BURKBURNETT INDUSTRIAL FOUNDATION ANNOUNCES PURCHASE OF TEN ACRES FOR INDUSTRIAL EXPANSION EAST PART TOWN

Mr. Alvin Hill, President of the Burk Burnett Industrial foundation announced the purchase of a 10 acre plot for the purpose of Industrial expansion.

The purchase was made following the signing of an option to lease by Imperial Plastics. A new firm planning to establish in Burk Burnett.

The foundation, organized by the Burk Burnett Chamber of Commerce, this past summer,

Board of Directors have been working this past year to locate new job opportunity firms in the Burk Burnett area. This is the first firm we started with," Hill stated, and we are now working with two others.

The foundation expects to start very shortly with the construction of a plant building on the new acreage which will be the home of Imperial Plastics. The building will be a 5,000 sq. ft. all purposed building with office space built in. Imperial

Mr. Veach is a member of the Quarterback club and the American Legion. He is a barber in the Joe & Joe Barber



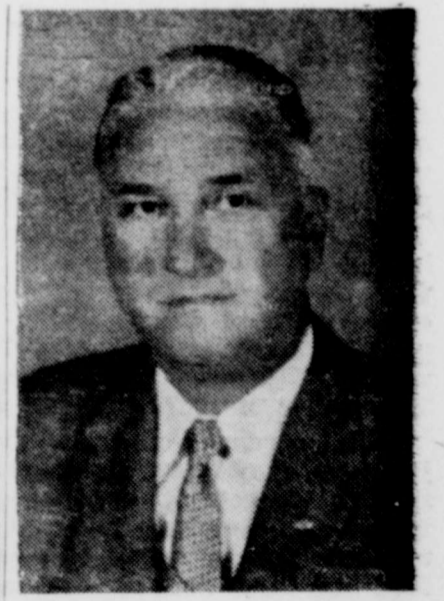

Uncle Sam, M. D.

Uncle Sam is going into the health business in a big way if President Kennedy can sell Congress on his six point proposal for Federal intervention in the fields of medical and nursing services and education, hospitalization, medical research, vocational rehabilitation and "Youth Fitness."

The most controversial item is a revival (with some revision) of the medical care for the aged program that was rejected by Congress last year. Under the new specifications the estimated cost of \$1.5 billion to be met by a hike in Social Security taxes.

The five other programs to be paid for with increased outlays of tax money are loosely figured to cost something over \$56 million for the first year and \$170 million the second year and include construction of nursing homes and medical and dental schools, Federal medical and dental scholarships.

The health plan for the aged, if passed this year, would be available on July 1, 1962 to 14.2 million Americans over 65 and provide up to 90 days of hospitalization (\$10 deductible the first nine days), up to 180 days of nursing home care and up to 240 days of visiting nurse service.

The President insisted in his message that: "This is not a program of socialized medicine." It "guaranteed," he said, freedom of choice of doctor and hospital and is "in accordance with the traditional American system of placing responsibility on the employe and the employer rather than on the general taxpayer, to help finance retirement and health costs."

We had somehow felt the "traditional American system" involved looking out for oneself and one's kith and kin. Nor is there any "freedom of choice" regarding payment of the increased Social Security taxes, even among those who are providing their own health insurance. Nor can we conceive of the Government barging into the healing business in any large way without regimenting the medical profession and entailing the customary extravagance, inefficiency and bureaucratic arrogance.

Ten Billion Dollar Saving

Mass distribution was pioneered by variety and food chain stores many years ago. This method of merchandising simply means moving goods to consumers on a large volume, low markup, rapid turnover principle. It is the rock foundation of mass production. One cannot exist without the other.

In 1953 the mass distribution system, for the first time in history, employed more people in distributing goods and services than were employed in producing them. The stabilizing effects of mass distribution in economic downswings are impressive. For example, in the 1954 recession, factory employment fell 10 percent while personnel income fell only one%. The decline of 1957-58 showed a similar comparison.

Of immediate concern to the consumer is the question of just how much mass distribution means in dollars and cents savings. Competent authorities estimate that distribution costs to the consumer have been cut from 40% of the food dollar to about 20%, a saving of some \$10 billion annually on the food bill. Other lines of chain retailing have held prices rigidly to minimums.

