## National Guard Still Vital for Defense

Traditionally, the observance of our National Independence Day is also the observance of the foundation of the National Guard, a force of nearly 500,000 men organized in state militia groups and equipped with every modern weapon of war, including an air arm of 22 jet-equipped combat wings and two global transport wings.

These militia units were a concept of our Founding Fathers as they gathered to frame our Constitution. It is written into Article I of the Constitution: "The Congress shall have power... to provide for organizing, arming and disciplining the militia, and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the service of the United States, reserving to the states respectively the appointment of the officers, and the authority of training the militia to the discipline prescribed by Congress."

Thomas Jefferson had an almost fanatical faith in the militia and believed the nation would never be safe without it. His November, 1808, message to Congress asserted: "For a people who are free, and who mean to remain so, a well organized and armed militia is their best security."

What the Constitutional Convention envisioned and Jefferson asserted is as applicable today as it was in the beginning. In this nuclear age, the National Guard constitutes our greatest guarantee of security at home in event of sudden attack. In the best tradition of a civilian soldiery, it is our bulwark of civilian defense.

This July, however, is usually significant in the annals of the National Guard. It has been upgraded officially in its primary mission, which is to provide trained and equipped combat units for the active Army and Air Force. This came about when the United States Air Force formally inducted the Air Guard into its "first team." This means that the Air Guard hereafter will be united with the USAF in training under the major commands to which they would be assigned in event of emergency.

Air Guard units include 72,000 men throughout all the states and well may constitute the most powerful reserve force in the world. Where the DEW Line watches the frontiers, these are the men who guard the home line. In the air, on the ground, these men are our greatest guarantee of security at home.

## What Do We Do Now?

In another of his endless (3½ hour) Hitler-type speeches, Fidel Castro told thousands of his screaming subjects that \$200 million worth of US owned sugar mills would be confiscated one by one as well as other "Yankee property down to the nails of their shoes" if the US reduces the Cuban sugar quota. (A bill just passed by the House would give the President this authority.)

At about two a. m. Castro stopped talking. Within 12 hours he had seized The Texas Company's 20,000 barrel per day petroleum refinery at Santiago-de-Cuba. He doubtless plans to move on to take the Standard Oil and the British Shell refineries in Havana, since all three are guilty of refusing a month ago to refine Soviet oil which the Reds are trading for cut rate sugar.

This latest Castro inductive and the seizure, threatened a month ago, were doubtless triggered by the first strong words we have officially uttered on the subject of the bearded hoodlum.

This was the US note to the Inter-American Peace Committee, a unit of the Organization of American States. In it the State Department charged Castro with lies and slander against the US and devoted 11 pages of the document to a recital of specific offenses, such as the implication of US responsibility for the explosion of the munitions ship La Coubre in Havana, the Cuban Coast guard attack on the US submarine Sea Poacher on the high seas & sundry others contributing to "rising tensions in the Caribbean."

This memorandum promises an increasingly tough policy, and further provocation has followed on its heels. It was compiled at the request of the Committee which is gathering information for submission to a meeting at Quito, Ecuador, next February.

Thus, we may well wonder, as we anticipate increasing irresponsibility on Castro's part, what our situation will be by that time, and whether we will still be sitting and taking it.

This, in the light of US history, does not seem very tough.

## Is This Nation To Dissemble?

There is no single reason why the United States has so lost the respect of the world that even little Cuba can kick us in the teeth with impunity. There are many.

One of the reasons is that if Congress rears half way up on its hind legs and demands or requests a stiff attitude toward any other nation, President Eisenhower may be expected to employ such moderation—if that is the correct word—in word or deed that the effect of Congress' action is largely neutralized.

After more than a year of repeated insults from Cuba, seizures of American property under circumstances that amount to theft, and evidence that Cuba is becoming a Soviet vassal, Congress at length gave the President the authority to take economic

reprisals in an effort to bring the Castro government to its senses. The President promptly exercised that authority and cut the Cuban sugar quota by 700,000 tons. But he took that action on the ground that Cuba no longer is a dependable source of supply, thus avoiding the appearance of hitting back at Castro's violent anti-Americanism in word and deed.

