Censorship Of Ideas

A considerable time ago the Internal Revenue Service ruled that the cost of "opinion" advertising is not a necessary and legitimate business expense, and hence is not a deductible item for tax purposes. The principal target of this ruling has been the utility industry, which has extensively used advertising to present its side of the public-vs-private power issue.

But if anyone believes that this form of censorship by taxation is of direct interest only to one or a few large enterprises, it is high time to think again.

Editor and Publisher tells us of the experience of Editor A. H. Washburn, of the Hope, Arkansas, Star. Mr. Washburn spent about \$6,000 in an effort to obtain a popular vote on a question of a state sales tax. In his opinion, passage of the tax would mean a loss of income to his paper. But now the Tax Courts has ruled that his campaign was not an ordinary business expense, and is not tax deductible.

It is clear that if the ruling is allowed to stand, no one will be able to use advertising or related forms of communication to express his views on public issues without running the risk of severe tax penalty. And this, as the American Newspaper Publishers Association has put it, amounts to nothing less than censorship of ideas.

The remedy, apparently, lies in Congressional action. A number of corrective bills are pending. But Editor and Publisher says its advices indicate that "a floodtide of grass roots pressure" will be needed if any of them are to reach the floor during the current session. May the floodgates open.

Helpless Hostages

The "sit-in" demonstrations of Negroes in eating places in the South, as a protest against segregation, have been given national news coverage. These "sit-ins" have largely occurred at lunch counters operated by chain variety stores. And some people seem to have developed the idea that the stores concerned are favoring segregation as a matter of policy.

This simply isn't true. Entirely aside from any segregation or integration argument, the stores are victims over which they have no control. Any store, whether it be a small independent or part of a huge chain, serves a relatively small local community. It must, so far as it is able, conform to local needs, local customs, local demands. Affiliation in a chain in no way affects this local character of operation.

Such stores are "local citizens." They have no choice save to follow local ordinances and customs. If trouble arises, as at the lunch counters, the managers must close the area of trouble.

As a matter of record, variety store managers have been doing all in their power to remove themselves from the conflict between the pro and anti-segregationists. The food service problem like other racial problems ultimately will be thrashed out in the courts. Meanwhile, as an editorial in Chain Store Age observes, "Until a higher judgment is reached, variety chain stores may continue to be helpless hostages of a conflict they did not create and are powerless to avert."

Keep Flag Flying On Seas

Russia's merchant fleet and its protective underwater escort of 500 submarines "is out to capture an ever larger portion of the trade between free as well as satellite nations."

That substantiated view comes from George Killion of the Committee of American Steamship Lines. He describes its significance in these words: "On our ability to participate in the commerce of the world depends, to a very great extent, this nation's future as the warm fortress of freedom in a world chilled by the winds of a calculatingly cruel war."

"On our ability to keep a favorable balance between foreign aid and our own economy, between our Merchant Marine and the ships flying foreign flags, between the controlled economy of the iron curtain East and the free economy of the West, depends our very survival."

Russia, obviously, is embarked on an all out campaign to strengthen her trade position in the world, to build her power, influence and prestige and if possible, to outdo the United States. As part of the cold war program, Russia is building a mighty merchant fleet of the most modern design. This is one of the many places where we can't afford to lag behind, and that's why America's maritime industry is undertaking a \$4,600,000,000 shipbuilding program to replace a largely war-built fleet with nearly 300 of the world's finest and fastest merchant vessels.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

DALTON, GA., CITIZEN: "The basic difference between the American creed and the communist creed is in the differing attitudes toward people. Where we believe that the individual human is worthy of respect, an entity to be valued, communistic doctrine strives toward the supremacy of the state and subservience of the people to that supremacy. Lenin, the founder of the Soviet state, recognized that a doctrine of this caliber must be imbued early into the human mind. Lenin said, 'Give us a child for eight years, and it will be a bolshevik forever.'"

WALTERBORO, S. C., PRESS and STANDARD: "The purpose of our public school system, and the sole reason for its existence, is to educate the people, and through this education to prepare them for a richer, both financially and intellectually, life. Somewhere along the long road to education the system has failed."

"Students today, particularly in the public schools, are ashamed of having intellectual prowess. Much bragging is heard on the star athlete, or the best dancer and social butterflies."

TERRE HAUTE, IND., ADVOCATE: "Safety authorities advise parents, and the heads of households, to make precautionary surveys of possibly dangerous conditions in the home at least once a year. If you will take this advice, and remove potential hazards for all members of the family, especially the young, you may well prevent a personal tragedy in your own home."