Mass distribution was a logical development of a market system in which consumer free choice is paramount.

Socialism and Cupidity

According to figures just released by Tax Foundation, Inc., the per capita burden of federal, state and local taxes was \$109 in 1940, \$369 in 1950 and \$715 in 1960.

In virtually all state and local governments, no less than the federal government, proposals are advanced for more and more tax revenue. Unless the people restrain their demands on government, and put their foot down on unnecessary government expenditures that carry favor with pressure groups, Karl Marx's plan "to wrest all capital from the bourgeoisie," may become a reality in the United States.

If socialism engulfs our country, it will be due to the cupidity of people who think they can get something for nothing from government.

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Social Security News

"Changes in the social security law in 1960 reduced the amount of work needed to get benefits," reports Erton F. Tate, District Manager of the Wichita Falls Social Security office.

"For benefits to be paid to a worker or his family when he reaches retirement age, dies or becomes disabled, he must have worked under social security for a certain length of time," said Tate. Just how long a person must work depends upon his date of birth, or when the payment of survivors or disability benefits is involved, upon the date he dies, or becomes disabled.

As an example, anyone who reaches retirement age (65 for men and 62 for women) this year will need to have no more than 3 1/4 years of work. Until the change in the law, a person of this age would have needed at least 5 years. Also, the survivors of workers who died after June, 1954, and who were not eligible for benefits previously, may now qualify in many cases.

Anyone who believes that he or she may qualify for payments as a result of this change in the law should get in touch with their social security office promptly.

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WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

Congress, is of course, and understandably so, concerned about the current unemployment situation. And while there may be differences of opinion as to just how widespread this situation actually is, there is sufficient of a problem to cause concern.

However, it should be no great sudden shock to anyone to learn that such a problem exists. For C. W. Harder several years, through their votes on various measures, the nation's independent businessmen, voting through the National Federation of Independent Business, have foretold that such a situation would surely result.

Because before there can be people employed, there must be employers, who supply the tools for a job. And each employer must be able to replace those tools when the old ones are worn out or obsolete, and in addition, must be able to add more tools to supply even more jobs.

Of course, the left wingers delight in hurling imprecations at the employing "class" as they phrase it, yet few if any leftwingers, missing a few meals, fall to be Johnny at the rathole if there is a chance that some employer will put them on on a payroll.

Thus, the only way to solve unemployment is to have more employers.

For the glants of any industry have a way of shrinking their employment. The auto industry is a perfect example of this. Not only has the Big Three gone as rapidly as possible toward automation, but they have also set up plants in foreign nations to the extent it is now estimated one out of every three imported cars comes from a plant owned or controlled by the Big Three with foreigners getting the paychecks.

But this ever present need for an increase of employers has been largely overlooked in writing tax legislation.

Consider a mythical case. A few men scrape together \$10,000 to form a corporation to make a new gadget. The \$10,000 goes into plant facilities. The first year they do well enough to make \$10,000. Now they feel that if they invest this \$10,000 in doubling their capacity and hiring more people, that unless the public fancy turns against their gadget, or strong competition moves into their field, it might be a good venture. . . . at least a worthwhile gamble.

But the hitch is that they don't have the \$10,000. Out of the \$10,000 they made, federal income tax takes \$2,500. So if they want to expand, they not only have to put in all their first year's profits, but an additional \$2,500 as well.

Thus, in many cases, rather than take the gamble they decide to stay as they are. But more importantly to the nation's welfare, they provide no new jobs, either.

This example is perhaps over simplified, but it illustrates why employment has not kept pace with the supply of employables.

Money paid out of a business in taxes cannot be used to expand that business and provide more jobs.

Your RIGHT TO VOTE

MR. AND MRS. VOTER, do you feel that you should have an opportunity to vote on legalizing Parimutuel Horse Race Betting?

A constitutional amendment (H.J.R. #4) is being considered whereby Texans will be given an opportunity to legalize horse race betting in Dallas, Tarrant, Harris, Galveston, Bexar, Midland, Hidalgo, Cameron and Webb Counties, subject to approval by LOCAL OPTION.

