## C.-C. Sponsoring Community Clinic

Plans for an expanded Chamber of Commerce program were announced this week by C. A. Morgan, President of the Burk Burnett Chamber of Commerce, with the appointment of a Community clinic committee composed of C. M. Archer, B. J. Byars and Jesse Bills.

Archer, acting as chairman, announced the date of the clinic has been set for Thursday, Sept. 29th, with various meetings arranged for all day.

A community clinic is used to interview a great number of people and determine the needs of Burk Burnett and the surrounding area. The clinic will be conducted under the auspices of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and Mr. Ralph Duncan, Community Relations staff man of the West Texas Chamber will be here to aid in each session.

It is the first time the entire public has been invited to take part in the planning of the Chamber of Commerce program, Archer stated. We feel that everyone of the citizens of Burk Burnett will wish to participate in this public forum type meeting. Discussions in the forums will be completely informal with everyone attending voicing opinions as to needs of Burk Burnett for progress. Cards will also be distributed for those present to write out their suggestions.

Plans for the community clinic were approved at the June meeting of the Chamber of Commerce board of directors on a motion by L. J. Byars.

Eight sessions are now in the planning stages with chairmen to be announced next week. The various groups to be formed for the one hour sessions will be: High School senior, Agri-business people, Retail merchants, Sheppard Air Force base personnel, Women's group, School teachers and professional people, Service and Construction people. Archer explained "Whether you are a member of the Chamber of Commerce or not, we want your opinions during the clinic. You can help make this a success by attending one of the sessions designated for your particular business or vocation. In turn it will certainly crystallize the aims of the Chamber of Commerce, which is working for you."

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## Burkburnett School Enrollment Shows Increase of 653 Pupils

School enrollment of the Burk Burnett Public School showed an increase from 2347 in June, 1960, to 3000 on the first day of school this year. This is an increase of 653 pupils from September, 1959.

Enrollment by schools for the first day, August 29, 1960, showed:

Elementary School	587
Junior High	317
Senior High	422
Grade 1	474
Grade 2	161
Grade 3	621
Grade 4	70

Enrollment in the First Grade shows 282, and in the Second Grade 301. This would indicate an increase of 653 for the next several years.

## Motorists Asked To Be Cautious In School Zones

With more than 2,250,000 children attending Texas schools this September, motorists were being urged to adjust their driving habits accordingly by J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association.

"Give a brake to our youngsters when nearing a school," he urged.

It is very appropriate for us to pause at this time of the year when children begin their training to prepare themselves for life, that we prepare ourselves through better driving habits to make it possible for them to live, Musick said.

Almost 200,000 youngsters full of anxiety will be going to school for the first time and will be a particular hazard from a safety standpoint. Although there is a tendency to think in terms of youngsters entering school for the first time, each age level has its particular safety hazards.

While we have 200,000 starting school there is another 115,000 reaching driving age. Congestion around Junior High and High Schools is presenting greater traffic hazards each year, Musick pointed out.

Elementary schools will show a total enrollment of approximately 1,598,000. Children on bicycles present a particular hazard around these schools.

## Resume of Garbage and Trash Ordinance Itemized

Many citizens have asked questions concerning the Ordinance pertaining to trash and garbage. The following is an itemized resume in questions and answer form of Ordinance No. 245:

**How many cans are required?**  
Ans. One or more. Whatever is necessary to handle the garbage. Wet and dry garbage does NOT have to be separated.

**How many "pick ups" will there be for residences?**  
Two each week.

**Must wet and dry garbage be separated?**  
No.

**Are racks required for garbage cans?**  
No. Racks are recommended to preserve the can and to prevent cans from being tipped over, however, they are not required.

**What size cans are required?**  
Not less than 20 gallons, nor more than 32 gals.

**On which days will the garbage be picked up?**  
The Sanitation Department will be able to determine a definite schedule after a few days in covering the city.

**What can I do with my old large containers?**  
If you wish to have them hauled away, place them beside your new can. If you wish to keep them remove them from the vicinity of your garbage area. There will be no extra charge for this service.

## Finishing Touches Completed for Altus AFB Festival Sept. 2-5th

Finishing touches are being added today to the Altus AFB Festival which will open Sept. 2nd, at near by Craterville amusement park and run for 4 days over the Labor Day weekend.

The festival will be the first of its kind for Altus AFB, the first bomber and missile base in Oklahoma.

Proceeds from the sales of tickets and concession stands will be used in the Base Welfare Fund, which helps finance youth and recreation activities at the base.