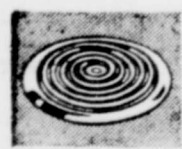

The Wichita County Celebration of National Home Demonstration Week comes to a close May 8th, after a county luncheon, club and community events, exhibits in all sections of the county and visits to demonstrators.

Volunteer local leaders play a very important role in the home demonstration club program. They are especially recognized during this observance of National Home Demonstration Week.

They are the officers of our clubs and the women who attend special training schools to learn and then teach new and better methods of homemaking to club members, neighbors and friends. This year the leaders in our county helped teach club and non club members how to refinish furniture, cover old lampshades and improve home lighting, clothing construction, clothing selection, care and storage and food and nutrition.

Miss Wirges, county HD agent, reports special training for food leaders, this past week. Leaders learned how to use their freezers to the very best advantage.

Instructions were given for cooking in quantity and freeze a portion. For example, when cooking beans, roast, pies, cakes, cookies, bread, casseroles

and churning butter, prepare more than for immediate needs. Prepare 2 roasts and freeze one, bake 2 pies and when cool freeze one. Cook in quantity instead of separate bakings conserve fuel, too.

Miss Wirges emphasizes importance of proper packaging for satisfactory results. Then, too, harvest and prepare food quickly to retain freshness. Speed in preparation is necessary. Promptness in handling, chilling and freezing any product helps retain quality.

One of our biggest problems is to get women to follow instructions carefully. Because freezing is so simple, women tend to skip over or be careless about the essential steps.

When food specialists speak of directions, they mean the ones which have been scientifically tested and proven. Too often women follow suggestions of the man at the store, or the lady at the store, then come to grief. Like the woman who froze 3 bushels of peas without washing, shelling or blanching, because a friend told her she heard you could. All vegetables must be blanched before packaging, insists Miss Wirges. This is essential to stop the enzyme action. Until vegetables are ready to pick, enzymes help them to grow and mature. After that they cause loss of flavor and color.

If vegetables are not heated enough enzymes continue to be active during frozen storage. They then develop off-flavors in a few months and may discolor or toughen. Heating also softens or wilts vegetables and makes them easier to pack. Too long heating period results in softening of texture and unnecessary loss of minerals and vitamins.

For this reason, follow time charts and instructions. Quick cooling after blanching is equal-

ly important. Fruit, in general is prepared for freezing as for eating. Wash in cold water but do not allow fruit to stand in it; some fruit loses food value and flavor and some gets water soaked. Sound, ripe fruit is best for freezing, slightly riper than for canning, but not soft or mushy.

It is best to prepare only enough for a few containers at a time. Especially fruit which darkens rapidly; 2 or 3 quarts is a good quantity to work with at one time.

To prevent discoloration, use ascorbic acid tablets or crystals or some special antidarkening preparation now available on the market. When using them, follow manufacturers' directions.

When using 1-4 teaspoon of ascorbic acid tablets in water to each quart of sugar packed. Use 1-2 tablets per quart of acid per quart of sugar.

Most fruits have a natural sugar and flavor. Sugar or syrup packed without use in special freezing uses. Figs, berries freeze or without sugar.

For sirup, may vary a little. Use 1 cup sugar to 4 cups fruit. Use dry pack, allow sugar to a quart.

