## Rains Delaying Wheat Harvest

Harvest of grain in this area, which was expected to be in full swing at this date, has been held to a minimum by rains and light showers during the past week.

Small quantities of oats, barley and wheat have come in, but most fields have been too soggy for the combines to operate. The thickest and best wheat has not fully ripened yet. A few days of sunshine and wind is all that is needed now for the best grain prospects in many years.

Fantastic yields are being reported on the small acreage cut thus far. The yield is more than double on lots of fields. Estimates still run as high as sixty bushels on some of the best looking fields. Combine men who have been coming to this area for the past 15 years say this is the best crop we have ever had.

At present there is a sufficient number of machines here to handle the crop. However, some crews have commitments farther north and may move out if wet weather continues to hamper operations here.

## Run-off Election Sat., June 4th

The primary run-off election will be held Saturday, June 4th. Although the ballot will be short, voters are urged to make a good turnout to decide county finals.

Local voters will be voting on a county sheriff, a county tax assessor-collector and a state civil appeals judge.

Burk voters will vote in three precincts, located at the City Hall, High School and Bell Station, Inc., office on West Third Street, across from the Bell Pipe Line offices.

## Judge McDonald Will Restore Respect For Appeals Court

A number of important issues remain to be settled in the June 4 primary election, but none is more important than restoring to the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals the respect it has lost during the tenure of Judge Lloyd W. Davidson on that bench. This can be achieved by defeating Judge Davidson and electing Judge W. T. McDonald of Bryan.

The Court of Criminal Appeals is Texas' supreme court in criminal matters. Its decisions are final, except in rare cases where a constitutional issue is involved which permits an appeal to the United States Supreme Court. As such, the court must hold the respect of all citizens. The legalistic hair-splitting in which Judge Davidson has indulged as a member of the court has made a mockery of justice, and gone far to cost the court the respect of the ordinary common-sense citizen.

## Pastor Retires In Burk Burnett



Rev. J. H. Kollmeyer, who is retiring from active ministry, preached his farewell sermon in Grace Lutheran church here Sunday.

He and Mrs. Kollmeyer are moving to Rosenberg, Tex. They came to Burk Burnett in November of 1952 from Mart, Tex. In addition to the Burk Burnett pastorate, Rev. Kollmeyer was vacancy pastor of Trinity Lutheran church of Clara for 2 1/2 years.

Rev. Kollmeyer entered the ministry 42 years ago. His first charge was at Clarendon. He also served congregations at Kingsville, Georgetown and Mart, Tex. In addition to the Burk Burnett years, he served as counselor of the Gulf Coast and Rio Grande Circuit. He was chairman of the pastors' committee, organizing Women's Missionary League of Texas and pastor counselor of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League of Texas eight years. He was chairman of the Student Aid Board in Texas for 18 years.

Rev. and Mrs. Kollmeyer have one son, Arthur, who is pastor of the Lutheran church at Rosenberg and also vacancy pastor of another nearby church. His father hopes to be able to assist him after retirement.

The new Grace Lutheran church was in debt when the Kollmeyers came to Burk Burnett. Now, however, they are proud to leave the church debt free. It has grown from 70 communicant members to 115.

## Chas. W. Boyd, Jr. With Petro-Tex Chemical Corp.

Research chemists of the Petro-Tex Chemical Corp. have developed a new process which will lead to immediate construction of a "multi-million dollar" maleic anhydride plant in Houston, it was disclosed Tuesday.

Petro-Tex officials declined to pin point the cost of the plant but trade circles estimated it would cost approximately \$8.5 million.

The plant, with a production of 30 million pounds per year, will be built upon a 10 acre tract off Park Place Boulevard between Galveston Road and the La Porte Road. It will adjoin the present Petro-Tex facilities.

Company officials, in announcing the new plant, also hinted that another new plant will be built about next year on a Ship Channel tract bought last year by the Tennessee Gas Transmission Co. Petro-Tex is jointly owned by Tennessee Gas and the Food Machinery and Chemical Corp.

Charles Wayne Boyd, Jr., who received his degree at Texas A and M will be employed at the Petro-Tex plant as a process engineer in the processing and designing department, beginning Monday. Charles is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Boyd of Burk Burnett.