Visitors to the Fall Festival will see and sometimes participate in such demonstrations and exhibitions as the:

- Military Auxiliary Radio System (MARS). This display of short wave radio equipment will permit a few festival visitors to talk direct to relatives stationed at overseas bases.
- DEWline, Southwestern Bell's demonstration of our early warning radar system using telephones, a recorder and three dimensional display.
- Sports Cars, Unusual and interesting models furnished by the Comanche Touring Club of Lawton and Ft. Sill, Okla.
- Missiles, Redstone Test Missile, Honest John, Short Range Tactical Weapon, Little John, Tactical Missile, Snark, and Air Force Inter Continental Missile.

One of the highlights of the festival program will be the selection and crowning of "Miss Atlas Missile." She will be picked from among contestants entered from communities in Southwestern Oklahoma and nearby Texas.

Festival officials expect that the Chamber of Commerce and Civic Organizations will sponsor as many as 20 local beauties for the title.

Contenders for "Miss Atlas Missile" will make appearances the last three days of the festival. They will take part in talent, bathing beauty contests and formal attire on the days of selection.

Winner of the "Miss Atlas Missile" title will be given a special crown, courtesy of Convair Astronautics (builder of the Atlas Missile), a model of the Atlas and \$500 in prizes, donated by business men of surrounding communities. There are runner-up awards of \$200, \$50 and \$25.

Four days of continuous free entertainment have been planned by festival officials. This includes 10 different variety shows as many as six band concerts each day, 18 games of skill carnival rides and music by five bands: Ft. Sill Army Band, Amarillo AFB band, Sheppard AFB band, Tipton High School band and the Barksdale AFB band.

The variety shows include western singing, Rock-n-Roll music, swing music, a German band, Judo and trampoline acts, pistol and revolver demonstrations and twirling exhibitions.

All stage shows will be free of charge to the public and each festival day will be concluded with fireworks at 11 p. m.

Miss Burk Burnett, to be selected Thursday night, Sept. 1st, has been invited to participate in the Altus AFB Festivities.

## Coming Electrical Wonders

Electrical conveniences that almost all of us use would have seemed inconceivable to our grandfathers. But electric living is still in its infancy.

The chief officer of one of our leading utility companies recently looked into the future. Here are some of the developments he foresees: Food will be prepared, cooked and served at the direction of an electric computer programmed days ahead of time. An appliance will take the food from the freezer to the range, then cook and serve it. A small electric machine will manufacture disposable dishes, thus eliminating the dishwashing chore.

The light bulb will be a thing of the past. People will use area source of light where whole walls will glow with electroluminescence. When dirt collects on a carpet, a closet will open and a vacuum cleaner will emerge. It will automatically do the needed cleaning, then put itself away and close the closet door. One wall probably consist of a giant TV screen. Programs will come to you live from every corner of the world, with the signals bounced to your living room by earth circling satellites.

There'll be no fussing with heating and cooling systems. Once the control is set, your house will be kept in perfect comfort, automatically, the year round. Driveways and paths around the house will be heated too, and the snow shovels will become a curiosity.

Fantastic? Yes, but these are only a few of the wonders that will become commonplace in the era of electric living that lies ahead.

## Blueprint For Peasantry

Two members of the board of directors of the American Farm Bureau Federation recently laid down a point-by-point program which, in that organization's view, is essential to the future of American farming. They rejected government price-fixing and other rigid controls, calling them a "blueprint for peasantry." The whole program is designed to give farmers greater freedom, and to advance the welfare and the interests of both producer and consumer.

One point is this: "With less interference from government, the marketing system will be freer to operate effectively and efficiently. This will encourage the expansion of market outlets and the production of quality products in line with market demands." This is more than theory, there is ample factual evidence to back it up. Meat is an A-1 example. The livestock producers, to their great credit, have always opposed government aids and controls, even when times were bad. Their faith lies in free enterprise, as does the faith of the packers and the other elements in the meat industry. The result, over the long years has been prosperity for producers, and an improved and fairly priced product for consumers.

It would be well if American agriculture kept that in mind this election year, in which candidates for office will be offering all kinds of promises in search of votes. Any program in which government is the boss is a "blueprint for peasantry."

## "Your Life's Record"

The hometown newspaper—like the rising and setting of the sun—is a vital part of our everyday living.

A letter to the editor of the Grundy, Iowa, Register, brings this point home. It said: "You were here over 50 years ago and you will find in the files of your newspaper a report of my birth. You have reported many anniversaries in our family, the birth of our four children, their activities in school and elsewhere. And in late years you have reported the arrival of our grandchildren. Before entering the service in Dec., 1957 Walkup graduated from Burkburnett High School.

