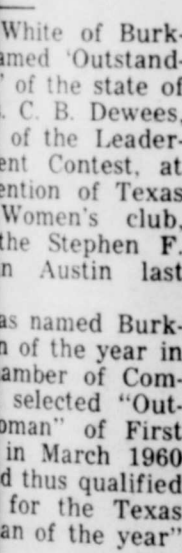

Connally Amendment Put On Shelf

The move to place the United States under the compulsory jurisdiction of the World Court probably is dead for this session of Congress.

The Senate foreign relations committee's vote to postpone indefinitely any action on the resolution to repeal the so-called Connally amendment should mean that the proposal will not come up again during this session.

However, it is to be noted that the vote was close—9 to 7, with one committee member, Sen John Kennedy (D-Mass.) not voting. The effort by the internationalists to take away from this country its power to determine what disputes are strictly its own business, and hence not the business of the World Court, will be revived some day. If not this session, then next.

Sen. J. W. Fulbright (D-Ark.) chairman of the committee and a proponent of the Humphrey resolution to strike out the Connally reservation, observed that he thought the "political climate" in the Senate influenced the committee vote.

That's fine. It is good to know that the Senate would have voted the resolution down if the committee had sent it to the floor. It is, in fact, a virtual certainty that the Humphrey resolution would have failed passage in the Senate where a two-thirds majority is required for passage.

What Fulbright didn't say, but looms large in the background is the fact that the "political climate" in the country generally also influenced the committee vote. Few proposals in the nation's history have evoked such a storm of protest as the effort to repeal the Connally reservation.

When The People Understand

If you have an insurance policy of any kind, you have a very direct interest in rising costs, high taxes, government debt and inflation, and any and all forces which may further reduce the purchasing power for your dollar.

Take life insurance. "Inflation trends not only increase the cost of life insurance," says the Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York, "but also reduce the purchasing power of life insurance dollars. Inflation also creates an unhealthy speculative psychology which, if unchecked, can threaten the future soundness of our whole economy."

"Inflation can be controlled, but only with the support of the American people as a whole. The necessary measures include a wise budgetary policy at all levels of government, intelligent debt management and prudent fiscal and monetary policies. We must also have courageous handling of the problems of power implicit in trade union and corporate behavior, and a public resistance to higher prices and higher taxes. Public officials can be relied upon invariably to respond when the people come to understand the problem and insist that it be solved."

Prepare For Retirement

Just about all of us have known people who retired in seemingly good health, and died within a brief span of time. It happens far more often than it should. And a major reason is that too many of us reach retirement age without being prepared for it. Boredom sets in—the zest for living is lost. We don't know what to do with ourselves. Senility follows as night follows day.

Dr. Theodore G. Klumpp, a member of the American Medical Association's Committee on Aging, has some important things to say about useful living in the latter years. First of all, of course we must take the obvious physical precautions—proper diet, exercise and rest. But that's just part of it. Purposeful useful activity is also vitally important.

In Dr. Klumpp's words, "You can run to retirement or you can run from retirement. To retire from is tragedy, but to retire to may mark the beginning of the most satisfying part of your whole existence." This means, he pointed out, that preparation for useful activity must begin before retirement, not after. And this activity should be related solely to a person's pre-retirement job. New and interesting horizons are needed.

Long ago, Robert Browning wrote: "Grow Old Along With Me. The best is yet to be, the last of life, for which the first was made." There is a deep truth in that philosophy—but the goal is not reached automatically. It must be earned.

A Federal Case?

Robberies took place last night in Waukegan, Montgomery, Santa Rosa, Portland. There were muggings in Helena, Richmond, Phoenix and Indianapolis. Assaults, theft and murders occurred in hundreds of other places.

Obviously crime is a nationwide problem. Since local efforts haven't stopped it, maybe Congress should step in and set up a Federal program to take care of the situation.

This reasoning makes the same kind of sense as that behind the controversial Forand bill. In hundreds of places across the United States there are indigent old people who need medical care. Despite public and private efforts at state and local levels, the problem exists. Therefore, say the Forand bill supporters, the federal government should step in.

We say this problem, like crime, is one for the local communities to handle. They may never solve it completely, but they will come a whole lot closer than an expensive, bureaucratic, red tape ensnared effort by the federal government.