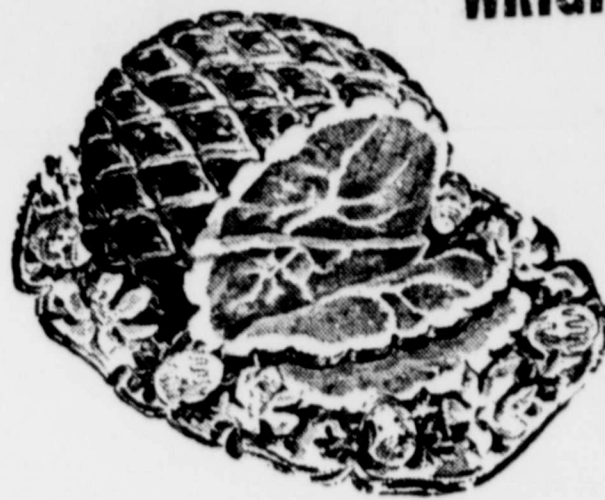

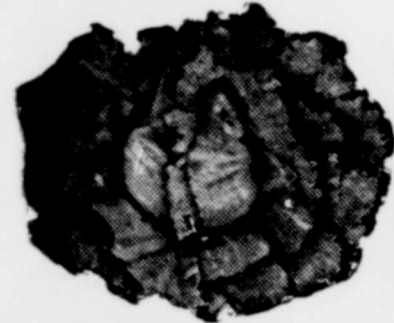

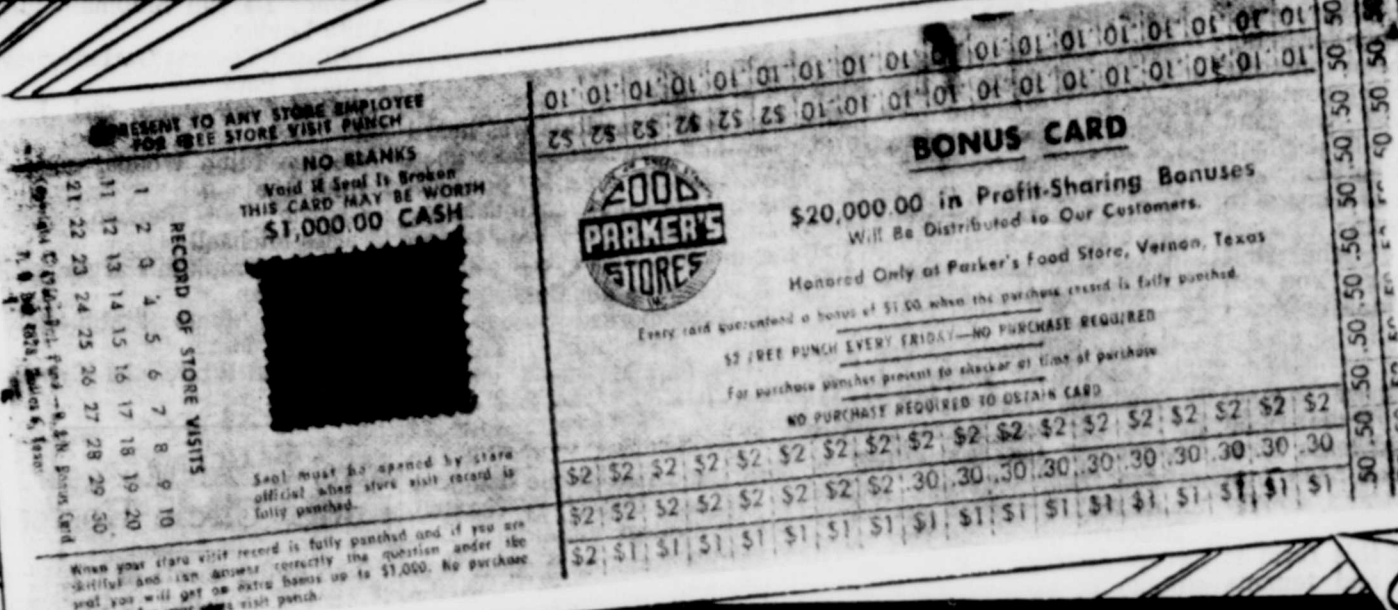

As He Sees It

State Capitol NEWS

Saturday is "speak now or forever hold your peace" day in Texas.

Or, to say the least, the voter who does not express an opinion at the polls and precinct conventions this week should hold his peace about what happens in Texas during the next two years. A number of important decisions as to office holders will be made Saturday. Once made, they are final, for two years or even four years.

At this point in the campaigns, almost all candidates and their supporters believe that if there is a big enough turnout Saturday their side will win handily. And those who aren't pleased with the way things turn out likely will blame it on those who don't bother to show up.

Equally as important as the primaries are the precinct conventions to be held the same day. This is the only means by which the individual voter can participate in the selection of the presidential nominee.

New Highway Signs Due
New highway signs, bigger and more colorful than any used before, will begin appearing soon on the interstate highways in Texas.

Highway Commission has ordered the posting of route markers and guide signs on 707 miles of interstate highway now completed or under construction in the state.

Conspicuously absent in this marking system will be stop signs. Completion of the 41,000 mile system of controlled access roads will make possible coast to coast and border to border driving without a stop sign or traffic light.

Motorists soon will become familiar with the interstate marker, a red, white and blue shield. Texas Highway Dept. designed the shield which later was adopted for the entire national system. All markers and guide signs will be larger than usual. Advance exit signs will be placed about two miles ahead of interchanges to give motorists plenty of time to plan their next move.

