Town Hall and Notes

The City Commission has had its first reading on a new dog ordinance. There will need to be two more readings before the ordinance becomes law. The ordinance is the result of a study made of several ordinances in other cities. From this study, an ordinance was prepared to fit our own situation. The ordinance, in substance, provides that:

1. Dogs and cats must be vaccinated for rabies, and a license obtained by July 1st. A license will be issued upon presentation of a vaccination certificate. The annual license fee is \$2.00 for males, \$2.00 for spayed females, and \$4.00 for females.

2. The dog or cat owner must keep their animal under restraint, and must not permit their dog or cat to be at large on their premises or property.

3. Several people, including children, have recently been bitten by dogs and scratched by stray cats. Mailmen and utility men also do encounter this trouble continually.

4. A city pound will be erected, and a dog catcher hired. All stray animals will be picked up (after July 1st) and will be held in accordance with provisions of the ordinance. Owners and calls have been received from citizens in other parts of the county. Most of them indicate that the ordinance is overdue, and they appreciate the protection it provides.

This ordinance is recognized and encouraged by Health authorities, and conforms to state law. It will provide the community with desperately needed protection. It was given to permit vaccinated and tagged dogs to run loose; however, it is indicated here and in other places that such dogs do not prey on other people's property.

We believe the ordinance is fair and will be appreciated by those who have proper regard for their neighbor.

Patrons will be required to erect an approved rural mail box for the deposit of mail.

Services for N.H. (Dad) Harris, pioneer Burkburnett resident who died at his home here Tuesday, will be conducted from the Burkburnett Church of Christ at 2:30 p. m. Thursday.

Officiating will be Wm. Wilhoit, minister of the Randlett Church of Christ and Tommy Swearingen, minister of the Burkburnett Church of Christ. Burial will be in Burkburnett Cemetery under direction of Owens & Brumley Funeral Home.

Harris, a resident here for 49 years, pursued a colorful life as a farmer, cowboy and law enforcement officer. He was born in Hopkins County, Texas, in 1874, and farmed in that area until 1907 when he and his wife moved to Altus, Okla. City and later to Pooleville, Okla. in Carter County.

Harris worked on a ranch as a cowboy while at Pooleville and served several years as deputy sheriff for northern Carter County.

He and his wife moved to Wilson, Okla., in 1919 and to Burkburnett in 1922 where he served as a police officer until his retirement.

He was a member of the Church of Christ.

Survivors include his widow, Virginia two daughters, Mrs. Harry Beal of Bristow, Okla., and Mrs. Sherwood Lee of Cheyenne, Wyo.; two sons, Cliff Amaralio, and John Fayward, Calif.; five grandchildren; six great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild.

Your newspaper continues, in this period of inflated prices, to represent one of your best buys.

At the same price, or a few more pennies per copy, more than 80 million subscribers and newsstand purchasers over the nation are getting a paper that is almost 20 percent bigger than it was ten years ago.

A major factor in making possible this impressive money's worth, is the research conducted continuously by newspapers and groups of publishers to hold down prices by constant improvement in methods and equipment. Outstanding in this field is the American Newspaper Publishers Association, which has announced that it will spend \$600,000 in research in 1961.

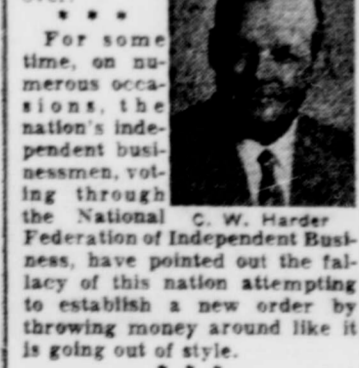

No other free country in the world permits Moscow's propaganda to be delivered at the expense of the taxpayers and many countries refuse to let such subversive material in under any circumstances."

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

There are some strong indications along the Potomac that the hey days of the internationalists, the foreign monopolists, and other do-gooders who stampeded the nation into an expenditure of more than \$70 million in all manner of foreign give away schemes, may just about be over.



For some time, on numerous occasions, the nation's independent businessmen, voting through the National C. W. Harder Federation of Independent Business, have pointed out the fallacy of this nation attempting to establish a new order by throwing money around like it is going out of style.

This viewpoint is gaining in support. For example, Rep. D. R. Matthews reported on his recent attendance at the Latin American agricultural conference held in Lima, Peru.

