### Lieutenant Colonel Floyd G. Seay Is Commended



Lt. Col. Floyd G. Seay has been awarded a medal for meritorious service from Randolph Air Force Base, Texas.

THE ORDER:  
"By direction of the Secretary of the Air Force, under the provisions of paragraph 29, Air Force Regulation 900-7, the Air Force Commendation Medal is awarded to Major Floyd G. Seay, A01541364, 13 August, 1956 to 18 August, 1960."

THE CITATION:  
"Major Floyd G. Seay distinguished himself by meritorious service at the USAF Hospital, Sheppard Air Force Base, Texas, from 13 August, 1956 to 18 August, 1960. During this period he improved the administrative functioning and coordination of the many professional divisions of the Hospital Professional Service which contributed immeasurably toward the comfort and well-being of the 23,000 in-patients and 475,000 out-patients who have been cared for during this period. In addition, Major Seay has saved the United States Air Force many thousands of dollars in appropriated funds through his outstanding management of available manpower and materials. At the same time he has contributed generously of his time toward Air Force and local church and community activities. The talent, energy and unselfish devotion to duty displayed

by Major Seay reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Air Force."  
Lt. Col. Floyd G. Seay and his family reside at 116 East College. After retiring from the service on August 31, 1960 he has continued to make his home in Burkburnett. At present he is attending evening classes at Midwestern University to obtain additional college credits. He is majoring in Business Administration.

Lt. Col. Seay is a thirty-second degree Mason, with membership in Scottish Rite Consistory, Little Rock, Arkansas, and an active member of the Calvary Baptist Church.

When he retired, Lt. Col. Seay had twenty-five years and seven days military service. He served in the Philippines from 1936 to 1939; on Corregidor, 1948-1949; in Saudi Arabia; and the Territory of Alaska, 1956-1956. He is one of the few remaining military people around who was a member of the horse cavalry. He served 2 years, 1941-42 in the 4th Cavalry Medical Department and one year, 1935-36, in the horse drawn field artillery.

### "Drive Lighted And Live" Slogan Highway Dept.

The ears of Texas automobile drivers are beginning to ring for the third time this year, with a little four word slogan that has been used effectively in helping to reduce death by automobile on Texas streets & highways: "Drive Lighted and Live."

Gov. Price Daniel has been advised by President Jim Hairgrove of Freeport, head of the Texas Association of Broadcasters, that most Texas radio and TV stations are joining in a campaign to enlist as many motorists as possible in driving safely and legally while they are using the highways.

The State's broadcasters adopted the "Drive Lighted and Live" idea and slogan for each of the three major holiday traffic safety campaigns sponsored by the Governor's Highway Safety Commission, the Texas Safety Association and numerous State agencies, the fourth of July, Labor Day and Christmas and New Year's.

The idea originated with a Victoria businessman, R. B. Roos for the Labor Day holiday in 1959. With the backing of Victoria Banker James R. Garrison, member of the Governor's Highway Safety Commission from Victoria county, radio stations there experimented with the idea. Numerous industrial concerns in that area joined in the plan, carried it out with company cars and trucks and secured cooperation of their employees. The result? No deaths and not a single serious crash in several counties surrounding Victoria.

During Christmas, 1959, the same plan was tried in the Corpus Christi area and again, there were no deaths and not a single serious crash.

The idea is very simple: Drivers are urged to drive with the car headlights burning during the daytime as a signal that they are driving safely and legally.