Why such pusillanimity? Why can't this government display some guts for a change and call a spade a spade?

For that matter, why should Latin American countries resent it if we take that minimum reprisal for Castro's repeated insults and thievery? And if they should resent it, why should we care greatly. Is not our national honor more to us than anyone's opinion?

Incidentally the Castro government's instant reply to the sugar bill was a move to seize all American property not already seized. Worse, the new law, hastily passed, amounts to open instead of disguised theft. It provides the owners would be given 30 year bonds to be paid only with money coming from excess sugar sold to this country, with the quota set so high that no "excess" would accumulate and consequently the bonds would never be paid off.

The President leaned over backward to be "moderate" again when asked if he agreed with the statement by Sen. Lyndon Johnson that "We can only anticipate that the next President will be greeted by the threat of a Russian submarine base in Cuba, less than 100 miles from our shores." When he replied that such things are possible but unlikely, he was asked what we would do in such event. His answer was that the machinery of the Organization of American States no doubt would come into play but that in its own interests this country might have to act as it saw fit—apparently a careful worded warning that we might have to intervene militarily.

Why such cautious hedging? If there's near danger of a Soviet military base of any kind in Cuba, why not give Castro a stern warning? To do so might stop the building of a Soviet submarine base, jet airplane landing strips and missile launching pads that could double the Soviet threat to the United States.

The President, even so, is a whole year late in taking note of this possibility. An editorial in the Houston Chronicle on July 25th last year, entitled "Communist State at our Front Door Is Distinct possibility," declared that this country would have to take action if a small minority enslaved Cuba and made it a base of operation against the entire western Hemisphere.

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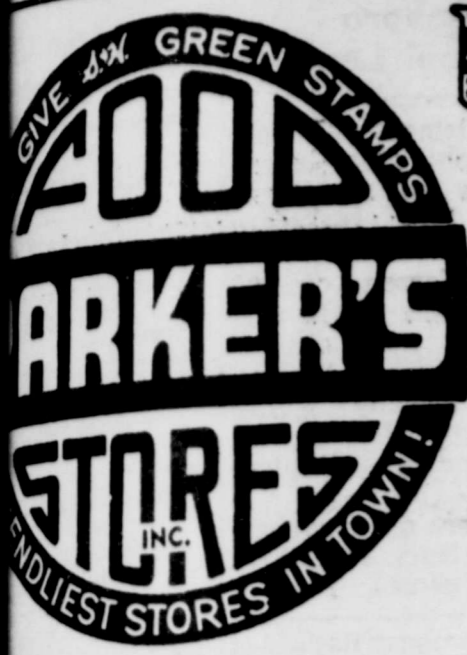

**State Capitol NEWS**

## Ordinance No. 245

AN ORDINANCE DEFINING THE VARIOUS KINDS OF GARBAGE, REGULATING THE KINDS AND SIZE OF RECEPTACLES IN WHICH TO PLACE SAME, THE MANNER OF ITS PREPARATION AND WHERE IT MUST BE PLACED TO BE COLLECTED BY THE CITY GARBAGE DEPARTMENT; PROVIDING REGULATIONS FOR COLLECTION OF SAME; PROVIDING THE SERVICE CHARGES, AND A METHOD OF BILLING AND COLLECTION OF THE FEES; PROHIBITING THE MEDDLING, SCATTERING CONTENTS, PILFERING OR JUNKING, WITH GARBAGE CANS, TRASH OR RUBBISH RECEPTACLES; PROHIBITING THE COLLECTION OF GARBAGE, TRASH OR RUBBISH BY OTHERS THAN CITY FORCES OR AGENTS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS; AND PRESCRIBING PENALTIES; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. This ordinance shall be known as the "garbage ordinance" of the City of Burkburnett, Texas. The word "premises" as used in this ordinance shall be taken to mean business houses, boarding houses, offices, theatres, hotels, restaurants, cafes, eating houses, tourist courts, apartments, sanitariums, hospitals, rooming houses, schools, private residences, vacant lots and all other places within the city limits of the city, where garbage, trash or rubbish accumulates in ordinary quantities.