## The Power Of Advertising

As a young man, George Romney, now one of our best known industrialists, went from Utah to Washington, D. C. to seek his fortune. What happened is told in a Harper's book, "The Story of George Romney" by Tom Mahoney which is being hailed by reviewers as one of the best recent business biographies.

One morning, George noticed a male-help wanted advertisement in a newspaper. It simply said "stenographer" at a room in the Senate Office Building. Out of a hundred candidates, he landed the job working for the late Senator David L. Walsh of Massachusetts. This started a career which a few years ago made him head of American Motors Corp.

With such an incident in his background, it is natural for George Romney to be interested in newspaper advertising. In fact, he is so interested that his company spends a larger share of its advertising money in newspapers than any other automobile manufacturer. As those who follow the financial pages know, the results have been very happy for him.

"The outstanding success story—in fact the only automotive success story of 1958—was that of American Motors," noted Editor and Publisher, the trade magazine. It spent about \$4,300,000, more than two-thirds of its advertising budget in newspapers. The company was the only one with greater sales than the previous year and had profits of \$26,000,000.

Last year Romney's company spent \$8,507,433 in newspapers, virtually double the year before, and had profits of \$60,000,000. In the compact car field, where it was once alone, his company now has a host of competitors. But it is still putting the bulk of its advertising in newspapers and in April had a greater share of the greatly expanded 1960 compact market than any other company.

This is not surprising. When we seek something as vital as a job or want to make a purchase as important as an automobile, it's only natural that we turn to our newspaper where the essential information is recorded in black and white and usually with a local address at which we can do business.

## Diminishing Return

A tax can reach a point of diminishing return. In other words it can become so excessive that it produces less and less revenue, and thus defeats its purpose. That, as the president of the National Gasoline Association of America now points out, may be true of the gasoline tax.

The history of this tax can be fairly described as one of more and more gouging of the consumer. From 1949 through 1959 there were 62 separate state tax increases, plus a rise of from 1.5 cents to 4 cents a gallon in the federal tax. This totaled an overall jump of more than 40%. By way of contrast, the actual price of gasoline at the pump rose only 4.5%, making the rate of gasoline tax increase nine times that of the gasoline itself.

The result is that the American motorist has become gasoline price conscious to a greater degree than ever before. And he too often blames the oil industry, whereas the true blame belongs to Government. That aside, he is expressing his resentment in a highly practical way. The new "compact" cars, which are primarily bought for economy reasons, are accounting for 25% of this year's domestic car production. In addition, there will be about two million small foreign economy cars in this country by the end of the year. This trend has led to the prediction that by 1964 annual gasoline sales will be 4,500,000,000 gallons less than would have been the case if compacts were not in the picture. And what that will do to gasoline tax revenue to government is certainly obvious.

You can lead a horse to water but you can't make him drink. You can increase gasoline taxes to any level, but you can't stop motorists from economizing.

## Your Tax Future?

In the long light of history, 47 years is only an instant of time. But, from the point of view of the taxpayer, the last 47 years have been somberly outstanding in this country.

Back in 1913, reports the Tax Foundation, all federal tax collections amounted to a mere \$662 million, now they are estimated at \$76.3 billion. The states haven't lagged. In the same period their collections have soared from \$301 million to \$17.4 billion. And local collections are no small item either. The 1913 figure was slightly over \$1.3 billion—in 1959 it was about \$16.8 billion. So much for the past. What will the next 47 years bring?

## News From The HD Agent

When your Automatic Washer Falls. Has this ever happened to you? Your automatic washer, usually your devoted slave, suddenly refuses to function. It overfills, or it doesn't fill at all; it won't pump out the water, or something goes wrong with the spin tub. And usually it couldn't happen at a worse time.

Delays are an inconvenience, and service calls are an expense. So stay calm if you can and do some simple checking before you make a call for help. Thelma Wirges, Co. HD agent, suggests you check these symptoms.

1. If the machine won't pump out water, think when you moved the machine recently to clean under it. Did you bend the drain hose so much that it won't let out the water?

2. If the machine won't fill, Check the inlet hose where you turn on the water, to make sure the water is turned on. The inlet hose can also kink, just as the drain hose does.

