#### Union Made Government?

Organized labor is making a mighty effort to capture the United States government in November.

COPE, the AFL-CIO Committee on Political Education, has amassed a huge treasury and marshalled an army of door bell ringers to push election of the unions' hand picked candidates.

Striving to put a union label on the Democratic party, union leaders succeeded in getting an amazing number of their own legislative policies written into the party's national platform. They have loudly endorsed the party nationally and are now repeating the endorsement state-by-state.

But the labor bosses do not balk at party lines. Individual candidates-whether Democrat or Republican-have been singled out for defeat or support on the single question of whether they will follow the labor line.

The union goal is a Congress and Administration that will enact labor's full legislative program. This is the same program that only a few years ago almost completely socialized Great plantings in the Eastern half of Britain and threw that nation into a monumental bureaucratic the United States. and economic mess.

The labor leaders may not reach their goal, this year or any year. Politicians hopeful of obtaining public money for their pet projects now are unanimously claiming that more government spending means more economic growth.

Americans never had to worry about long-term growth until recent years. It is no coincidence that those are the very years in which government was increasing its tax receipts eight times as sunny location and well drainfast as Americans were increasing their national income.

This tax load has made it harder for individuals and busimesses to save money. Economic growth always has come from the savings that people invest in new and expanded business. And that is the only way that economic growth can occur.

Many of the things that government spends money for are desirable and neccessary. All of them are at the expense of economic growth or at the expense of private consumption by American families.

The American people are willing to make these sacrifices for worthwhile and necessary governmental services. But they will not be long fooled into confusing governmental spending with economical growth. And they will do well to suspect the honesty or the sanity of any politician who tries to fool them in this way.

### WANT AN OIL WELL

At one time or another, just about everyone has said, "Wish I had an oil well." For oil wells have become symbols of great and easily come by wealth.

But symbolism and fact can be two very different things-as a feature article in Newsweek makes clear. As soak them in household amthe magazine puts it, oilmen are tapping fresh barrels of trouble with every new well they drill. The industry is pouring out a flood of products that has over whelmed demand and played hob with prices. According to the U. S. Interior Department, world production is running at some 5.5 barrels a day more than the 19.5 million barrels the world consumes. In the words of the president of one of the world's greatest companies, Standard of New Jersey, the current situation amounts to "one of the roughest stretches in our history."

Our cold war enemies, needless to say, are contributing to the problem. Newsweek adds that: "The Russians with no concern for profit margins" have been dumping high quantities of cheap oil daily into free world markets" and are stepping up the marketing drive.

The American oilmen, along with their free world equivalents, are moving to solve the problem in various ways. Increased emphasis on marketing is now the first of these. To quote Standard of New Jersey's president again, "The marketer has become the fair-haired boy to whom the other branches of the business are turning for salvation." Meanwhile, owning an oil well, or thousands of oil wells, isn't the unqualified boon so many think.

#### News From The County Agent

Farmers in the Wichita Falls area are busy harvesting pecans. The crop this year, as a whole is good. The crop is estimated to be 25% better than last year. The quality is also good. Now is a good time to purchase some pecans for Thanksgiving and Christmas.

Farmers are real busy at present time planting small grain and winter legumes. There has been approximately 65% of the small grain planted in the county. The cotton harvest is still in full swing.

Twig blight is a common disease of cedar, arborvitae, juniper and cypress. The fungus disease is more apt to be a problem in areas of higher rainfall or during seasons of above average rainfall. It occurs in epidemic form in coniforius nurseries and in ornamental

Tips of branches turn brown with progressive dying back. A whole branch or even a young tree may be killed. Trees over five wars are not apt to be killa very short time.

Anyone can grow roses. They may be planted in the fall or spring. In Texas, fall planting generally preferred.

Aim for quality and you may also get quantity. Many gardeners try to grow too many varieties or too many plants. Given careful attention, B. T. Haws, pleasure than 50 poorly tended plants.

Essentials for success with roses are: proper planting, a ed soil. Start with No. 1 grade plants, and have the ground ready when the plants arrive. Make sure roots are never exposed to sunlight or drying
