## CITY HALL News and Notes

The Dog Ordinance was passed by the Board of Commissioners on its third and final reading at the last meeting. The Ordinance will go into effect July 1st. It will be printed in its entirety in the Burkburnett Star, but in substance provides the following:

- 1 Creates the office of Pound master, and provides for the construction of a dog pound.
- 2 Provides that all dogs and cats be vaccinated against Rabies before July 1st.
- 3 Provides that all dogs and cats be licensed. License to be obtained at City Hall upon presentation of Vaccination Certificate. License fees are as follows: \$2.00 for males, \$2.00 for spayed females, and \$4.00 for females.
- 4 Owner shall keep his dog under restraint at all times, and shall not permit dog to be at large off premises or property of the owner, unless on leash and/or under the strict control of a competent person.
- 5 Provides for a fine of not less than \$15.00 nor more than \$200.00 for violation, with each and every day a separate offense.
- 6 Provides for the impounding of all dogs not licensed and not under proper restraint.
- 7 Following fees to be charged before animal is released from pound: Impoundment fee \$4.00, plus \$2.00 for each day animal is kept in pound. After five days impoundment without animal being claimed, the animal becomes the property of the City of Burkburnett. License tags and receipts have been ordered. A notice will be given when they arrive so that animal owners may bring their vaccination certificates to the City Hall to obtain license.

## Red Cross Drive Begins April 10

The annual Red Cross fund drive in Burkburnett will get underway the week of April 10th, according to Jerry Thomas Red Cross fund drive chairman for the Burkburnett area.

The campaign theme this year is "Good Things Happen When You Help." Red Cross volunteers pointed out that the campaign provides every American the opportunity to help restore the disrupted lives of disaster victims; provide blood for the ill and injured; train people in first aid, home nursing, swimming and life saving, and solve personal problems of service men and their dependents.

Burkburnett's 8,000 population uses about 300 pints of blood each year at a minimum collecting and processing cost to the Red Cross Blood Center budget of over \$1,000 annually. No one is charged for the blood itself, and blood is not only provided in Wichita County but also throughout the United States and Canada for county residents here.

Disaster relief is another major service. In the present flooded areas in Hattiesburg, Miss., and Montgomery, Ala., alone, 2,200 families are receiving Red Cross aid including rebuilding and refurbishing homes for those who cannot meet their own needs. This is possible only because the American people give through the Red Cross to help their disaster stricken neighbors.

Editor and Publisher quotes the head of a large retailing organization, which has 36 stores around the country, as saying that it "couldn't do business today without the 84 papers in which we advertise."

The magazine adds: "Other retailing establishments are paying the same tribute to newspapers every day in the year thru their advertising dollars. They know which advertising medium sells goods with speed and economy. Newspaper advertising moves goods off the retailers' shelves into the hands of consumers regardless of whether the sales effort is made by the manufacturer or the retailer."

Nothing replaces the printed word—and most particularly, from an advertiser's standpoint, the printed word which the thousands of daily and weekly newspapers of this country bring to their tens of millions of readers.

## Inspecti'n Sticker Waiting Line to Be Very Long

Inspection Sticker! Deadline?—Saturday midnight, April 15, 1961. Motorists are warned there is less than two weeks for procuring their new 1961 inspection sticker. This announcement was made by Capt. Alan Johnson of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Johnson pointed out that of the 544,419 vehicles registered in the 60 counties of this region only a little more than half of them have been inspected and approved. This means that in the last few days of inspection there will be long lines of cars and trucks waiting to be inspected.

Motorists are reminded that the inspection law prohibits inspections being made when it is raining or the streets are wet. So, it is possible that inclement weather could prevent inspection these last few days. "There will be no extension of the April 15th deadline for inspection," Johnson stated.

Anyone operating a motor vehicle after midnight, April 15th without displaying a 1961 inspection sticker will be operating in violation of the law and subject to a fine not to exceed \$200 plus court cost.

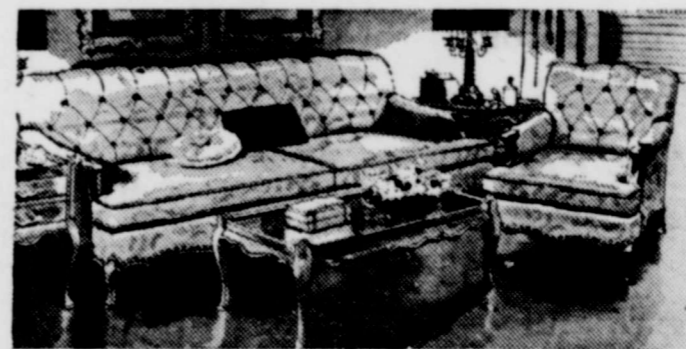

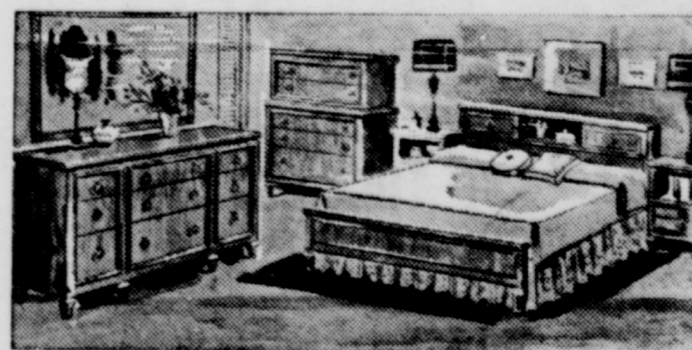

No one is charged for the blood itself and blood is not only provided in Wichita County but also throughout the United States and Canada for county residents here.