Congressman Matthews says "I am positive that the nations of the world must solve their own problems. America isn't smart enough and big enough and rich enough to solve all the problems of the world. We can help, I think, other nations to help themselves, but basically, the great problems of other nations are going to have to be solved by themselves."

This statement of the Congressman is comparable to the observations of many others who had long claimed that if the affluent of the so-called distressed nations were taxed anywhere near the American scale of taxation to help people of their own country, there would be little world distress.

But as it has often been pointed out, the taxpayers of America have been assessed heavily to maintain a feudalism status quo in many nations.

Congressman Matthews also feels that our attitude and approach to foreign trade must be changed saying "Our trade with nations must be on a reciprocal basis. America is facing tremendous problem now in maintaining its exports. We not only have the competition of the self-sufficiency ideal of under developed nations, but we have hard competition from Germany, Japan, and other nations. For our own national survival, we must not be forced out of the trade markets of the world because of an absence of bargaining at the conference table."

In the past, the American failure at the trade conferences has been the dominance at these meetings of that segment of the State Dept. which apparently has only the foggiest notion of what is meant by business negotiations.

But as Congressman Matthews so well states the situation, the time has now come when America at international trade meetings must be represented by hard headed business bargaining instead of the past fuzzy wuzzy Polyania approach which has caused the siphoning off of the U. S. gold reserve.

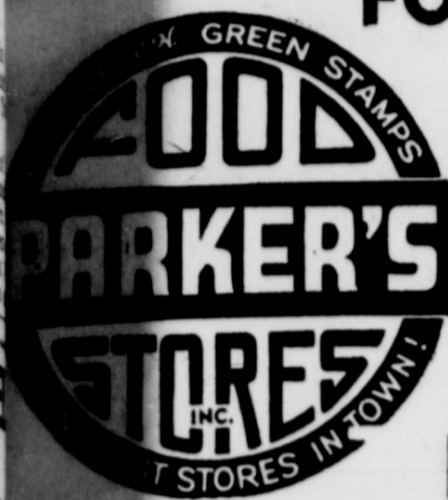

The "Back to School" type conference program was developed from suggestions by county officials. Its primary purpose is to give those participating a better understanding of the many problems which county officials must handle in the discharging of their responsibilities.

The three day conference is sponsored by the County Judges' and Commissioners' Association of Texas and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Some Interesting U. S. Presidential Facts and Figures

(From Feb. 1961 issue of McWane Pipe Painters.)

Age—the youngest president at inauguration was Theodore Roosevelt, 42 years, 10 months. The oldest, William Henry Harrison, 68 years, 23 days.

President John F. Kennedy, (D-Mass.) was 43 years, 236 days old on inauguration day. Services in Congress—James A. Garfield, in 1880 was the only man to be elected to the presidency while a member of the House of Representatives.

Only two men have been elected president while serving in the Senate, Warren G. Harding, (R-Ohio) in 1920 and John F. Kennedy.

Eighteen presidents served in Congress; seven in both House and Senate; six in the House only; five in the Senate only.

Twenty-four men who were once governors of their states ran for president; 10 made it.

Religion—9 presidents were Episcopalians; 7 were Presbyterians; 4 Unitarians; 3 Methodists; 2 Baptists; 2 Dutch Reformed church; 1 each was Congregationalist, Disciples of Christ and Quaker. Kennedy is Catholic. Three had no specific denomination.

Occupation—Twenty-four presidents were lawyers, one a journalist, one an engineer, five professional soldiers and two were public officials for most of their lives. Kennedy was once a journalist.

Wealth—The largest estate left by a president was that of Franklin D. Roosevelt, \$1,085,500. Washington left \$530,000; Lincoln \$83,000; Theodore Roosevelt \$811,000; Wilson \$60,000; Harding \$487,000 and Coolidge, \$500,000. Jefferson owed \$40,000 at death; William H. Harrison also was in debt. Kennedy comes from one of the nation's wealthiest families.

Residence—Seven presidents were residents of New York at the time of their inaugurations. 6 were residents of Ohio, 5 of Virginia; 4 of Massachusetts, 3 of Tennessee, 2 of Illinois and one each of California, Indiana, Louisiana, Missouri, New Hampshire, New Jersey and Pennsylvania.

Social Security News

The 1960 amendments to the Social Security Act provide for payments of cash disability benefits to qualified disabled workers regardless of age, according to Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls social security office. Dependents of these disabled workers may also be entitled, he added.

In order to qualify for social security disability payments, a worker must have a disability of long lasting and indefinite duration which prevents him from doing any substantial gainful work. He must also have worked under social security for at least five out of the ten years before his disability began.

