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No Mandate

Writing in U. S. News and World Report, just after the election, David Lawrence said: "This is the time when we are all extorted to let bygones be bygones and to give our new leader the wholehearted support of all the people. But it is time for more than mere exhortation to the populace. It is time to remind the successful party and the victorious candidate for all offices that elections do not settle fundamental issues but merely serve as vivid reminders of the diversity of interests and pressures that make up the modern political struggle."

This is not a carping observation. It takes nothing away from Senator Kennedy's victory. But it does spotlight a development of a unique nature. This presidential election, unlike any other presidential election of modern times, supplies absolutely no mandate for a party or a candidate. The popular vote was practically evenly divided between Mr. Kennedy and Mr. Nixon. A switch of a handful of votes would have swung the scales the other way.

Mr. Kennedy has been charged with an awesome responsibility—to keep this country strong, secure and free in a chaotic and unpredictable world. But neither he nor anyone else has been directed by 180 million people to make sweeping and revolutionary changes in the philosophy on which this nation was built, and which has made it great. The highly vocal advocates of an ever-expanding, ever more costly welfare state, got nowhere in this year's historic election.

Two Old Adages

The old adage tells us that "when the cat's away, the mice will play."

A rough paraphrase would be that when the attention of the people is distracted, minority groups may be able to slip over some legislative fast ones.

Today the distractions are unprecedented in scope, urgency and complexity. The boiling world situation alone assures that. As a consequence, many of us may fasten our eyes on the huge and comparatively new problems and controversies, and, in doing that, fail to keep a watch on movements here at home which present a very real and present danger to our liberties, our pocketbooks and our system of government.

Take, for instance, the public vs private electric power issue. It played a minor role in this year's political campaigns. But there is not a shadow of a doubt that every effort will be given to furthering socialized power in commerce, and that it would unnecessarily consume huge sums of tax money, while destroying tax-paying industries, will not deter the zealots. Indeed, it is only logical that they will press harder than ever at times when a multitude of other issues and problems grip the public attention. So another old adage applies—eternal vigilance is the price of liberty. And today we need to be more vigilant than ever before.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

WASHINGTON, IOWA, JOURNAL: "I feel sorry for the newspaper workers who slave for the metropolitan sheets. They have to work in a mechanical and impersonal atmosphere. The smaller the town the more important the news becomes. That's where the folks know all the news before the paper comes out, and they take it simply to see whether or not the editor got the stories according to the way they heard them."

FRANKLIN, N. C. PRESS: "Who would deny that the average American today has much less personal freedom than he had prior to 1914? In scores, perhaps hundreds, of ways, big and little, his life has become regulated. In some states today a man is told, with government sanction, that he may work only if he joins a labor union. Another rarely noted, is the curb on the citizen's right to protest. That right is basic; and the most effective of all protests is the refusal to pay taxes. But how can a man refuse to pay tax that is deducted from his wages?"

WEST POINT, MISS., LEADER: "When Social Security taxes were first levied in 1937, the maximum combined annual tax on employer and employee amounted to \$60. or \$30 each. By 1960 the combined tax on employers and employees will be \$432. or \$216 each. Since 1957, when more people became beneficiaries, the Trust fund has been declining because it has been paying out more than it received. The deficit in 1959 amounted to \$1.7 billion. Social Security cannot continue to go up and still be security."

WORKING WITH WOOD

Homes, buildings and other wooden structures hundreds of years old provide evidence of wood's resistance to the ravages of time. Wood does not decay from age. Decay occurs only as the result of the action of certain wood destroying fungi.

There are several ways to prevent wood from decaying. Since the fungi which causes decay are plants, we can create conditions in the wood, which are unsuitable for these plants to live. If wood is kept dry, with a moisture content under 20% fungi will not grow. This fact is important to home owners.

In addition to moisture, oxygen is another necessity for the growth of wood destroying fungi. If wood is completely submerged in water, fungi cannot survive and such wood will not decay. This fact is utilized when planning and building off-shore structures.

Another method of preventing decay is to make the wood distasteful or poisonous to wood destroying fungi. This can be accomplished by an effective treatment with proven wood preservatives. Preservative treated wood should always be used when attack by insects and fungi is likely.

