

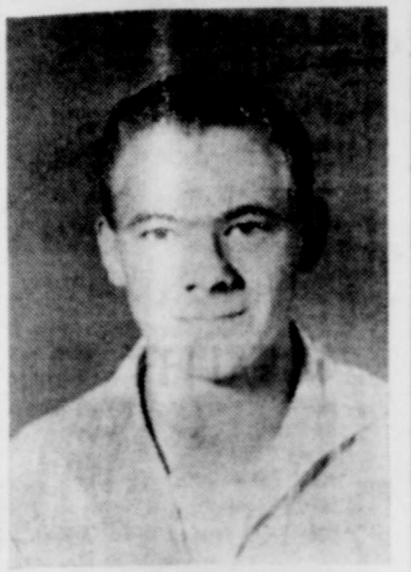

Bloodmobile To Be in Burkburnett Wed. Sept. 14th

The Wichita County Red Cross bloodmobile is set to collect blood in Burkburnett Wednesday, Sept. 14th in the Legion Hall. The last visit was May 31st when 22 pints were collected.

Donor hours are from 12 noon to 6 p. m., according to Joe Janeke, chairman of the Red Cross committee for the Burkburnett area.

Sponsored by the American Legion, the bloodmobile visit makes it easy for busy people to give a pint of blood to save a life and still be away from their jobs only a few minutes.

Burkburnett residents know from experience the importance of having blood on hand when needed and the necessity of giving regularly ahead of time.

Dr. Jos. A. Davey, chairman of the blood bank for Burkburnett, urged a large turn out of donors. Blood given during the bloodmobile visit can be credited to the individuals' future needs or past usage, he explained.

Residents here use over 200 pints of blood each year, blood bank officials said. They hope to collect 40 to 50 pints on each of the four visits yearly.

To pledge a pint of blood for the bloodmobile, call Joe Janeke, Dr. Davey or the Chamber of Commerce.

Churches and clubs may ask their members to credit their blood donations to them. Then as members and their families need blood it can be provided by the church group.



WILD SPENDING ORGY

There was a slight victory for the economy-minded citizens of the nation in the surplus of \$1.1 billion achieved in the Federal budget for fiscal '60. This was much larger than had been forecast.

What makes this surplus really look good is that is most certainly is a great improvement over the \$12.4 billion deficit of fiscal '59.

But what of fiscal '61? Unless economy-minded citizens keep their eyes on the Congress and exercise their voices, fiscal '61 threatens to roll up a deficit even bigger than that of fiscal '59.

The reconvening of Congress following on the heels of the 2 major political part conventions, is a serious threat to a balanced budget for fiscal '61, instead of the surplus of \$4.2 billion estimated last January.

Both political platforms promised all things to all men. During this short session, our national legislators of both parties are in a contest to see just how much money they can appropriate without the slightest concern as to where that money is to come from. The true national interest is being sacrificed to political expediency, as Republicans vie with Democrats to spend, spend and spend so that they can elect, elect and elect.

Thoughtful citizens who favor a balanced budget will do well to communicate their views to their Congressman, now. That seems to be the only hope for curbing a wild-spending orgy.

Penalizing Free Expression

The Saturday Evening Post says editorially: "What is a 'legitimate business expense'? Wages and salaries, trips to business conventions, advertising, membership in unions and trade associations, such items and many others are conceded by the Internal Revenue Service to be deductible from income. However when a company or an individual is threatened by a new law which could put him or it out of business, any money spent to defeat the proposed legislation is, according to the same authority not deductible from income."

This ruling directly and deeply affects a very long list of enterprises and organizations. A prime example is the electric utility business. It is clear that, if the public power advocates have their way, the private utilities will ultimately be entirely socialized. They have devoted advertising and other efforts to presenting their side of the case. But the Internal Revenue Service has decided that the costs thus incurred are not a legitimate business expense and hence are not deductible in making out their income tax returns. The result is that, if this ruling is allowed to stand, the utilities cannot present their arguments to the public or to legislative bodies except on pain of heavy tax penalty. And that amounts to nothing less than censorship by taxation.

This goes far beyond the question of whether you or anyone else wants public power or private power. If one industry can be penalized in this fashion, so can all others, along with any group which has and expresses an interest in any kind of legislation. The IRS has adamantly refused to change its position, and so the remedy lies in Congress. A bill to that end is pending. Of it, the Post well says: "It ought not to take the members of Congress long to decide whether it wants to promote discussions of public issues and sanction the right of citizens to protect their own interests, or whether it wants to leave the Internal Revenue Service as the final judge of when an American should be permitted, as far as the tax laws are concerned, to exercise this right."

Wonderful Vigor

Great changes have been taking place in the retail industry. These have aroused deep concern in some quarters. It's said, for instance, that everybody seems to be invading everybody else's field of business, and that distinction among types of retailing seems to be disappearing.

An editorial in Chain Store Age touches on this. Written by S. O. Kaylin, it says: "Well, I don't think the sweeping changes in retailing are terrible. Indeed, I think they are wonderful, for the consumer and retailing."

"They are a demonstration of the wonderful vigor of retailing. They supply evidence that our competitive economy is doing what it's supposed to do."

"The consumer has always had the final word on how merchandise would be presented and that fact has never been more evident than it is today."

Innovations in retailing have always been met with skepticism, opposition and worry. That was true of chain merchandising, of the self service system, of the shopping center concept. But all of these innovations have worked to the benefit of the retailer who had the energy and the ability and the willingness to meet new challenges and to the benefit of all customers.

Mr. Kaylin anticipates that there'll be plenty of additional changes in the retail picture in the next few years. He adds: "And forward looking retailers will welcome those new opportunities to give the customers what she wants."

Taxpayers' Nightmare

A billion dollars is a lot of money, but our national debt is a fantastic \$285 billion. The Citizens Public Expenditure survey, New York, a state-wide tax research organization, calculated that even if the government should end each year with a surplus of 1.1 billion and apply all of it to paying off the debt, it would still take about 260 years—until the year 2220—for the entire debt to be paid.

In the meantime, just the interest on the debt makes it the second most costly item on your federal tax bill. Only national defense costs more. We must continue to tell our legislators, on the local and state as well as the federal level, to keep government spending within revenues and step up the battle to reduce the debt.
