

Writing in Newsweek, Henry Hazlitt says: "The most urgent problem that confronts the President-elect is to remove any suspicion or misgiving concerning the future of the American dollar, to reaffirm the pledge he gave during his campaign not to devalue the dollar from the present rate, to reassure all foreign governments and banks and holders of dollar assets everywhere that the pledge of October 30th was not merely something said to win an election, but a deep determination that can be reiterated now that Mr. Kennedy has nothing to gain from doing so but his country's honor and prestige."



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The mediam age of the American people is about 45. This means, among many other things that a great majority of todays motorists have never bought a gallon of gasoline without paying sales tax on it. To most of us, the gas tax is, and always has been, an established and substantial element in our overall cost of living.

But the fact is that the first gasoline tax was passed in Oregon in 1919, and it was a mere cent a gallon. Loyal M. Graham, the legislator who introduced the bill, is still living. On reaching his 100th birthday, he was interviewed by James Lattie of the Portland Oregonian. And writes Mr. Lattie, he is wondering if such a tax" was such a good idea.'

The reason for this is that to Mr. Graham, "the last straw was the Federal gasoline tax." In his words, "It is a tendency of a Yankee to ride a free horse to death.'

Well, the gasoline tax horse is certainly being ridden to death. It has reached the point where, on the average, it amounts to some 50% of the retail price of gas before tax. No other necessity, or even luxury, bears a tax within shooting distance of this figure. Worst of all, there is a concerted movement underway to make permanent the last one cent increase in the federal tax, which was supposed to be a tmporary boost that would expire next June. And some, in addition, would add another half cent of federal tax.

The upshot of all this is that the gas tax is beginning to demonstrate the workings of the law of diminishing returns. People are buying the economy cars, or are driving less. So unless the trend is checked, we will see a ridiculous anomaly, a tax that, as it goes higher and higher, brings in less and less revenue

Precedent For Water Pollution

Water pollution, and the attendant problem of land-water conservation, has become a matter of national concern. There is much greater urgency for action in some regions than in others. But there's barely a sizeable section of this country that isn't facing a pollution problem in some form.

In an address before Water Pollution Control Federation, the head of one of this country's major oil companies, challenged the membership to provide competent leadership in developing sound programs for the effective use and protection of the nation's water resources.

His major point was that water problems are not just of a technical nature. There are grave social and economic problems involved which call for the maintenance of a proper perspective in seeking solutions. As he puts it, "Our exploding population, our rapidly expanding metropolitan industrial complexes, our fast changing technology with the constant introduction of new manufacturing processes-all demand that our research in the