Disaster relief is another major service. In the present flooded areas in Hattiesburg, Mississippi and Montgomery, Alabama alone, 2,200 families are receiving Red Cross aid including rebuilding and re-furnishing homes for those who cannot meet their own needs. This is possible only because the American people give thru the Red Cross to help their disaster stricken neighbors.

During last year 325 disaster relief operations in 44 states included emergency mass care for 107,700 persons and rehabilitation aid to 14,900 families—all free of charge to recipients.

Thomas urged prompt and generous support of the fund drive to make certain that funds will be on hand to operate the blood center and other Red Cross community services.

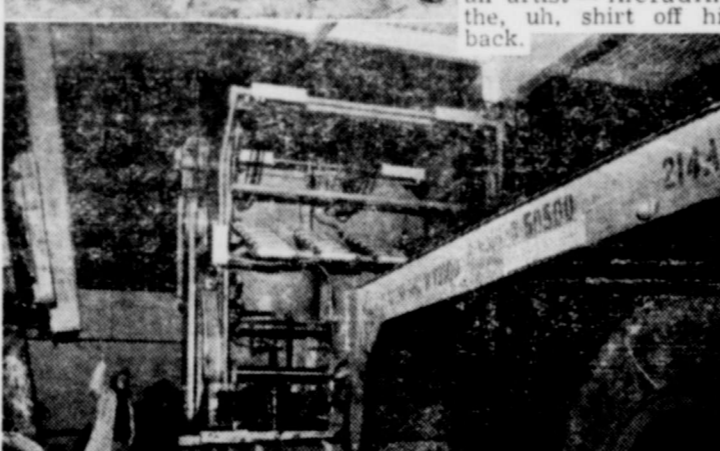

### BENEFIT PROGRAMS

A larger and larger share of our tax dollars has been going, not for National Security and Defense, or International Affairs, but to finance "Benefit" programs. A "Benefit," Federal Government style is something given by the Federal Government to its citizens "for free." "Benefits" for fiscal '61 will amount to over 25% of the total Federal budget. That is up from 17% in '52.

The trouble with these "Benefit" program is that while launched to meet some real or imagined crisis, they've a nasty tendency to live on and grow.

This will be something for the 87th Congress to ponder and ponder well, if the newly elected administration actually does attempt to carry out its campaign promises and those of the Democratic Party platform. The Congress must bear in mind that new "Benefits" will not only call for more taxes, or more deficit spending but that the comparatively small initial expense is the seductive charm to invite Congressional approval.

Each new program requires staffing a bureau (more people feeding at the public trough) and as has been the case with other "benefit" programs, it will grow. The worst feature of these "benefit" programs is that they divert the Federal Government from devoting its full attention to important things such as national defense and preserving a free society peopled by self-reliant, self-respecting individuals.

## News From The County Agent

There will be a pecan budding and grafting school at the county courtroom in Wichita Falls on Tuesday, April 18th, beginning at 1:30 p. m. Mr. V. A. Randolph, supt. of the Montague Experiment station will be in charge of the meeting. He will discuss pecan diseases and insects of pecans. Anyone wanting to learn how to bud and graft pecans are invited to attend.

The Wichita County 4-H and FFA and FHA Project Show will be held at Iowa Park Fair grounds on Saturday, April 15. The project show is sponsored by the Wichita County Farm Bureau. All projects are to be in place by 9 a. m. and the judging of the projects will start at 10 a. m. The show will last from 9 a. m. to 1:30 p. m.

The Tri-County Dairy Show will be held at the 4-H Barn in Wichita Falls on Tuesday, April 25. The show will last from 9:30 a. m. to 2:30 p. m. All dairymen, club boys and girls are eligible to show animals in the show. Both registered and grade females may be entered, but only registered bulls six months of age and older will be shown.

Dr. John R. Cole, Pathologist, Crops Research Division, USDA is recommending 1/2 pound of dithionine per 100 gallons of water and 1 pound dithionine per 100 gallons of water if scab increases during rainy periods. Scab control sprays usually start when the leaves are 1-3 grown and continues at 3 to 4 week intervals but under severe scab attack, B. T. Haws, county agent suggests spraying every two weeks.

A number of farmers have sprayed their small grain for greenbugs during the past several days. There are still lots of greenbugs present. Farmers should check their fields for this insect. The following insecticides are recommended to control greenbugs: Parathion, Methyl Parathion or Malathion. One and one half pints of either of the insecticides is recommended per acre.

