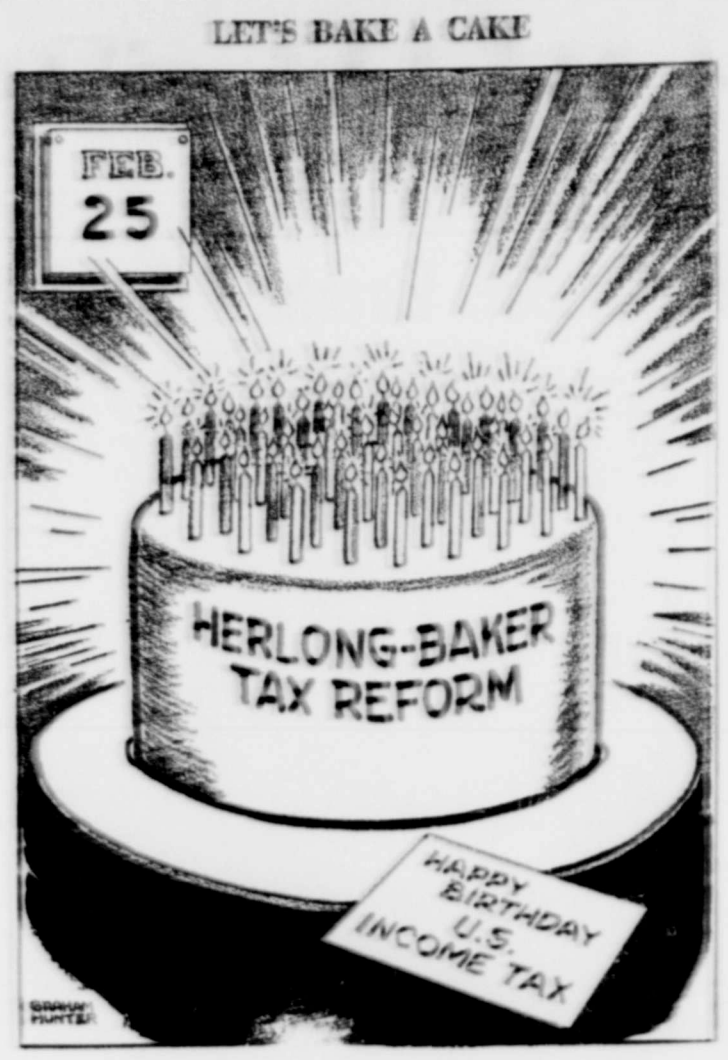
GRASS ROOTS OPINION

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Toward A Happier Return

The U. S. income tax will be 47 years old Feb. 25th. Does anyone want to sing "Happy Birthday" to celebrate the joyous occasion?

When it was born in 1913, few people foresaw how the tax would grow. It started with a nibble of one to six percent. Now it gobbles 20 to 91 percent. The result has been to eat up savings and capital and stunt the growth of national economy.

A way to curb the damage has been suggested by Congressmen Howard Baker of Tennessee and A. S. Herlong of Florida, with the backing of five other Representatives from Indiana, Texas and Tennessee. They are sponsoring legislation to reduce the income tax rate in every bracket. Their proposal would ease the bite on all taxpayers. In addition, they predict the lower rates would spur economic growth which soon would put tax revenues back at the present level or even higher.

We wish Congress would observe the 47th birthday of the income tax by adopting the Herlong-Baker bills. It would mark the birth of a better day for taxpayers, and for the economy.

National FAA Week Feb. 20-27

Future Farmers of America members throughout the nation are scheduling special activities to focus public attention on the work of their organization during National FFA Week, February 20-27.

Membership in the FFA is made up of farm boys who are students of vocational agriculture in high school. The organization's activities are designed primarily to help develop rural leadership and good citizenship, and to stimulate the boys to better achievement in their study and work toward successful establishments in farming.

The Burk FFA chapter has 41 members. Officers are: President, Jimmy Wolf; vice president, Don Craig; Reporter, Joe Bob Penn; treasurer, Dexter Kinnett; Secretary, Jerry Darter; Sentinel, Larry Jack Elliott. The national Future Farmers organization has 380,000 members, with 9,000 local chapters in the 50 states and Puerto Rico. Membership in Texas totals 40,000.