Tate urged everyone who thinks he might be eligible for disability benefits to contact his social security office as soon as possible.

News From The County Agent

Diseases took an estimated \$156 million bite out of the 1960 Texas Cotton crop, according to reports from 15 cotton specialists located throughout the State. An estimated 1,116,000 bales never got to market because of diseases, said B. T. Haws, county agent. Major losses were credited to bacterial blight, root rot, seedling disease Pseudomonas wilt, root knot, Verticillium wilt and boll rots.

Interest in the Texas Community Improvement continues to grow. Currently, 241 communities have filed entries in the program sponsored by the electric utilities companies operating in Texas and the Agricultural Extension Service. Local county extension agents can supply information on the program.

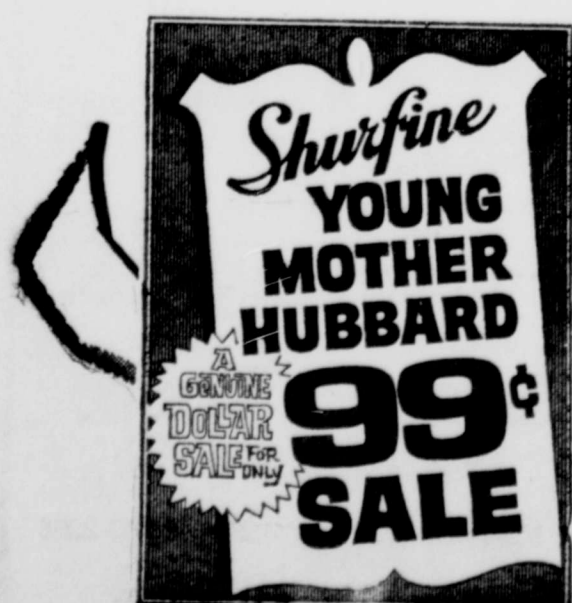

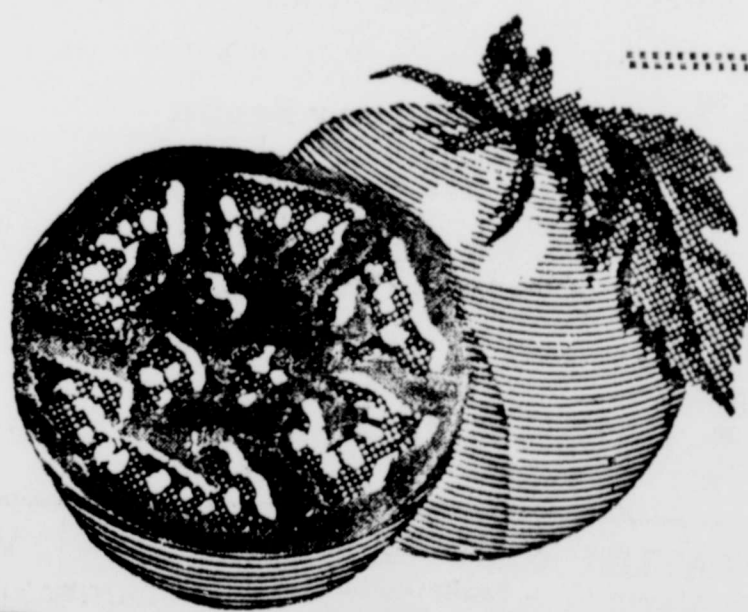

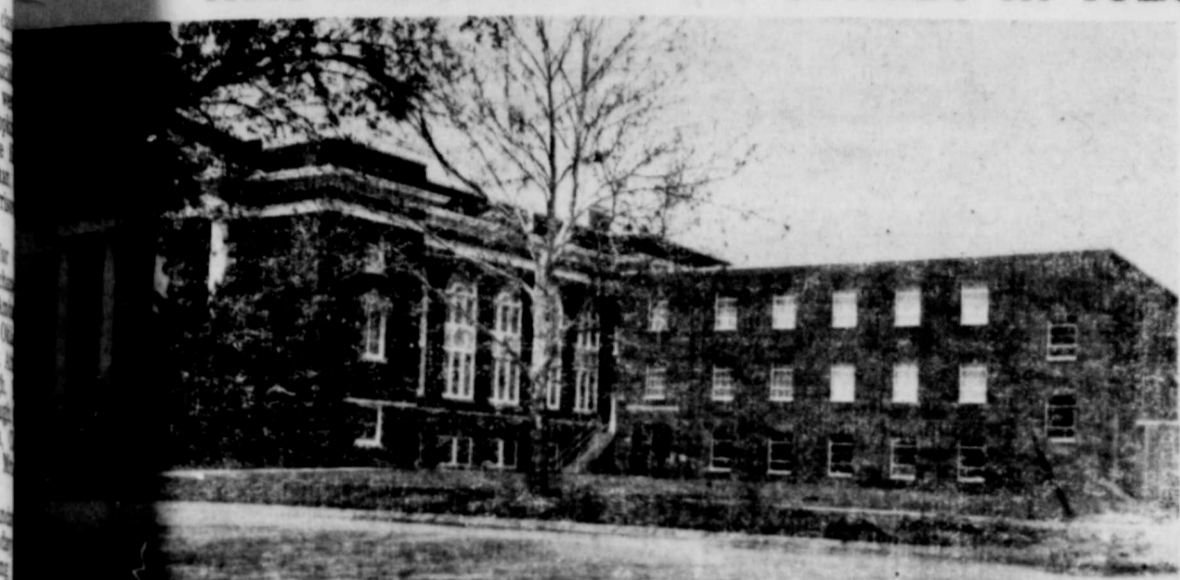

Burkburnett CD Gets Workout

Although Burk Burnett's Civil Defense is just in the process of being organized, it got its first workout on Feb. 26th and 27th in the tragic death of Dottie Mae Hall, 16 year old daughter of Mrs. Sam Crabtree, of Burk Burnett.

Miss Hall was thrown into Red River about 12:20 A. M. Sunday morning as she was walking on the Burk Burnett bridge. Her body was discovered by Civil Defense workers Monday afternoon at 1:16 p. m.

Burkburnett's Civil Defense workers, the voluntary fire department, were the first on the scene, after being notified by the Police Department. Col. Steve Marchand, in charge of the Rescue Section of Wichita Falls Civil Defense arrived at the scene about 2 a. m. with the Rescue Bus and equipment.

Other units of Wichita County Civil Defense and the Oklahoma Highway Patrol arrived while workers were still searching the icy waters for the body.

By daybreak the Red Cross, Wichita County Civil Defense communications and the County's Civil Defense Police Units, the State Guard Communications and the Texas and Oklahoma Highway Patrols had arrived at the scene with the Oklahoma Highway Patrol rescue bus. Other workers and CD units from throughout the area continued to arrive and set up for operations. Monday morning the units were joined by the Salvation Army.