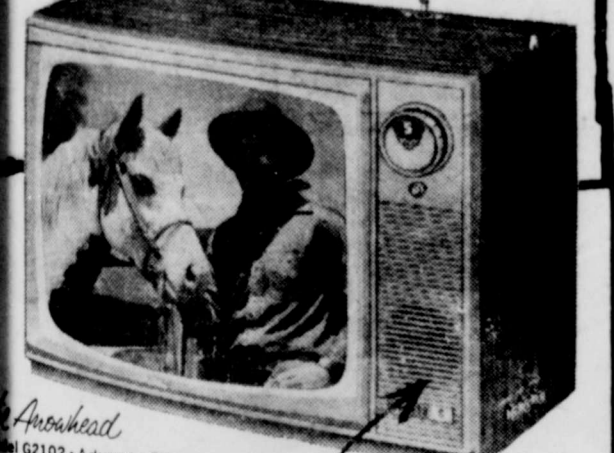

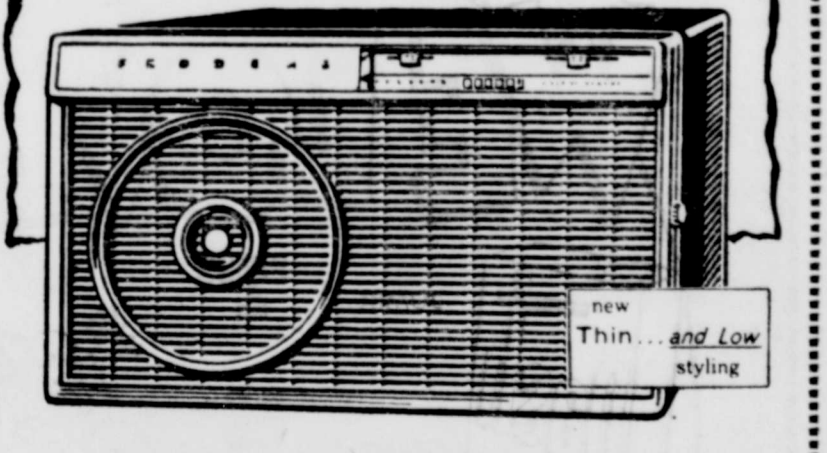

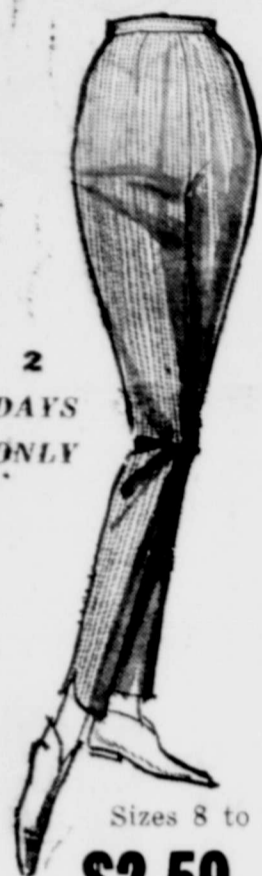

## News From The HD Agent

Powdery mildew, a fungus disease which attacks many flowering & ornamental plants is normally present at this time of the year in many areas of Texas.

Home gardeners are advised to check their plantings for signs of the disease. The fungus appears as a white to grayish growth covering the surface of the plant parts, mainly the leaf surface. Dust the plants with sulfur at the first appearance of the disease or spray with wettable sulfur (1 1-2 to 2 level tablespoons to 1 gallon of water). Repeat the applications as needed. Karathane or Phaltan used as a dust or spray may give better control but is probably more expensive. Karathane or Phaltane has an advantage of being less toxic to plants. Sulfur, Karathane or Phaltan are available in insecticide-fungicide combination spray or dust.

Some of the more commonly grown plants which should be watched for mildew are roses, violets, chrysanthemums, honeysuckle, phlox, zinnias, live oak, crape myrtle, euonymous and hydrangea.

Unless the disease is controlled, the plants may lose their foliage and thus fail to make normal growth and production. Thelma Wirges, county HD agent and the home improvement committee have plans for presenting plant disease information to organized groups in the near future. If interested visit your local home demonstration club or write for a bulletin. If commercial preparations are applied, the recommendation of the manufacturer of the material should be followed in making the application. Keep pesticides in a dry, safe place away from children.

Seeding waterways has topped the list for conservation practices being applied in the Iowa Park Work Unit this week, according to T. E. Gilbreath, technician for the Soil Conservation service.

Ellis McCullough of Burkburnett, L. C. Jarvis, Paul Dowdy and M. E. McCullough of the Cashion community, H. C. Obenhaus and W. H. McAlister of Punkin Center and Albert May, Sr. of Iowa Park have seeded a combined total of 17 waterways. King Ranch bluestem and buffalograss were the principal grasses being used. All of these are applied as a part of District conservation plans.

Frank Marlan and Dr. James R. McKinney of Iowa Park and Valley View have leveled five acres and twenty-three acres of land for establishment to Coastal Bermudagrass.

