## Are You Disfranchised?

Millions upon millions of Americans do that, in effect, each election year. They do it by failing to vote. They're too lazy, too indifferent, or "too busy" to spend the brief time and effort it takes to go to the polling booth.  
The result is that people are elected to office, and often the highest offices, by what amounts to minority vote.  
We all pay lip service to the right of free franchise. And that's as it should be—it is the greatest single defense we have against dictatorship and political oppression. But it is meaningless unless the words are matched with deeds.  
The future of freedom depends on men and women who will analyze candidates and platforms, choose those they think best capable of guiding the nation's destinies in the stormy days that lie ahead—and vote accordingly.

## Bureaucracy In Action

Ever wonder why more school youngsters are not employed?  
A friend of ours owns a small factory. His 16 year old son decided that it would be nice if his father gave him a job in the factory during the summer vacation. An excellent idea, said the father, who promptly boasted to his foreman about the "chip off the old block."  
But the foreman was a cautious fellow and immediately began to sprinkle cold water on the father's enthusiasm. In order to employ the boy for a few weeks, he pointed out, the father would have to do these things:  
Apply for a special permit for the employment of a minor.  
Deduct 20% from wages paid to the boy, for income tax purposes.  
Apply at the end of the boy's employment, to the Internal Revenue Bureau for permission to refund the 20% since the boy would not be earning enough in the vacation period to make him eligible as an income tax payer.  
Report the boy's earnings along with his own, at the end of the current tax year, and pay taxes on them since the boy is a minor.  
Report the termination of the boy's employment.  
Sequel: The boy attended a summer camp.

### Wichita County Highway Bond Issue

**Questions and Answers**

Information has been gathered from reliable official sources in response to questions of Wichita County citizens. It is presented to help you understand the \$1,750,000 Highway Bond Issue to be voted upon Tuesday, November 8, 1960.

- 1.—Question: How will the money from the Highway Bond Issue be used?  
Answer: It will be used to buy right-of-way for the Red River Valley Expressway and for precinct road projects.
  - 2.—Question: How much right-of-way remains to be purchased on the expressway system?  
Answer: Approximately 38 1/4 miles of right-of-way still needs to be purchased to complete the 53 mile expressway system.
  - 3.—Question: How much will this additional right-of-way cost?  
Answer: The County's share will be \$1,338,000.
  - 4.—Question: Where will the remainder of the \$1,750,000 go?  
Answer: It will be used for needed precinct road improvements.
  - 5.—Question: How much will the bond issue increase taxes?  
Answer: 10c on \$100 of assessed taxable value.
  - 6.—Question: What would the bond issue cost the average tax payer?  
Answer: A home in Wichita County worth \$10,000 is probably assessed \$2,500 valuation, and at a 10c tax rate, the added cost of taxes would be \$2.50 per year.
  - 7.—Question: Might the tax rate be less or the bonds paid off sooner than 22 years?  
Answer: Yes.
  - 8.—Question: How will the expressway system benefit the citizens of the county?  
Answer: It will give them savings in time and fuel, greater safety and less traffic congestion.
  - 9.—Question: Who will pay the construction costs of the expressway system?  
Answer: State gasoline taxes and vehicle license fees paid by all drivers furnishes money for highway construction.
  - 10.—Question: Will the expressway system help the county grow and prosper?  
Answer: Yes, tying into a network of other divided highways, it means a new avenue for movement of goods to the center of the United States. This gives Wichita County an opportunity for further development as a distribution center for the Southwest.
  - 11.—Question: When will the expressway be completed?  
Answer: Five to seven years if the right of way is obtained.
  - 12.—Question: What will happen if the bond issue is not passed?  
Answer: State construction money will be delivered to areas and counties with right-of-way available.

# The Great Men of My Time

Henry Cabot Lodge for the vice presidency, he revealed a trait that many of us already knew he owned in abundance, the willingness to separate himself from the herd, to plow a new row, to choose a course of non-conformity as opposed to a path of go-along-to-get-along sameness that spells mediocrity at best.