Future Farmers choose the week of George Washington's birthday each year for the observance of National FFA Week. Although usually recognized as a Revolutionary War General and our first President, Washington's first love was the farm he called Mount Vernon. There, he was one of the first in the nation to practice contour planting, crop rotation, fertilization, and other soil conservation and improvement methods. It was more than a century after Washington's death before general use was made of many of the sound agricultural practices that he advocated.

YOUR NEW Social Security

Social Security rules also apply to farmers and ranchers.

According to Clarence B. Dixon of Internal Revenue Service, Wichita Falls, farm and ranch employers must report and pay social security taxes on cash wages paid to each farm and ranch worker whose total wages amounts to \$150 a year, or if the worker performs agricultural services on 20 or more days and receives cash wages on a time basis.

Mr. Dixon said that Internal Revenue has two free booklets for farmers, ranchers and their employees: Circular A, or the more comprehensive Farmers' Tax Guide, 1960 edition.

Although self-help by taxpayers is stressed again this year by Uncle Sam's collection agency the Internal Revenue phone number is 322-3165-66. Special taxpayer assistance day for especially knotty problems is every Monday from 8:30 a. m. to 12:30 p. m. The IRS office is located at 1090 Lamar St., Wichita Falls.

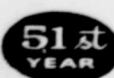

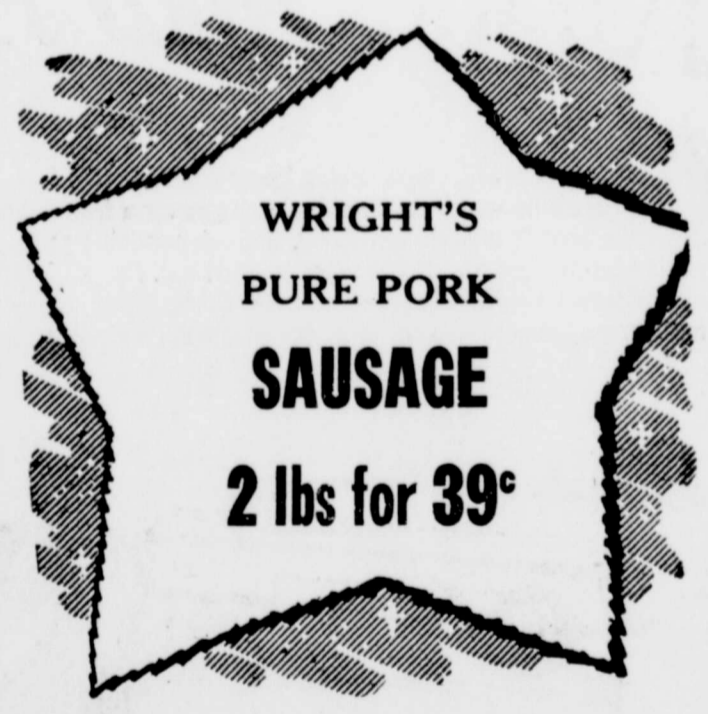

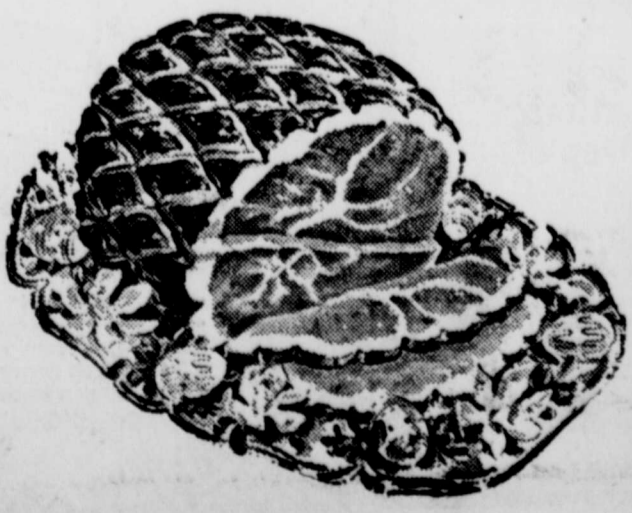

INCOME TAX FACTS

"Interest on U. S. Savings Bonds must be considered taxable income," Henry R. Hall of Internal Revenue Service, Wichita Falls advised taxpayers today.

If you are on the cash basis, you have an option as to when you may report the interest on your income tax return. You may want to report interest yearly. If you do it this way, the amount of interest to be included in income each year is given in the table on the bond.