Clear Lake Stock Farm west of Kamay has seeded 123 acres of retired farm land to native grasses. George Graham and Frank Harlan of Iowa Park, A. C. Yates of Electra and Dr. Dan Roberts of Wichita Falls

have sodded Coastal Bermuda grass. Mike Hartmangruber and Sons of Iowa Park were the Iowa Park were the sodding contractors.

Farm ponds have been constructed on two farms for D. R. Preston of Electra; one pond was finished for Don Parker of Wichita Falls. Harry Marton of Wichita Falls, contractor, did the dirt work. At the present time a pond is under construction on the Clear Lake Stock Farm of Kamay, Benton Brown of Henrietta being the contractor.

Topographic maps for planning irrigated land have been made on Cecil Petty farm, 200 acres and L. D. Smith, 100 acres both of the Kamay community.

A drainage agreement is being worked out at present between C. Birk Estate and Dickey & McGann farms of the Clara Community. Waterways are being used to serve their material needs.

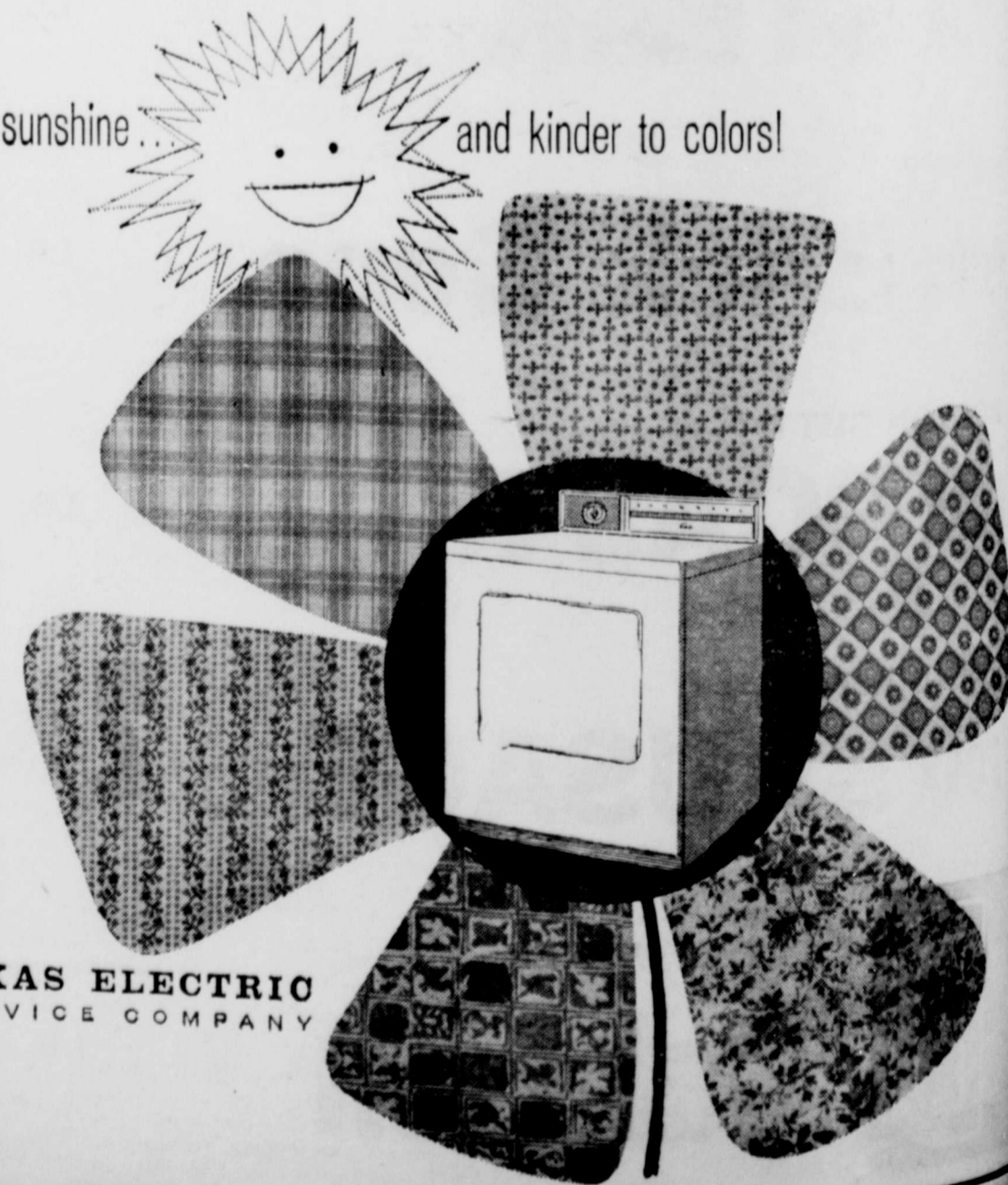

The new two-in-one combinations are creating much interest. At present there are some obvious advantages to the combinations, but there are also some disadvantages. Before buying a washer-dryer combination consider these points, advises Miss Wirges.