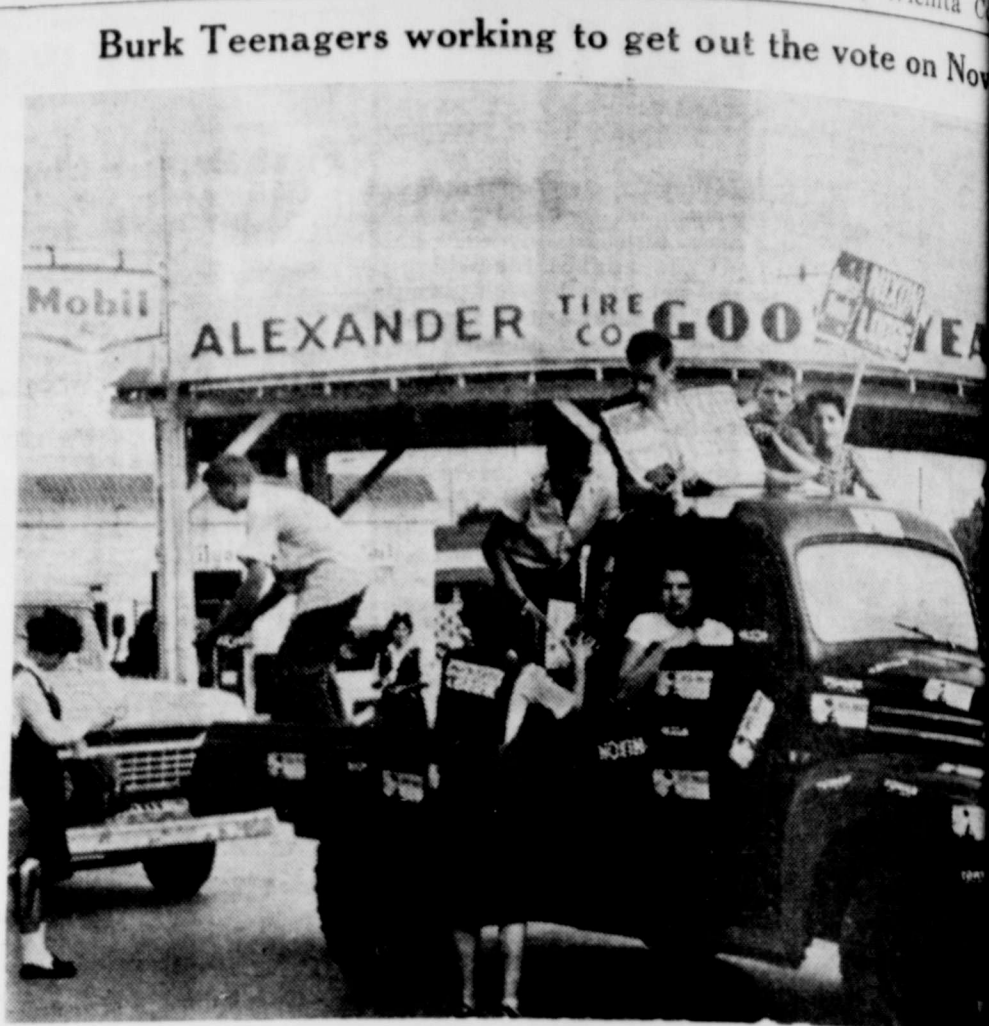

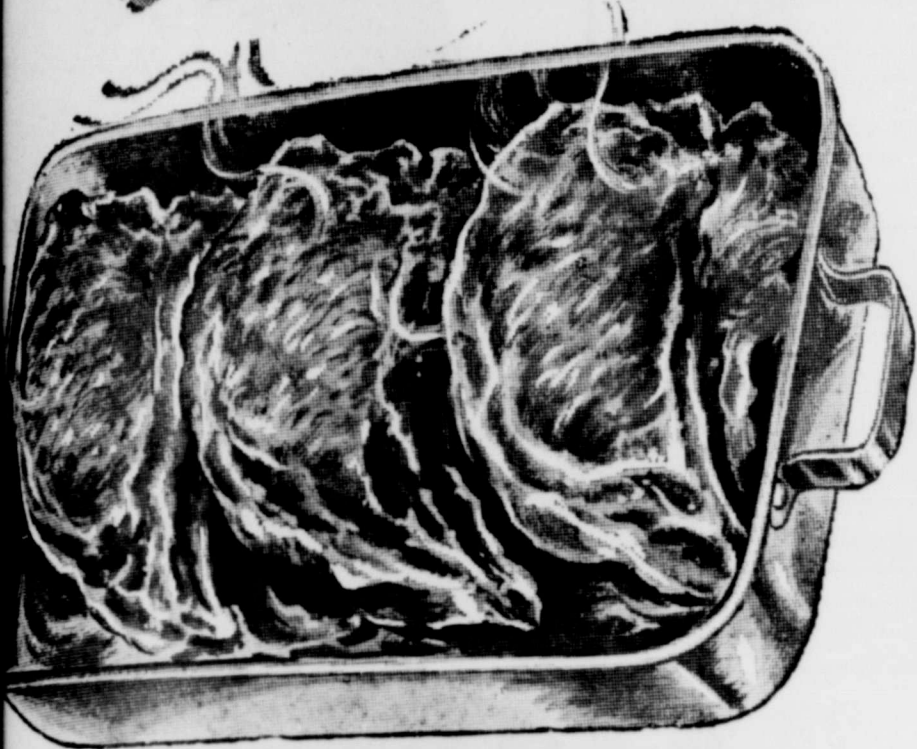

### Texas State Dept. of Health

While the national birth rate is steadily declining, the birth rate for Texas has remained stable according to provisional data for the first six months of 1958, 1959 and 1960.

During the first six months of this year there were 110,996 live births in Texas, compared to 110,774 during the same period last year and 108,395 in the first half of 1958.

The birth rates for 1958 and 1959 were identical, 23.6 per 1,000 population. However, during the first six months of 1960 it was only 23.2 per 1,000 which is a slight drop but still above the national average.

Another development indicat-

ed in the six months provisional statistical data is the upturn in the death rate for Texans.

For the past 15 years, the Texas death rate has declined steadily year after year, but so far during 1960 there has been an increase. The death rate for the first six months is 8.3 per 1,000 population. The total deaths were 39,498.

In 1958 there were 36,630 deaths for a rate of 8.0 per 1,000 and in 1959 there were only 36,033 deaths indicating an all time low of 7.7 deaths per 1,000 population.

If this rate remains through the year, it is possible that 1960 will have the highest death rate since 1951, when it was 8.2 per 1,000 population.

Very little change was noted in the number of fatal deaths and fatal death ratios during the first six months of the last three years.