ORDINANCE NO. 247

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE PRESENCE OF MINORS UNDER THE AGE OF TWENTY (20) YEARS ON PUBLIC STREETS AND OTHER PLACES BETWEEN CERTAIN HOURS; DEFINING DUTIES OF PARENTS OR OTHERS IN CARE OF MINORS; PROVIDING FOR ARRESTS AND PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF; REPEALING ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT THEREWITH; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, an emergency exists by reason of a large number of minors being on the streets at night in the City of Burk Burnett, in Wichita County, Texas, which has overtaxed the law enforcement agencies of the City of Burk Burnett, because of influxes of population, overcrowded living conditions, the presence of numerous strangers and transients, transportation inadequacies and irregularities, special efforts required to prevent vice; over-crowded public places, and the like; and

WHEREAS, due to these emergency conditions now prevailing, juvenile criminal delinquency now in the City of Burk Burnett, has so increased as to become a menace to the preservation of public peace, safety, health, morals and welfare;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT:

Section 1. Loitering of Minors Prohibited. It shall be unlawful for any minor under the age of twenty (20) years to loiter, idle, wander, stroll or play in or upon the public streets, highways, roads, alleys, parks playgrounds or other public grounds public places and public build-

ings, place of amusement and entertainment, vacant lots or other unsupervised places between the hours of 11:00 P. M. and 4:00 A. M. of the following day, Central Standard Time, on Sundays, Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays and between the hours of 12:30 O'clock A. M. on Friday and Saturdays and 4:00 A. M. of the following day; provided that on any day in which the public schools of the City of Burk Burnett, Texas, are not in session, or on any day just prior to the day in which the public schools in the City of Burk Burnett, Texas, are not in session, that the provisions of this Section do not apply on said day and such hours hereby extended to 12:30 A. M., and 4:00 A. M., on the following day; provided however that the provisions of this Section do not apply to a minor accompanied by his or her parent, guardian or other adult person or where the minor is upon an emergency errand or legitimate business directed by his or her parent, guardian or other adult person, having the care and custody of said minor.

Each violation of this Section shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 2. Responsibility of Parents. It shall be unlawful for the parent, guardian or other adult persons having the care and custody of a minor under the age of twenty (20) years, to knowingly permit such a minor to loiter, idle, wander or stroll or play in or upon the public streets, highways, roads, alleys, parks, playgrounds, or other public grounds, public places and public buildings, place of amusement and entertainment, vacant lots or other unsupervised places between the hours of 11:00 P. M. and 4:00 A. M. of the following day, Central Standard Time, on Sundays, Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays and between the hours of 12:30 o'clock midnight on Fridays and Saturdays and 4:00 A. M. of the following day; provided, however, that the provisions of this Section do not apply when the minor is accompanied by his

or her parents, guardian, or other adult person having the care and custody of the minor; and where the minor is upon an emergency errand or legitimate business directed by his or her parent, guardian or other adult person having the care and custody of the minor; and provided that on any day in which the public schools of the City of Burk Burnett, Texas, are not in session, or on any day just prior to the day that such public schools in the City of Burk Burnett, Texas, are not in session, that the provisions of this Section do not apply on said day and such hours are hereby extended to 12:30 A. M. and 4:00 A. M. on the following day.

Each violation of this Section shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 3. Penalties. Any minor violating the provisions of Section 1 hereof shall be dealt with in accordance with Juvenile Law and Procedure, and if of the age of seventeen (17) years or over shall be subject to a fine of not less than five nor more than two hundred dollars. Any parent, guardian, or other adult person having the care and custody of a minor violating Section 2 hereof, shall be fined not less than five, nor more than two hundred dollars.

Such fine shall be applicable for each offense as defined by this Ordinance and each violation of the provisions of this Section shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 4. Repeal of Conflicting Ordinances. All existing Ordinances of the City of Burk Burnett are hereby repealed insofar as they may be inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 5. Separability of Provisions. It is the intention of the Board that each separate provision of this ordinance shall be deemed independent of all other provisions herein, and it is further the intention of the

Board of Commissioners if any provisions ordinance be declared null and void, all other provisions shall remain valid and enforceable.