Space required. The combination requires less space than separate units.

Your Own Work Habits. Without transferring from one machine to another, the clothes are washed, rinsed and dried.

Length of complete washing-drying cycle. The length of time for the complete washing-drying cycle is more than double that for a separate washing machine & dryer. The full washing-drying cycle for each load in the combination will be 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 hours. This may be a limitation for the woman wishing to wash loads in sequence.

Purchase price. The price of a combination washer-dryer is approximately the same as that for the two individual machines.

a. Due to the design of combinations, it is impossible to get the high spin speeds of washers only. Spin speeds range up to 1100 rpm's in washers in combinations, 225 to 550. Because the load retains more moisture, it takes longer and costs more to dry them.

b. Besides the water used for washing, combination machines will use approximately 2 quarts of cold water per minute to carry heat, lint, and moisture during the drying process. A full size load will require 40 to 50 gallons to dry using 20 to 25 gallons of water.

Cost of up-keep—Combinations require repair more often because they have as many parts as both a washer and dryer.

Cost of Replacement—The life expectancy of a washer is longer than that of a dryer. The life expectancy of a combination is the same as a dryer.

If you are building or planning a utility room or kitchen which is to include laundry equipment, don't forget to consider size and arrangement of these pieces. Also keep an eye to the future if you now have equipment and hope to make changes.

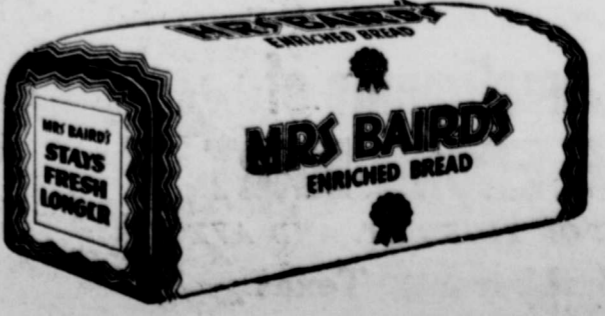

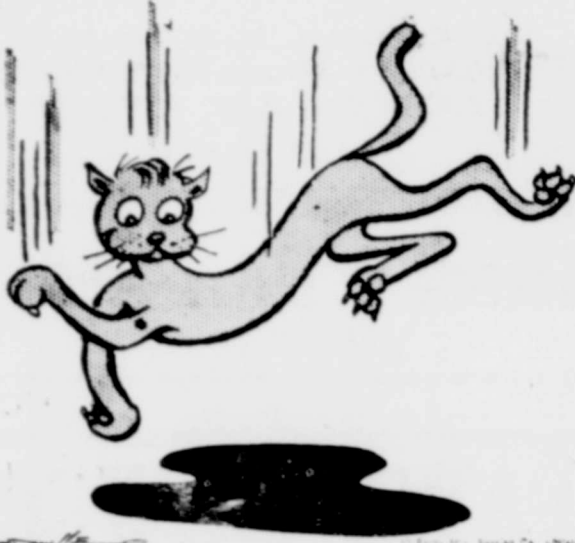

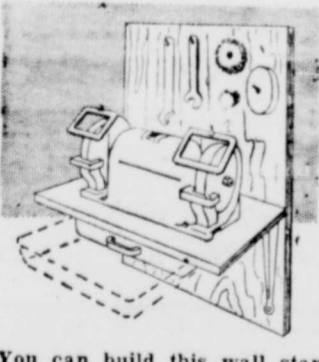

A wall stand with built-in parts and accessories tray provides an ideal shelf for a portable electric bench grinder, especially if you have a compact workshop. The shelf can easily be made from plywood with the aid of a portable power saw and drill.

The shelf is a 16 x 24-inch section of 3/4-inch fir plywood locked by steel shelf brackets to a larger (24x32) piece of 3/4-inch plywood, which can be nailed to wall studs, or fastened to masonry with 2-inch machine screws and common expansion shields.

The top of a household baking pan is attached to the bottom of the bench grinder's shelf to provide runners for the pan itself, which becomes a sliding parts drawer. (Free plans for this bench grinder shelf may be obtained by writing to the Thor Research Center and requesting Plan GS302.)

From the mailbox:  
Q. What's the easiest way to eliminate the squeaks from kitchen cabinet drawers?  
A. Apply soap or paraffin over the offensive area. This not only will get rid of the noise, but the drawers will move quickly and smoothly in and out.  
Q. Is it possible to plane the edge of a plywood board?  
A. Planing plywood is not recommended, though some experts are able to do so with little or no splintering. If it is absolutely necessary, be sure the plane blade is very sharp and in a shallow position. To minimize splintering, first plane a bevel on outside plies to required depth.

