Go On At

Baird High

As the summer draws to a close, school is drawing near. This is a fact that many students have dreaded. But change has come at good old Baird High.

A new coach? Yes, Coach Randy Franklin. Coach Franklin will be involved in football, as an assistant coach and will also teach some courses one of which will be Biology.

Activities are already starting to get underway. The Baird High School band started their pre-season practices August 2. Their director, Mike Devenport has commented that he expects a very good year with this group of students.

On Monday, August 9, at 7 a.m., Head Coach Quinn Conley will begin two-a-day football practices. Conley will issue shoes to players on August 4 between the hours of 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Changes in appearance have also been made at Baird High. The football stadium is now being repainted, a new Superintendent's office is being built as is a new Secretary's office.

Investment Group Purchases Interest In First National

A group of investors has purchased a substantial interest in the First National Bank of Baird, announced Joe E. Sharp, head of the group and senior partner of an Amarillo-based accounting firm.

Sharp, who formed the accounting firm of Sharp, Bausch & Co. six years ago, will replace Norman Stewart on the bank's board of directors and will become board chairman. Stewart is leaving the bank for business ventures elsewhere.

Fred Goble, a board member associated with the bank 30 years, will become president and chief executive officer. Other bank officers will remain unchanged. They include James Eubanks, executive vice president; Jerry Barron, cashier; and Randy Tollett, assistant cashier. Other board members include Eubanks and Frank Windham Sr.

With the purchase, the investment group will own majority interest in the

bank. The transaction is effective Tuesday, August 3.

Sharp, Bausch specializes in both audit and tax practices. It has offices in Amarillo, Dallas, Tulsa and Dodge City, Kansas, and employs 60 persons, 10 of whom are partners in the firm.

Sharp is a graduate of Munday High School. He attended McMurry College in Abilene before earning a bachelor's degree in accounting from North Texas State University in Denton. He spent four years with White Stores, Inc., as an accountant before entering Texas Tech University in Lubbock for graduate work.

In 1964 he joined Peat, Marwick, Mitchell & Co. and became head of its Amarillo office tax department in 1969. He left the firm in 1976 to form Sharp, Bausch. He is on the board of directors of the First National Bank of Darrout, as well as BJM Drilling and Exploration, Inc. of Midland.

Clyde Girls Gain East Texas State Championship July 17

The Division II Clyde Girls All-Star Softball team will be playing in the regional United Girls Softball Tournament this weekend in Odessa.

The tournament will be the second all-star tourney for the team, which won the East Texas State Tournament in

Breckenridge July 17. Teams from Breckenridge, Brownwood, Merkel-Trent also participated in this tournament. Clyde defeated Merkel-Trent twice and Breckenridge once to gain the championship title.

Commissioners To Discuss Preliminary Offer On Hospital

A preliminary offer regarding the operation of Callahan General Hospital has been received by County Judge Mack Kniffen from United Hospitals management.

"Details of the offer cannot be made public until the county commissioners have met with officials from United," said Kniffen. August 9, is the next scheduled meeting of the commissioners and officials are hoping that the meeting with United can take place then. If not, a special meeting will be called at a time agreeable to commissioners and United.

The search for new management began when Rural Hospital Management Inc., took steps to terminate its 10-year lease with the hospital. A spokesman from Hendrick Medical said that since RHM1 had taken over the hospital, it had continued to lose money.

Ron Hand, regional consultant for United Hospitals, told commissioners that most facilities bought or leased by United is losing money when they take over, but with good management, each hospital can brought back in the black.

Biggest Budget Surplus In Texas Unveiled Thursday

State Comptroller Bob Bullock unveiled the biggest budget surplus in Texas history Thursday, but warned "there are thorns among the roses."

The record \$1.3 billion budget surplus will mean the Legislature will have \$5.1 billion available for spending in January 1983, over and above what was available in January 1981.

"This surplus is the result of the good times we have had," Bullock said in a capitol press conference. But the Comptroller cautioned Texans that "the growth we are predicting today is substantially less than we have seen in the past 10 years."

Although Texas is the "flagship of the United States economy," and has led the nation in the creation of new jobs, Bullock said, "The recession has come to Texas. Our economy has begun to slow down. We are beginning to see significant drops in some major revenue

sources."

The Comptroller pointed out Texans do not pay corporate or personal income taxes and have not had a tax increase since 1971. "Last year alone," Bullock said, "31 other states burdened their citizens with higher taxes."

Bullock announced the surplus with an official revenue estimate, which the Texas Constitution directs him to make for each session of the Legislature and "at other times as may be necessary to show probable changes."

Bullock noted an expected drop in federal funds coming into the Texas Treasury will make other revenue sources more important to the state budget in years to come. He cautioned those involved with the investing of state funds and leasing of state lands to "be looking closer than ever to make sure these important revenue sources reap the greatest possible benefits for the state."

**Clyde Teen Sentenced
To Two Prison Terms**

James Starley Reston, 19, of Route 4, Clyde was sentenced to two 10-year prison terms to run concurrently after being arrested for possession of THC, or hashish in the Taylor County Courthouse parking lot.

Reston was at the courthouse to make his monthly report of his probation officers when two city narcotics officers stopped him and asked to search his car

Inside, 28 tin foil wrappers of THC, along with several "bong pipes" and

items of narcotic paraphernalia were found. Officers said that the reason for the search came from an anonymous tip.

After being placed on probation for 10 years on July 29, 1980 admitting to several Taylor County burglaries, Reston admitted that the possession of the illegal drug was a violation of his probation.

Under terms of the plea bargain struck by prosecutors and his attorney, Bobby Clark, the terms will run concurrently.

