A great army of second guessers maintain that the U-2 incident was "inappropriately" timed before the summit meeting. Lest we forget, we were "meeting" and negotiating with the Japanese envoys when they leveled military installations and much of our Navy at Pearl Harbor.

It is a pretty sorry turn of events when the world wonders whether Mr. Khrushchev feels buoyant or blue . . . Can you imagine thinking that history depends on Mr. K.'s degree of well being!

Has anybody thought about making a proposal to Khrushchev? We to call off all our reconnaissance planes and he to call off his army of spies. And perhaps have the "workers" in the embassies behave as honorably as the representatives from free nations.

From where I sit, it appears that marchers in free countries who demonstrate at the drop of a suggestion would do well to try to march in Moscow.

Funny that in the "people's paradise" there are no labor demonstrations. The "conditioned" folks just work and do without the things, including the rights and freedoms that demonstrators take for granted.

If Mr. K. feels mad about our taking pictures from the air, how should we feel about his stealing atomic bomb secrets from us and the British? . . . and the Russian Colonel who was captured posing as a photographer? . . . to mention only two examples.

If a neighboring country looks cross-eyed at Mr. K.'s politics, he has threatened them with the atomic bomb. Wonder what the world would say if Mr. Eisenhower threatened some of our blustering neighbors with our missiles.

Have you noticed how "pink" people would have us sever our relations with dictators like Franco who grant us military air base rights, and yet the same "liberals" are constantly working towards the seating of Red China at the UN?

According to Russian codes, it is perfectly all right to spy from embassies and consular offices throughout the world, but flying way up over a country must be different . . . Guess ground rules are different from air space.



Look who is squawking. An atheist who has lied habitually, and has been caught at it, blatantly says, at the Summit Meeting, "Before God I swear my heart is pure and my hands are clean . . ."

Russia has trained trouble makers, rabble rousers and spies snooping throughout the world. On top of that, it is bad enough to have the Russians trying to bluff us, but it is far worse to have them treat our President with contempt and abuse.

The surprise about Berlin is not that Khrushchev wants to break this signed agreement, but rather that he kept it this long. Consider how few agreements the Russians keep and not one day beyond the day they are expedient, to Russia.

One thought has emerged from the Summit Meeting which failed to meet. You can only negotiate with Mr. Khrushchev one way . . . on what you give up — never on any concessions from him.

Sometimes it seems that summit conferences make two kinds of people — the hopeful innocents who expect something, and the initiates, who know better. From Yalta to Paris — when you get right down to results — nothing much good has come from any of them.

A NATION WITHOUT CARS

Imagine, if you can, a deathly still nation over the Fourth of July, its streets deserted of motor vehicles, every car behind locked garage doors.

Think of it—no traffic on the streets. No trucks, buses, cars or whatnot clogging the streets and highways during the three day holiday. No din of honking horns and blaring car radios and screeching tires.

No trips to Grandma's house. No weekend outings. No one taking a vacation.

Of course, this is strictly fantasy. We're a motorized nation, a nation on wheels, a nation of people whose life is geared to the motor vehicle.

If we were ordered to keep our car in the garage for three days, we'd set up a fuss and holler that would be heard 'round the world. And rightly so.

The National Safety Council, founded in 1913 to prevent

all kinds of accidents, has always encouraged Americans to have fun over the holidays, to take trips, to get outdoors and enjoy life. But it points out, realistically, it seems to us, that you can't have fun and enjoy life very well from a wheelchair, or a grave. So please be sure to use extra care to meet the extra danger.

Everyone agrees the auto and all it has brought to this nation are marvelous. But the auto was never intended to be an instrument of death, over the Fourth of July holiday or any time of the year. So use it properly.

EUGENE, ORE., REGISTER-GUARD: "Under present law a person must forfeit his social security money if he makes more than \$1,200 a year. This is unrealistic.

"It would be different if social security were some kind of largess from the government. But it isn't. It's something the older has coming to him. He contributed to the fund, and so did his employer, while he was working. It's his money. He shouldn't have to agree to live a life of poverty in order to get it."

SOUTH PASADENA, CALIF., REVIEW: "A proof that private enterprise can do it better is pointed up by the operation of the Canadian railroads. During the past 15 years the Canadian Pacific Railroad, a privately owned railroad system, earned a profit of 448 million dollars. At the same time the publicly owned and managed Canadian National Railroad system showed a loss of 653 million dollars.

"The Canadian Pacific (privately owned railroad) paid 368 million dollars in dividends to its stockholders and 340 million dollars in income taxes to the Canadian government. The Canadian National paid no taxes, but the taxpayers had to make up the deficit on its operation."

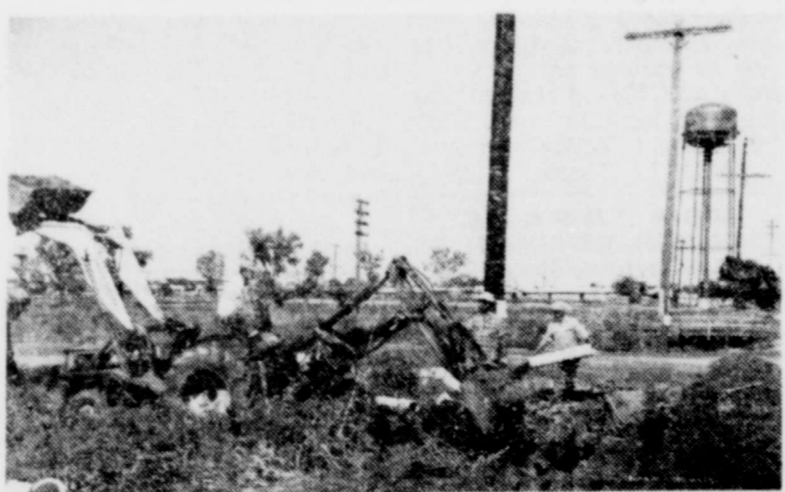

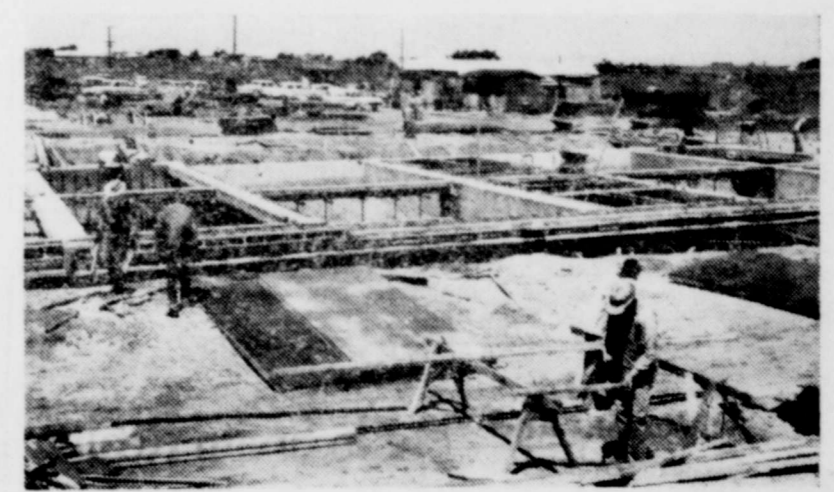