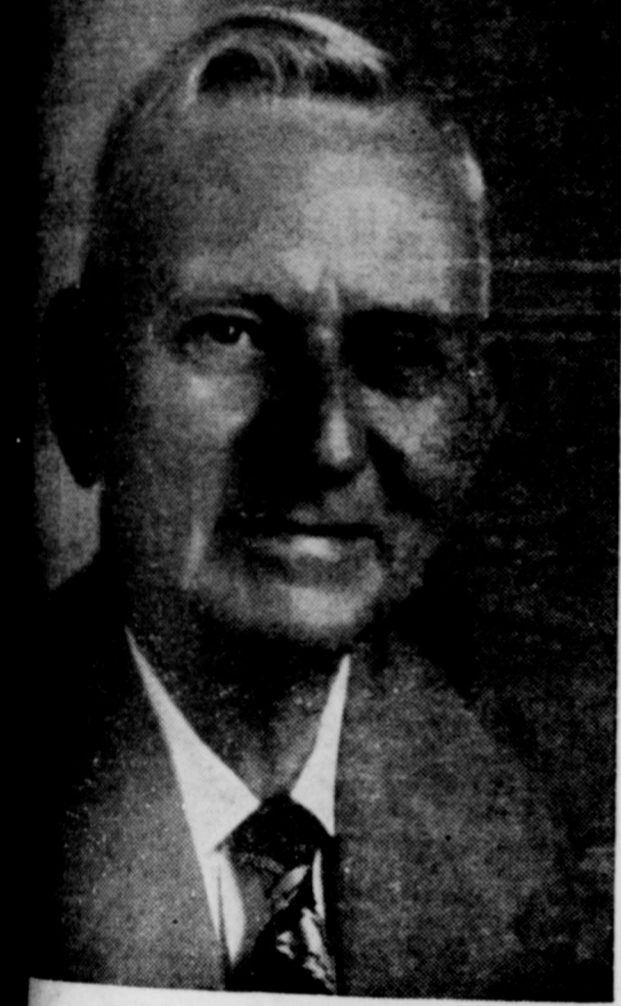
The Christmas holidays provided the occasion for a family reunion in the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. Hennis and her mother, Mrs. Lillie Wellington.