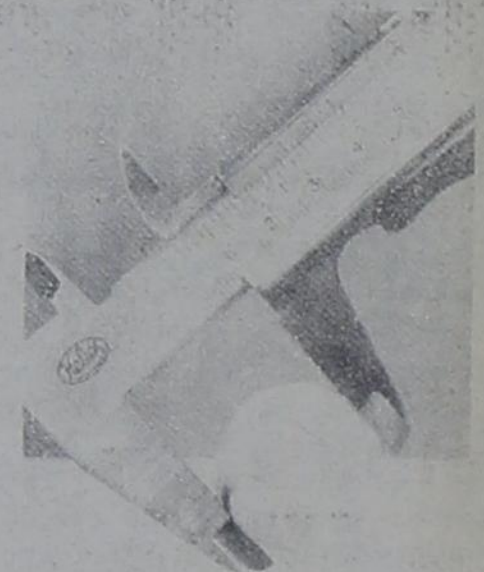

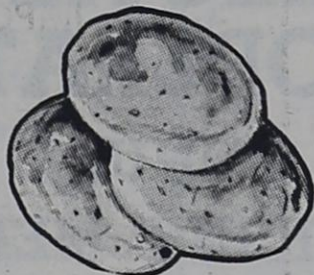

Dr. Sol B. Estes, 76, of Old Anson Road, Abilene, a physician who had practiced in Abilene since 1938, died at 5:35 p.m. Sunday at West Texas Medical Center after a brief illness.

Services were at 2 p.m. Tuesday at University Church of Christ.

Burial was at Elmwood Memorial Park, directed by Elliott-Hamil Funeral Home, 542 Hickory St.

Born Nov. 2, 1905, in Clyde, he briefly attended Abilene Christian College before receiving a bachelor of science degree from the University of Texas and, in 1930, his medical degree from the UT Medical School at Galveston. He served in the Navy from 1930 to 1938, interning at San Diego Naval Hospital and later serving in China, the Philippines and Rhode Island. He married Lydia Dzewas July 19, 1930, in Yuma, Ariz. In 1938, they moved to Abilene, where he opened a private practice. During his career, he served as chief of staff of St. Ann Hospital and, later, staff chairman at Hendrick Memorial Hospital. He was a member of the Taylor-Jones County Medical Society, Texas Medical Association, American Medical Association, Texas Academy of Family Practice and University Church of Christ.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Esme Glenn and Diane King, both of Abilene; two sons, Don and Richard, both of Abilene; a brother, John Estes Sr. of Clyde; two sisters, Analou Black of Abilene and Nanabel Carlton of Lockhart; eight grandchildren; and a great-grandson.

Strake Talk

Education—Our Money's Worth?

In my travels over Texas, it has become clear that Texans rate crime, the economy, and the education of their children among their principal concerns.

This week I would like to discuss education. As the father of six children, this has long been one of my principal concerns also.

We currently spend over half our tax revenue on education, and many people raise the question to me: "Are we getting our money's worth?" The questions put to me indicate some think we are spending too much; others, not enough.

I too am concerned about the amount of money we spend on education, but I am more concerned about the quality of that education. I believe the quality of education our children receive can be improved by making some fundamental changes in the way we pay and treat our teachers.

I believe in merit pay for teachers. Frankly, I think good

teachers ought to be paid more than poor teachers. A good, conscientious teacher cannot help but become discouraged and disillusioned when he or she ends the month with the same pay as one whom they know to be indifferent. The result is apt to be that they leave the teaching profession altogether.

I also think we ought to enter a system of competency testing not only for new teachers, but for those who are currently teaching. We test our kids, why not also test those who teach them?

In short, I think we ought to bear down on the basics, relieve our teachers of burdensome paper work now placed upon them, and recognize and reward our better teachers with better pay, for the sake of our children, and our future.

WTU Files For Change In Wholesale Rates

West Texas Utilities Company filed Monday for a change in wholesale rates for total requirements electric service it supplies to 14 rural electric cooperatives, one municipality and one investor-owned

distribution company, and for partial requirements electric service it supplies to two municipally owned electric system.

In its filing with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, WTU pro-

posed rates which will produce about \$2.1 million in additional revenue for the Company during the 1983 calendar year. This amounts to an increase of approximately three per cent from these wholesale customers.

WTU requested that the new rates become effective January 1, 1983. Present total requirements rates have been in effect since February, 1982, and the partial requirements rates have been in effect since 1977. Except for the rate level, no other major changes were proposed.

WTU officials said the rate change is needed to bring the Company's revenues from wholesale customers to a level equal to the cost of providing service.

The following wholesale customers will be affected: Coleman County Electric Cooperative, Inc., Concho Valley Electric Cooperative, Inc., Dickens Electric Cooperative, Inc., Gate City Electric Cooperative, Inc., Greenbelt Electric Cooperative, Inc., Lighthouse Electric Cooperative, Inc., McCulloch Electric Cooperative, Inc., Midwest Electric Cooperative, Inc., Stanford Electric Cooperative, Inc., Taylor Electric Coopera-

tive, Inc., Western Farmers Electric Cooperative, Inc. (which supplies Southwest Rural Electric Association), Brazos Electric Power Cooperative, Inc., (which supplies B-K Electric Cooperative, Inc.), City of Brady, City of Coleman, City of Sonora and Texas-New Mexico Power Company.

Well site is 2,310 feet from the south and 490 feet from the west lines of Section 145, GH&H Survey.

Daily potential was 27 barrels of 43.2 gravity oil, plus 50 barrels of water. It is pumping from perforations at 2,411-15 feet, treated with 500 gallons of acid and fractured with 5,226 gallons of fluid and 5,200 pounds of sand.

Operator set the 4 1/2-in. casing at 2,643 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 2,704 feet.