Section 6. Fiscal Emergency. This Ordinance shall be passed as an emergency measure, and the ordinance is passed clear that an emergency which makes it imperative that this ordinance be published forthwith; the publication; the emergency being as follows:

That conditions existing in the City of Burk Burnett, Texas, make it necessary to provide for the public peace, safety, health, morals and welfare of the streets and places for the pur- tailing juvenile delinquency, making this ordinance immediately upon its passage.

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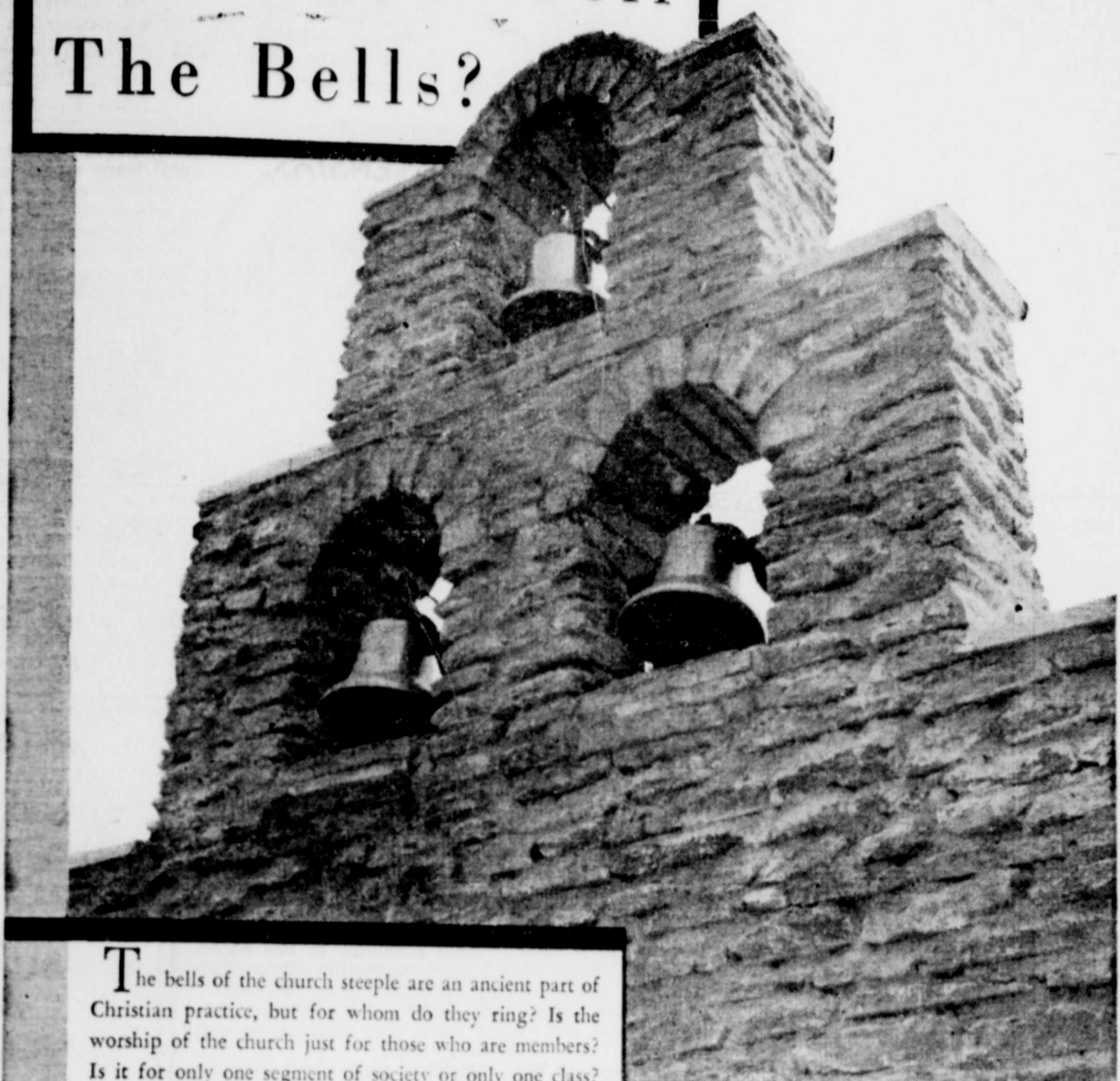

just before the day of infamy at Pearl Harbor. Civil Air Patrol was formed almost overnight to meet the emergency. Predictions were that it would die just as quickly, when hostilities ceased.