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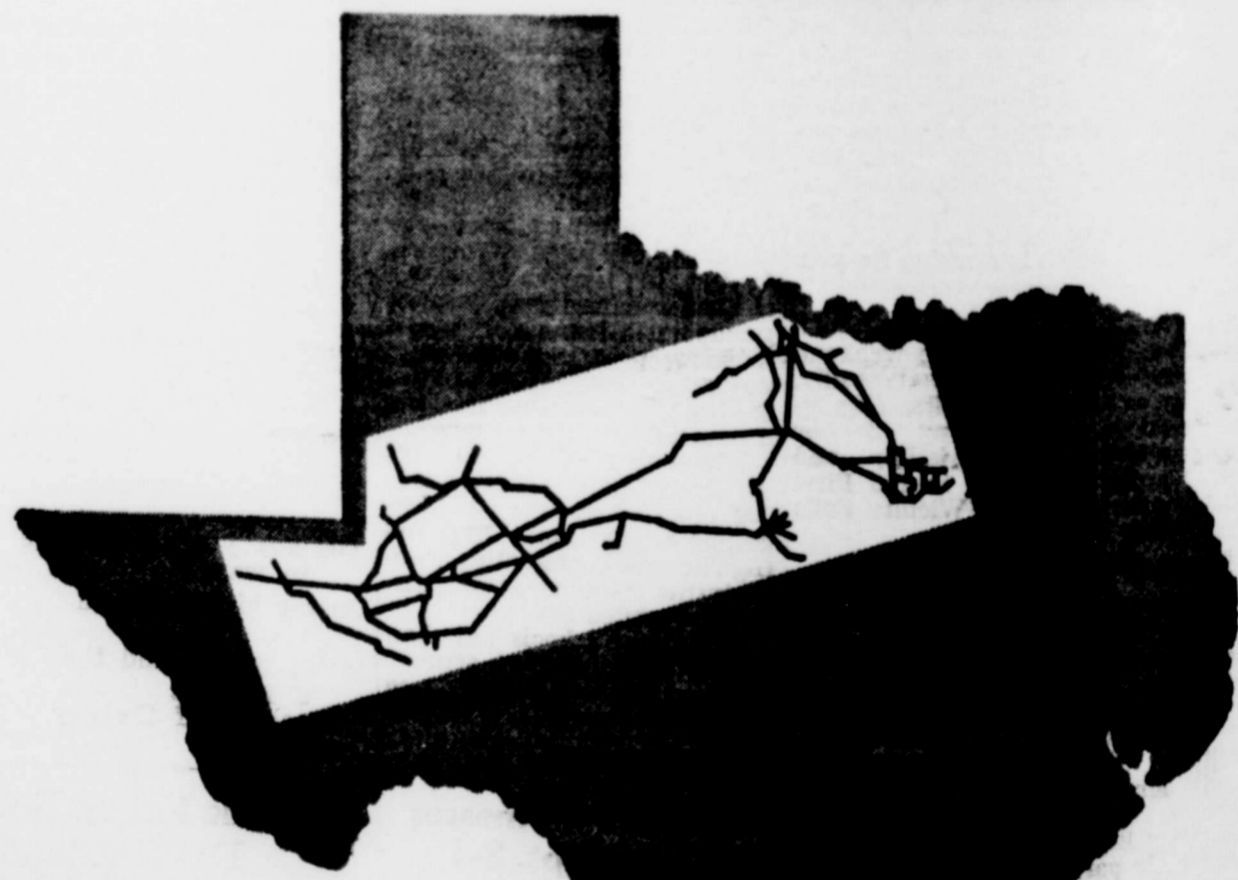

### Words of Advice To Bicycle Riders

Bike riding is fun so keep it that way by obeying traffic signs, the same as on driving a motor vehicle. Remember, in case of a quick stop, you that ride a bicycle, can stop much quicker than an automobile. Here are some good rules to follow for your own safety as well as others:

1. Signal for turns and stops;
2. Obey traffic lights and other signs;
3. Remember, pedestrians have right of way;
4. Ride alone and let your buddy walk;
5. Keep both hands on handlebars except when giving signals;
6. Ride single file on the right side of the road;
7. Keep bicycle in good condition, brakes, lights, reflectors, etc.

Other safety tips are: Have complete control of bicycle, no zig-zagging or wobbling; Keep well behind automobiles in case of sudden stops or turns; Make changes in course. Don't ride fast on gravel, down hill or on slippery roads; Above all, when riding a bicycle, keep your mind on what you are doing and where you are going.

