Police Department Given Vote of Confidence

Monday night the City Council met in a regularly scheduled meeting. The Council had granted a group of teenagers and an individual permission to appear before the Council and voice their complaints against the police department

For several hours City Council members sat there patiently, listening attentively and showed the complaintants every courtesy and consideration.

Some time during the hearings, members of the group ransacked the Coke machine, took the money and a number of bottled drinks. That in itself showed a great contempt for law and order and decency. Yet an even greater breach of good conduct was committed when one of the group picked up the microphone and cursed policemen in the patrol cars. The latter is a matter for the Federal Communications Commission to handle, and the Council is working with FCC authorities to bring the guilty to account for his most disgraceful act.

The records of the complaintants have been carefully studied and considered. After reviewing these records, and in view of the acts of misconduct of some of the complaintants in the City offices Monday night, the Council was called in a special meeting Wednesday afternoon, at which time the police department was given a unanimous vote of confidence, and the Council pledges its full support to the department in upholding law and order in

The Council will demand proper conduct and procedures from each officer in carrying out their duty. We ask the public to lend whatever assistance they can in co-operation with our police department in their efforts to uphold law and order in a manner acceptable to good citizens everywhere.

The Council has under consideration a number of measures to permit more efficient law enforcement here. We admit the police department is woefully under staffed. It is practically impossible for four men to properly police a city the size of Burkburnett. We will do our best to improve the local situation just as quickly as possible.

Anti-Trust Laws For Unions ABSENT MINDED BEN HUR



Don Robinson, publisher of the weekly newspaper trade magazine The American Press said something about the American strike situation recently that bears repeating. From here on the School of Instruction

During the next few months there will undoubtedly be a flood of suggestions for dealing with management-labor relations. The tremendous losses to workers, manufacturers, government and the public resulting from the steel strike cannot help but lead to fervent demands for legislation to prevent repetition.

In the editorials of the newspapers of the country, we have read many proposals for dealing with the situation. But we have read none that make more sense than the seemingly simple answer Every Tuesday Night, 7:30 p. m. of making anti-trust laws applicable to labor as well as manage-

The anti-trust laws were enacted in the first place to prevent J. industry from ganging up on labor and the public and taking unfair advantage of the power which could be wielded by building monopolies

Now the shoe seems to be on the other foot. Business and the public now need similar protection against labor. For it seems just as dangerous for labor to form tremendous, industry-wide unions, which are in a position to break the back of industry and inflict hardship on the public, as it would be to permit industries to form monopolies.

When bigness reaches monopoly proportions, history has taught us that it must be broken up.

Don't Look Now, But

If you are troubled by a \$290 billion national debt and an \$80 billion federal budget, cheer up. It's going to get worse.

That debt of \$290 billion. Federal Budget Director Maurice Stans discloses, isn't the half of it. Laws passed in former sessions of Congress have obligated this country to pay out another \$350 billion in future years, over and above the expenses that will be incurred during those years.

As for that \$80 billion budget, Stans warns that "unless we hold the line now, the day is not too distant when the budget will rise to the \$90 billion or \$100 billion range." In the last session of Congress alone, 20 major spending bills were introduced in the House and 20 in the Senate, which, if passed, would add \$50 or \$60 billion a year to present spending.


As for economizing, nearly 85% of the budget is "locked in" in commitments for national security, interest on the public debt and mandatory benefits for agriculture, veterans and the needy. That leaves little room for discretion or for cutting expenses.

Plains counties. Haws added that growers wanting additional cotton acreage from the released allotments must file written requests at the county ASC office by these same dates. Detailed information on the law changes can be obtained from county ASC office and county agents.

News From The HD Agent

Do you have to cram all of your clothes into one small closet? If you do, perhaps a good cleaning with an eye open to-

will help solve your problem. Thelma Wirges, county HD agent, suggests starting at the top of the closet with hats. A square hat box uses the shelf space to better advantage than a round one. Find a box as large today as the shelf will take so more than one hat can be tucked init. Liberal use of tissue paper keeps the hats in good condition. If shelf room is limited, perhaps a second shelf can be added.

Lower down, the rod for hangers might be changed from a single one, the full width of the closet, to two shorter ones installed from back to front. This arrangement adds space and convenience especially in shallow and wide closets.

On your rod or rods, hang garments by sections according is done by notifying the county to length, blouses to the back ASC office in the county holding or end, then suits and skirts and lastly, dresses. Under the short pieces you will have storage room for boxes or out of season garments.