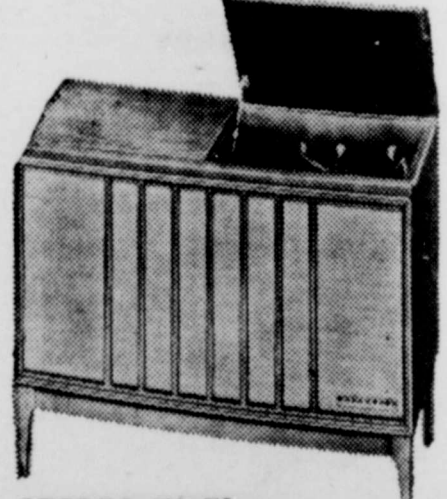

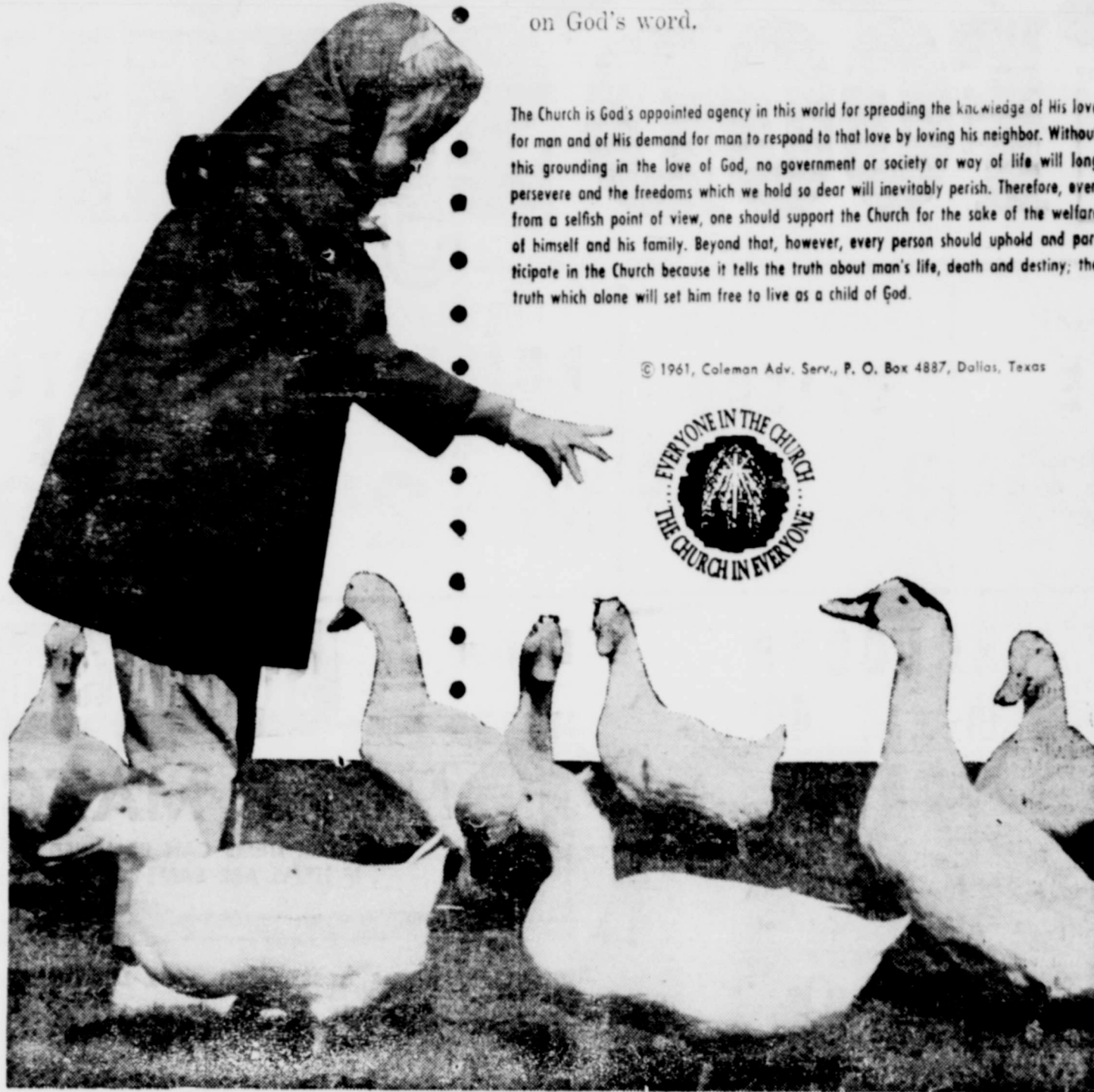

AN ORDINANCE CREATING THE OFFICE OF POUNDMASTER, PROVIDING FOR THE APPOINTMENT, DUTIES AND COMPENSATION OF A POUNDMASTER, PROVIDING FOR THE VACCINATION OF DOGS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT, PROVIDING FOR THE OBSERVATION OF DOGS THAT BITE OR BREAK THE SKIN OF ANY PERSON; PROVIDING FOR THE DESTRUCTION OF A DOG JUDGED TO BE RABID; PROVIDING THAT NO DOG EXPOSED TO RABIES SHALL BE KILLED WITHOUT PERMISSION OF THE COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT; PROVIDING THE DISPOSITION OF ANY ANIMAL FOUND TO BE INFLECTED WITH RABIES; PROHIBITING THE RUNNING AT LARGE OF ANY DOG OR CAT WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF BURKBURNETT UNLESS UNDER THE IMMEDIATE CONTROL OF A COMPETENT PERSON; PROHIBITING THE KEEPING OF ANY LIVESTOCK OR FOWL WITHIN THE ONE HUNDRED (100) FEET OF ANY BUILDING OR STRUCTURE USED FOR SLEEPING, DINING OR LIVING; PROVIDING FOR THE IMPOUNDMENT OF ANY DOG, CAT, LIVESTOCK OR FOWL FOUND IN VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING FOR FEES TO BE CHARGED BY THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT IN CONNECTION WITH THE IMPOUNDMENT OF ANY SUCH ANIMAL OR THE SALE OF ANY SUCH ANIMAL TO DEFRAY COST OF IMPOUNDMENT AND KEEP; PROVIDING FOR THE DESTRUCTION OF ANY DOG OR CAT NOT CLAIMED WITHIN FIVE DAYS AFTER BEING

IMPOUNDED. PROVIDING THAT THE POUNDMASTER SHALL USE DUE DILIGENCE IN ATTEMPTING TO NOTIFY THE OWNER OF ANY ANIMAL IMPOUNDED UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING FOR THE PURCHASE BY THE ORIGINAL OWNER OF ANY ANIMAL SOLD UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY OF NOT LESS THAN FIFTEEN (\$15.00) DOLLARS NOR MORE THAN TWO HUNDRED (\$200.00) DOLLARS, AND PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT, TEXAS.

**SECTION I POUNDMASTER**  
THAT THE City Manager, with the approval of the City Commission, shall appoint a poundmaster and fix compensation therefor, which salary may include a reasonable allowance for expenses incurred in connection with the performance of the duties of the poundmaster, and the City Manager may appoint or provide compensation for an assistant or assistants to the poundmaster. The poundmaster and his assistant or assistants shall be under the supervision and control of the inspection department. It shall be the duties of the poundmaster and his assistants to take up and impound all livestock found running at large within the limits of the City of Burkburnett and to perform such duties as may be directed by the Inspection Department, under terms of this Ordinance.