Don't forget the person driving an automobile or riding a bicycle behind you can't read your mind so he has no way of knowing your next move.

### Area Highway Patrol News

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety today announced the official prediction that 29 persons will be killed next weekend in Labor Day holiday traffic in Texas.

Garrison said some 125 extra patrolmen from the department's other uniformed services will join the regular Highway Patrol force in attempting to halt traffic violations, which figure in most fatal accidents.

We hope the driving public will help this Labor Day weekend to prove that we have over estimated the number of traffic fatalities that will occur in the three day period, he said.

Department patrolmen and all other law enforcement officers in our state will do everything possible to make the streets and highways safer by removing lawless drivers, but the statistics prove the main job is up to the

individual behind the wheel. It is significant to note that in each of the 14 fatal accidents which occurred outside city limits last Labor Day weekend, at least one law violation was involved.

N. K. Woerner, manager of the department's statistical services, reported that excessive speed over the posted limits was involved in 10 of the 14 rural fatal accidents during the holiday last year and that drinking was involved in 7 of the 14.

In recent years, the highest statewide traffic toll for the 3 day Labor Day holiday was 43 killed in 32 accidents in 1955, 30 died in 1958 and 27 motor-cides occurred during the Labor Day holiday of 1959.

Labor Day is a yearly turning point in our lives, a time of year when activities, dress and behavior of Texans make a definite change. It is time for many of us to take that last big outing before settling down to the routine of fall and the school season, Garrison said.

Therefore, we can expect Texans to be on the move on our streets and highways and we

should be alert for the extra hazards presented by unusually crowded conditions.

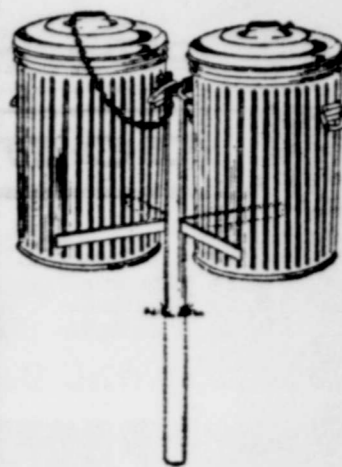

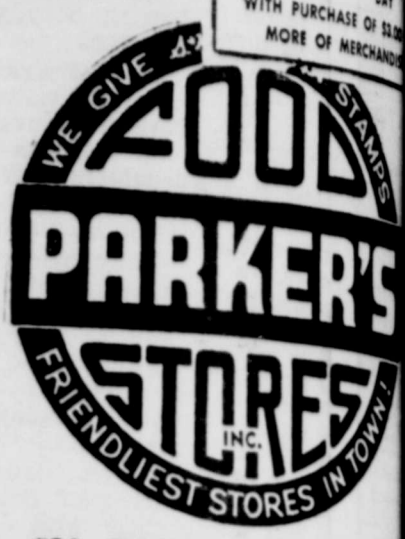

2. She must be an organizer. The president must be thoroughly familiar with the structure of the group, aware of its present weakness, alert to the best means of converting each into strength.

3. She must be a leader. If she is truly concerned with achieving a continuity of successful club work, rather than simply holding on to her office, the president must try to develop and train new leaders.

4. She must be a worker. Not the least of a good executive's duties is to delegate a certain amount of responsibility to others. The president must know, also, how to apply herself when the time comes or the need arise. The hand at the helm must never be separated from the shoulder at the wheel.

2. She presides at all official meetings when the president is absent or when she leaves the chair.

3. In case of the president's prolonged absence, the vice president may exercise all the duties of her office as outlined in the by-laws, but she cannot change or abolish any rules the president may have established.

4. The vice president cannot fill vacancies if the by-laws specify that these are to be filled by the president.

5. When the vice president takes over the presidency, her office automatically becomes vacant. In many instances, the members of the Executive Committee may appoint a person to serve until the Club's next regular election.

**Recording Secretary.** (Referred to simply as Secretary if there is no Corresponding Secretary).  
1. She keeps the minutes which permanently record the activities of the organization. These are read at each meeting, and are then either approved as read or approved as corrected by the group.

2. She calls the roll at each meeting.

3. In the absence of the president and the vice president she calls the meeting to order and presides until a temporary chairman is elected by the group.

She must have the book of minutes with her at all meetings. In addition, she should always have handy a copy of the by-laws or standing rules, the organization's authority on parliamentary procedure, and a list of unfinished business, which should be handed to the presiding officer before the meeting is called to order.