Guide signs will have white letters and symbols on a green background and signs for rest and service areas will have green letters on a reflectorized white background. Warning and yield signs will remain in the familiar yellow and black but will grow in dimensions.

Texas leads the nation in the number of miles of interstate highways completed and under way. Texas' allotment is 3,033 miles of which 697 are finished and 259 are in some stages of progress.

Schools' Share Down
Texas is spending a smaller proportion of its tax revenue on education now than it did 10 years ago.

This statement was issued by the Texas State Teachers Ass'n in support of its drive for enactment of the Hale Aikin program for School Improvement.

In 1958-59, says the report, Texas spent 29.6 cents of each tax dollar for public school education. In the last completed school year the percentage was 27.68 cents of each dollar.

During that period public school spending more than doubled from \$156,000,000 to \$322,000,000, to keep pace with a 51 percent increase in students and 49 percent increase in teachers. But spending for other purposes increased faster.

Gov. Price Daniel again has said that he would like to call a special session after the elections to erase the deficit and raise teachers' pay. But he also said it would depend on getting agreement from legislators.

Profit Predicted
When everything is finally cleared up, the state will come out with a profit of \$50,000, perhaps more, on land involved in the Veterans Land Board Scandals.

This prediction was made by Land Commissioner Bill Allcorn who called \$50,000 a "conservative figure." He said that \$1,725,000 has already been recovered from fraudulent land deals and that \$1,679,000 more is outstanding but fully secured.

When the entire \$3,404,000 is recovered, said Allcorn, the state will have a comfortable margin above what was involved in the original transactions.

Costly Error—

Texas Supreme Court has returned to district court for retrial a case involving a \$100,000 mistake in arithmetic.

An employee of an Arlington contractor made the error in submitting a bid of \$534,175 instead of \$634,226, to the local school board for a school building job. After the bid was accepted by the board, the contractor discovered the error and refused to carry out the contract.

Board then awarded the bid to the second low bidder and sued the first contractor for the \$36,278 difference between the second low bid and the bid they had first accepted. Supreme Court members disagreed on the case, wrote 3 different opinions, but all agreed it should be retired.

How Big The Grounds—

State Building Commission is awaiting an attorney general's opinion before putting in sidewalks to the new state buildings.

Reason for the precaution is that the Legislature passed a bill in 1957 stating that nothing absolutely nothing, could be built on the Capitol grounds without specific permission from the Legislature. And the Legislature did not provide for sidewalks.

Who Owns The Oil?—

Another question under consideration by the attorney general's dept. is "who owns rights to the minerals under county roads."

Request for an opinion was submitted by Jack Cook, county attorney of Kleberg County. Ultimately to be decided is whether state and local government can claim the right to mineral development of the right of way of some 228,000 miles of streets and highways in Texas.

School Fund Advisors—

A 19 member advisory committee of prominent business and professional men is helping the State Board of Education develop investment policies for the \$415,000,000 permanent school fund. Committee members are C. D. Aker, Jacksonville; Walter Lacy and H. M. Fentress, Waco; J. Ralph Wood and A. M. McCullough, Dallas; Hines Baker, Houston; Joe B. McNeil, Wichita Falls; Frank D. Austin, Amarillo and H. H. DeWar, San Antonio.

some form of medical care bill for the aged and aging that will protect the doctor-patient relationship. We'll pass a minimum wage bill."

The Senate Majority Leader also predicted the Congress will

"We have come to expect each year about this time some charge that Congress has done too much or not done enough, Johnson said.

Looking to the immediate future, Johnson predicted that before the session is over "we will pass an amendment to the Social Security Act, we will have some good farm legislation, we'll pass

Clarence T. Mertins Given Fellowship To West Texas State

Clarence T. Mertins, a teacher at Burkburnett, has been awarded a fellowship to attend the National Science Foundation Summer Institute at West Texas State College.

Judge Calvert has been on the Supreme Court since 1950, and is the only member of the court who is a candidate to succeed the present chief justice, who is retiring, and is the only candidate for chief justice with Supreme Court experience.
"Judge Calvert has served with great distinction as associate justice for almost ten years," Gaynor Kendall of Austin, state campaign manager, said. "He therefore knows from actual experience the additional administrative duties which he must assume as chief justice, and he has demonstrated by his service with the other judges his ability to furnish the leadership the court requires."
