PRO BONUM PUBLICO

The Democratic and Republican parties have been drawing up campaign platforms every four years for a hundred years or better. Everyone of those platforms has been "in the best interest of the people"- but just what that phrase means has changed a good deal over the years.

When many of today's political thinkers refer to "the people", what they have in mind is the whole of society. They think of people as a group-a concept indistinguishable from the Marxist idea of "the Masses."

In contrast, the American political tradition has always conceived of "the people" as individuals, each endowed with supreme and equal worth by God. This revolutionary idea that each person has certain rights derived from an Authority higher than any government was proclaimed in the Declaration of Independence and written into the Constitution. On it Americans founded a nation in which government was to be the servant of the people rather than their master.

A close look at the platforms coming from the political conventions this month will show how the party leaders interpret the word "people". If they make large promises of more federal duties, powers and programs, watch out. Collectivization of power in a big central government is in the Marxist manner. Political leaders who want to protect the American heritage of personal rights and freedoms will advocate keeping as much government as possible at the local levels where each individual can keep an eye on it and make his voice heard.

Word From The Grass Roots

Reports indicate that the shelving of the proposed new Federal wage-hour bill, which occurred during the post convention Congressional session, was due in large part to grass roots opposition. The legislators were asked by numbers of their constituents to think again.

We will know what comes of that thinking next session, when this and other wage hour bills will come up for consideration again. Meanwhile, certain facets of the wage hour law situation are worth pondering.

The bill in question would do more than raise the legal minimum wage. It would extend coverage to millions of workers in local service enterprises, principally retailing, who have always been exempt. And this, it would seem, has aroused more thoughtful opposition than the wage factor, important as that is. The dangers that lie in applying an arbitrary minimum wage, which would be the same in the smallest village as in the greatest city, should certainly be evident to all. Living costs, needs, customs & conditions vary tremendously from one part of the country to another. Local problems, wherever they exist, should be corrected by local legislation.

It is true that one proposed bill would apply only to the larger retailers—those doing a certain volume of business. But a retailer no matter what his size, or whether he be an independent or part of a chain, must still compete locally. Many local considerations determine whether he will succeed or not.

Finally, it is probable that legislators were influenced by the fact that passage of a blanket-type bill would force the service businesses concerned to pare marginal employment to the limit The law can establish an arbitrary wage, at any level-but that will do no one any good if the jobs disappear.

Our Deteriorating Textbooks

Russell Kirk writes in National Review: "Anyone who has bothered to save school and college textbooks over the past forty or fifty years-or who will go to the trouble of turning over such textbooks as have accumulated in the attics of an old house can see for himself that there has been a dismaying deterioration of quality with the passing of the decades. The paper, binding, illustrations, and type-face all have improved; but in style and substance, the text itself, in nearly all disciplines, has been reduced to boring and deceptive generalizations.

Really first rate textbooks for high schools now are difficult to obtain: the educationist pressure groups have persuaded every big publisher in the field to adapt his textbooks to 'progressive' and 'permissive' standards—there has crept into textbooks a sermonizing indoctrination in 'socially approved attitudes,'-zeal for promoting equality of economic condition, fondness for the centralized welfare state, federal aid to schools, and all that Until very recent years, sweet sympathy for the aims of the Soviet peoples was on this list of approved attitudes."