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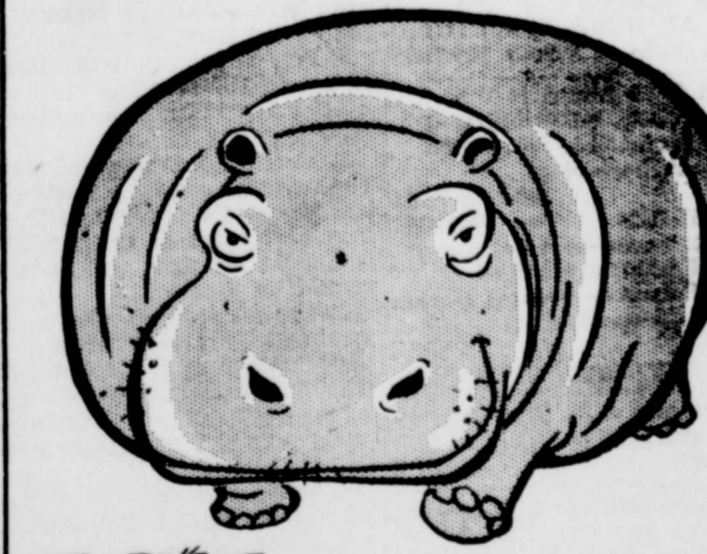

Mrs. Raymond Krull brought a question to the county HD agent, which is common to many homemakers today. Have you asked or heard someone ask: "Should we own a washing machine or go to the laundry?"

Your county HD agent, Thelma Wirges, reminds homemakers that this complicated world in which we live makes it necessary to make decisions which can not be answered for them. In helping the homemaker make this decision, Miss Wirges suggests the consideration of the following things:

1. Estimate the distance to the laundry and the cost of driving to the laundry.
  2. How many trips will have to be made each week.
  3. Cost per load for having laundry done. Does this cost include soaps or detergents?
  4. Will it be necessary to have more garments when laundry is done away from home.
  5. How about the time required to take the laundry.
- After considering these things compare with:
1. Cost of washing machine. The machine can be expected to last 10 years or of course there may be repairs. If the machine is bought on time the interest should be considered.
  2. The cost of operation of the machine. This will depend on the length of cycle. The specific machine would need to be checked for watts and lengths of cycle.
  3. Fewer clothes may be needed.
  4. More hot water will be needed and the cost of the additional hot water added.
  5. Cost of detergents.
  6. Will a water softener be necessary?
- Clothes will likely be washed more often when done at home. Other jobs may be done while the washing is being done would give some consideration. The more features the washing machine has the more there are to get out of order.
- Life of the washing machine depends on the use and care given it. Any decision involves thinking, weighing two sides & then make the best of the decision.

## 7¢ Increase In Burk's Key Rate After Inspection

Recent inspection by the State Board of Insurance resulted in charges totalling 7c appearing in our key rate.

Many things enter into determining the key rate for any city. Inspectors list the credits, such as adequate fire fighting equipment, the number of fire hydrants in a given area, their size, etc. Then the penalties are all listed. Results are tallied and if the penalties amount to more than the credits, as was the case in Burkburnett, then the key rate goes up accordingly.

The following deficiencies were noted in the inspection report, with suggestions to correct them:

All 2-way hydrants in the mercantile district to be replaced with 3-way hydrants.

All hydrants to be inspected, flushed, oiled and greased every 90 days, and painted yearly.

Paid fireman cannot hold position of Fire Marshal. Fireman's primary duty is to keep equipment in first class operating condition.

Insurance Board recommends a fire limits ordinance be passed and rigidly and impartially enforced.

Fire hose short of the minimum requirements of 500 feet.

The City is now making efforts to correct the above mentioned deficiencies.

The Water Department is busy this week replacing the down town 2-way hydrants with 3-way hydrants.

All hydrants will be inspected, flushed, oiled and greased every 90 days. They will be painted as soon as the city crew can get to them, and will be repainted every year.

Chester Howard has been relieved of additional duties as Fire Marshal, and C. R. Chambers appointed Fire Marshal in addition to his duties as Assessor-Collector of Taxes. This change made effective September 1st.

The Fire Limits Ordinance recommended by the State Board is now being studied, and recommendations will be made to the City Council in the near future.

An additional 500 feet of fire hose will be purchased within a short time.

The City is showing a wonderful spirit of cooperation, trying to get Burk's key fire insurance rate down to the point where there will be no penalty. It is possible to earn a credit rate.