**SECTION II VACCINATION AND LICENSE**  
It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person or persons to keep or cause to be kept within the territorial limits of the City of Burkburnett, Texas, any dog or cat after the 1st day of July of any year, without first having said dog or cat vaccinated for rabies within the period of sixty days immediately preceding the date of July 1, of each year, presenting a certificate of said vaccination to the Tax Assessor-Collector of the City of Burkburnett and obtaining a license for keeping of said dog or cat in said City of the ensuing or current year; provided, however, any dog or cat that has been vaccinated within the period of ninety days immediately prior to the beginning of the 12 Month Period for which license to keep said dog or cat within said City must be obtained under the provisions herein, may be licensed for the said period upon presentation of a certificate of said vaccination of same to the Tax Assessor-Collector of the City of Burkburnett, Texas. All dogs and cats are to be vaccinated on becoming three months old.

**SECTION III POUND**  
The City Commission shall erect or establish a place for impounding said animals as are found running at large.

**SECTION IV**  
A. Every animal which bites a person shall be promptly reported to the County Health Department and shall thereupon be securely quarantined at the direction of the County Health Department for a period of ten (10) days, and shall not be released from such quarantine except by written permission of the County Health Department, such quarantine will be at the owner's option and expense in a veterinary hospital of his choice.

**SECTION IV**  
B. When the report of the State Health Department or a laboratory examination approved by the Health Department gives a positive diagnosis of rabies, the County Health Department shall recommend a city-wide quarantine; no animal shall be taken into the streets, or permitted to be in the streets or off the premises of the owner or keeper during such period of quarantine.

**SECTION IV**  
C. During such period of rabies quarantine as herein mentioned, every animal bitten by an animal adjudged to be rabid shall be forewith destroyed, or at the owner's expense under six months quarantine as provided in Section A.

**SECTION V RESTRAINT**  
The owner shall keep his dog or cat under restraint at all times and shall not permit such dog or cat to be at large off the premises or property of the owner, unless on leash and under the control of a competent person.

**SECTION VI RUNNING AT LARGE**  
That it shall be unlawful for the owner, keeper or person in charge of any horse, mule, jack, jenny, cow, sheep, chickens, ducks, geese, guineas, or turkeys to allow or permit the same to run at large within the limits of the City of Burkburnett. Every such animal shall be kept in a stable, shed, pen or other enclosure and every such stable, shed, pen or other enclosure for such animals shall be a distance of at least one hundred (100) feet from every building or structure used for sleeping, dining and living.