The various kinds of garbage shall be defined as follows:

A. By the term "Kitchen Garbage" as used in this ordinance is meant, dry kitchen

refuse, all meat, vegetable and fruit refuse, small dead animals and dead fowls, from any premises within the city limits.

B. By the term "dry kitchen refuse" is meant the solids after the liquids or slop has been drained off.

C. By the term "trash" as used in this ordinance is meant paper of all kinds, rags, old clothing, paper containers, old rubber, pieces of wood, boxes, barrels, crates, feathers, weeds, grass, tree limbs from any premises within the city limits.

D. By the term "rubbish" as used in this ordinance, is meant tin cans, bottles, glass, scraps of iron, tin, wire, or any other metals from any premises within the city limits.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of every person, firm, or corporation owning, managing, operating, leasing or renting any premises, or any place where (a) kitchen garbage or (b) dry kitchen refuse accumulates to provide a portable garbage can or cans constructed of galvanized iron, tin or other suitable materials with handles and a tight fitting cover of a capacity not less than twenty gallons and the daily accumulation of kitchen garbage and dry kitchen refuse shall be placed in this or these garbage cans. It shall be the duty of every person, firm or corporation owning, managing, operating, leasing or renting any premises to place all trash or rubbish from said premises in boxes, portable cans, or other portable metal containers provided that the gross weight shall not exceed sixty (60) pounds. Any person desiring to place tree trimmings or hedge cuttings for collection shall cause the same to be securely tied for collection in bundles not heavier than seventy-five (75) pounds nor more than four (4) feet in length. These shall be placed with the other garbage and trash for pick up at the regular time for collection.

SECTION 3. Business houses, restaurants, cafes, eating establishments and other commercial establishments shall provide suitable containers for their particular needs. These shall be subject to the approval of the City Manager, and may not be used unless acceptable to him.

SECTION 4. After the enactment of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for fifty-five (55) gallon oil drums to be used as garbage containers.

SECTION 5. Rock, waste, scrap building materials, or other trash resulting from construction or remodeling; resulting from a general clean-up of vacant or improved property or resulting from sizeable amounts of trees, brush or debris cleared from property will not be removed by the City as a regular service, but may be done for the owner on payment of an extra fee. Exceptions to this are:

1. Trees, shrubs and cuttings will be carried by the City as defined elsewhere in this ordinance.

2. All types of trash, refuse, and rubbish will be carried by the City during any clean-up campaign which is proclaimed and authorized by the Mayor or City Commissioners. The owner, at his option, may have such debris removed at his expense by private haulers. In the event the owner desires the City to haul debris, a charge therefore, will be made at the rate approved by the City Manager of the City of Burkburnett, Texas.

SECTION 6. The authorized agents of the City of Burkburnett will not make collection of kitchen garbage, trash or rubbish or tree limbs where same is not prepared for collection and placed as designated by the terms of this ordinance and failure to comply with this provision will be an offense and each day's failure to comply will constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 7. The lids, garbage cans and other receptacles shall be kept in a sanitary condition and closed tightly at all times so that flies and other insects may not have access to the refuse contained therein and shall only be removed while emptying additional garbage or refuse therein, or while the Garbage Collector or person authorized in removing such garbage or unloading the same for disposal. The contents of all receptacles shall be so protected that the wind cannot blow out and scatter same over the streets, alleys, and premises of the city.

SECTION 8. It shall be unlawful for any person other than those designated by the city to collect or dispose of any garbage or to haul or transport or convey said garbage within the City of Burkburnett, Texas, except as specifically designated within this ordinance.

SECTION 9. The meddling with garbage cans, trash or rubbish receptacles or in any way pilfering, scattering contents or junkings in any alley or street within the city limits is prohibited.

