Ever wonder why more school youngesters are not employed? A friend of ours owns a small factory. His 16 year old son decided that it would be nice if his father gave him a job in the factory during the summer vacation. An excellent idea, said the father, who promptly boasted to his foreman about the "chip off the old block.

But the foreman was a cautious fellow and immediately began to sprinkle cold water on the father's enthusiasm. In order to employ the boy for a few weeks, he pointed out, the father would have to do these things:

Apply for a special permit for the employment of a minor. Deduct 20% from wages paid to the boy, for income tax purposes. Apply at the end of the boy's employment, to the Internal Revenue Bureau for permission to refund the 20% since the boy would not be earning enough in the vacation period to make him

eligible as an income tax payer. Report the boy's earnings along with his own, at the end of the current tax year, and pay taxes on them since the boy is a minor. Report the termination of the boy's employment.