The exact opposite came true. There were too many ardent, aviation-minded men and women of considerable stature to allow such a history-making, heroically proved organization like CAP to drift into limbo.

It was Gen. H. H. "Hap" Arnold, Army Air Force wartime commander, who spearheaded the move to incorporate CAP, and this was done by public law on July 1, 1946; it became a benevolent, nonprofit organization under Federal charter without financial assistance from the Air Force.

Later, in May 1948, CAP was designated by statute a civilian auxiliary of the Air Force and the military service provided a professional national headquarters staff of military and civilian employees to advise and administer to the organization in its many corporate responsibilities.

Brig. Gen. Stephen D. McElroy, USAF, is CAP's national commander and commander of the Air Force financed advisory staff of 385; Col William C. Whelen, CAP, Nashville, Tenn., and Jacksonville, Fla., construction engineering executive, is CAP's national board chairman.

December 1, 1960—CAP's 19th anniversary, finds this Air Force auxiliary a substantial, dues-paying volunteer flying organization in over 1900 communities with 70,000 adult and teen-agers in 52 wings, in each state, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico. to advance his aerospace knowledge.

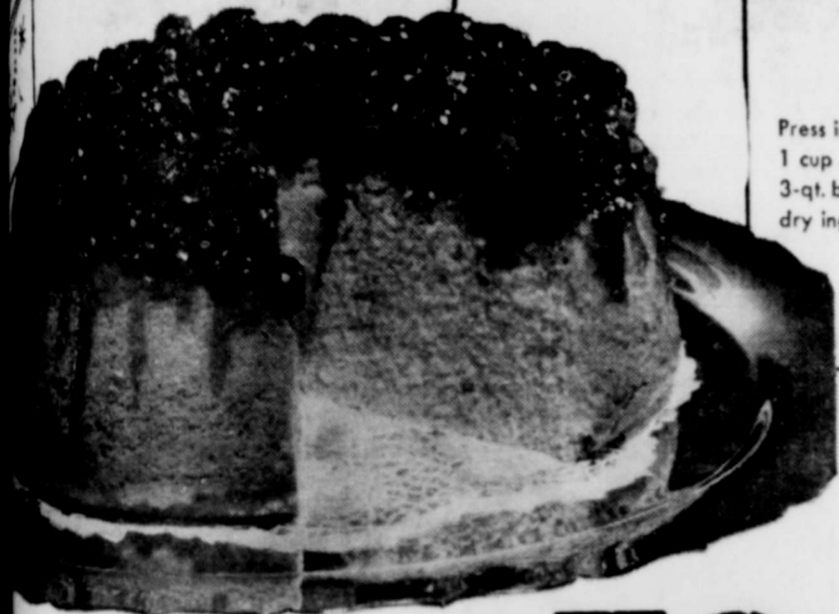

3 Tablesp. melted butter or margarine
 2 cups sugar
 2 cups fresh cranberries
 1/2 cup shortening
 2 eggs
 1 teasp. vanilla
 2 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
 1 Tablesp. baking powder
 1/2 teasp. salt
 1 cup PET Evaporated Milk

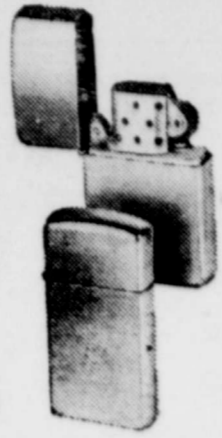

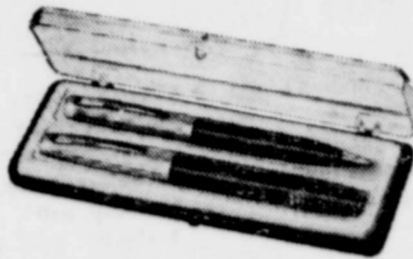

the Commissioners all matters for the development and advancement of the City's facilities, and, particularly, shall pass upon the application for plats requested under Article 974-A of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas.

