Dangerous Distractions

The next administration will have to deal with two crucial responsibilities—national defense and foreign policy. It seems likely that the survival of this nation and of the free world will depend upon how successfully these responsibilities are met.

Defense and foreign policy are true national responsibilities, since they can not be handled by any branch of government below the federal level. Because of their importance, they need the fullest and most skillful attention of both the Congress and the Executive. Yet in dealing with them, the national government will be hampered by a surplus of "national" problems that are truly national. Most of these problems can and should be handled at the state, county and city level where they originate.

Lack of local funds is most often given as the reason for not dealing locally with problems such as slums, roads and schools. Yet, except for import duties, the federal government has access to no tax sources that are not available to the state and local governments. The total of national wealth is no greater than the sum of local wealth in the nation.

Putting more and more burdens on the federal government—as many political candidates have advocated—is dangerously shortsighted. Every secondary duty that distracts the national government from its primary responsibility for foreign policy and defense increases the danger of war and disaster.

Storm Warnings Go Up

"There seems to be a point beyond which people simply will not be taxed, and when a tax reaches that point it becomes self-defeating."

That statement comes from an article in a magazine published by the Sun Oil Company. It is substantiated by all manner of historical examples. In 18th century France a tax was placed on fireplaces—so people stopped building fireplaces. In 17th Century Holland a house tax was based on the number and hize of windows—so windowless houses became the vogue. England's Parliament once imposed a tax on horses, so farmers took to riding cows.

The present outstanding example would seem to be the gasoline tax, which now totals about 50% of the retail value of the fuel—a percentage which isn't borne by even such luxuries as mink coats and diamonds, much less any other absolute necessity. As the article puts the case, "While it is too early to reach any category conclusions, we wonder if the storm warnings aren't going up, whether motorists haven't become fed up paying \$3 for \$2 worth of gasoline and whether we aren't now facing the first signs of a consumer revolt which could mean that any further increase in gasoline taxes actually will bring even less revenues."

The signs are certainly there. According to the New York Times, if the trend to smaller cars continues at the present rate, gasoline tax revenues by 1964 will be \$548 million below what they could ordinarily be expected to total. Here's a case of tax extremism in which everyone is the loser.

Dazzling Show Case

The magazine, Successful Grocer, quotes a leading marketing specialist, Dr. Leo J. Shapiro, as saying that the retail food market will change radically in the 1960's. He adds that there are two major forces behind the "big change"—growth in technology and growth in leisure. He believes that "fantastic quantities of leisure time merchandise will be sold through retailing outlets and food stores will be one of the outlets."

Retailing, it is clear from this, is an example of the old saying that nothing is permanent but change." And the vast anticipated changes Dr. Shapiro describes will, of course, affect all branches of the retail industry, not just food. We are in a technological revolution of enormous intensity. New techniques and discoveries are appearing at a bewildering rate. There seems to be no limit to the ability of man to improve his material lot.

We are also witnessing a dramatic example of the fact that mass distribution is the full partner of mass production, and that neither could be successful without the other. The retail store is America's showcase—and it is a dazzling one indeed.

VOICE FOR THE VOICELESS

In Telephone Talk I mentioned the success of Echo, the communication satellite in miles above the earth. There are still another product of communication research. It's a new artificial larynx to help impaired vocal chords to speak again. This larynx is really a "new voice" for those who have lost the use of their vocal chords. When placed in the throat, this 7-ounce device (looks somewhat like a flashlight) replaces the vibrations of normal vocal chords to produce speech. It is being offered on a trial basis. Some of the great scientific achievements such as space communications, the Bell solar battery and transistor (pioneered by Bell scientists), it's reassuring that telephone research has not overlooked human needs for better communications services.

"Landscape design changes as surely as the fashion of ladies hats," said Mrs. Carl Morrison, guest speaker at the meeting of the Unity Garden club Thursday, Nov. 9th. The meeting was held in the home of Mrs. T. J. Campbell with Mrs. W. R. Stimpson as co-hostess.

Mrs. Morrison, graduate of school one of landscape design at A&M, College Station, Tex., further stated that there are 3 areas to be considered in landscaping: the public area, the private area and the service area. For the public area, the part of the yard viewed from the street, there is the lawn, the foundation planting and usually a shade tree. The change being made in this area is the tendency toward smaller trees such as the mimosa or flowering peach. Foundation planting is becoming smaller too. A better effect may be obtained if we plant more of one variety & by keeping the design simple and by keeping a predominant flower throughout. For a green lawn it is necessary to fertilize as well as to water and to mow often.

The private area of the yard is enhanced by a fence or hedge which not only gives privacy but protection for plants and lawn. All should be designed according to the amount of time and energy to be expended. Good housekeeping shows in your yard as well as in your house.

Continuous display may be had from petunias, geraniums, caladiums and coleus. Daffodils do well here and give good spring display. Use one predominant color with fillers in that harmonize. Low maintenance plants and plants are in demand. The use of rocks and concrete is popular. A garden should reflect its owner and his way of life.