3. If the machine won't run at all. Try checking the fuses in the fuse box. Much money is spent every year on calls for a service man when all that is needed is a new fuse.

And before you make that telephone call, check your instruction book carefully for clues to your problem.

Warm weather brings insects of all kinds. Flies, ants mosquitoes, moths and other insects endanger health, feed on fabrics contaminate food and are general nuisances around the house.

Use up to date control measures to fight these insects. A leaflet compiled by extension entomologists of Texas A&M College system offers directions for choosing and applying insecticides.

This handy leaflet, "Texas Guide for Controlling Household Insects," classifies all major pests except the termite into specific categories relating to type of damage. Insects are illustrated for easy identification and concise control measures are given for each insect. Also listed are some important cautions to observe in using insecticides.

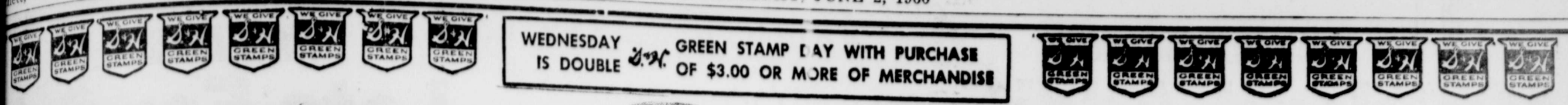

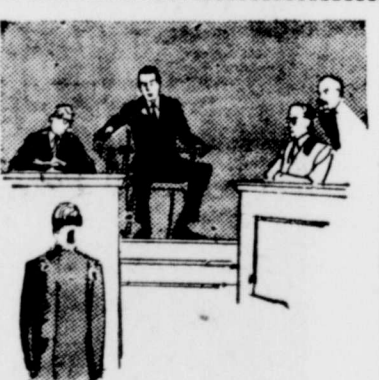
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### Atomic Energy Foundation To Continue In Texas

The world's first and largest privately-financed program aimed at harnessing the H-bomb's tremendous power for the generation of electricity has been extended for an additional four years, it was announced today by J. B. Thomas, president of Texas Electric Service Co.

Texas Electric Service Company is a member of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation, composed of 11 investor-owned electric utility companies operating in Texas. Thomas is a director of the foundation.

The directors voted at their annual meeting in Houston this week to continue their joint sponsorship of the nuclear research program underway since 1957 at the laboratories of General Dynamics Corporation's General Atomic Division which has as its goal the control of the nuclear fusion reaction for power generation. Nuclear fusion is the process responsible for the energy of the sun and stars, and of the hydrogen bomb.

Other member companies of the research foundation are: Central Power and Light Co., Dallas Power and Light Co., El Paso Electric Co., Gulf States Utilities Co., Houston Lighting and Power Co., Southwestern Electric Power Co., Southwestern Public Service Co., Texas Power and Light Co., and West Texas Utilities Co.

The jointly sponsored research is being conducted at General Atomic's John Jay Hopkins Laboratory for Pure and Applied Science in San Diego, Calif., and includes both theoretical and experimental work in Plasma phenomena, directed toward ultimately controlling and sustaining a man made fusion reaction. Dr. Frederic de Hoffmann, senior vice president of General Dynamics and president of General Atomic Division, hailed the TAERF decision as "a further impressive demonstration of the vision and vitality of the pioneering spirit in American enterprise, in the best tradition of technological progress."

"General Dynamics is delighted that we are to continue our association in this venture with such a forward looking group of utilities," he said. Dr. de Hoffmann said the new experimental facilities now coming into operation result largely from an enlargement of interest in shock wave plasma generation and injection.

Indicative of the growth of the joint program, he said, is the fact that more than 50 scientists and other technical personnel are now engaged in its theoretical and experimental activities. In addition, the program has access to the talents of more than 1,100 scientists, engineers and others who make up the personnel of the John Jay Hopkins Laboratory. A large atomic beam laboratory, because of the nature of its research (the study of atomic scattering phenomena) is closely associated with the controlled fusion program.

The program is under the direction of Dr. Donald W. Kerst, inventor and developer of the betatron nuclear accelerator. Dr. Marshall N. Rosenbluth, internationally known physicist heads the theoretical research in plasma stability at General Atomic.