Food and other necessities were dispersed through joint efforts of the Salvation Army, Red Cross and Wichita Falls Civil Defense. Food was purchased by the Red Cross until word of the emergency spread and then food, coffee, hot chocolate began to come in from individuals and church groups. Food was sent from places as far away as Electra. Surplus food remaining after the operations, was taken to the dead girls family. Some food from the Salvation Army's storage was also contributed.

Because the location of the disaster was nearest to Burk all activities were coordinated through Burk Burnett Civil Defense. Red River proper, being under the authorities of Oklahoma, the coordination of efforts was handled by Burk Burnett CD officials in cooperation with the Oklahoma Highway Patrol.

Clovis D. Mann, Director of Burk Burnett's Civil Defense, expressed his appreciation to all the many agencies for their assistance. Each unit that arrived

on the scene knew it's job and place, therefore began operations immediately. County-wide communications were maintained throughout the emergency through the County Civil Defense Fire Department radios recently installed. The base station control is located in the Burk Burnett Police office.

Mr. Mann was called to the scene about 6:30 Sunday morning and found rescue units already set up and operating. The Burk Burnett voluntary firemen were already searching the river and Reavis Wooten was already on the job coordinating the communications through the radio control center.

Although Burk Burnett Civil Defense is not fully organized, there was no wasted effort as the units joined in with the more experienced units. The Burk Burnett CAP Cadets, who became a part of the Civil Defense organization only this past weekend, also joined in the operations.

"There were so many groups and individuals who played such an important part that it would be folly to attempt to give names. In any event, the success of any operation of this nature depends upon the cooperative efforts of everyone and not on any particular individual or group," Mr. Mann said. "The cooperation that existed between all units, the Salvation Army, Red Cross, County Civil Defense, Wichita Falls Civil Defense, and others, certainly indicate the success of well organized groups," Mr. Mann continued. "In as far as our own CD organization is concerned, things were learned during this operation that will be most helpful to us as we complete our own CD organization," Mann said.