SECTION 10. Garbage and refuse situated at residences shall be picked up twice per week.

All business concerns situated within the corporate limits of the city, shall receive a daily pickup.

SECTION 11. Rates for gathering and removal of garbage and refuse from all premises within the City of Burkburnett, Texas, shall be calculated on the following basis:

(a) Single family unit with alley entrance, \$1.50 per month.

(b) One family unit without alley entrance, where it is necessary to carry out refuse or garbage for more than 20 feet from property line, \$2.50 per month.

(c) Two family units on separate meters, per unit, \$1.50 per month.

(d) Apartment houses in one building with three or more units, per unit, \$1.50 per month.

(e) Housing Developments to be charged per family unit, \$1.50 per month.

(f) Commercial and business establishments, regardless of location shall be charged at a rate to be established by the City Manager and by the Supervisor of Garbage Collection on the basis of cost of daily service according to actual time required but no concern shall be less than \$1.50 per month.

SECTION 12. The charges fixed or to be fixed under the terms and provisions of this ordinance and any contract that may be entered into by the City for the removal and disposal of garbage, waste or refuse, shall be charged against such person or person, owner, occupant or lessee, and the amount fixed shall be collected through the Water Department monthly, as the water charges are collected.

SECTION 13. If garbage pickup charge is not paid, water services will be discontinued to that customer until such time as garbage charge is paid.

SECTION 14. If water service is discontinued because of non-payment of water and/or garbage charge, then an extra charge of One Dollar (\$1.00) shall be made and collected before water service is reinstalled.

SECTION 15. All charges for service as outlined in this ordinance are the same for all establishments of like kind without regard to whether there is or is not a separate water meter for the house or residence, commercial or business establishment.

SECTION 16. Any person, firm or corporation who violates any of the provisions of this ordinance or who fails to provide the necessary garbage cans herein required, or shall allow the premises to become unsanitary, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined a sum of not less than five (\$5.00) dollars and not more than Two Hundred (\$200.00) dollars for each offense and each day's continuance of a failure to comply therewith shall constitute a separate and distinct offense for each of said days.

SECTION 17. The term "garbage collector" or "garbage collectors" as used herein shall mean an employee or employees of the City of Burkburnett, Texas, or other person or firm under contract with the City, to remove garbage and other trash.

SECTION 18. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby expressly repealed.

SECTION 19. Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remainder of said ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

SECTION 20. The fact that there are no adequate regulations governing the collection and disposal of garbage and industrial waste in the corporate limits of the City of Burkburnett creates an urgency and emergency for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety and general welfare and requires that this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and publication on the 1st day of September, A. D. 1960, and it is accordingly so ordained.

Ordinance No. 244

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE BURNING OF TRASH AND/OR GARBAGE WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF BURKBURNETT, TEXAS; PRESCRIBING A PENALTY, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That effective the 1st day of September, A. D. 1960, it shall thereafter be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, to burn trash and/or garbage within the city limits of Burkburnett, Texas.

SECTION 2. That any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall, upon conviction in a court of competent jurisdiction, be fined in any sum not exceeding Two Hundred (\$200.) Dollars.

SECTION 3. The fact that trash and garbage burning within the corporate limits of the City of Burkburnett, jeopardizes the peace and health of the citizens of said City, creates an emergency and this ordinance is hereby declared an emergency measure on the grounds of urgent public need for the preservation of peace, health and safety of property; and the rule requiring the reading of ordinances on three separate days is hereby suspended, and this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and approval, and after same has been published, and on and after the 1st day September, A. D. 1960.

## Wilbarger-Wichita SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

**OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH**

Outstanding production from fertilizing wheat was realized by Ralph Swinford of Friberg-Cooper community, according to Elvy Sargent, Iowa Park Conservationist.