**SECTION VII FEES**  
A. The poundmaster of the City of Burkburnett is authorized and directed to impound all animals subject to provisions of this Ordinance which are found to be in violation of this ordinance.  
B. The following fees shall be charged by the poundmaster before any of such animals are surrendered to its owner.  
1. Impoundment fees of animals, excepting fowl, \$4.00.  
2. \$2.00 per day for keeping of all animals, excepting fowl.  
3. The fees to be paid on fowl shall be one half of fee above set forth.  
C. The fees or money received by the poundmaster under provision of this ordinance shall be paid to the City Clerk and shall be used for defraying of costs incurred in connection with enforcement of the provisions of this ordinance.  
D. The owner of every dog or cat within the City limits of the City of Burkburnett shall on or before the 1st day of July of each year obtain a license for each animal above mentioned for the oncoming 12 month period. The following fees shall be charged for license: \$2.00 for males; \$2.00 for spayed females; and \$4.00 for females.

**SECTION VIII Disposal or Sale of Animals**  
A. Any dog or cat impounded under the provisions of this ordinance shall be kept for a period of five days and after such period of time, if such animal has not been claimed and fees as above provided paid by the owner of such animal, it shall become the property of the City of Burkburnett and disposed of at the discretion of the City of Burkburnett.  
B. It shall be the duty of the poundmaster upon impounding any animal under the provision of this ordinance to use due diligence to notify or ascertain the owner of such animal that such animal is impounded in the City Pound.  
C. Within three (3) days after impounding any livestock or fowl, the poundmaster shall

post a notice at the City Hall, giving therein a full description of such animal so taken up and impounded and stating a day and place of sale of such animals, which date of sale shall not be less than five (5) days from the date of posting notice, and said animals shall be sold at public auction to the highest bidder.

D. The City of Burkburnett is authorized to transfer title of any animal sold under the provision of this ordinance to the purchaser.

E. After deducting the fees for impounding, keeping and selling each animal, the Poundmaster shall return the balance of such sale, if any, to the owner. If the owner fails to call for the said amount within fifteen (15) days from the date of sale, then he shall pay the same over to the City Clerk.

F. That anytime within six months from the date of sale, the owner of any animal impounded, and sold under the provisions of this ordinance shall have the right to redeem the same by paying the purchaser thereof double amount paid by said purchaser for such animal and his reasonable expenses incurred in keeping the same.

G. That the Poundmaster shall keep a book in which he shall record a description of all animals impounded, dates of impounding, amount realized from sale, the fees and expenses due for impounding and keeping the animal, the name of the owner, if known, and the name of the purchaser. H. That the term "person" as used herein shall be construed to include both singular and plural and shall mean and embrace any individual, corporation, association, partnership or society, and their agents, servants and employees.

**SECTION IX PENALTY**  
That any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction hereof, shall be fined not less than (15) dollars

and not more than two hundred (\$200.00) dollars, and each and every day of such violation shall be deemed a separate and complete offense.

**SECTION X**  
All ordinances in conflict with the provisions hereof are hereby repealed, it being the intended purpose that the foregoing Ordinance shall be exclusive as to the subject matter therein contained.

**SECTION XI**  
Should any provision sentence,

paragraph or clause of this ordinance be deemed unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such determination shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions hereof.

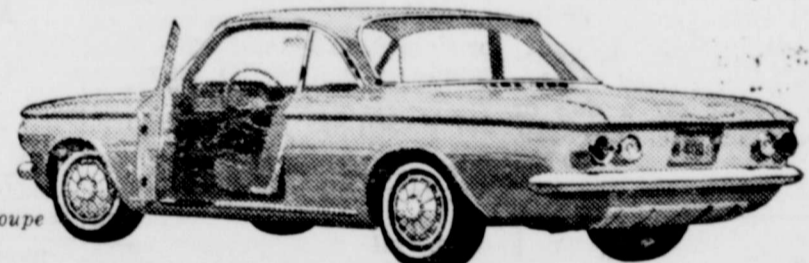

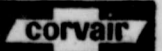

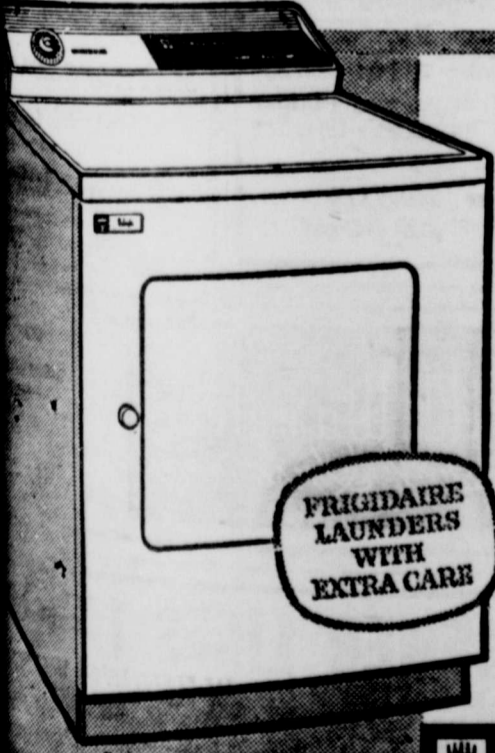