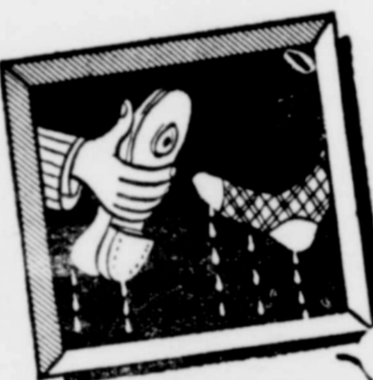

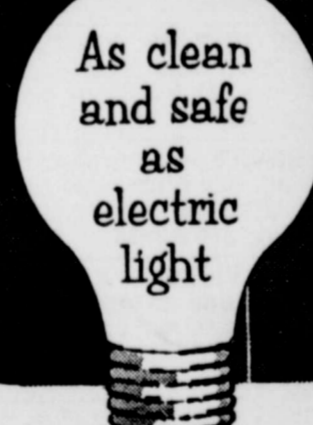
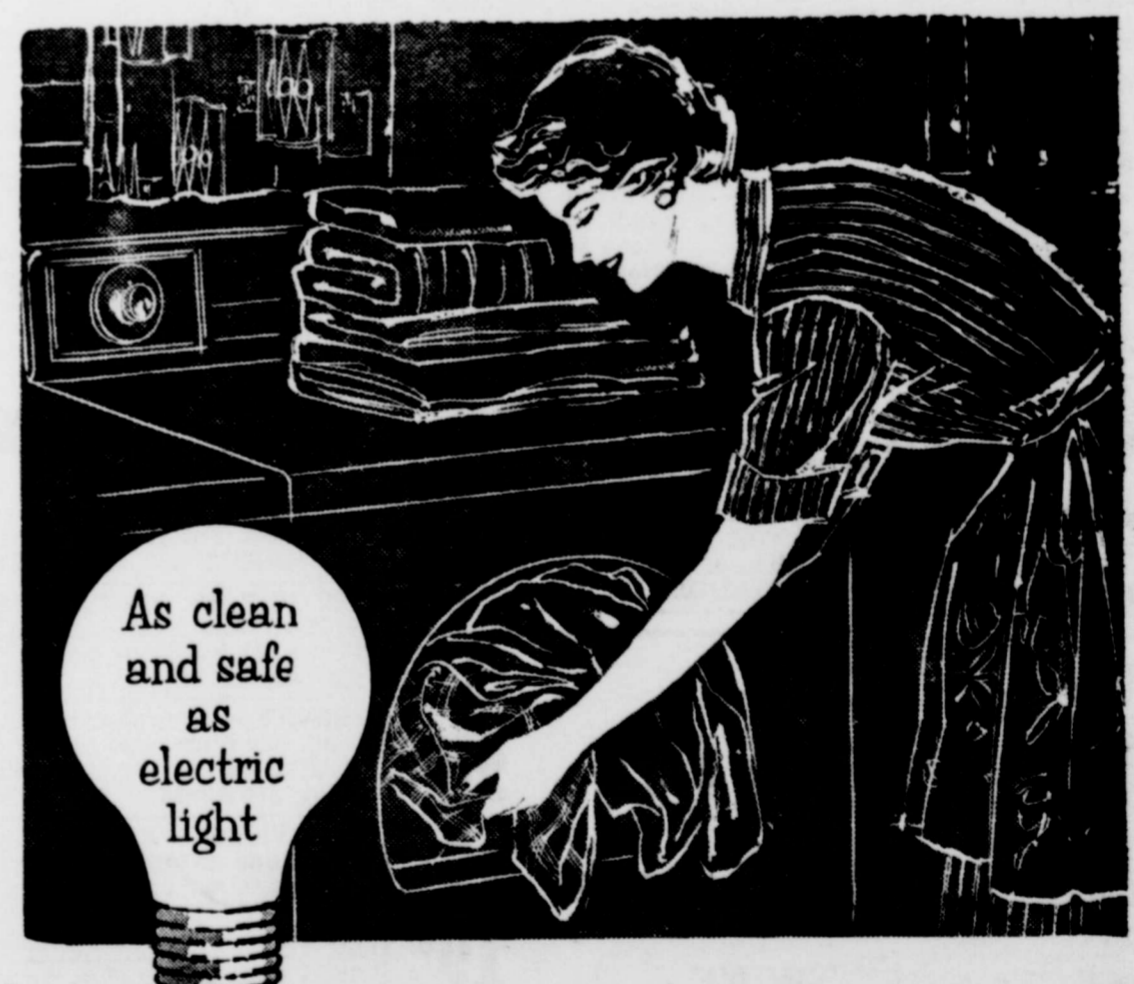