The taxpayer may wait until the bonds are matured or cashed before reporting the interest earned. In this case the interest must be included as income for that year. Also, once the taxpayer begins to report interest yearly, he must continue with this plan, unless he is given permission to change to another method.

"Accrual method taxpayers must report interest on U. S. Savings Bonds each year as the interest accrues. They are not permitted to defer the reporting of interest until the bonds are cashed or matured," Mr. Hall concluded.

19 Rural Traffic Accidents in Jan.

The Highway Patrol Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety investigated 119 rural traffic accidents in Wichita County during the month of January according to Sgt. F. E. Webster.

In making this announcement the Sergeant reported 12 property damage, 6 injury and 1 fatal accidents. These wrecks

caused a total property damage of \$8,280, with 10 persons injured and one killed.

The Highway Patrol Supervisor pointed out that the motoring public has begun the new year with an improved traffic record. "You can help keep it that way in this county by doing two things," he added. "Know and obey traffic laws yourself and insist that your neighbors do likewise."

"The knowledge and observance of traffic laws on the part of the highway users is the best antidote we know for prevent-

ing traffic accidents.

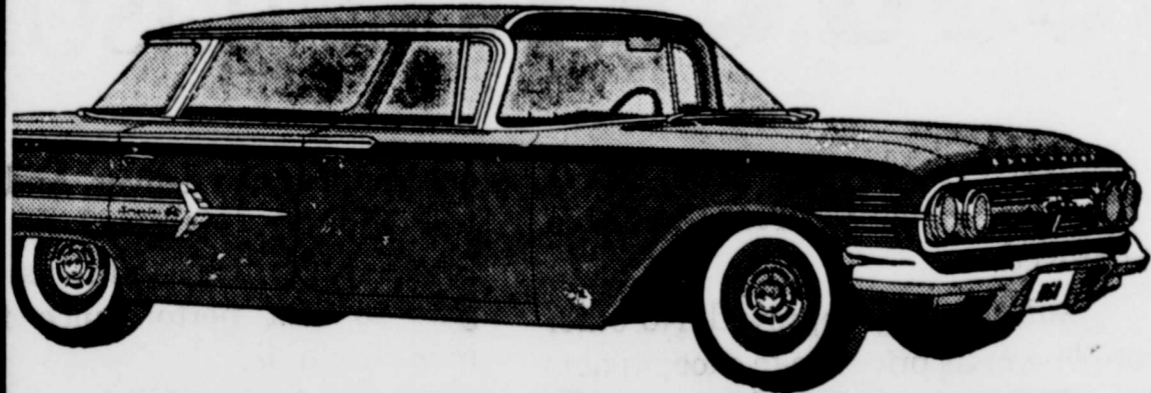

Texas City Using Gas Light Fixtures Formerly Used to Illuminate London



Gas lights in Bedford's Stonegate addition formerly illuminated the streets of London's borough of Westminster.

A new residential development at Bedford in Tarrant Co. Texas carries an English accent which features illumination of streets with gas lights formerly used in London during Queen Victoria's reign.

Negotiations for purchase of the gas lights began when the Stonegate Company, developers and builders, contacted the English president of the Anglo-Texas Society, Sir Alfred Bossom, asking for suggestions and information that might be used to re-create a genuine early English atmosphere in the development which has been named Stonegate.

Sir Alfred responded with a word that the borough of West-

minster in London, site of such as Westminster Abbey, the House of Parliament and Buckingham Palace was replacing the township's century old lamp posts and would be willing to make the gas lights available for adding an authentic historical note to Stonegate.

A half dozen of the columns, each weighing 784 pounds, have been installed on Bedford Road in Stonegate addition. They arrived by ship in Galveston and were hauled to Fort Worth for assembly by Lone Star Gas Co. Additional English gas lights will be used if they are available, but if enough cannot be procured American manufactured gas lights will be added

to cast a soft glow over Stonegate which has been planned to carry a British theme throughout.

The Stonegate Company received approval of the Bedford City Council to install the gas lights for street lighting. Each intersection of streets will have a gas light, and the longer blocks call for installation of a light midway between intersections.

The 350 acre residential development calls for a total of 1,000 houses to be built within five years, 220 of which are scheduled to be finished in 1960. Stonegate is said to be the only suburban area in the Southwest with all streets to be illuminated by gas lights.