(b) To make plans and maps of the whole or any part or portion of the City and of land outside the City located within five (5) miles of the City limits, and any other land outside the City, which, in the opinion of the Planning Board, bears a relation to the planning of the City, and to make changes in, additions to, and extensions of such plans or maps when it deems the same advisable.

(c) To confer with and advise private property owners pertaining to location and erection of private structures with the view of having same conform to the over-all city plan, and to advise with the building inspectors and Department of Public Works in the performance of their duties.

(d) To aid and assist the Commissioners in the preparation of budgets and determination of sources of funds, and in the procuring of financial and other assistance for the City from the State and Federal Governments and their agencies for each and all of the purposes herein enumerated.

(e) To act with and assist all other municipal and governmental agencies, and particular-

ly by Commissioners of the City of Burkburnett, in formulating and executing proper plans of municipal development and growth.

(f) To plan and recommend the location, plan, and extent of city alleyways, viaducts, bridges, subways, parkways, airports, automobile parking places, and other public grounds and public improvements; for the location of public buildings, schools, and other public properties; and of public utilities, including bus terminals, railroads, railroad depots, and terminals, whether publically or privately owned, for water, lights, sanitation, sewerage, sewage disposal, drainage, flood control, transportation, communication, marketing and shipping facilities, power and other purposes, and for the removal, relocation, widening, extension, narrowing, vacation, abandonment or change of use of any of the foregoing public places, facilities, or utilities.

(g) To select and recommend to the Commissioners routes of streets, avenues, and boulevards, including the opening, widening, and abandonment of the same, or of any alley, or the changing thereof to conform with the City's system, present and future, with reference to traffic.

(h) To investigate, consider, and report to the Commissioners upon the layout or platting of any new subdivision of the City or of property situated within five (5) miles of the City limits, and to recommend the approval of all plans, plats, or replats of additions within the City limits or within five (5) miles of the same, or of the rejection of either.

(i) To suggest to the Commissioners of the City, plans for clearing the City of slums and blighted areas.

(j) To make any recommendation that seems expedient and in consonance with future zoning plans or laws, and with reference to the use of the present zoning of the City.

(k) The Board shall, from time to time, recommend to the Commissioners passage of such ordinances as may be necessary to carry out its program.

Six Persons Die In Wichita County By Automobiles

Santa has never failed to make his rounds yet, possibly because he uses an air borne sleigh for transportation. But judging from the record, if the jolly old gent had to use Wichita County highways, he might not get to your house for Christmas.

So far this year, automobile accidents have killed 6 persons, injured 106, and have caused property damage amounting to \$88,848, in this county.

In November the Highway Patrol investigated 13 accidents in this county. These wrecks accounted for 1 person killed, 12 injured and property damage of \$12,047.

"Ninety-seven persons were killed in Texas automobile mishaps during the Christmas-New Year holiday period last year." Highway Patrol Sgt. F. E. Webster warned. "Sixty-eight per cent of these deaths occurred on rural roads and highways. Therefore, motorists should drive with caution when making holiday trips this year."

The Department of Public Safety has predicted 90 traffic deaths during the 1960 Christmas holiday season. But in an effort to reduce that grim figure, the Department of Public Safety has assigned all officers to round the clock duty using all means available to rid the highways of those twin menaces to public safety—the drinking driver and the speeding driver.

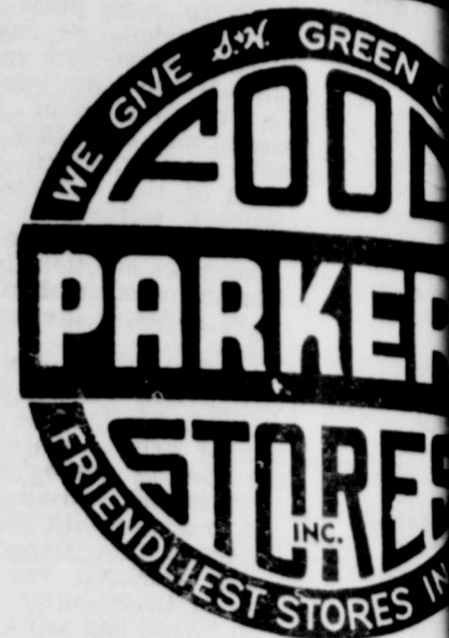