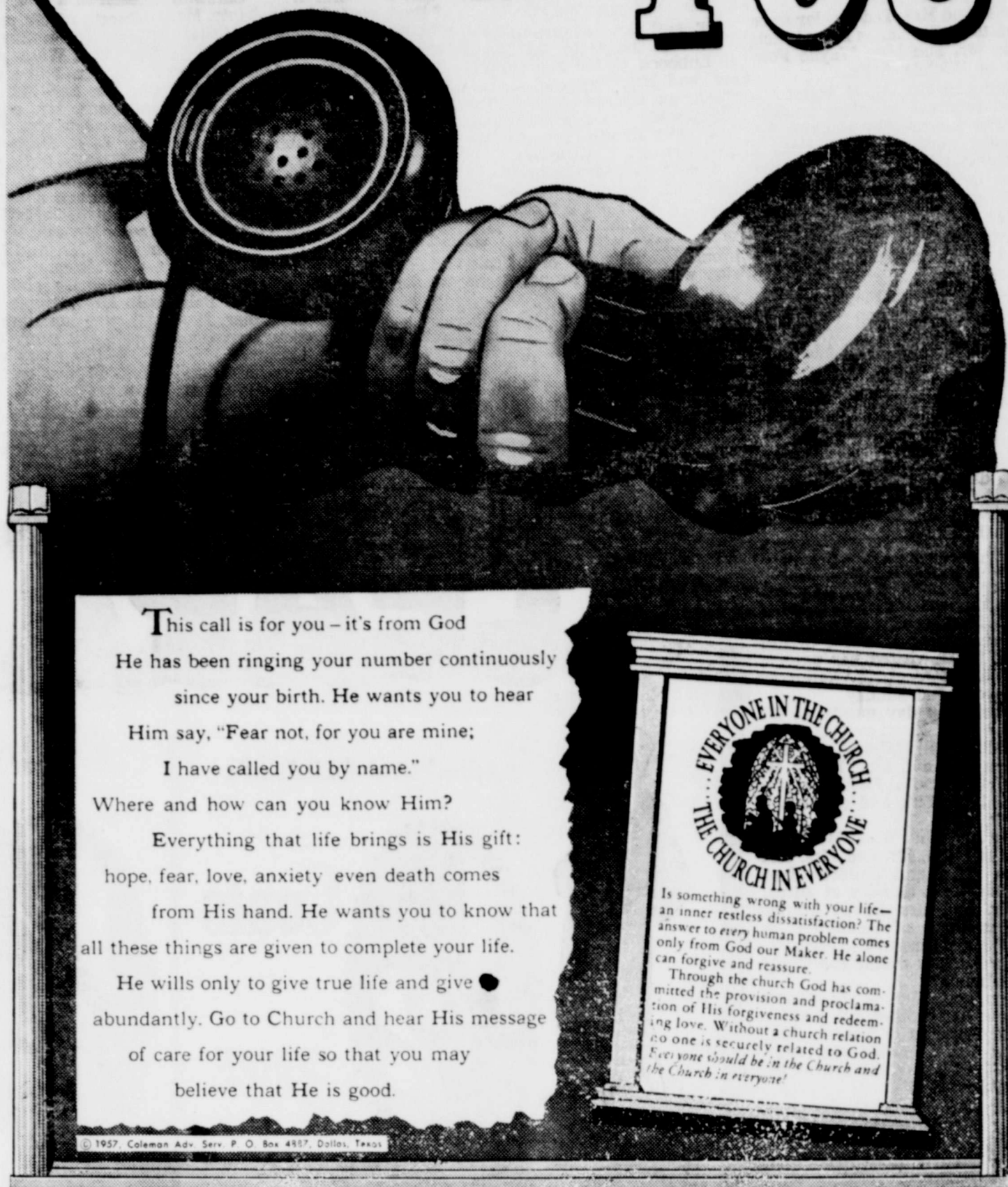

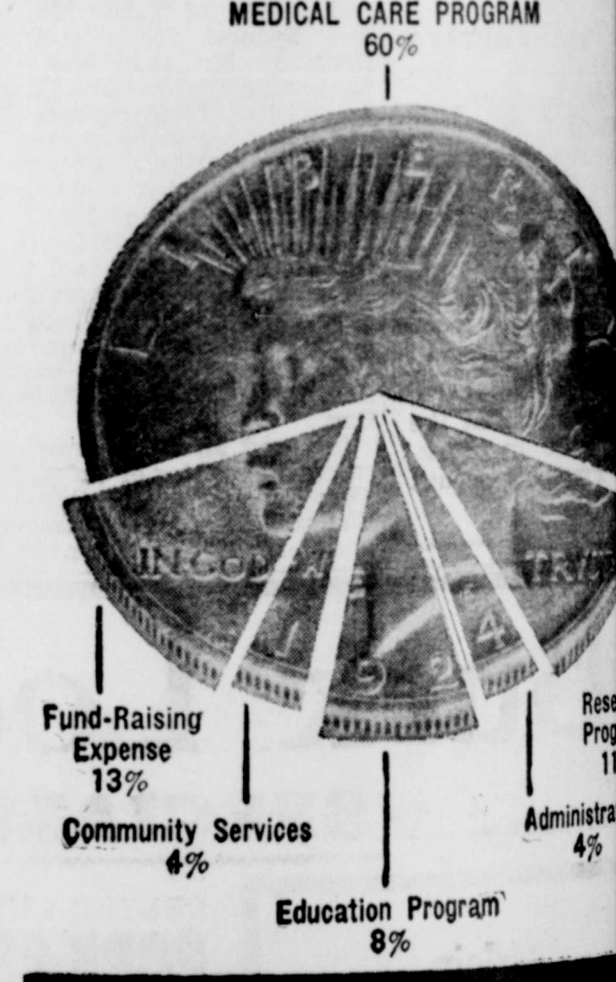

## Bowl Teams to Fly via Braniff

## Railroads Paid \$61,786 Taxes In Co. Last Year

Texas railroads paid \$61,786 in taxes in Wichita county during 1959, according to the Texas Railroad Association.

That amount was the county's share of the nearly \$10,000,000 the railroads paid throughout the state.

In addition, of course, was the large total in taxes the railroads' approximately 40,000 Texas employes contributed on their own property. The vast majority of railroad workers, many of whom live in Wichita county, own their own homes.

The largest railroad contribution in Wichita county was for the support of education. The school tax for 1959 totaled \$32,758.

City and village taxes amounted to \$17,823, while the share of the county government's operating expenses paid for by the railroads totaled \$5,458. The road and bridge fund gained \$2,788 from the railroads in 1959. All other taxes brought the total for the county to \$61,786.

"With the future of our county & state depending to a great extent upon the education of our youth, I am glad to see that nearly half of the taxes paid by the railroads in 1959, a total of \$4,565,103, went to support the schools," said Walter Caven, general counsel of the Texas Railroad Association. Recognizing this need for education, many of our railroads also make scholarships available every year.