If your closet still is to stuffed, take a good look at your wardrobe. A garment you have not worn in months probably isn't so valuable to you as the closet room.

Good closet accessories will help keep your wardrobe in good condition. You can make your own shoe bags, hat boxes, glove boxes and dress covers. Directions are given in an extension bulletin, "Facts About Clothing Care". Copies are available from your county HD agent's office 305 Federal Building.

Mrs. E. A. Litteken, one of the home demonstration club demonstrators has done an excellent job in clothing storage and closet arrangement. Taking a closet composed of one long rod, a chest in the back corner and one deep top shelf, Mr. and Mrs. Litteken added side shelf space and drawers. The long deep top shelf was made more narrow, so things can be more easily seen.

Long clothing was hung to one side of the center section and short to the other. On the short side a second rod was added to make double deck storage. The doors are no longer wasted, as far as storage. Peg board has been added and small clothing articles such as belts, ties, etc are now there.

Mr. and Mrs. Litteken find they have about 3 times as much space, to use. Everything is easy to see, easy to reach and easy to clean.

Since it is so easy to use, the demonstrator has painted the closet, so it now makes a pleasing picture, if the doors are left open. How do you feel when your closet doors are left open.

Keep that new hat fresh and new looking by regular care. Suggestions given by Thelma Wirges, county HD agent, may also help you to revive a tired

looking model from last year. Keep natural luster of your hat by keeping dust or dirt from settling in. Brush frequently with a soft brush or a rubber sponge. Spots and dirt can some times be removed from light colored felts with fine sandpaper. Cleaning fluids may also be helpful in removing spots. Quick treatment makes the job

Drape the veil back over the hat to prevent wrinkling. If the veil does become limp and wrinkled, press between two pieces of waxed paper.

Store hats in boxes. Crushed tissue paper stuffed in the crown, in ribbon bows and around other trimming will help to keep them newer looking Fur and felt hats should be protected from moths.

A hat treated properly will re-tain its lines and shape for two or more seasons. Since winter hats will soon take their place on the shelf, see that they are stored in such a way, you will be pleased to wear them next



Improper growth, tooth decay, poor bone formation, night blindness sore gums and other disorders may occur.

Check now to see how you and other family members rate. A leaflet, written by foods and nu-trition specialists provides an easy check list for rating your daily diet and eating habits. Entitled Are You A Good Eater. the leaflet lists the more important food elements needed by the body and then gives good

sources for each. Encourage all family members to rate their eating habits. Get copies of the leaflet from your county HD agent's office.

Food and Nutrition demonstrators are located in all sections of the County. Each demonstrator has selected goals and made plans for the things that will make their families better fed in 1960. This does not mean they will have more food, but does mean they will have the correct kind.

It's been a rough winter on Remember, don't give the county agent, could cause loss-

Shortages of adequate and quality roughages and protein supplement have caused excessive weight losses and cows in such condition generally have calving & after calving trouble. says Haws. Calves may be born weak even to weak to nurse. Too, the cow may not produce enough milk for the calf and it may be low in some of the essential nutrients. Thus, adds the agent, calves become unthrifty and some may die.

Here are Haws suggestions for improving the situation. The cow should get a daily minimum of 2 lbs of 41% supplement because pasture grasses this year are of low quality due to last fall's early and hard freeze and the unfavorable weather which has followed. The feeding of additional roughages of good quality may be necessary on some farms and ranches he adds.

Cows in very poor condition deficiency, Haws says. This can be corrected by feeding a block of leafy green alfalfa hay or one fourth pound of alfalfa pellets daily and could save the cow and calf. He advises such feeding until green grazing becomes available.

Now is a good time to consider creep feeding calves to take part of the load off the cows. For this purpose, Haws suggests a simple mixture consisting of 85% ground sorghum grain, 10 percent cottonseed meal and 5 percent alfalfa leaf meal.

Texas 30, Harper 3 and Texas 28 produced average yields of about 70 bushels per acre to lead all hybrids in the 1959 Texas Corn performance tests conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

These hybrids showed a wide range of adaption by ranking at or near the top in each of the individaul tests

The highest yielding white hybrid was Texas 17-W. Among the yellow hybrids, Texas 34 & 30 were more resistant to in**sects** and diseases and are there fore recommended particularly for areas where insects and diseases cause serious damage to

In the tests corn was planted at 20 locations under dryland and 2 locations under irrigation. Four of the dryland tests were lost because of unfavorable weather conditions.

Growers should consider the performance of the hybrids at the nearest test location, and also the average yield for their area. Recommendations for the various areas are based on prevarious results as well as those during 1959.