Yield checks made by Soil Conservation Service and Dr. Carl Gray of Midwestern University showed yield increase of 9 to 26 bushels per acre. Swinford had six different fertilizer combinations that were applied at the same time with the same equipment and land had about fifteen years of the same cropping system. It should be pointed out that not all fertilizer checks gave an economical return, Sargent said. Farmers should consider the soil, past tillage practices, crop rotation and method of fertilizer application. Leaving check plots are the only sure way to evaluate returns.

Wheat having the same fertilizer and tillage practices on Swinford farm, but on which Austrian Winter Peas were grown three crops backs, gave an additional yield of approximately 10 bushels per acre.

Albert Brockreide, district co-operator of Punkin Center, got an increase of 13 bushels per acre from fertilizer, but got an increase of 20 bushels per acre from wheat following Austrian Winter Peas.

Soil Conservation District co-operators are planning fertilized Austrian Winter Peas followed by wheat and second or third wheat crop being fertilized.

Mechanical conservation practices are most in demand by co-operators with the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District, Elvy Sargent, Iowa Park work unit conservationist reports.

Mr. W. H. McAlister has two waterways nearing completion. H. C. Obenhaus and Mrs. Cora Washburn have two waterways located and designed by technicians of the Soil Conservation Service. Barwise Estate has a waterway planned to serve four owners of the estate and two waterways have been designed and staked for Carl Moeller. All of these are in Electra area east of Punkin Center. The Barwise Estate will receive Federal cost-share through an ACP pooling agreement.

Mr. Newton Crane of Burkburnett will shape four waterways as soon as a contractor is available. Mr. J. B. Riley of Burkburnett, Stanley Williamson, chairman of Wichita County ACP committee, Albert May, W. E. Karstetter of Iowa Park are terracing. H. B. Klinkerman of Iowa Park is constructing a pond.

Clear Lake Stock Farm of Kamay, owned by Mrs. Ramond Wood, is constructing a farm pond, diversion terraces, leveling land and growing hegari for dead cover when grasses are seeded. Cost-share for Clear Lake Stock Farm is through the Great Plains Conservation program.

## Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.**

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto new Sections to be known as Sections 6, 7, and 8, to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of Hospital Districts co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County, and County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, having certain stated powers and duties and subject to certain stated limitations; providing that any enabling Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character; providing for an election; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, and the same is hereby amended by adding the following Sections which shall read as follows:

"Section 6. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County, and County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, except that the maximum rate of tax that the said Lamar County Hospital District may be authorized to levy shall be seventy-five cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District, subject to district taxation.

"Section 7. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District co-extensive with Hidalgo County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided in Article IX, Section 6(a), of the Constitution of Texas, as it applies to Hidalgo County, except that the maximum rate of tax that the said Hidalgo County Hospital District may be authorized to levy shall be ten cents (10c) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District subject to district taxation.

"Section 8. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District to be co-extensive with the limits of County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, Texas.

"If such District is created, it may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed seventy-five cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property taxing voters who have duly rendered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections, as long as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of seventy-five cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation, and no election shall be required by subsequent changes in the boundaries of the Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County.

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District co-extensive with Lamar and Hidalgo Counties, and co-extensive with County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District co-extensive with Lamar and Hidalgo Counties, and co-extensive with County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District co-extensive with Lamar and Hidalgo Counties, and co-extensive with County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

To make the most of lovely fabrics, and to assure a dress that suits you and fits well, take time to choose your pattern carefully. Thelma Wirges, county HD agent says taking time to determine pattern type and size best suited to you, will save time later by cutting down on alteration needs. And less handling & fewer fitting problems will help you turn out more professional looking garments.

Use your bust measure as the first key in deciding the size pattern you should buy. If the hips are large in proportion to the bust, it is better to buy a pattern according to the bust measure. Usually the skirt is easier to alter than the bodice. You will also need to measure your waist hips and back waist length. Write down your measurements and compare them with a standard measurement chart.

The leaflet "Choose Your Patterns Wisely," written by clothing specialists, gives a standard measurement chart for patterns. Also included are suggestions for selecting pattern styles for different figure types.