H.J.R. #4 provides for distribution, ANNUALLY, among all counties that do not have race tracks, one-half of the STATE TAX REVENUE obtained from horse racing. Each county would receive approximately \$1.00 per capita population the first year. Counties where the tracks are located would receive 2% of parimutuel handle. The state's tax income from horse racing alone would be \$12,000,000 the very first year—possibly more—besides all the tourists would bring to Texas—which would amount to millions of dollars, plus a great ad valorem tax on race tracks, breeding and many valuable race horses.

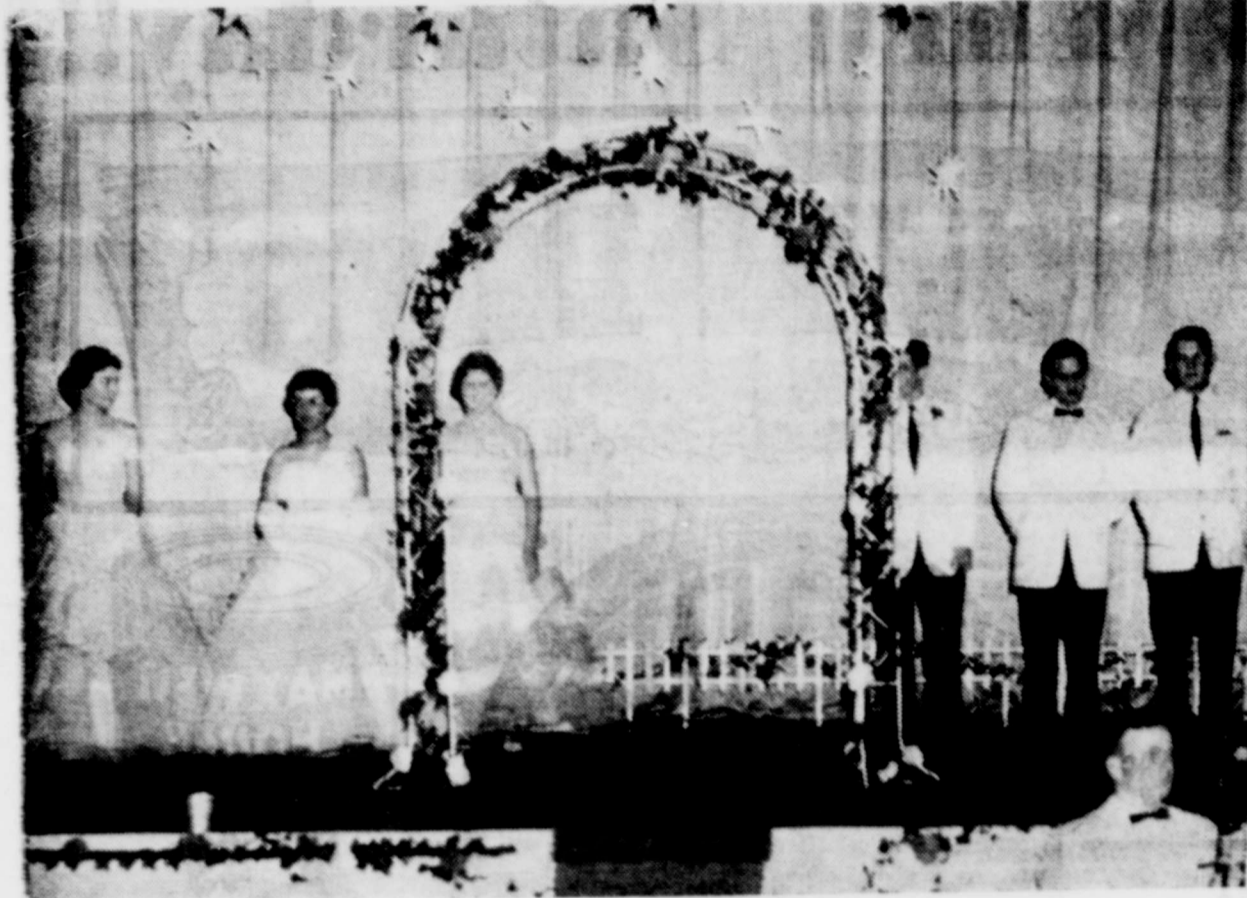

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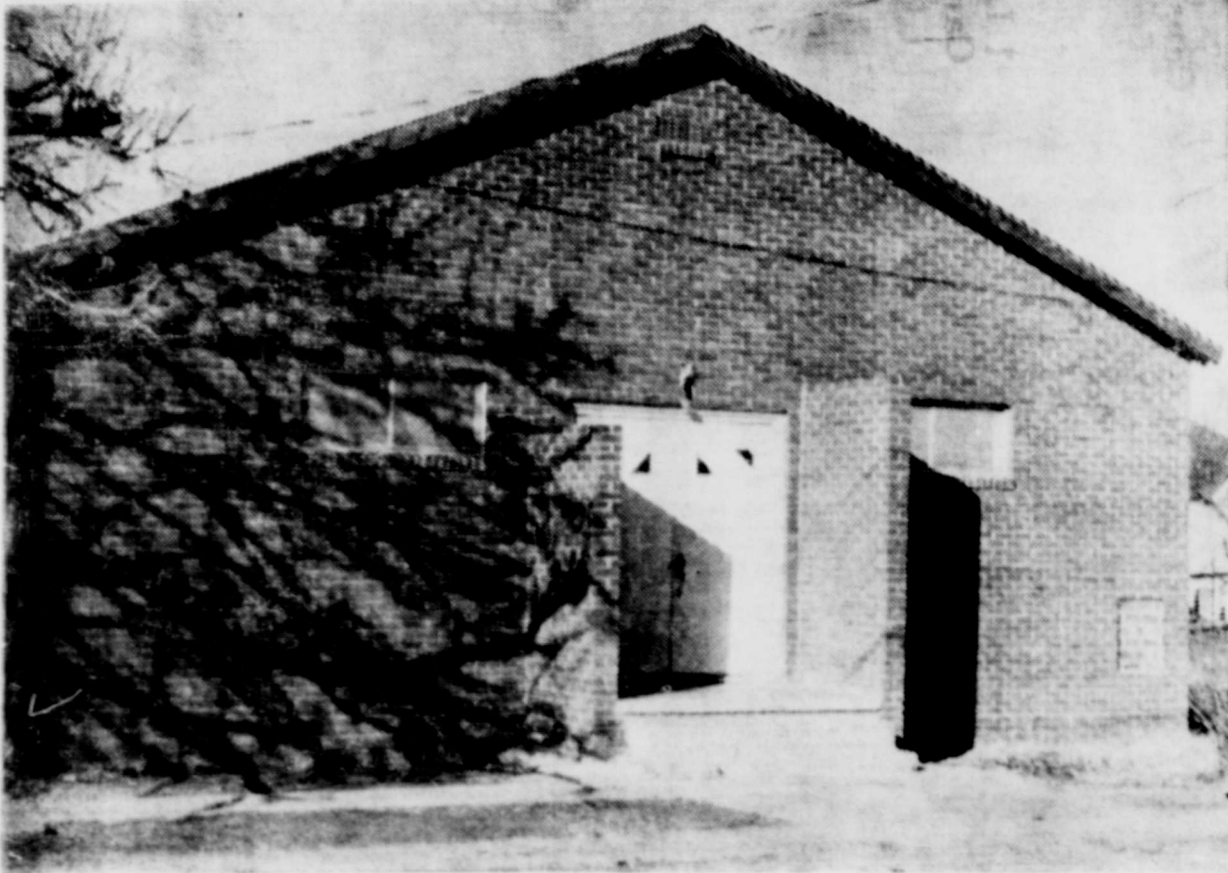

THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK . . .

"There is a way that seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death." (Prov. 14:12)

The wise man Solomon hath declared in God's word that there is a way that seemeth right. There are many people today you can ask, "Are you a Christian?" They will tell you that they joined the church when they were young, or that they send in their dues each month. But you ask them the direct question, "Are you really 'Born Again?'" And they will say, "No, but I feel I'm alright. I think I'll make it." Ezra declared we must seek the right way. Then I proclaimed a fast there, at the river of Ahava, that we might afflict ourselves before God to seek of him a right way for us, and for our little ones, and for all our substance." (Ezra 8:21)

To think we are in the right path is not enough. We must know by the word of God that we are absolutely right. Saul of Tarsus thought he was in the right way until, "And Saul, yet breathing out threatenings and slaughter against the disciples of the Lord, went unto the high priest, and desired of him letters to Damascus to the synagogues, that if he found any of this way, whether they were men or women, he might bring them bound unto Jerusalem. And as he journeyed he came near Damascus and suddenly there shined round about him a light from heaven; and he fell to the earth and heard a voice saying unto him, Saul, Saul, why persecutest thou me? And he said, who art thou, Lord? And the Lord said, I am Jesus whom thou persecutest; it is hard for thee to kick against the pricks. And he trembling and astonished said, Lord, what wilt thou have me to do? And the Lord said unto him, Arise, and go into the City, and it shall be told thee what thou must do." (Acts 9:1-6)

He then realized he was in the wrong way. He turned to Jesus for help and got in the right way. He then withstood persecutions for Christ's sake. "Enter ye in the strait gate: for wide is the gate, and broad is the way, that leadeth to the destruction, and many there be which go in there at; because strait is the gate and narrow is the way which leadeth unto life and few there be that find it." (Matt 7:13-14) We find there is a broad way and plenty of room for all those who "think" they are right, but a straight and narrow way for all who know they are right, and desire to really live for Jesus. "For even hereunto were ye called: because Christ also suffered for us, leaving us an example, that ye shall follow his steps: who did no sin, neither was guile found in his mouth: who, when he was reviled, reviled not again; when he suffered he threatened not; but committed himself to him that judgeth righteously: who his own self bare our sins in his own body on the tree, that we, being dead to sins, should live unto righteousness, by whose stripes ye were healed." (1 Peter 2:21-24)

We must follow in the steps of Jesus to be in the right way. He was always doing good seeking someone to help, going out of his way to help people, as the man in the tombs, and the Samaritan woman at the well. "And a highway shall be there, and a way, and it shall be called the way of holiness; the unclean shall not pass over it; but it shall be there for those, the wayfaring man, though fools, shall not err therein." (Isaiah 35:8)

The word of God teaches us that there can be a deceptive appearance. As Judas Iscariot,

when he met Jesus in the garden of Gethsemane, he told the chief priests he would betray Jesus for thirty pieces of silver, but still Judas said, whomsoever I shall kiss, that same is he: hold him fast. (Matt 26:48)

No one could say that Judas did not have a deceptive appearance when he kissed Jesus. He had brought the mob to kill him. But when he had performed the job, conviction seized him. He brought again the thirty pieces of silver, cast them down, went out and hanged himself.

"If any man among you seem to be religious and brideth not his tongue, but deceiveth his own heart, his religion is vain. Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this: to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep himself unspotted from the world."

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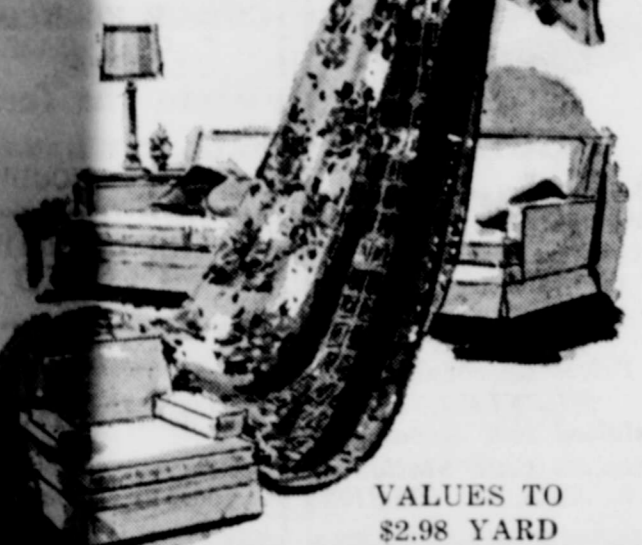
